SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Modifies circumstances under which optometrist must refer patient being treated for glaucoma to ophthalmologist. Reorganizes certain existing statutory provisions.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

4 <u>SECTION 1.</u> Section 2 of this 2007 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 683.010 to 5 683.310.

6 <u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) Optometrists utilizing pharmaceutical agents shall be held to the same 7 standards of liability as persons licensed as physicians to practice medicine and surgery by

- (3)(a) An optometrist treating a patient with antiglaucoma medication shall refer the
 patient to an ophthalmologist if:
- 13 (A) The glaucoma progresses despite the use of a single glaucoma medication;

14 (B) More than one medication is required to control the glaucoma; or

- 15 (C) A secondary glaucoma develops.
- (b) Glaucoma shall be considered to be progressing if there is a worsening of the patient's visual field as measured by standard threshold testing or if there is a worsening of the patient's optic nerve as measured by direct observation or standard imaging technology or by rising eye pressure despite the use of medication. Glaucoma shall be considered to be under control if eye pressure, individualized for each patient, is maintained with no progression.

21 **SECTION 3.** ORS 683.270 is amended to read:

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683.270. [(1)] The powers and duties of the Oregon Board of Optometry are as follows:
