SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Permits issuance of teaching, personnel service or administrative license or registration to person convicted of misdemeanor prostitution if Teacher Standards and Practices Commission determines that person is fit to be teacher and date of conviction is more than five years prior to date of application. Allows school district to employ, [or] contract with **or use as volunteer** person convicted of misdemeanor prostitution if district determines that person is fit to be employed by, [or] contract with **or volunteer with** district and date of conviction is more than five years prior to date of employment or date contract is entered into.

Modifies provisions relating to criminal background checks that are applicable to schools. Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2007.
