SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Exempts from disclosure, unless public interest requires otherwise, home address and telephone number in voter registration records of **public safety officer**, district attorney, deputy district attorney or assistant attorney general, if person requests information not be disclosed.

Exempts from disclosure, unless public interest requires otherwise, name of public safety officer, district attorney, deputy district attorney or assistant attorney general contained in county assessment or taxation records, if person requests information not be disclosed.

Specifies limits of exemptions.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 192.501 is amended to read:

6 192.501. The following public records are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505
7 unless the public interest requires disclosure in the particular instance:

8 (1) Records of a public body pertaining to litigation to which the public body is a party if the
9 complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the public body shows that such
10 litigation is reasonably likely to occur. This exemption does not apply to litigation which has been
11 concluded, and nothing in this subsection shall limit any right or opportunity granted by discovery
12 or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or potential litigation;

13 (2) Trade secrets. "Trade secrets," as used in this section, may include, but are not limited to,
14 any formula, plan, pattern, process, tool, mechanism, compound, procedure, production data, or
15 compilation of information which is not patented, which is known only to certain individuals within
16 an organization and which is used in a business it conducts, having actual or potential commercial
17 value, and which gives its user an opportunity to obtain a business advantage over competitors who
18 do not know or use it;

19 (3) Investigatory information compiled for criminal law purposes. The record of an arrest or the
20 report of a crime shall be disclosed unless and only for so long as there is a clear need to delay
21 disclosure in the course of a specific investigation, including the need to protect the complaining
22 party or the victim. Nothing in this subsection shall limit any right constitutionally guaranteed, or
23 granted by statute, to disclosure or discovery in criminal cases. For purposes of this subsection, the
24 record of an arrest or the report of a crime includes, but is not limited to:

25 (a) The arrested person's name, age, residence, employment, marital status and similar bi-

2 (b) The offense with which the arrested person is charged;

5 (e) The identity of the investigating and arresting agency and the length of the investigation;

6 (f) The circumstances of arrest, including time, place, resistance, pursuit and weapons used; and

7 (g) Such information as may be necessary to enlist public assistance in apprehending fugitives
8 from justice;

9 (4) Test questions, scoring keys, and other data used to administer a licensing examination,
10 employment, academic or other examination or testing procedure before the examination is given
11 and if the examination is to be used again. Records establishing procedures for and instructing
12 persons administering, grading or evaluating an examination or testing procedure are included in
13 this exemption, to the extent that disclosure would create a risk that the result might be affected;

14 (5) Information consisting of production records, sale or purchase records or catch records, or
15 similar business records of a private concern or enterprise, required by law to be submitted to or
16 inspected by a governmental body to allow it to determine fees or assessments payable or to estab-
17 lish production quotas, and the amounts of such fees or assessments payable or paid, to the extent
18 that such information is in a form which would permit identification of the individual concern or
19 enterprise. This exemption does not include records submitted by long term care facilities as defined
20 in ORS 442.015 to the state for purposes of reimbursement of expenses or determining fees for pa-
21 tient care. Nothing in this subsection shall limit the use which can be made of such information for
22 regulatory purposes or its admissibility in any enforcement proceeding;

23 (6) Information relating to the appraisal of real estate prior to its acquisition;

24 (7) The names and signatures of employees who sign authorization cards or petitions for the
25 purpose of requesting representation or decertification elections;

26 (8) Investigatory information relating to any complaint filed under ORS 659A.820 or 659A.825,
27 until such time as the complaint is resolved under ORS 659A.835, or a final order is issued under
28 ORS 659A.850;

29 (9) Investigatory information relating to any complaint or charge filed under ORS 243.676 and
30 663.180;

21 make the operations of the entity more efficient, accurate or compliant with applicable rules, pro-

- 44 **SECTION 3.** ORS 181.854 is amended to read:
- 45 181.854. (1) As used in this section:

1 (a) "Public body" has the meaning given that term in ORS 192.410.

