WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Expands kidnapping statute so that kidnapping in the first degree would include kidnapping a person under the age of 12 with the purpose of committing a sex offense.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Conforming current statute with Jessica's Law
- Legislative intent of Jessica's Law
- Concerns regarding definition of "kidnapping"
- Possible need to modify general kidnapping statute

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: "Jessica's Law" (HB 3511, 2006 Special Session (codified in ORS 137.700)) mandates a 300 month sentence when a defendant commits first-degree kidnapping "in furtherance of the commission or attempted commission" of first-degree rape, sodomy, or sexual penetration of a child. However, under the current kidnapping statute (ORS 163.225), kidnapping in the First Degree requires proof of a separate aggravating factor such as "to terrorize" or "to cause physical harm." This proposed legislation would remove the need to prove an aggravating factor when a kidnapping involves sexual assault, and would include such crimes within the definition of First Degree kidnapping.
