# REVENUE IMPACT OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

### **Measure Description**

Limits historical property special assessments to one 15-year term prospectively for all types of property unless a second 15 year term is approved by the local governing authority. Permits completion of the second 15-year term of special assessment. Requires that an application for special assessment include a preservation plan that must have a schedule for completing substantial work to the exterior of the building within the first 5 years of special assessment. Creates a Task Force on Historic Property to conduct a comprehensive review of the special assessment of the historic properties program. Requires Task Force to report to the Governor prior to October 1, 2008. Effective 91 days after sine die.

## Impact Explanation:

#### Data:

- The FY0709 current expenditure for exemption is \$29 million.
- Roughly 75% of the 2,400 historically designated properties will be eligible to apply for a second 15 year exemption at some time in the future.
- 35% of the value of the exemptions pertains to residential property.
   (Source: The FY0709 Tax Expenditure Report, Department of Revenue, pp. 290-291).
- Since FY0506, only 17 cities and 2 counties have approved the second 15 year exemption for residential properties. (Source :Oregon Parks and Recreation Dept.)

#### Assumptions:

- 5% of the taxable amount attached to the residential exemptions will be approved for a second 15 year term, spread out over the next 10 years.
- 50% of the taxable amount that pertains to commercial exemptions will be approved for a second 15 year term, spread out over the next 10 years.

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
