A-Engrossed Senate Bill 296

Ordered by the Senate May 7 Including Senate Amendments dated May 7

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Classifies unlawful delivery of marijuana to person under 18 years of age by person at least 18 years of age and at least three years older than person to whom delivered as crime category 8. Classifies unlawful delivery of Schedule I, II or III controlled substance to person under 18 years of age as crime category 8. Classifies unlawful manufacture or delivery of controlled substance within 1,000 feet of school as crime category 8.

Removes general reference to unlawful delivery of marijuana from crime category 8.

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to controlled substances; amending ORS 475.900.

3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 475.900 is amended to read:

5 475.900. (1) A violation of ORS 475.840, [or] 475.846 to 475.894, **475.904 or 475.906** shall be 6 classified as crime category 8 of the sentencing guidelines grid of the Oregon Criminal Justice 7 Commission if:

8 (a) The violation constitutes delivery or manufacture of a controlled substance and involves 9 substantial quantities of a controlled substance. For purposes of this paragraph, the following 10 amounts constitute substantial quantities of the following controlled substances:

11 (A) Five grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of heroin;

12 (B) Ten grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of cocaine;

(C) Ten grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of metham phetamine, its salts, isomers or salts of its isomers;

(D) One hundred grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount ofhashish;

17 (E) One hundred and fifty grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable 18 amount of marijuana;

(F) Two hundred or more user units of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount
 of lysergic acid diethylamide;

(G) Sixty grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of psilocybin
 or psilocin; or

23 (H) Five grams or more or 25 or more pills, tablets or capsules of a mixture or substance con-

24 taining a detectable amount of:

25 (i) 3,4-methylenedioxyamphetamine;

1 (ii) 3,4-methylenedioxymethamphetamine; or

2 (iii) 3,4-methylenedioxy-N-ethylamphetamine.

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3 (b) The violation constitutes possession, delivery or manufacture of a controlled substance and 4 the possession, delivery or manufacture is a commercial drug offense. A possession, delivery or 5 manufacture is a commercial drug offense for purposes of this subsection if it is accompanied by at 6 least three of the following factors:

7 (A) The delivery was of heroin, cocaine, hashish, marijuana, methamphetamine, lysergic acid
8 diethylamide, psilocybin or psilocin and was for consideration;

(B) The offender was in possession of \$300 or more in cash;

10 (C) The offender was unlawfully in possession of a firearm or other weapon as described in ORS 11 166.270 (2), or the offender used, attempted to use or threatened to use a deadly or dangerous 12 weapon as defined in ORS 161.015, or the offender was in possession of a firearm or other deadly 13 or dangerous weapon as defined in ORS 161.015 for the purpose of using it in connection with a 14 controlled substance offense;

(D) The offender was in possession of materials being used for the packaging of controlled substances such as scales, wrapping or foil, other than the material being used to contain the substance
that is the subject of the offense;

18 (E) The offender was in possession of drug transaction records or customer lists;

19 (F) The offender was in possession of stolen property;

20 (G) Modification of structures by painting, wiring, plumbing or lighting to facilitate a controlled 21 substance offense;

(H) The offender was in possession of manufacturing paraphernalia, including recipes, precursor
 chemicals, laboratory equipment, lighting, ventilating or power generating equipment;

24 (I) The offender was using public lands for the manufacture of controlled substances;

(J) The offender had constructed fortifications or had taken security measures with the potential
 of injuring persons; or

27 (K) The offender was in possession of controlled substances in an amount greater than:

(i) Three grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of heroin;

29 (ii) Eight grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of cocaine;

(iii) Eight grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of metham-phetamine;

32 (iv) Eight grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of hashish;

(v) One hundred ten grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount
 of marijuana;

(vi) Twenty or more user units of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of
 lysergic acid diethylamide;

(vii) Ten grams or more of a mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of psilocybinor psilocin; or

(viii) Four grams or more or 20 or more pills, tablets or capsules of a mixture or substance
 containing a detectable amount of:

41 (I) 3,4-methylenedioxyamphetamine;

42 (II) 3,4-methylenedioxymethamphetamine; or

43 (III) 3,4-methylenedioxy-N-ethylamphetamine.

44 (c) The violation constitutes a violation of ORS 475.848, 475.852, 475.858, [475.860,] 475.862,
45 475.868, 475.872, 475.878, 475.882, 475.888, 475.892 or 475.904.

The state has the burden of proving each factor beyond a reasonable doubt. 39 40 (5) As used in this section, "mixture or substance" means any mixture or substance, whether or not the mixture or substance is in an ingestible or marketable form at the time of the offense. 41 42
