

# House Bill 3510

Sponsored by Representatives HUNT, C EDWARDS; Representatives BARKER, CLEM, COWAN, D EDWARDS, RILEY

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Removes statute of limitations for certain felony sex crimes in cases involving victim under 18 years of age.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to statutes of limitations; amending ORS 131.125.

3 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

4 **SECTION 1.** ORS 131.125 is amended to read:

5 131.125. (1) A prosecution for aggravated murder, murder, attempted murder or aggravated  
6 murder, conspiracy or solicitation to commit aggravated murder or murder or any degree of  
7 manslaughter may be commenced at any time after the commission of the attempt, conspiracy or  
8 solicitation to commit aggravated murder or murder, or the death of the person killed.

9 (2) A prosecution for any of the following felonies may be commenced within six years after the  
10 commission of the crime or, if the victim at the time of the crime was under 18 years of age, [*anytime*  
11 *before the victim attains 30 years of age or within 12 years after the offense is reported to a law*  
12 *enforcement agency or the Department of Human Services, whichever occurs first*] **at any time after**  
13 **the commission of the crime:**

14 (a) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205.

15 (b) Rape in the third degree under ORS 163.355.

16 (c) Rape in the second degree under ORS 163.365.

17 (d) Rape in the first degree under ORS 163.375.

18 (e) Sodomy in the third degree under ORS 163.385.

19 (f) Sodomy in the second degree under ORS 163.395.

20 (g) Sodomy in the first degree under ORS 163.405.

21 (h) Unlawful sexual penetration in the second degree under ORS 163.408.

22 (i) Unlawful sexual penetration in the first degree under ORS 163.411.

23 (j) Sexual abuse in the second degree under ORS 163.425.

24 (k) Sexual abuse in the first degree under ORS 163.427.

25 (L) Using a child in a display of sexual conduct under ORS 163.670.

26 (m) Encouraging child sexual abuse in the first degree under ORS 163.684.

27 (n) Incest under ORS 163.525.

28 (o) Promoting prostitution under ORS 167.012.

29 (p) Compelling prostitution under ORS 167.017.

30 (3) A prosecution for any of the following misdemeanors may be commenced within four years  
31 after the commission of the crime or, if the victim at the time of the crime was under 18 years of

1 age, anytime before the victim attains 22 years of age or within four years after the offense is re-  
 2 ported to a law enforcement agency or the Department of Human Services, whichever occurs first:

- 3 (a) Sexual abuse in the third degree under ORS 163.415.
- 4 (b) Furnishing obscene materials to minors under ORS 167.065.
- 5 (c) Sending obscene materials to minors under ORS 167.070.
- 6 (d) Exhibiting an obscene performance to a minor under ORS 167.075.
- 7 (e) Displaying obscene materials to minors under ORS 167.080.

8 (4) In the case of crimes described in subsection (2)(L) of this section, the “victim” is the child  
 9 engaged in sexual conduct. In the case of the crime described in subsection (2)(n) of this section, the  
 10 “victim” is the party to the incest other than the party being prosecuted. In the case of crimes de-  
 11 scribed in subsection (2)(o) and (p) of this section, the “victim” is the child whose acts of prostitution  
 12 are promoted or compelled.

13 (5) A prosecution for arson in any degree may be commenced within six years after the com-  
 14 mission of the crime.

15 (6) Except as provided in subsection (7) of this section or as otherwise expressly provided by  
 16 law, prosecutions for other offenses must be commenced within the following periods of limitations  
 17 after their commission:

- 18 (a) For any other felony, three years.
- 19 (b) For any misdemeanor, two years.
- 20 (c) For a violation, six months.

21 (7) If the period prescribed in subsection (6) of this section has expired, a prosecution never-  
 22 theless may be commenced as follows:

23 (a) If the offense has as a material element either fraud or the breach of a fiduciary obligation,  
 24 prosecution may be commenced within one year after discovery of the offense by an aggrieved party  
 25 or by a person who has a legal duty to represent an aggrieved party and who is not a party to the  
 26 offense, but in no case shall the period of limitation otherwise applicable be extended by more than  
 27 three years;

28 (b) If the offense is based upon misconduct in office by a public officer or employee, prosecution  
 29 may be commenced at any time while the defendant is in public office or employment or within two  
 30 years thereafter, but in no case shall the period of limitation otherwise applicable be extended by  
 31 more than three years; or

32 (c) If the offense is an invasion of personal privacy under ORS 163.700, prosecution may be  
 33 commenced within one year after discovery of the offense by the person aggrieved by the offense,  
 34 by a person who has a legal duty to represent the person aggrieved by the offense or by a law  
 35 enforcement agency, but in no case shall the period of limitation otherwise applicable be extended  
 36 by more than three years.

37 (8) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, a prosecution for rape in the first or second  
 38 degree or sodomy in the first or second degree may be commenced within 12 years after the com-  
 39 mission of the crime if the defendant is identified after the period described in subsection (2) of this  
 40 section on the basis of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) sample comparisons.
