Testimony in Support of HB 4131: Family Preservation Project, Coffee Creek
Correctional Facility

Chair Sanchez, Vice Chairs Bynum and Sprenger and members of the Committee.

My name is Trish Garner and I am the State Public Policy Chair of the American Association of University Women of Oregon. AAUW has been empowering women since 1881 by advancing equity through advocacy, education, and research.

Female inmates bring distinct needs to imprisonment, including the need to ameliorate the effects of past trauma, escape poverty, and deal with the emotional challenges associated with being a primary caregiver to a child who has to be left behind. Once released, these women face much higher rates of unemployment and homelessness and are less likely to have a high school education compared to formerly incarcerated men.¹

The children and family members of incarcerated women are often "hidden victims" of a parent's incarceration.² These effects are associated with challenges such as psychological strain, antisocial behavior, suspension or expulsion from school, economic hardship and criminal behavior. The most significant factor that is associated with a child's ability to overcome these challenges and succeed in life is the parent-child bond.

The Family Preservation Project meets these challenges head on and, guided by gender-specific, trauma informed and multidisciplinary supports, seeks to foster a foundation for future family success. It recognizes that the maintenance of contact with the incarcerated parent is the single most important factor in supporting a child's attachments to his or her parents, siblings and other family members.³ A variety of counseling, educational and co-support processes also help families deal with the emotional trauma and anxiety of incarceration and reentry into the community.

Since its inception more than 400 women at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility have been connected with their children and been provided with supervised visits, parent coaching, wraparound services, resource centers and post-prison support. Results have been positive, including reduced recidivism and placement of children in care, as well as increasing academic, social and emotional outcomes for the inmates and their children.