2 (b) "Public safety employee" means a certified reserve officer, corrections officer, parole and
3 probation officer, police officer or youth correction officer as those terms are defined in ORS
4 181.610.

5 (2) A public body may not disclose a photograph of a public safety employee of the public body
6 without the written consent of the employee. This subsection does not apply to the use by the public
7 body of a photograph of a public safety employee.

8 (3) A public body may not disclose information about a personnel investigation of a public safety
9 employee of the public body if the investigation does not result in discipline of the employee.

10 (4) Subsection (3) of this section does not apply:

11 (a) When the public interest requires disclosure of the information.

12 (b) When the employee consents to disclosure in writing.

13 (c) When disclosure is necessary for an investigation by the public body, the Department of
14 Public Safety Standards and Training or a citizen review body designated by the public body.

15 (d) When the public body determines that nondisclosure of the information would adversely af-

28 **SECTION 4.** ORS 312.030 is amended to read:

29 312.030. (1) Within two months after the day of delinquency of taxes of each year the tax col-
30 lector shall prepare a list of all real properties then subject to foreclosure. The list shall be known
31 as the foreclosure list and shall contain:

32 (a) The names of the several persons appearing in the latest tax roll as the respective owners
33 of tax-delinquent properties. **If the owner of the property is an attorney or public safety officer**
34 **who has applied for an exemption under ORS 192.501, the list shall state that the name of**
35 **the owner is suppressed by law.**

36 (b) A description of each such property as it appears in the latest tax roll.

37 (c) The year or years for which taxes are delinquent on each property.

40 (2) Thereafter, and until judgment is obtained pursuant to ORS 312.090, interest shall be charged
41 and collected on each of the several amounts of taxes included in the foreclosure list at the rate
42 provided in ORS 311.505 (2).

43 **SECTION 5.** ORS 312.050 is amended to read:

44 312.050. (1) On the day which is three months after the day of delinquency of taxes of the latest
45 year, the tax collector, with the assistance of the district attorney, shall institute proceedings to

1 foreclose the liens for all the delinquent taxes against each of the several properties included in the
2 foreclosure list.

3 (2) One general proceeding shall be brought on the part of the county to foreclose the tax liens
4 against each of the properties included in the foreclosure list. The person whose name appears in
5 the latest tax roll as the owner of any property therein described shall be considered and treated
6 as the owner of the property. Each such proceeding shall be a proceeding in rem against the prop-
7 erty itself. If in any tax roll it appears that the owner of any property is unknown, **or that the**
8 **name of the owner is exempt from disclosure under ORS 191.501**, then [such] the property shall
9 be proceeded against as belonging to an unknown owner.

10 **SECTION 6.** ORS 312.190 is amended to read:

11 312.190. **Subject to an exemption from disclosure that applies under ORS 192.501:**

12 (1) Not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days prior to the expiration of the period of re-
13 demption of any real property ordered sold to the county under a judgment under ORS 312.100, the
14 tax collector shall publish a general notice relative to the expiration of the period of redemption.

15 (2) The notice shall contain the date of the judgment, the date of expiration of the period of
16 redemption, and warning to the effect that all the properties ordered sold under the judgment, unless
17 sooner redeemed, will be deeded to the county immediately on expiration of the period of redemption
18 and that every right or interest of any person in the properties will be forfeited forever to the
19 county.

20 (3) The notice shall be published in two weekly issues of a duly designated newspaper of general
21 circulation in the county within the period of 20 days as specified in this section. Proof of publica-
22 tion shall be attached to and made a part of the deed issued to the county. The published notice
23 may be a general notice and it shall not be necessary to include therein descriptions of the several
24 properties or the names of the respective owners.

25 **SECTION 7.** ORS 192.502 is amended to read:

26 192.502. The following public records are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

27 (1) Communications within a public body or between public bodies of an advisory nature to the
28 extent that they cover other than purely factual materials and are preliminary to any final agency
29 determination of policy or action. This exemption shall not apply unless the public body shows that
30 in the particular instance the public interest in encouraging frank communication between officials
31 and employees of public bodies clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

32 (2) Information of a personal nature such as but not limited to that kept in a personal, medical
33 or similar file, if public disclosure would constitute an unreasonable invasion of privacy, unless the
34 public interest by clear and convincing evidence requires disclosure in the particular instance. The
35 party seeking disclosure shall have the burden of showing that public disclosure would not consti-
36 tute an unreasonable invasion of privacy.

