Senate Bill 211

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Increases amount transferred each fiscal year from State School Fund to High Cost Disabilities Account.

Increases percentage of children with disabilities for which school district may receive additional weighting for purposes of calculation of State School Fund grant.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2007.

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to school finance; creating new provisions; amending ORS 327.008 and 327.013; and declar ing an emergency.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 <u>SECTION 1.</u> ORS 327.008, as amended by section 6a, chapter 803, Oregon Laws 2005, is 6 amended to read:

327.008. (1) There is established a State School Fund in the General Fund. The fund shall consist
of moneys appropriated by the Legislative Assembly and moneys transferred from the Education
Stability Fund. The State School Fund is continuously appropriated to the Department of Education
for the purposes of ORS 327.006 to 327.077, 327.095, 327.099, 327.101, 327.125, 327.137, 327.348,
327.355, 327.357, 327.360, 336.575, 336.580, 336.635, 342.173, 343.243, 343.533 and 343.961.

(2) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each school district a State School Fund grant, consisting of the positive amount equal to a general purpose grant and a facility grant and a transportation grant and a high cost disabilities grant minus local revenue, computed as provided in ORS 327.013.

(3) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each education service district a
 State School Fund grant as calculated under ORS 327.019.

(4) All figures used in the determination of the distribution of the State School Fund shall beestimates for the same year as the distribution occurs, unless otherwise specified.

(5) Numbers of students in average daily membership used in the distribution formula shall bethe numbers as of June of the year of distribution.

(6) A school district may not use the portion of the State School Fund grant that is attributable
to the facility grant for capital construction costs.

(7) The total amount of the State School Fund that is distributed as facility grants may not exceed \$25 million in any biennium. If the total amount to be distributed as facility grants exceeds this limitation, the Department of Education shall prorate the amount of funds available for facility grants among those school districts that qualified for a facility grant.

(8) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer the amount of [\$12] \$18 million

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1 from the State School Fund to the High Cost Disabilities Account established in ORS 327.348.

2 (9) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer the amount of \$2.5 million from

3 the State School Fund to the Small School District Supplement Fund established in ORS 327.360.

6 327.013. The State School Fund distributions for school districts shall be computed as follows:
