| 1 | On page 1 of the printed A-engrossed bill, after line 4, insert: |
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| 2 | "SECTION 1. The Legislative Assembly finds that: |
| 3 | "(1) The Metolius River Basin is an invaluable and highly sensitive natural area that is |
| 4 | ecologically and scientifically significant because of the basin's unique hydrogeologic char |
| 5 | acteristics, wetlands and ground water resources. |
| 6 | "(2) The Metolius River was added to the federal Wild and Scenic River system in the |
| 7 | Omnibus Oregon Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1988 because the federal government deter |
| 8 | mined the river to be remarkable in all areas of evaluation. |
| 9 | "(3) The basin has unique hydrological and geological features that cannot be adequately |
| 10 | protected through current mitigation practices. Pumping ground water will likely result in |
| 11 | diminished discharge at the principal spring complexes at the head of the Metolius River. |
| 12 | "(4) The Metolius River and its tributaries are home to sensitive and threatened species |
| 13 | of fish, including Redband Trout and Bull Trout, and the Metolius River Subbasin is critical |
| 14 | to the restoration of anadromous fish populations, including Spring Chinook, Sockeye and |
| 15 | Summer Steelhead. |
| 16 | "(5) The basin contains highly sensitive ranges for wintering deer and elk. |
| 17 | "(6) The basin holds significant cultural, economic, religious and historical value for Na |
| 18 | tive American tribes. |
| 19 | "(7) The basin features outstanding scenic views and sites. |
| 20 | "(8) Recognizing the unique values and special qualities of the region's natural resources |
| 21 | and spiritual values, the United States Forest Service, in the Deschutes National Forest Land |
| 22 | and Resource Management Plan of 1990, designated 86,000 acres in the basin as the Metolius |
| 23 | Conservation Area, to be managed subject to heightened standards of protection. |
| 24 | "(9) Protections against resort development in similar significant, noteworthy and na |
| 25 | tionally recognized areas is already codified and should be extended to the basin. |
| 26 | "(10) After nearly 80 years in various private ownership, in recognition of the |
| 27 | transcendent nature of this Oregon treasure, private citizens donated the Metolius |
| 28 | headwater-springs trail, viewpoint area and permanent scenic easement to the United States |
| 29 | Government in 1967, for perpetual preservation and maintenance for the benefit of all people |
| 30 | "(11) The protection of the basin's natural resources, wildlife habitat and historical, cul |
| 31 | tural and scenic values from urban and similar forms of development is a matter of utmos |
| 32 | importance and concern to the State of Oregon.". |
| 33 | In line 5, delete "1" and insert "2". |
| 34 | Delete lines 23 through 25 and insert: |

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"(f) In the Metolius River Basin.

"(g) Within three miles of the Metolius River Basin if on a site located, in whole or in part, 1 2 within Jefferson County that is: 3 "(A) Not owned by a federally recognized Indian tribe; and "(B) West of Southwest Grandview Loop Road.". 4 On page 2, delete lines 1 through 10. 5 In line 11, restore the bracketed material and delete the boldfaced material. In line 18, delete "2" and insert "3" and delete "1" and insert "2". 7 In line 21, delete "3" and insert "4". 8 In line 25, delete "4" and insert "5".

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
