A-Engrossed House Bill 2222

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Requires superintendent of Oregon State Hospital to establish and implement program for hiring relief positions consisting of health care personnel who provide specified services.]

Provides that Oregon State Hospital may not procure psychiatric treatment for patients at hospital by number of physicians employed by or contracting with Oregon Health and Science University that is in excess of 25 percent of total number of physicians who provide psychiatric treatment at hospital.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to the Oregon State Hospital; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding ORS chapter 190, any interagency agreement between the Oregon Health Authority and the Oregon Health and Science University for the procurement of psychiatric treatment for patients of the Oregon State Hospital by physicians employed by or contracting with the university may not provide for the procurement of psychiatric treatment for patients of the hospital by a number of physicians employed by or contracting with the university that is in excess of 25 percent of the total number of physicians who provide psychiatric treatment at the hospital.

SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2015 Act applies to agreements between the Oregon Health Authority and the Oregon Health and Science University that are entered into, renewed or extended on or after the effective date of this 2015 Act.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect on its passage.
