SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes renewable portfolio standard for electric utilities and electricity service suppliers. Specifies renewable energy sources that can be used to generate electricity for purposes of complying with standard. Provides exemptions from compliance with standard.

Directs State Department of Energy to establish system of renewable energy certificates. Specifies renewable energy certificates that may be used to comply with renewable portfolio standard.

Establishes compliance requirements for renewable portfolio standards. Allows use of alternative compliance payments. Allows Public Utility Commission to impose penalty against electric company or electricity service supplier that fails to comply with standard.

Requires that utilities offer green power rate.

Extends required collection of public purpose charge to January 1, 2026.

Modifies laws relating to people's utility districts.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

5 Whereas the Legislative Assembly finds that it is in the interest of the state to promote research
6 and development of new renewable energy sources in Oregon; and

7 Whereas the Legislative Assembly finds that it is necessary for Oregon's electric utilities to
8 decrease their reliance on fossil fuels for electricity generation and to increase their use of
9 renewable energy sources; and

10 Whereas this 2007 Act may be cited as the Oregon Renewable Energy Act; and

11 Whereas the Oregon Renewable Energy Act provides a comprehensive renewable energy policy
12 for Oregon, enabling industry, government and all Oregonians to accelerate the transition to a more
13 reliable and more affordable energy system; now, therefore,

14 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

DEFINITIONS

SECTION 1. Definitions. As used in sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act:

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19 (1) **"Banked renewable energy certificate" means a bundled or unbundled renewable en-**
20 **ergy certificate that is not used by an electric utility or electricity service supplier to comply**

1 with a renewable portfolio standard in a calendar year and that is carried forward for the
2 purpose of compliance with a renewable portfolio standard in a subsequent year.

3 (2) "BPA electricity" means electricity provided by the Bonneville Power Administration,
4 including all electricity from the Federal Columbia River Power System hydroelectric
5 projects and other electricity acquired by the Bonneville Power Administration by contract.

6 (3) "Bundled renewable energy certificate" means a renewable energy certificate for
7 qualifying electricity that is acquired:

8 (a) By an electric utility or electricity service supplier by a trade, purchase or other
9 transfer of electricity that includes the certificate that was issued for the electricity; or

10 (b) By an electric utility by generation of the electricity for which the certificate was
11 issued.

12 (4) "Compliance year" means the calendar year for which the electric utility or electricity
13 service supplier seeks to establish compliance with the renewable portfolio standard appli-
14 cable to the utility or supplier in the compliance report submitted under section 19 of this
15 2007 Act.

16 (5) "Consumer-owned utility" means a municipal electric utility, a people's utility district
17 organized under ORS chapter 261 that sells electricity or an electric cooperative organized
18 under ORS chapter 62.

19 (6) "Electric company" has the meaning given that term in ORS 757.600.

20 (7) "Electric utility" has the meaning given that term in ORS 757.600.

21 (8) "Electricity service supplier" has the meaning given that term in ORS 757.600.

22 (9) "Qualifying electricity" means electricity described in section 2 of this 2007 Act.

23 (10) "Renewable energy source" means a source of electricity described in section 4 of
24 this 2007 Act.

25 (11) "Retail electricity consumer" means a retail electricity consumer, as defined in ORS
26 757.600, that is located in Oregon.

27 (12) "Unbundled renewable energy certificate" means a renewable energy certificate for
28 qualifying electricity that is acquired by an electric utility or electricity service supplier by
29 trade, purchase or other transfer without acquiring the electricity for which the certificate
30 was issued.

31
32 **QUALIFYING ELECTRICITY**

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34 **SECTION 2. Qualifying electricity.** (1) Except as provided in this section, and subject to
35 section 15 of this 2007 Act, electricity generated from a renewable energy source may be used
36 to comply with a renewable portfolio standard only if the facility that generates the elec-
37 tricity meets the requirements of section 3 of this 2007 Act.

38 (2) Any electricity that the Bonneville Power Administration has designated as environ-
39 mentally preferred power, or has given a similar designation for electricity generated from
40 a renewable resource, may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard.

41 (3) The Legislative Assembly finds that hydroelectric energy is an important renewable
42 energy source and electricity from hydroelectric generators may be used to comply with a
43 renewable portfolio standard as provided in sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act.

44 **SECTION 3. Qualifying electricity; age of generating facility.** (1) Except as provided in
45 this section, electricity may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard only if

1 the electricity is generated by a facility that becomes operational on or after January 1, 1995.

2 (2) Electricity from a generating facility, other than a hydroelectric facility, that became
3 operational before January 1, 1995, may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio stand-
4 ard if the electricity is attributable to capacity or efficiency upgrades made on or after Jan-
5 uary 1, 1995.

6 (3) Electricity from a hydroelectric facility that became operational before January 1,
7 1995, may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard if the electricity is attrib-
8 utable to efficiency upgrades made on or after January 1, 1995. If an efficiency upgrade is
9 made to a Bonneville Power Administration facility, only that portion of the electricity gener-
10 eration attributable to Oregon's share of the electricity may be used to comply with a
11 renewable portfolio standard.

12 (4) Subject to the limit imposed by section 4 (5) of this 2007 Act, electricity from a hy-
13 droelectric facility that is owned by an electric utility and that became operational before
14 January 1, 1995, may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard if the facility is
15 certified as a low-impact hydroelectric facility on or after January 1, 1995, by a national
16 certification organization recognized by the State Department of Energy by rule.

17 SECTION 4. Renewable energy sources. (1) Electricity generated utilizing the following
18 types of energy may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard:

- 19 (a) Wind energy.
- 20 (b) Solar photovoltaic and solar thermal energy.
- 21 (c) Wave, tidal and ocean thermal energy.
- 22 (d) Geothermal energy.

23 (2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, electricity generated from
24 biomass and biomass byproducts may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard,
25 including but not limited to electricity generated from:

- 26 (a) Organic human or animal waste;
- 27 (b) Spent pulping liquor;
- 28 (c) Forest or rangeland woody debris from harvesting or thinning conducted to improve
29 forest or rangeland ecological health and to reduce uncharacteristic stand replacing wildfire
30 risk;
- 31 (d) Wood material from hardwood timber grown on land described in ORS 321.267 (3);
- 32 (e) Agricultural residues;
- 33 (f) Dedicated energy crops; and
- 34 (g) Landfill gas or biogas produced from organic matter, wastewater, anaerobic digesters
35 or municipal solid waste.

36 (3) Electricity generated from the direct combustion of biomass may not be used to
37 comply with a renewable portfolio standard if any of the biomass combusted to generate the
38 electricity includes:

- 39 (a) Municipal solid waste; or
- 40 (b) Wood that has been treated with chemical preservatives such as creosote,
41 pentachlorophenol or chromated copper arsenate.

42 (4) Electricity generated by a hydroelectric facility may be used to comply with a
43 renewable portfolio standard only if:

- 44 (a) The facility is located outside any protected area designated by the Pacific Northwest
45 Electric Power and Conservation Planning Council as of July 23, 1999, or any area protected

1 under the federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, Public Law 90-542, or the Oregon Scenic
2 Waterways Act, ORS 390.805 to 390.925; or

3 (b) The electricity is attributable to efficiency upgrades made to the facility on or after
4 January 1, 1995.

5 (5) Up to 50 average megawatts of electricity per year generated by an electric utility
6 from certified low-impact hydroelectric facilities described in section 3 (4) of this 2007 Act
7 may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard, without regard to the number
8 of certified facilities operated by the electric utility or the generating capacity of those fa-
9 cilities. A hydroelectric facility described in this subsection is not subject to the require-
10 ments of subsection (4) of this section.

11 (6) Electricity generated from hydrogen gas derived from any source of energy described
12 in subsections (1) to (5) of this section may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio
13 standard.

14 (7) If electricity generation employs multiple energy sources, that portion of the elec-
15 tricity generated that is attributable to energy sources described in subsections (1) to (6) of
16 this section may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard.

17 (8) The State Department of Energy by rule may approve energy sources other than
18 those described in this section that may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio
19 standard. The department may not approve petroleum, natural gas, coal or nuclear fission
20 as an energy source that may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard.

21
22 **RENEWABLE PORTFOLIO STANDARDS**
23

24 **SECTION 5. Applicable standard.** (1) Electric utilities must comply with the applicable
25 renewable portfolio standard described in section 6 or 7 of this 2007 Act.

26 (2) Electricity service suppliers must comply with the renewable portfolio standard es-
27 tablished under section 9 of this 2007 Act.

28 **SECTION 6. Large utility renewable portfolio standard.** (1) The large utility renewable
29 portfolio standard imposes the following requirements on an electric utility that makes sales
30 of electricity to retail electricity consumers in an amount that equals three percent or more
31 of all electricity sold to retail electricity consumers:

32 (a) At least five percent of the electricity sold by the utility to retail electricity con-
33 sumers in each of the calendar years 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014 must be qualifying electricity;

34 (b) At least 15 percent of the electricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers
35 in each of the calendar years 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019 must be qualifying electricity;

36 (c) At least 20 percent of the electricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers
37 in each of the calendar years 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023 and 2024 must be qualifying electricity;
38 and

39 (d) At least 25 percent of the electricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers
40 in calendar year 2025 and subsequent calendar years must be qualifying electricity.

41 (2) If, on the effective date of this 2007 Act, an electric utility makes sales of electricity
42 to retail electricity consumers in an amount that equals less than three percent of all elec-
43 tricity sold to retail electricity consumers, but in any three consecutive calendar years
44 thereafter makes sales of electricity to retail electricity consumers in amounts that average
45 three percent or more of all electricity sold to retail electricity consumers, the utility is

1 subject to the renewable portfolio standard described in subsection (3) of this section. The
2 utility becomes subject to the standard described in subsection (3) of this section in the cal-
3 endar year following the three-year period during which the utility makes sales of electricity
4 to retail electricity consumers in amounts that average three percent or more of all elec-
5 tricity sold to retail electricity consumers.

6 (3) An electric utility described in subsection (2) of this section must comply with the
7 following renewable portfolio standard:

8 (a) Beginning in the fourth calendar year after the calendar year in which the utility
9 becomes subject to the standard described in this subsection, at least five percent of the
10 electricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers in a calendar year must be
11 qualifying electricity;

12 (b) Beginning in the 10th calendar year after the calendar year in which the utility be-
13 comes subject to the standard described in this subsection, at least 15 percent of the elec-
14 tricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers in a calendar year must be qualifying
15 electricity;

16 (c) Beginning in the 15th calendar year after the calendar year in which the utility be-
17 comes subject to the standard described in this subsection, at least 20 percent of the elec-
18 tricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers in a calendar year must be qualifying
19 electricity; and

20 (d) Beginning in the 20th calendar year after the calendar year in which the utility be-
21 comes subject to the standard described in this subsection, at least 25 percent of the elec-
22 tricity sold by the utility to retail electricity consumers in a calendar year must be qualifying
23 electricity.

24 **SECTION 7. Small electric utilities.** (1) Except as provided in this section, an electric
25 utility that makes sales of electricity to retail electricity consumers in an amount that
26 equals less than three percent of all electricity sold to retail electricity consumers is not
27 subject to sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act.

28 (2) Beginning in calendar year 2025, at least five percent of the electricity sold to retail
29 electricity consumers in a calendar year by an electric utility must be qualifying electricity
30 if the electric utility makes sales of electricity to retail electricity consumers in an amount
31 that equals less than one and one-half percent of all electricity sold to retail electricity
32 consumers.

33 (3) Beginning in calendar year 2025, at least 10 percent of the electricity sold to retail
34 electricity consumers in a calendar year by an electric utility must be qualifying electricity
35 if the electric utility makes sales of electricity to retail electricity consumers in an amount
36 that equals or is more than one and one-half percent, and less than three percent, of all
37 electricity sold to retail electricity consumers.

38 (4) The exemption provided by subsection (1) of this section terminates if an electric
39 utility, or a joint operating entity that includes the utility as a member, acquires electricity
40 from an electricity generating facility that uses coal as an energy source or makes an in-
41 vestment on or after the effective date of this 2007 Act in an electricity generating facility
42 that uses coal as an energy source. This subsection does not apply to:

43 (a) A wholesale market purchase by an electric utility for which the energy source for
44 the electricity is not known;

45 (b) BPA electricity;

1 (c) Acquisition of electricity under a contract entered into before the effective date of
2 this 2007 Act;

3 (d) A renewal or replacement contract for a contract for purchase of electricity described
4 in paragraph (c) of this subsection;

5 (e) A purchase of electricity if the electricity is included in a contract for the purchase
6 of qualifying electricity and is necessary to shape, firm or integrate the qualifying electricity;

7 (f) Electricity provided to an electric utility under a contract for the acquisition of an
8 interest in an electricity generating facility that was entered into by the utility before the
9 effective date of this 2007 Act or entered into before the effective date of this 2007 Act by
10 an electric cooperative organized under ORS chapter 62 of which the electric utility is a
11 member, without regard to whether the electricity is being used to serve the load of the
12 electric utility on the effective date of this 2007 Act; or

13 (g) Investments in an electricity generating facility that uses coal as an energy source
14 if the investments are for the purpose of improving the facility's pollution mitigation equip-
15 ment or the facility's efficiency or are necessary to comply with requirements or standards
16 imposed by governmental entities.

17 (5) The exemption provided by subsection (1) of this section terminates for a consumer-
18 owned utility if at any time after the effective date of this 2007 Act the utility acquires ser-
19 vice territory of an electric company without the consent of the electric company.

20 (6) Beginning in the calendar year following the year in which an electric utility's ex-
21 emption terminates under subsection (4) or (5) of this section, the utility is subject to the
22 renewable portfolio standard described in section 6 (3) of this 2007 Act and related provisions
23 of sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act.

24 (7) The provisions of this section do not affect the requirement that electric utilities offer
25 a green power rate under section 23 of this 2007 Act.

26 **SECTION 8. Exemptions from compliance with renewable portfolio standard.** (1) Electric
27 utilities are not required to comply with the renewable portfolio standards described in
28 sections 6 and 7 of this 2007 Act to the extent that:

29 (a) Compliance with the standard would require the utility to acquire electricity in excess
30 of the utility's projected load requirements in any calendar year; and

31 (b) Acquiring the additional electricity would require the utility to substitute qualifying
32 electricity for electricity derived from an energy source other than coal, natural gas or pe-
33 troleum.

34 (2)(a) Electric utilities are not required to comply with a renewable portfolio standard to
35 the extent that compliance would require the utility to substitute qualifying electricity for
36 electricity available to the utility under contracts for electricity from dams that are owned
37 by Washington public utility districts and are located between the Grand Coulee Dam and the
38 Columbia River's junction with the Snake River. The provisions of this subsection apply only
39 to contracts entered into before the effective date of this 2007 Act and to renewal or re-
40 placement contracts for contracts entered into before the effective date of this 2007 Act.

41 (b) If a contract described in paragraph (a) of this subsection expires and is not renewed
42 or replaced, the utility must comply, in the calendar year following the expiration of the
43 contract, with the renewable portfolio standard applicable to the utility.

44 (3) A consumer-owned utility is not required to comply with a renewable portfolio
45 standard to the extent that compliance would require the utility to reduce the utility's pur-

1 chases of the lowest priced electricity from the Bonneville Power Administration pursuant
 2 to section 5 of the Pacific Northwest Electric Power Planning and Conservation Act of 1980,
 3 P.L. 96-501, as in effect on the effective date of this 2007 Act. The exemption provided by this
 4 subsection applies only to firm commitments for BPA electricity that the Bonneville Power
 5 Administration has assured will be available to a utility to meet agreed portions of the util-
 6 ity's load requirements for a defined period of time.

7 **SECTION 9. Renewable portfolio standard for electricity service suppliers.** An electricity
 8 service supplier must meet the requirements of the renewable portfolio standards that are
 9 applicable to the electric utilities that serve the territories in which the electricity service
 10 supplier sells electricity to retail electricity consumers. The Public Utility Commission shall
 11 establish procedures for implementation of the renewable portfolio standards for electricity
 12 service suppliers that sell electricity in the service territory of an electric company. If an
 13 electricity service supplier sells electricity in territories served by more than one electric
 14 company, the commission may provide for an aggregate standard based on the amount of
 15 electricity sold by the electricity service supplier in each territory. Pursuant to ORS 757.676,
 16 a consumer-owned utility may establish procedures for the implementation of the renewable
 17 portfolio standards for electricity service suppliers that sell electricity in the territory served
 18 by the consumer-owned utility.

19 **SECTION 10. Manner of complying with renewable portfolio standards.** (1) Except as
 20 provided in subsection (2) of this section, an electric utility or electricity service supplier
 21 must comply with the renewable portfolio standard applicable to the utility or supplier in
 22 each calendar year by:

23 (a) Using bundled renewable energy certificates issued or acquired during the compliance
 24 year;

25 (b) Subject to the limitations described in sections 16 and 17 of this 2007 Act, using un-
 26 bundled or banked renewable energy certificates; or

27 (c) Making alternative compliance payments as described in section 20 of this 2007 Act.

28 (2) Bundled or unbundled renewable energy certificates that are issued or acquired by
 29 an electric utility or electricity service supplier on or before March 31 in a calendar year
 30 may be used by the utility or supplier to comply with the renewable portfolio standard ap-
 31 plicable to the utility or supplier for the preceding calendar year.

32 **SECTION 11. Implementation plan for electric companies; annual reports.** (1) An electric
 33 company that is subject to a renewable portfolio standard shall develop an implementation
 34 plan for meeting the requirements of the standard and file the plan with the Public Utility
 35 Commission. Implementation plans must be revised and updated at least once every two
 36 years.

37 (2) An implementation plan must at a minimum contain:

38 (a) Annual targets for acquisition and use of qualifying electricity; and

39 (b) The estimated cost of meeting the annual targets, including the cost of transmission,
 40 the cost of firming, shaping and integrating qualifying electricity, the cost of alternative
 41 compliance payments and the cost of acquiring renewable energy certificates.

42 (3) The commission shall acknowledge the implementation plan no later than six months
 43 after the plan is filed with the commission. The commission may acknowledge the plan sub-
 44 ject to conditions specified by the commission.

45 (4) The commission shall adopt rules:

1 (a) Establishing requirements for the content of implementation plans;

2 (b) Establishing the procedure for acknowledgement of implementation plans under this
3 section, including provisions for public comment; and

4 (c) Providing for the integration of the implementation plan with the integrated resource
5 planning guidelines established by the commission and in effect on the effective date of this
6 2007 Act.

7 (5) The implementation plan filed under this section may include procedures that will be
8 used by the electric company to determine whether the costs of constructing a facility that
9 generates electricity from a renewable energy source, or the costs of acquiring bundled or
10 unbundled renewable energy certificates, are consistent with the standards of the commis-
11 sion relating to least-cost, least-risk planning for acquisition of resources.

12 **SECTION 11a.** An electric company shall develop and file with the Public Utility Com-
13 mission an initial implementation plan under section 11 of this 2007 Act no later than Janu-
14 ary 1, 2010.

15
16 **COST LIMITATION**

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18 **SECTION 12. Limits on cost of compliance with renewable portfolio standard.** (1) Electric
19 utilities are not required to comply with a renewable portfolio standard during a compliance
20 year to the extent that the incremental cost of compliance, the cost of unbundled renewable
21 energy certificates and the cost of alternative compliance payments under section 20 of this
22 2007 Act exceeds four percent of the utility's annual revenue requirement for the compliance
23 year.

24 (2) For each electric company, the Public Utility Commission shall establish the annual
25 revenue requirement for a compliance year no later than January 1 of the compliance year.
26 The governing body of a consumer-owned utility shall establish the annual revenue require-
27 ment for the consumer-owned utility.

28 (3) The annual revenue requirement for an electric utility shall be calculated based only
29 on the operations of the utility relating to electricity. The annual revenue requirement does
30 not include any amount expended by the utility for energy efficiency programs for customers
31 of the utility or for low income energy assistance, the incremental cost of compliance with
32 a renewable portfolio standard, the cost of unbundled renewable energy certificates or the
33 cost of alternative compliance payments under section 20 of this 2007 Act. The annual re-
34 venue requirement does include:

35 (a) All operating expenses of the utility during the compliance year, including depreci-
36 ation and taxes; and

37 (b) For electric companies, an amount equal to the total rate base of the company for
38 the compliance year multiplied by the rate of return established by the commission for debt
39 and equity of the company.

40 (4) For the purposes of this section, the incremental cost of compliance with a renewable
41 portfolio standard is the difference between the levelized annual delivered cost of the quali-
42 fying electricity and the levelized annual delivered cost of an equivalent amount of reason-
43 ably available electricity that is not qualifying electricity. For the purpose of this subsection,
44 the commission or governing body of a consumer-owned utility shall use the net present
45 value of delivered cost, including:

1 (a) Capital, operating and maintenance costs of generating facilities;

2 (b) Financing costs attributable to capital, operating and maintenance expenditures for
3 generating facilities;

4 (c) Transmission and substation costs;

5 (d) Load following and ancillary services costs; and

6 (e) Costs associated with using other assets, physical or financial, to integrate, firm or
7 shape renewable energy sources on a firm annual basis to meet retail electricity needs.

8 (5) For the purposes of this section, the governing body of a consumer-owned utility may
9 include in the incremental cost of compliance with a renewable portfolio standard all ex-
10 penses associated with research, development and demonstration projects related to the
11 generation of qualifying electricity by the consumer-owned utility.

12 (6) The commission shall establish limits on the incremental cost of compliance with the
13 renewable portfolio standard for electricity service suppliers under section 9 of this 2007 Act
14 that are the equivalent of the cost limits applicable to the electric companies that serve the
15 territories in which the electricity service supplier sells electricity to retail electricity con-
16 sumers. If an electricity service supplier sells electricity in territories served by more than
17 one electric company, the commission may provide for an aggregate cost limit based on the
18 amount of electricity sold by the electricity service supplier in each territory. Pursuant to
19 ORS 757.676, a consumer-owned utility may establish limits on the cost of compliance with
20 the renewable portfolio standard for electricity service suppliers that sell electricity in the
21 territory served by the consumer-owned utility.

22 SECTION 12a. The Public Utility Commission shall establish the methodology for deter-
23 mining the annual revenue requirement of an electric company for purposes of section 12
24 of this 2007 Act no later than July 1, 2008.

26 **COST RECOVERY**

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28 SECTION 13. Cost recovery by electric companies. (1) Except as provided in section 20
29 (5) of this 2007 Act, all prudently incurred costs associated with compliance with a renewable
30 portfolio standard are recoverable in the rates of an electric company, including intercon-
31 nection costs, costs associated with using physical or financial assets to integrate, firm or
32 shape renewable energy sources on a firm annual basis to meet retail electricity needs and
33 other costs associated with transmission and delivery of qualifying electricity to retail elec-
34 tricity consumers.

35 (2) Costs associated with compliance with a renewable portfolio standard are not an
36 above-market cost for the purposes of ORS 757.600 to 757.687.

37 (3) The Public Utility Commission shall establish an automatic adjustment clause as de-
38 fined in ORS 757.210 or another method that allows timely recovery of costs prudently in-
39 curred by an electric company to construct or otherwise acquire facilities that generate
40 electricity from renewable energy sources and for associated electricity transmission.
41 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, upon the request of any interested person the
42 commission shall conduct a proceeding to establish the terms of the automatic adjustment
43 clause or other method for timely recovery of costs. The commission shall provide parties
44 to the proceeding with the procedural rights described in ORS 756.500 to 756.610, including
45 but not limited to the opportunity to develop an evidentiary record, conduct discovery, in-

1 introduce evidence, conduct cross-examination and submit written briefs and oral argument.
 2 The commission shall issue a written order with findings on the evidentiary record developed
 3 in the proceeding.

4 (4) An electric company must file with the commission for approval of a proposed rate
 5 change to recover costs under the terms of an automatic adjustment clause or other method
 6 for timely recovery of costs established under subsection (3) of this section. Notwithstanding
 7 any other provision of law, upon the request of any interested person the commission shall
 8 conduct a proceeding to determine whether to approve a proposed change in rates under the
 9 automatic adjustment clause or other method for timely recovery of costs. The commission
 10 shall provide parties to the proceeding with the procedural rights described in ORS 756.500
 11 to 756.610, including but not limited to the opportunity to develop an evidentiary record,
 12 conduct discovery, introduce evidence, conduct cross-examination and submit written briefs
 13 and oral argument. The commission shall issue a written order with findings on the
 14 evidentiary record developed in the proceeding. A filing made under this subsection is subject
 15 to the commission's authority under ORS 757.215 to suspend a rate, or schedule of rates, for
 16 investigation.

17 SECTION 13a. The Public Utility Commission shall establish the automatic adjustment
 18 clause or another method for timely recovery of costs as required by section 13 (3) of this
 19 2007 Act no later than January 1, 2008. The clause or method shall apply to all prudently
 20 incurred costs described in section 13 (3) of this 2007 Act incurred by an electric company
 21 since the date of the company's last general rate case that was decided by the commission
 22 before the effective date of this 2007 Act.

23 RENEWABLE ENERGY CERTIFICATES

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 25
 26 SECTION 14. Renewable energy certificates system. (1) The State Department of Energy
 27 shall establish a system of renewable energy certificates that can be used by an electric
 28 utility or electricity service supplier to establish compliance with the applicable renewable
 29 portfolio standard. The department shall consult with the Public Utility Commission before
 30 establishing a system of renewable energy certificates under this section. The department
 31 may allow use of renewable energy certificates that are issued, monitored, accounted for or
 32 transferred by or through a regional system or trading program, including but not limited
 33 to the Western Renewable Energy Generation Information System. The system established
 34 by the department shall allow issuance, transfer and use of renewable energy certificates in
 35 electronic form.

36 (2) The validity of a bundled renewable energy certificate for purposes of compliance with
 37 the applicable renewable portfolio standard is not affected by the substitution of any other
 38 electricity for the qualifying electricity at any point after the time of generation.

39 SECTION 15. Renewable energy certificates that may be used to comply with standards.
 40 (1) A bundled renewable energy certificate may be used to comply with a renewable portfolio
 41 standard if:

42 (a) The facility that generates the qualifying electricity for which the certificate is issued
 43 is located in the United States and within the geographic boundary of the Western Electricity
 44 Coordinating Council; and

45 (b) The qualifying electricity for which the certificate is issued is delivered to the

1 **Bonneville Power Administration, to the transmission system of an electric utility or to an-**
2 **other delivery point designated by an electric utility for the purpose of subsequent delivery**
3 **to the electric utility.**

4 **(2) An unbundled renewable energy certificate may be used to comply with a renewable**
5 **portfolio standard if the facility that generates the qualifying electricity for which the cer-**
6 **tificate is issued is located within the geographic boundary of the Western Electricity Coordinating Council.**

8 **(3) Renewable energy certificates issued for any electricity that the Bonneville Power**
9 **Administration has designated as environmentally preferred power, or has given a similar**
10 **designation for electricity generated from a renewable resource, may be used to comply with**
11 **a renewable portfolio standard without regard to the location of the generating facility.**

12 **SECTION 16. Use, transfer and banking of certificates. (1) Renewable energy certificates**
13 **may be traded, sold or otherwise transferred.**

14 **(2) Renewable energy certificates that are not used by an electric utility or electricity**
15 **service supplier to comply with a renewable portfolio standard in a calendar year may be**
16 **banked and carried forward indefinitely for the purpose of complying with a renewable port-**
17 **folio standard in a subsequent year. For the purpose of complying with a renewable portfolio**
18 **standard in any calendar year:**

19 **(a) Banked renewable energy certificates must be used, up to the limit imposed by sec-**
20 **tion 17 of this 2007 Act, before other certificates are used; and**

21 **(b) Banked renewable energy certificates with the oldest issuance date must be used to**
22 **comply with the standard before banked renewable energy certificates with more recent is-**
23 **suance dates are used.**

24 **(3) An electric utility or electricity service supplier is responsible for demonstrating that**
25 **a renewable energy certificate used to comply with a renewable portfolio standard is derived**
26 **from a renewable energy source and that the utility or supplier has not used, traded, sold**
27 **or otherwise transferred the certificate.**

28 **(4) The same renewable energy certificate may be used by an electric utility or electricity**
29 **service supplier to comply with a federal renewable portfolio standard and a renewable**
30 **portfolio standard established under sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act. An electric utility or**
31 **electricity service supplier that uses a renewable energy certificate to comply with a**
32 **renewable portfolio standard imposed by any other state may not use the same certificate**
33 **to comply with a renewable portfolio standard established under sections 1 to 24 of this 2007**
34 **Act.**

35 **SECTION 17. Limitations on use of unbundled certificates to meet renewable portfolio**
36 **standard. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, unbundled renewable energy cer-**
37 **tificates, including banked unbundled renewable energy certificates, may not be used to meet**
38 **more than 20 percent of the requirements of the large utility renewable portfolio standard**
39 **described in section 6 of this 2007 Act for any compliance year.**

40 **(2) The limitation imposed by subsection (1) of this section does not apply to renewable**
41 **energy certificates issued for electricity generated in Oregon from a renewable energy source**
42 **by a net metering facility as defined in ORS 757.300, or another generating facility that is**
43 **not directly connected to a distribution or transmission system.**

44 **(3) The limitation imposed by subsection (1) of this section does not apply to renewable**
45 **energy certificates issued for electricity generated in Oregon by a qualifying facility under**

1 **ORS 758.505 to 758.555.**

2 (4) **The limitation imposed by subsection (1) of this section does not apply to an elec-**
3 **tricity service supplier.**

4 **SECTION 17a. Notwithstanding section 17 (1) of this 2007 Act, for compliance years be-**
5 **fore 2020, a consumer-owned utility subject to the large utility renewable portfolio standard**
6 **described in section 6 of this 2007 Act may use unbundled renewable energy certificates, in-**
7 **cluding banked unbundled renewable energy certificates, to meet up to 50 percent of the re-**
8 **quirements of the standard.**

9 **SECTION 18. Multistate electric companies. The Public Utility Commission by rule shall**
10 **establish a process for allocating the use of renewable energy certificates by an electric**
11 **company that makes sales of electricity to retail customers in more than one state.**

12
13 **COMPLIANCE REPORTS**
14

15 **SECTION 19. Compliance reports. (1) Each electric utility and electricity service supplier**
16 **that is subject to a renewable portfolio standard shall make an annual compliance report for**
17 **the purpose of detailing compliance, or failure to comply, with the renewable portfolio**
18 **standard applicable in the compliance year. An electric company or electricity service sup-**
19 **plier shall make the report to the Public Utility Commission. A consumer-owned utility shall**
20 **make the report to the members or customers of the utility.**

21 (2) **The commission shall review each compliance report filed under this section by an**
22 **electric company or electricity service supplier for the purposes of determining whether the**
23 **company or supplier has complied with the renewable portfolio standard applicable to the**
24 **company or supplier and the manner in which the company or supplier has complied. In re-**
25 **viewing the reports, the commission shall consider:**

26 (a) **The relative amounts of renewable energy certificates and other payments used by**
27 **the company or supplier to meet the applicable renewable portfolio standard, including:**

28 (A) **Bundled renewable energy certificates;**

29 (B) **Unbundled renewable energy certificates;**

30 (C) **Banked renewable energy certificates; and**

31 (D) **Alternative compliance payments under section 20 of this 2007 Act.**

32 (b) **The timing of electricity purchases.**

33 (c) **The market prices for electricity purchases and unbundled renewable energy certif-**
34 **icates.**

35 (d) **Whether the actions taken by the company or supplier are contributing to long term**
36 **development of generating capacity using renewable energy sources.**

37 (e) **The effect of the actions taken by the company or supplier on the rates payable by**
38 **retail electricity consumers.**

39 (f) **Good faith forecasting differences associated with the projected number of retail**
40 **electricity consumers served and the availability of electricity from renewable energy**
41 **sources.**

42 (g) **For electric companies, consistency with the implementation plan filed under section**
43 **11 of this 2007 Act, as acknowledged by the commission.**

44 (h) **Any other factors deemed reasonable by the commission.**

45 (3) **The commission by rule may establish requirements for compliance reports submitted**

1 by an electric company or electricity service supplier.

2
3 **ALTERNATIVE COMPLIANCE PAYMENTS**
4

5 **SECTION 20. Electric companies; electricity service suppliers.** (1) The Public Utility
6 Commission shall establish an alternative compliance rate for each compliance year for each
7 electric company or electricity service supplier that is subject to a renewable portfolio
8 standard. The rate shall be expressed in dollars per megawatt-hour.

9 (2) The commission shall establish an alternative compliance rate based on the cost of
10 qualifying electricity, contracts that the electric company or electricity service supplier has
11 acquired for future delivery of qualifying electricity and the number of unbundled renewable
12 energy certificates that the company or supplier anticipates using in the compliance year to
13 meet the renewable portfolio standard applicable to the company or supplier. The commission
14 shall also consider any determinations made under section 19 of this 2007 Act in reviewing
15 the compliance report made by the electric company or electricity service supplier for the
16 previous compliance year. In establishing an alternative compliance rate, the commission
17 shall set the rate to provide adequate incentive for the electric company or electricity service
18 supplier to purchase or generate qualifying electricity in lieu of using alternative compliance
19 payments to meet the renewable portfolio standard applicable to the company or supplier.

20 (3) An electric company or electricity service supplier may elect to use, or may be re-
21 quired by the commission to use, alternative compliance payments to comply with the
22 renewable portfolio standard applicable to the company or supplier. Any election by an elec-
23 tric company or electricity service supplier to use alternative compliance payments is subject
24 to review by the commission under section 19 of this 2007 Act. An electric company or elec-
25 tricity service supplier may not be required to make alternative compliance payments that
26 would result in the company or supplier exceeding the cost limitation established under
27 section 12 of this 2007 Act.

28 (4) The commission shall determine for each electric company the extent to which al-
29 ternative compliance payments may be recovered in the rates of the company. Each electric
30 company shall deposit any amounts recovered in the rates of the company for alternative
31 compliance payments in a holding account established by the company. Amounts in the
32 holding account shall accrue interest at the rate of return authorized by the commission for
33 the electric company.

34 (5) Amounts in holding accounts established under subsection (4) of this section may be
35 expended by an electric company only for costs of acquiring new generating capacity from
36 renewable energy sources, investments in efficiency upgrades to electricity generating facil-
37 ities owned by the company and energy conservation programs within the company's service
38 area. The commission must approve expenditures by an electric company from a holding
39 account established under subsection (4) of this section. Amounts that are collected from
40 customers and spent by an electric company under this subsection may not be included in
41 the company's rate base.

42 (6) The commission shall require electricity service suppliers to establish holding ac-
43 counts and make payments to those accounts on a substantially similar basis as provided for
44 electric companies. The commission must approve expenditures by an electricity service
45 supplier from a holding account established under this subsection. The commission may ap-

1 prove expenditures only for energy conservation programs for customers of the electricity
2 service supplier.

3 **SECTION 20a.** The Public Utility Commission shall establish initial alternative compli-
4 ance rates as required by section 20 of this 2007 Act no later than July 1, 2009.

5 **SECTION 21. Consumer-owned utilities.** The governing body of a consumer-owned utility
6 shall establish an alternative compliance rate for the utility. To the extent possible, the al-
7 ternative compliance rate shall be determined by the governing body of the consumer-owned
8 utility in a manner similar to that used by the Public Utility Commission in establishing al-
9 ternative compliance rates under section 20 of this 2007 Act. Amounts collected as alterna-
10 tive compliance payments by a consumer-owned utility may be used for the purposes
11 specified in section 20 (5) of this 2007 Act and for the purpose of paying expenses associated
12 with research, development and demonstration projects related to the generation of qualify-
13 ing electricity by the utility.

14 15 PENALTY

16
17 **SECTION 22. Penalty.** If an electric company or electricity service supplier that is sub-
18 ject to a renewable portfolio standard under sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act fails to comply
19 with the standard in the manner provided by sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act, the Public
20 Utility Commission may impose a penalty against the company or supplier in an amount de-
21 termined by the commission. A penalty under this section is in addition to any alternative
22 compliance payment required or elected under section 20 of this 2007 Act. Moneys paid for
23 penalties under this section shall be transmitted by the commission to the nongovernmental
24 entity receiving moneys under ORS 757.612 (3)(d) and may be used only for the purposes
25 specified in ORS 757.612 (1).

26 27 GREEN POWER RATE

28
29 **SECTION 23. Green power rate.** (1) Electric utilities shall allow retail electricity con-
30 sumers to elect a green power rate. A significant portion of the electricity purchased or
31 generated by a utility that is attributable to moneys paid by retail electricity consumers who
32 elect the green power rate must be qualifying electricity, and the utility must inform con-
33 sumers of the sources of the electricity purchased or generated by the utility that is attrib-
34 utable to moneys paid by consumers who elect the green power rate. The green power rate
35 shall reasonably reflect the costs of the electricity purchased or generated by the utility that
36 is attributable to moneys paid by retail electricity consumers who elect the green power rate.
37 All prudently incurred costs associated with the green power rate are recoverable in a green
38 power rate offered by an electric company.

39 (2) Any qualifying electricity procured by an electric utility to provide electricity under
40 a green power rate under subsection (1) of this section or ORS 757.603 (2)(a) may not be used
41 by the utility to comply with the requirements of a renewable portfolio standard.

42 (3) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section do not apply to electric companies that
43 are subject to ORS 757.603 (2)(a).

44 (4) An electric utility may comply with the requirements of subsection (1) of this section
45 by contracting with a third-party provider.

1 COMMUNITY-BASED RENEWABLE ENERGY PROJECTS

2
3 **SECTION 24. Goal for community-based renewable energy projects.** The Legislative As-
4 sembly finds that community-based renewable energy projects are an essential element of
5 Oregon's energy future, and declares that it is the goal of the State of Oregon that by 2025
6 at least eight percent of Oregon's retail electrical load comes from small-scale renewable
7 energy projects with a generating capacity of 20 megawatts or less. All agencies of the
8 executive department as defined in ORS 174.112 shall establish policies and procedures pro-
9 moting the goal declared in this section.

10
11 JOB IMPACT STUDY

12
13 **SECTION 25. Job impact study.** (1) The State Department of Energy shall periodically
14 conduct a study to evaluate the impact of sections 1 to 24 of this 2007 Act on jobs in this
15 state. The study shall assess the number of new jobs created in the renewable energy sector
16 in this state and the average wage rates and the provision of health care and other benefits
17 for those jobs. In addition, the study shall investigate the extent to which workforce training
18 opportunities are being provided to employees to prepare the employees for jobs in the
19 renewable energy sector.

20 (2) The department shall conduct the first study under this section not later than two
21 years after the effective date of this 2007 Act.

22 **SECTION 26. Section 25 of this 2007 Act is repealed January 2, 2026.**

23
24 PUBLIC PURPOSE CHARGE

25
26 **SECTION 27. ORS 757.612 is amended to read:**

27 757.612. (1) There is established an annual public purpose expenditure standard for electric
28 companies to fund new cost-effective local energy conservation, new market transformation efforts,
29 the above-market costs of new renewable energy resources and new low-income weatherization. The
30 public purpose expenditure standard shall be funded by the public purpose charge described in sub-
31 section (2) of this section.

32 (2)(a) Beginning on the date an electric company offers direct access to its retail electricity
33 consumers, except residential electricity consumers, the electric company shall collect a public
34 purpose charge from all of the retail electricity consumers located within its service area [*for a*
35 *period of 10 years*] **until January 1, 2026.** Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection,
36 the public purpose charge shall be equal to three percent of the total revenues collected by the
37 electric company or electricity service supplier from its retail electricity consumers for electricity
38 services, distribution, ancillary services, metering and billing, transition charges and other types of
39 costs included in electric rates on July 23, 1999.

40 (b) For an aluminum plant that averages more than 100 average megawatts of electricity use
41 per year, beginning on March 1, 2002, the electric company whose territory abuts the greatest per-
42 centage of the site of the aluminum plant shall collect from the aluminum company a public purpose
43 charge equal to one percent of the total revenue from the sale of electricity services to the alumi-
44 num plant from any source.

45 (3)(a) The Public Utility Commission shall establish rules implementing the provisions of this

1 section relating to electric companies.

2 (b) Subject to paragraph (e) of this subsection, funds collected by an electric company through
3 public purpose charges shall be allocated as follows:

4 (A) Sixty-three percent for new cost-effective conservation and new market transformation.

5 (B) Nineteen percent for the above-market costs of [*new renewable energy resources*] **con-**
6 **structing and operating new renewable energy resources with a nominal electric generating**
7 **capacity, as defined in ORS 469.300, of 20 megawatts or less.**

8 (C) Thirteen percent for new low-income weatherization.

9 (D) Five percent shall be transferred to the Housing and Community Services Department Re-
10 volving Account created under ORS 456.574 and used for the purpose of providing grants as de-
11 scribed in ORS 458.625 (2). Moneys deposited in the account under this subparagraph are
12 continuously appropriated to the Housing and Community Services Department for the purposes of
13 ORS 458.625 (2). Interest on moneys deposited in the account under this subparagraph shall accrue
14 to the account.

15 (c) The costs of administering subsections (1) to (6) of this section for an electric company shall
16 be paid out of the funds collected through public purpose charges. The commission may require that
17 an electric company direct funds collected through public purpose charges to the state agencies
18 responsible for implementing subsections (1) to (6) of this section in order to pay the costs of ad-
19 ministering such responsibilities.

20 (d) The commission shall direct the manner in which public purpose charges are collected and
21 spent by an electric company and may require an electric company to expend funds through com-
22 petitive bids or other means designed to encourage competition, except that funds dedicated for
23 low-income weatherization shall be directed to the Housing and Community Services Department as
24 provided in subsection (7) of this section. The commission may also direct that funds collected by
25 an electric company through public purpose charges be paid to a nongovernmental entity for in-
26 vestment in public purposes described in subsection (1) of this section. Notwithstanding any other
27 provision of this subsection, at least 80 percent of the funds allocated for conservation shall be spent
28 within the service area of the electric company that collected the funds.

29 (e)(A) The first 10 percent of the funds collected annually by an electric company under sub-
30 section (2) of this section shall be distributed to education service districts, as described in ORS
31 334.010, that are located in the service territory of the electric company. The funds shall be dis-
32 tributed to individual education service districts according to the weighted average daily member-
33 ship (ADMw) of the component school districts of the education service district for the prior fiscal
34 year as calculated under ORS 327.013. The commission shall establish by rule a methodology for
35 distributing a proportionate share of funds under this paragraph to education service districts that
36 are only partially located in the service territory of the electric company.

37 (B) An education service district that receives funds under this paragraph shall use the funds
38 first to pay for energy audits for school districts located within the education service district. An
39 education service district may not expend additional funds received under this paragraph on a
40 school district facility until an energy audit has been completed for that school district. To the
41 extent practicable, an education service district shall coordinate with the State Department of En-
42 ergy and incorporate federal funding in complying with this paragraph. Following completion of an
43 energy audit for an individual school district, the education service district may expend funds re-
44 ceived under this paragraph to implement the energy audit. Once an energy audit has been con-
45 ducted and completely implemented for each school district within the education service district, the

1 education service district may expend funds received under this paragraph for any of the following
2 purposes:

3 (i) Conducting energy audits. A school district shall conduct an energy audit prior to expending
4 funds on any other purpose authorized under this paragraph unless the school district has performed
5 an energy audit within the three years immediately prior to receiving the funds.

6 (ii) Weatherization and upgrading the energy efficiency of school district facilities.

7 (iii) Energy conservation education programs.

8 (iv) Purchasing electricity from environmentally focused sources and investing in renewable
9 energy resources.

10 (f) The commission may **not** establish a different public purpose charge than the public purpose
11 charge *[otherwise]* described in subsection (2) of this section *[for an individual retail electricity con-*
12 *sumer or any class of retail electricity consumers located within the service area of an electric company,*
13 *provided that a retail electricity consumer with a load greater than one average megawatt is not re-*
14 *quired to pay a public purpose charge in excess of three percent of its total cost of electricity*
15 *services].*

16 *[(g) The commission shall remove from the rates of each electric company any costs for public*
17 *purposes described in subsection (1) of this section that are included in rates. A rate adjustment under*
18 *this paragraph shall be effective on the date that the electric company begins collecting public purpose*
19 *charges.]*

20 (4) An electric company that satisfies its obligations under this section shall have no further
21 obligation to invest in conservation, new market transformation[, *new renewable energy resources*]
22 or new low-income weatherization or to provide a commercial energy conservation services program
23 and is not subject to ORS 469.631 to 469.645[,] **and** 469.860 to 469.900 [*and 758.505 to 758.555*].

24 (5)(a) A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of electricity at
25 any site in the prior year shall receive a credit against public purpose charges billed by an electric
26 company for that site. The amount of the credit shall be equal to the total amount of qualifying
27 expenditures for new energy conservation, not to exceed 68 percent of the annual public purpose
28 charges, and the above-market costs of purchases of new renewable energy resources incurred by
29 the retail electricity consumer, not to exceed 19 percent of the annual public purpose charges, less
30 administration costs incurred under this subsection. The credit may not exceed, on an annual basis,
31 the lesser of:

32 (A) The amount of the retail electricity consumer's qualifying expenditures; or

33 (B) The portion of the public purpose charge billed to the retail electricity consumer that is
34 dedicated to new energy conservation, new market transformation or the above-market costs of new
35 renewable energy resources.

36 (b) To obtain a credit under this subsection, a retail electricity consumer shall file with the
37 State Department of Energy a description of the proposed conservation project or new renewable
38 energy resource and a declaration that the retail electricity consumer plans to incur the qualifying
39 expenditure. The State Department of Energy shall issue a notice of precertification within 30 days
40 of receipt of the filing, if such filing is consistent with this subsection. The credit may be taken after
41 a retail electricity consumer provides a letter from a certified public accountant to the State De-
42 partment of Energy verifying that the precertified qualifying expenditure has been made.

43 (c) Credits earned by a retail electricity consumer as a result of qualifying expenditures that
44 are not used in one year may be carried forward for use in subsequent years.

45 (d)(A) A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of electricity at

1 any site in the prior year may request that the State Department of Energy hire an independent
2 auditor to assess the potential for conservation investments at the site. If the independent auditor
3 determines there is no available conservation measure at the site that would have a simple payback
4 of one to 10 years, the retail electricity consumer shall be relieved of 54 percent of its payment
5 obligation for public purpose charges related to the site. If the independent auditor determines that
6 there are potential conservation measures available at the site, the retail electricity consumer shall
7 be entitled to a credit against public purpose charges related to the site equal to 54 percent of the
8 public purpose charges less the estimated cost of available conservation measures.

9 (B) A retail electricity consumer shall be entitled each year to the credit described in this sub-
10 section unless a subsequent independent audit determines that new conservation investment oppor-
11 tunities are available. The State Department of Energy may require that a new independent audit
12 be performed on the site to determine whether new conservation measures are available, provided
13 that the independent audits shall occur no more than once every two years.

14 (C) The retail electricity consumer shall pay the cost of the independent audits described in this
15 subsection.

16 (6) Electric utilities and retail electricity consumers shall receive a fair and reasonable credit
17 for the public purpose expenditures of their energy suppliers. The State Department of Energy shall
18 adopt rules to determine eligible expenditures and the methodology by which such credits are ac-
19 counted for and used. The rules also shall adopt methods to account for eligible public purpose
20 expenditures made through consortia or collaborative projects.

21 (7)(a) In addition to the public purpose charge provided under subsection (2) of this section, be-
22 ginning on October 1, 2001, an electric company shall collect funds for low-income electric bill
23 payment assistance in an amount determined under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

24 (b) The total amount collected for low-income electric bill payment assistance under this section
25 shall be \$10 million per year. The commission shall determine each electric company's proportionate
26 share of the total amount. The commission shall determine the amount to be collected from a retail
27 electricity consumer, except that a retail electricity consumer is not required to pay more than \$500
28 per month per site for low-income electric bill payment assistance.

29 (c) Funds collected by the low-income electric bill payment assistance charge shall be paid into
30 the Housing and Community Services Department Revolving Account created under ORS 456.574.
31 Moneys deposited in the account under this paragraph are continuously appropriated to the Housing
32 and Community Services Department for the purpose of funding low-income electric bill payment
33 assistance. Interest earned on moneys deposited in the account under this paragraph shall accrue
34 to the account. The department's cost of administering this subsection shall be paid out of funds
35 collected by the low-income electric bill payment assistance charge. Moneys deposited in the ac-
36 count under this paragraph shall be expended solely for low-income electric bill payment assistance.
37 Funds collected from an electric company shall be expended in the service area of the electric
38 company from which the funds are collected.

39 (d) The Housing and Community Services Department, in consultation with the federal Advisory
40 Committee on Energy, shall determine the manner in which funds collected under this subsection
41 will be allocated by the department to energy assistance program providers for the purpose of pro-
42 viding low-income bill payment and crisis assistance, including programs that effectively reduce
43 service disconnections and related costs to retail electricity consumers and electric utilities. Priority
44 assistance shall be directed to low-income electricity consumers who are in danger of having their
45 electricity service disconnected.

1 (e) Notwithstanding ORS 293.140, interest on moneys deposited in the Housing and Community
2 Services Department Revolving Account under this subsection shall accrue to the account and may
3 be used to provide heating bill payment and crisis assistance to electricity consumers whose primary
4 source of heat is not electricity.

5 (f) Notwithstanding ORS 757.310, the commission may allow an electric company to provide re-
6 duced rates or other payment or crisis assistance or low-income program assistance to a low-income
7 household eligible for assistance under the federal Low Income Home Energy Assistance Act of
8 1981, as amended and in effect on July 23, 1999.

9 (8) For purposes of this section, "retail electricity consumers" includes any direct service in-
10 dustrial consumer that purchases electricity without purchasing distribution services from the elec-
11 tric utility.

18 provided in subsection (8) of this section, the amount of the public purpose charge shall be sufficient

29 (2) Except as provided in subsection (9) of this section, the governing body of a consumer-owned
30 utility shall determine the manner of collecting and expending funds for public purposes required
31 by law to be assessed against and paid by the retail electric consumers of the utility. A determi-
32 nation by the governing body shall include:

- 33 (a) The manner for collecting public purpose charges;
- 34 (b) Public purpose programs upon which revenue from the charges may be expended; and
- 35 (c) The allocation of expenditures for each program.

36 (3) Beginning on the same date two years after July 23, 1999, a consumer-owned utility shall

2 amended November 10, 1981), or conducted by the utility pursuant to agreement with the Bonneville

4 (Public Law 96-501). All such funds expended, credits issued and incremental costs incurred in con-
5 nection with the performance of a consumer-owned utility's obligations under this section shall be
6 credited toward the utility's public purpose funding obligation under this section.

7 (6) A consumer-owned utility also may credit toward its funding obligations under this section
8 any incremental costs incurred by the utility for capital expenditures made to reduce its distribution
9 system energy losses, existing biomass gas and waste to energy systems, existing hydroelectric
10 generation projects using fish attraction water, for new energy conservation and renewable resource
11 funding costs included in its wholesale power supplier's charges and for electric power generated
12 by renewable or cogeneration resources pursuant to requirements of the Public Utilities Regulatory
13 Policy Act of 1978 (Public Law 95-617), to the extent that such costs exceed the average cost of the
14 utility's other electric power resources.

15 (7) A consumer-owned utility also may credit toward its public purpose funding obligations under

17 (8) Beginning on March 1, 2002, a consumer-owned utility whose territory abuts the greatest
18 percentage of the site of an aluminum plant that averages more than 100 megawatts of electricity
19 use per year shall collect from the aluminum company a public purpose charge equal to one percent
20 of the total revenue from the sale of electricity services to the aluminum plant from any source.

21 (9)(a) A retail electricity consumer that uses more than one average megawatt of electricity at
22 any site in the prior year shall receive a credit against public purpose charges billed by a
23 consumer-owned utility for that site. The amount of the credit shall be equal to the total amount
24 of qualifying expenditures for new energy conservation, not to exceed 68 percent of the annual
25 public purpose charges, and the above-market costs of purchases of new renewable energy resources
26 incurred by the retail electricity consumer, less administration costs incurred under this subsection.

 26 **SECTION 30.** ORS 261.010 is amended to read:

27 261.010. As used in this chapter, unless otherwise required by the context:

28 (1) "Affected territory" means that territory proposed to be formed into, annexed to or consol-

30 (2) "Board of directors," "directors" or "board" means the governing body of a people's utility
 31 district, elected and functioning under the provisions of this chapter.

 40 a full term, setting forth and particularly describing the boundaries of the parcel of territory, sepa-

 43 separate parcels of territory, city and district, or any of them, for the formation of a district, the

 10 279C.100 to 279C.125 and 279C.300 to 279C.470 and ORS chapters 279A and 279B, except ORS
 11 279A.140 and 279A.250 to 279A.290.

12 **(2) The public contracting and purchasing requirements of ORS 279.835 to 279.855,**
 13 **279C.005, 279C.100 to 279C.125 and 279C.300 to 279C.470 and ORS chapters 279A and 279B do**
 14 **not apply to contracts entered into by districts for the acquisition, construction, improve-**
 15 **ment or equipping of a renewable energy facility or for the purchase or sale of electricity,**
 16 **electrical capacity or renewable energy certificates.**

17 **SECTION 40.** ORS 261.348 is amended to read:

18 261.348. (1) Notwithstanding any other law, people's utility districts and municipal electric
 19 utilities may enter into transactions with other persons or entities for the production, supply or
 20 delivery of electricity on an economic, dependable and cost-effective basis, including financial pro-
 21 ducts contracts and other service contracts that reduce the risk of economic losses in the trans-
 22 actions. This [section] **subsection** does not authorize any transaction that:

23 [(1)] **(a)** Constitutes the investment of surplus funds for the purpose of receiving interest or
 24 other earnings from the investment; or

25 [(2)] **(b)** Is intended or useful for any purpose other than the production, supply or delivery of
 26 electricity on a cost-effective basis.

27 **(2) Nothing in subsection (1) of this section prohibits a people's utility district or a mu-**
 28 **nicipal electric utility from entering into any transaction for the acquisition, construction,**
 29 **improvement or equipping of a renewable energy facility or for the purchase or sale of elec-**
 30 **tricity, electrical capacity or renewable energy certificates.**

31 **SECTION 41.** ORS 261.355 is amended to read:

32 261.355. (1) For the purpose of carrying into effect the powers granted in this chapter, any dis-
 33 trict may issue and sell revenue bonds, when authorized by a majority of its electors voting at any
 34 primary election, general election or special election.

35 (2) All revenue bonds issued and sold under this chapter shall be so conditioned as to be paid
 36 solely from that portion of the revenues derived [from] **by** the district [by] **from** the sale of water,
 37 waterpower and [electric energy] **electricity**, or any of them, or any other service, commodity or
 38 facility which may be produced, used or furnished in connection therewith, remaining after paying
 39 from those revenues all expenses of operation and maintenance, including taxes.

40 (3) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section and subject to subsection (4) of this section,
 41 any district may, by a duly adopted resolution of its board, issue and sell revenue bonds for the
 42 purpose of **financing** betterments and extensions [within the existing boundaries] of the district, **in-**
 43 **cluding renewable energy facilities or the purchase or sale of electricity, electrical capacity**
 44 **or renewable energy certificates**, but the amount of **revenue bonds** so issued shall be limited to
 45 the reasonable value of the betterments and extensions plus an amount not to exceed 10 percent

1 thereof for administrative purposes. Revenue bonds shall not be issued and sold for the purpose of
 2 acquiring an initial utility system or acquiring property or facilities owned by another entity that
 3 provides electric utility service **unless:**

4 **(a) The acquisition is a voluntary transaction between the district and the other entity**
 5 **that provides electric utility service; or**

6 **(b)** *[without first obtaining the affirmative vote of]* The electors within the district **have approved**
 7 **issuance of the bonds by a vote.**

8 (4) Not later than the 30th day prior to a board meeting at which adoption of a resolution under
 9 subsection (3) of this section will be considered, the district shall:

10 (a) Provide for and give public notice, reasonably calculated to give actual notice to interested
 11 persons including news media which have requested notice, of the time and place of the meeting and
 12 of the intent of the board to consider and possibly adopt the resolution; and

13 (b) Mail to its customers notice of the time and place of the meeting and of the intent of the
 14 board to consider and possibly adopt the resolution.