37 (3) Public body employee or volunteer addresses, Social Security numbers, dates of birth and
38 telephone numbers contained in personnel records maintained by the public body that is the em-
39 ployer or the recipient of volunteer services. This exemption:

40 (a) Does not apply to the addresses, dates of birth and telephone numbers of employees or vol-
41 unteers who are elected officials, except that a judge or district attorney subject to election may
42 seek to exempt the judge's or district attorney's address or telephone number, or both, under the
43 terms of ORS 192.445;

44 (b) Does not apply to employees or volunteers to the extent that the party seeking disclosure
45 shows by clear and convincing evidence that the public interest requires disclosure in a particular

1 instance;

2 (c) Does not apply to a substitute teacher as defined in ORS 342.815 when requested by a pro-
3 fessional education association of which the substitute teacher may be a member; and

4 (d) Does not relieve a public employer of any duty under ORS 243.650 to 243.782.

5 (4) Information submitted to a public body in confidence and not otherwise required by law to
6 be submitted, where such information should reasonably be considered confidential, the public body
7 has obliged itself in good faith not to disclose the information, and when the public interest would
8 suffer by the disclosure.

9 (5) Information or records of the Department of Corrections, including the State Board of Parole
10 and Post-Prison Supervision, to the extent that disclosure would interfere with the rehabilitation of
11 a person in custody of the department or substantially prejudice or prevent the carrying out of the
12 functions of the department, if the public interest in confidentiality clearly outweighs the public in-
13 terest in disclosure.

14 (6) Records, reports and other information received or compiled by the Director of the Depart-
15 ment of Consumer and Business Services in the administration of ORS chapters 723 and 725 not
16 otherwise required by law to be made public, to the extent that the interests of lending institutions,
17 their officers, employees and customers in preserving the confidentiality of such information out-
18 weighs the public interest in disclosure.

19 (7) Reports made to or filed with the court under ORS 137.077 or 137.530.

20 (8) Any public records or information the disclosure of which is prohibited by federal law or
21 regulations.

22 (9) Public records or information the disclosure of which is prohibited or restricted or otherwise
23 made confidential or privileged under Oregon law.

24 (10) Public records or information described in this section, furnished by the public body ori-
25 ginally compiling, preparing or receiving them to any other public officer or public body in con-
26 nection with performance of the duties of the recipient, if the considerations originally giving rise
27 to the confidential or exempt nature of the public records or information remain applicable.

28 (11) Records of the Energy Facility Siting Council concerning the review or approval of security
29 programs pursuant to ORS 469.530.

30 (12) Employee and retiree address, telephone number and other nonfinancial membership records
31 and employee financial records maintained by the Public Employees Retirement System pursuant to
32 ORS chapters 238 and 238A.

33 (13) Records submitted by private persons or businesses to the State Treasurer or the Oregon
34 Investment Council relating to proposed acquisition, exchange or liquidation of public investments
35 under ORS chapter 293 may be treated as exempt from disclosure when and only to the extent that
36 disclosure of such records reasonably may be expected to substantially limit the ability of the
37 Oregon Investment Council to effectively compete or negotiate for, solicit or conclude such trans-
38 actions. Records which relate to concluded transactions are not subject to this exemption.

39 (14) The monthly reports prepared and submitted under ORS 293.761 and 293.766 concerning the
40 Public Employees Retirement Fund and the Industrial Accident Fund may be uniformly treated as
41 exempt from disclosure for a period of up to 90 days after the end of the calendar quarter.

42 (15) Reports of unclaimed property filed by the holders of such property to the extent permitted
43 by ORS 98.352.

