SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Urges Congress to pass Employee Free Choice Act.

1	JOINT MEMORIAL
2	To the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress as-
3	sembled:
4	We, your memorialists, the Seventy-fourth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in leg-
5	islative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows:
6	Whereas in 1935, the United States established, by law, that workers must be free to form un-
7	ions; and
8	Whereas the freedom to form or join a union is internationally recognized as a fundamental
9	human right; and
10	Whereas union membership provides workers better wages and benefits, and protection from
11	discrimination and unsafe workplaces; and
12	Whereas unions benefit communities by strengthening tax bases, promoting equal treatment and
13	enhancing civic participation; and
14	Whereas workers want to organize but cannot, as more than 58 million United States workers
15	say they would join a union now if they had the opportunity; and
16	Whereas even though on paper America's workers have the freedom to choose for themselves
17	whether to have a union, in reality workers across the nation are routinely denied that right; and
18	Whereas when the right of workers to form a union is violated, wages fall, race and gender pay
19	gaps widen, workplace discrimination increases and job safety standards disappear; and
20	Whereas many thousands of America's workers are routinely threatened, coerced or fired each
21	year because they try to form a union; and
22	Whereas most violations of workers' freedom to choose a union occur behind closed doors, and
23	each year millions of dollars are spent to frustrate workers' efforts to form unions; and
24	Whereas a worker's fundamental right to choose a union is a public issue that requires public
25	policy solutions, including legislative remedies; and
26	Whereas the Employee Free Choice Act has been introduced in the United States Congress in
27	order to restore workers' freedom to join a union; now, therefore,
28	Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:
29	That we, the members of the Seventy-fourth Legislative Assembly, support the Employee Free

Choice Act, which would authorize the National Labor Relations Board to certify a union as the

1	bargaining representative when a majority of employees voluntarily sign authorizations designating
2	the union to represent them, would provide for first-contract mediation and arbitration and would
3	establish meaningful penalties for violations of a worker's freedom to choose a union; and be in
4	further
5	Resolved, That we urge Congress to pass the Employee Free Choice Act to protect and preserve
6	for America's workers their freedom to choose for themselves whether or not to form a union; and
7	be it further
8	Resolved, That a copy of this memorial shall be sent to the Senate Majority Leader and the
9	Speaker of the House of Representatives and to each member of the Oregon Congressional Delega
10	tion.