15 **(5) Except as provided in subsection (3)(a) of this section,** any authorizing resolution adopted
 16 for the purposes of subsection (3) of this section shall provide that electors residing within the dis-
 17 trict may file a petition with the district asking to have the question of whether to issue such bonds
 18 referred to a vote.

19 (6) If within 60 days after adoption of a resolution under subsection (3) of this section the dis-
 20 trict receives petitions containing valid signatures of not fewer than five percent of the electors of
 21 the district, the question of issuing the bonds shall be placed on the ballot at the next date on which
 22 a district election may be held under ORS 255.345 (1).

23 (7) When petitions containing the number of signatures required under subsection (6) of this
 24 section are filed with the district within 60 days after adoption of a resolution under subsection (3)
 25 of this section, revenue bonds shall not be sold until the resolution is approved by a majority of the
 26 electors of the district voting on the resolution.

27 (8) Any district issuing revenue bonds may pledge that part of the revenue which the district
 28 may derive from its operations as security for payment of principal and interest thereon remaining
 29 after payment from such revenues of all expenses of operation and maintenance, including taxes, and
 30 consistent with the other provisions of this chapter.

31 (9) Prior to any district board taking formal action to issue and sell any revenue bonds, the
 32 board shall have on file with the secretary of the district a certificate executed by a qualified en-
 33 gineer that the net annual revenues of the district, including the property to be acquired or con-
 34 structed with the proceeds of the bonds, shall be sufficient to pay the maximum amount that will
 35 be due in any one fiscal year for both principal of and interest on both the bonds then proposed to
 36 be issued and all bonds of the district then outstanding.

37 **(10) Except as provided in subsection (3)(a) of this section,** the district shall order an
 38 election for the authorization of revenue bonds to finance the acquisition or construction of an ini-
 39 tial utility system, including the replacement value of the unreimbursed investment of an investor
 40 owned utility in energy efficiency measures and installations within the proposed district, as early
 41 as practicable under ORS 255.345 after filing the certificate required under subsection (9) of this
 42 section. An election under this subsection shall be held no more than twice in any one calendar year
 43 for any district. In even-numbered years no election shall be held on any other date than the date
 44 of the primary election or general election.

45 **SECTION 42.** ORS 262.005 is amended to read:

1 262.005. As used in ORS 262.015 to 262.105, unless the context requires otherwise:

2 (1) “Electric cooperative” means a cooperative corporation owning and operating an electric
3 distribution system.

4 (2) “Joint operating agency” means an agency organized by three or more cities or people’s
5 utility districts under the laws of this state for the purposes and according to ORS 262.005 to
6 262.105.

7 (3) “Privately owned electric utility company” means an electric utility operated for profit and
8 subject to regulation by the Public Utility Commission of Oregon or the equivalent officer or com-
9 mission of any other state.

10 (4) “Utility properties” means [*plants, systems and facilities, and any enlargement or extension*
11 *thereof, used for or incidental to the generation and transmission of electric power and energy,*] **a**
12 **plant, works or other property used for development, generation, storage, distribution or**
13 **transmission of electricity.** [*provided, however, that it shall not mean*] “**Utility properties**” **does**
14 **not include** facilities for uranium refining, processing or reprocessing.

15 **SECTION 43.** ORS 262.015 is amended to read:

16 262.015. (1) Any three or more cities or people’s utility districts or combinations thereof, or-
17 ganized under the laws of this state, may form a joint operating agency to plan, acquire, construct,
18 own, operate and otherwise promote the development of utility properties [*in this state*] for the
19 generation, [*and*] transmission **and marketing** of [*electric power and energy*] **electricity, electrical**
20 **capacity or renewable energy certificates.**

21 (2) A joint operating agency may participate with other publicly owned utilities, including other
22 joint operating agencies, or with electric cooperatives, or with privately owned electric utility
23 companies, or with any combination thereof, for any purpose set forth in subsection (1) of this sec-
24 tion, whether such agencies or utilities are organized or incorporated under the laws of this state
25 or any other jurisdiction. However, no joint operating agency may act alone or as the managing
26 participant to acquire, construct, own or operate utility properties[, *nor may a joint operating agency*
27 *own more than 50 percent of any utility property, except combustion turbines*].

28 (3) Joint operating agencies, cities, people’s utility districts and privately owned utilities, or
29 combinations thereof, may participate in joint ownership of [*thermal generation and transmission*]
30 **common** facilities in accordance with ORS 225.450 to 225.490 or 261.235 to 261.255.

31 **SECTION 44.** ORS 262.075 is amended to read:

32 262.075. (1) Each joint operating agency shall be a political subdivision of the State of Oregon,
33 and shall be a municipal corporation with the right to sue and be sued in its own name. Except
34 as otherwise provided, a joint operating agency shall have all the powers, rights, privileges and ex-
35 emptions conferred on people’s utility districts.

36 (2) A joint operating agency shall have the power to acquire, hold, sell and dispose of real and
37 other property, within or without this state, which the board of directors in its discretion finds
38 reasonably necessary or incident to the generation, [*and*] transmission **and marketing** of [*electric*
39 *power and energy*] **electricity, electrical capacity or renewable energy certificates.** However,
40 such an agency shall not acquire or operate any facilities for the distribution of [*electric energy*]
41 **electricity.**

42 (3) A joint operating agency shall have the power of eminent domain which it may exercise for
43 the purpose of acquiring property; however, a joint operating agency shall not condemn any prop-
44 erties owned by a publicly or privately owned utility which are being used for the generation or
45 transmission of [*electric energy or power*] **electricity** or are being developed for such purposes with

1 due diligence, except to acquire a right of way to cross such properties in a manner which will not
2 interfere with the use thereof by the owner.

3 (4) A joint operating agency shall have the power to enter into contracts, leases and other
4 undertakings considered necessary or proper by its board, including but not limited to contracts for
5 any term relating to the purchase, sale, interchange, assignment, allocation, transfer or wheeling
6 of power with the Government of the United States, or any agency thereof, and with any other
7 municipal corporation or privately owned utility, or any combination thereof, within or without the
8 state, and may purchase, deliver or receive power anywhere.

9 (5) A joint operating agency shall have the power to borrow money and incur indebtedness, to
10 issue, sell and assume evidences of indebtedness, to refund and retire any indebtedness that may
11 exist against the agency or its revenues, and to pledge any part of its revenues. A joint operating
12 agency may borrow from banks or other financial institutions such sums on such terms as the board
13 considers necessary or advisable. A joint operating agency may also issue, sell and assume bond
14 anticipation notes, refunding bond anticipation notes, or their equivalent, which shall bear such date
15 or dates, mature at such time or times, be in such denominations and in such form, be payable in
16 such medium, at such place or places, and be subject to such terms of redemption, as the board
17 considers necessary or advisable. The issuance and sale of revenue obligations by a joint operating
18 agency shall be governed by ORS 262.085.

19 (6) The joint operating agency may apply for, accept, receive and expend appropriations, grants,
20 loans, gifts, bequests and devises in carrying out its functions as provided by law.

22 **COST RECOVERY FOR CONSERVATION MEASURES**

23
24 **SECTION 45. Section 46 of this 2007 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 757.600 to**
25 **757.687.**

26 **SECTION 46. (1) In addition to the public purpose charge established by ORS 757.612, the**
27 **Public Utility Commission may authorize an electric company to include in its rates the costs**
28 **of funding or implementing cost-effective energy conservation measures implemented on or**
29 **after the effective date of this 2007 Act. The costs may include amounts for weatherization**
30 **programs that conserve energy.**

31 **(2) The commission shall ensure that a retail electricity consumer with a load greater**
32 **than one average megawatt:**

33 **(a) Is not required to pay an amount that is more than three percent of the consumer's**
34 **total cost of electricity service for the public purpose charge under ORS 757.612 and any**
35 **amounts included in rates under this section; and**

36 **(b) Does not receive any direct benefit from energy conservation measures if the costs**
37 **of the measures are included in rates under this section.**

41 **SECTION 47. The unit and section captions used in this 2007 Act are provided only for**
42 **the convenience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or**
43 **express any legislative intent in the enactment of this 2007 Act.**

44 **SECTION 48. This 2007 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
45 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2007 Act takes effect**

1 **on its passage.**