44 (16) The following records, communications and information submitted to the Oregon Economic
45 and Community Development Commission, the Economic and Community Development Department,

1 the State Department of Agriculture, the Oregon Growth Account Board, the Port of Portland or
2 other ports, as defined in ORS 777.005, by applicants for investment funds, loans or services includ-
3 ing, but not limited to, those described in ORS 285A.224:

4 (a) Personal financial statements.

5 (b) Financial statements of applicants.

6 (c) Customer lists.

7 (d) Information of an applicant pertaining to litigation to which the applicant is a party if the
8 complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the applicant shows that such
9 litigation is reasonably likely to occur; this exemption does not apply to litigation which has been
10 concluded, and nothing in this paragraph shall limit any right or opportunity granted by discovery
11 or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or potential litigation.

12 (e) Production, sales and cost data.

13 (f) Marketing strategy information that relates to applicant's plan to address specific markets
14 and applicant's strategy regarding specific competitors.

15 (17) Records, reports or returns submitted by private concerns or enterprises required by law
16 to be submitted to or inspected by a governmental body to allow it to determine the amount of any
17 transient lodging tax payable and the amounts of such tax payable or paid, to the extent that such
18 information is in a form which would permit identification of the individual concern or enterprise.
19 Nothing in this subsection shall limit the use which can be made of such information for regulatory
20 purposes or its admissibility in any enforcement proceedings. The public body shall notify the tax-
21 payer of the delinquency immediately by certified mail. However, in the event that the payment or
22 delivery of transient lodging taxes otherwise due to a public body is delinquent by over 60 days, the
23 public body shall disclose, upon the request of any person, the following information:

24 (a) The identity of the individual concern or enterprise that is delinquent over 60 days in the
25 payment or delivery of the taxes.

26 (b) The period for which the taxes are delinquent.

27 (c) The actual, or estimated, amount of the delinquency.

28 (18) All information supplied by a person under ORS 151.485 for the purpose of requesting ap-
29 pointed counsel, and all information supplied to the court from whatever source for the purpose of
30 verifying the financial eligibility of a person pursuant to ORS 151.485.

31 (19) Workers' compensation claim records of the Department of Consumer and Business Services,
32 except in accordance with rules adopted by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Busi-
33 ness Services, in any of the following circumstances:

34 (a) When necessary for insurers, self-insured employers and third party claim administrators to
35 process workers' compensation claims.

36 (b) When necessary for the director, other governmental agencies of this state or the United
37 States to carry out their duties, functions or powers.

38 (c) When the disclosure is made in such a manner that the disclosed information cannot be used
39 to identify any worker who is the subject of a claim.

40 (d) When a worker or the worker's representative requests review of the worker's claim record.

41 (20) Sensitive business records or financial or commercial information of the Oregon Health and
42 Science University that is not customarily provided to business competitors.

43 (21) Records of Oregon Health and Science University regarding candidates for the position of
44 president of the university.

45 (22) The records of a library, including circulation records, showing use of specific library ma-

1 terial by a named person or consisting of the name of a library patron together with the address
2 or telephone number, or both, of the patron.

3 (23) The following records, communications and information obtained by the Housing and Com-
4 munity Services Department in connection with the department's monitoring or administration of
5 financial assistance or of housing or other developments:

6 (a) Personal and corporate financial statements and information, including tax returns.

7 (b) Credit reports.

8 (c) Project appraisals.

9 (d) Market studies and analyses.

10 (e) Articles of incorporation, partnership agreements and operating agreements.

11 (f) Commitment letters.

12 (g) Project pro forma statements.

13 (h) Project cost certifications and cost data.

14 (i) Audits.

15 (j) Project tenant correspondence.

16 (k) Personal information about a tenant.

17 (L) Housing assistance payments.

18 (24) Raster geographic information system (GIS) digital databases, provided by private forestland
19 owners or their representatives, voluntarily and in confidence to the State Forestry Department,
20 that is not otherwise required by law to be submitted.

