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**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:** Requires a county that has a local public safety coordinating council to publish annually a summary of program, service and budget changes the county made in response to its public safety coordinating council's recommendations. Requires that the report be provided to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission. Requires a county to fill a vacancy in its public safety coordinating council within three months after the vacancy becomes vacant or as soon as possible. Requires the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission to add to its comprehensive long-range plan for a coordinated state criminal justice system the effective utilization of local public safety coordinating councils.

**ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

**EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT:** Requires copy of report to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, to annually publish a summary ( not a report) and to fill vacancies within three months or as soon as possible.

**BACKGROUND:** ORS 423.560 requires each county to convene a local public safety coordinating council. The council must include: (1) A police chief; (2) The district attorney; (3) The sheriff; (4) A state court judge; (5) A public defender; (6) The director of community corrections; (7) A city councilor or mayor; (8) A representative of the state police; and (9) A representative of the Oregon Youth Authority. Councils are responsible for developing a plan for the use of state resources to serve the local offender population and for developing a plan to serve the needs of the local offender population who are at least 15 years of age, but not yet 18 years of age.
