House Bill 3418

Sponsored by Representative BUTLER

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Establishes Oregon Main Street Program in State Parks and Recreation Department to encourage preservation of historic character of commercial neighborhoods.

2 Relating to Oregon Main Street Program.

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- 3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
 - SECTION 1. (1) There is established within the State Parks and Recreation Department the Oregon Main Street Program.
 - (2) The purposes of the program include the following:
 - (a) To assist communities in restoring and retaining the historic character of downtown areas and historic commercial districts;
- 9 (b) To stimulate business investment, assist in retaining existing small businesses and 10 promote new businesses in downtown areas and historic commercial districts;
 - (c) To strengthen the local tax base;
 - (d) To create employment opportunities in downtown areas and historic commercial districts;
 - (e) To stimulate heritage tourism; and
- 15 (f) To enhance the economic viability of downtown areas and historic commercial dis-16 tricts.
 - <u>SECTION 2.</u> To carry out the objectives of the Oregon Main Street Program, the State Parks and Recreation Department shall:
 - (1) Assist local governments and historic commercial districts in establishing and implementing downtown revitalization programs;
 - (2) Provide technical assistance with building and streetscape design, marketing and promotions, economic assessments and analyses, and organizational development;
 - (3) Coordinate the delivery of services and programs from other state agencies and organizations;
 - (4) Contract for services the department determines are necessary to meet local needs;
 - (5) Provide grant funding, as available, to assist local programs and projects; and
 - (6) Conduct training for prospective and current program participants.
 - SECTION 3. (1) In performing its duties for the Oregon Main Street Program, the State Parks and Recreation Department may:
- 30 (a) Conduct hearings and conferences to develop facts, to explain programs and activities 31 and to obtain advice.

- (b) Enter into agreements with other public agencies and with associations and individuals for services that will assist the program.
- (c) Enter into agreements with other public agencies of Oregon or with agencies of other states or the federal government, and with private corporations, associations and individuals in Oregon or other states for cooperative endeavors that further the objectives of the program.
- (d) Make grants to local agencies, to associations or to individuals for the development and conservation of programs or projects in accordance with policies and procedures adopted under this section.
- (2) In carrying out the purposes of the Oregon Main Street Program under sections 1 to 3 of this 2007 Act, in addition to the other powers granted, the department:
- (a) Shall appoint, as needed, committees, consultants, architects and other persons expert in subjects of concern to the program to advise and assist the department in administering the program.
- (b) May obtain from any state agency necessary assistance and data, to the extent permitted by laws relating to confidentiality.
 - (c) May perform other acts necessary to carry out the department's duties.
 - (3)(a) The department shall adopt rules governing the operation of the program.
- (b) The department shall consult with the Economic and Community Development Department, Travel Oregon and other state agencies and organizations involved in community development, economic development, heritage tourism and historic preservation to ensure that the program meets local needs and, to the extent possible, is compatible with the principles of the Main Street Program developed by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

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