21 (25) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by a
22 public body engaged in the business of providing electricity or electricity services, if the information
23 is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 261.348, or if the information is directly related
24 to a bid, proposal or negotiations for the sale or purchase of electricity or electricity services, and
25 disclosure of the information would cause a competitive disadvantage for the public body or its re-
26 tail electricity customers. This subsection does not apply to cost-of-service studies used in the de-
27 velopment or review of generally applicable rate schedules.

28 (26) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by the
29 City of Klamath Falls, acting solely in connection with the ownership and operation of the Klamath
30 Cogeneration Project, if the information is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 225.085
31 and disclosure of the information would cause a competitive disadvantage for the Klamath
32 Cogeneration Project. This subsection does not apply to cost-of-service studies used in the develop-
33 ment or review of generally applicable rate schedules.

34 (27) Personally identifiable information about customers of a municipal electric utility or a
35 people's utility district or the names, dates of birth, driver license numbers, telephone numbers,
36 electronic mail addresses or Social Security numbers of customers who receive water, sewer or
37 storm drain services from a public body as defined in ORS 174.109. The utility or district may re-
38 lease personally identifiable information about a customer, and a public body providing water, sewer
39 or storm drain services may release the name, date of birth, driver license number, telephone num-
40 ber, electronic mail address or Social Security number of a customer, if the customer consents in
41 writing or electronically, if the disclosure is necessary for the utility, district or other public body
42 to render services to the customer, if the disclosure is required pursuant to a court order or if the
43 disclosure is otherwise required by federal or state law. The utility, district or other public body
44 may charge as appropriate for the costs of providing such information. The utility, district or other
45 public body may make customer records available to third party credit agencies on a regular basis

1 in connection with the establishment and management of customer accounts or in the event such
2 accounts are delinquent.

3 (28) A record of the street and number of an employee's address submitted to a special district
4 to obtain assistance in promoting an alternative to single occupant motor vehicle transportation.

5 (29) Sensitive business records, capital development plans or financial or commercial information
6 of Oregon Corrections Enterprises that is not customarily provided to business competitors.

7 (30) Documents, materials or other information submitted to the Director of the Department of
8 Consumer and Business Services in confidence by a state, federal, foreign or international regulatory
9 or law enforcement agency or by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners, its affiliates
10 or subsidiaries under ORS 646.380 to 646.398, 697.005 to 697.095, 697.602 to 697.842, 705.137, 717.200
11 to 717.320, 717.900 or 717.905, ORS chapter 59, 722, 723, 725 or 726, the Bank Act or the Insurance
12 Code when:

13 (a) The document, material or other information is received upon notice or with an under-
14 standing that it is confidential or privileged under the laws of the jurisdiction that is the source of
15 the document, material or other information; and

16 (b) The director has obligated the Department of Consumer and Business Services not to dis-
17 close the document, material or other information.

18 (31) A county elections security plan developed and filed under ORS 254.074.

19 (32) Information about review or approval of programs relating to the security of:

20 (a) Generation, storage or conveyance of:

21 (A) Electricity;

22 (B) Gas in liquefied or gaseous form;

23 (C) Hazardous substances as defined in ORS 453.005 (7)(a), (b) and (d);

24 (D) Petroleum products;

25 (E) Sewage; or

26 (F) Water.

27 (b) Telecommunication systems, including cellular, wireless or radio systems.

28 (c) Data transmissions by whatever means provided.

29 (33) The information specified in ORS 25.020 (8) if the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court des-
30 ignates the information as confidential by rule under ORS 1.002.

31 *[(34) If requested by a public safety officer as defined in ORS 181.610, the home address, home
32 telephone number and electronic mail address of the public safety officer. This exemption does not apply
33 to addresses and telephone numbers that are contained in county real property or lien records.]*

34 **SECTION 8. The amendments to ORS 181.854, 192.501, 192.502, 312.030, 312.050 and 312.190**
35 **by sections 1 to 7 of this 2007 Act apply to records in the custody of a public body on or after**
36 **the effective date of this 2007 Act.**

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
