WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Creates the crime of subjecting another person to involuntary servitude in the first			
and second degree with first degree	set as a Class B felony and second degree as a Class C felony. Creates the crime of

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: Replaces the bill.

BACKGROUND: Human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery. Victims of human trafficking are young children, teenagers, men and women. Approximately 800,000 to 900,000 victims annually are trafficked across international borders worldwide, and between 14,500 and 17,500 of those victims are trafficked into the United States, according to the U.S. Department of State. Victims of human trafficking are subjected to force, fraud, or coercion, for the purpose of sexual exploitation or forced labor.

A person commits the crime of theft by extortion when the person compels another person to deliver property to the person or another person by instilling fear in the other person, that if the property is not delivered, the other person or someone close to the other person will be harmed. The harm could include physical harm, damage to property, exposing secret or publicizing facts subjecting the other person to hatred or contempt, or use or abuse of the position a public servant has by performing some act related to official duties.

A person commits the crime of coercion when the person compels another person to engage in conduct from which the other person has a legal right not to do, or to not engage in conduct that the other person has a legal right to engage in, by means of instilling fear in the other person. A person may instill fear in another person by threatening to: (a) Unlawfully cause physical injury to some person; (b) Unlawfully cause damage to property; (c) Engage in conduct constituting a crime; (d) Falsely accuse some person of a crime; (e) Cause or continue a strike, boycott except that such a threat is not deemed coercive when the act or omission compelled is for the benefit of the group in whose interest the actor purports to act; (f) Testify falsely or provide false information; or (g) Unlawfully use or abuse a person's position as a public servant.
