WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Defines elements of primary care home. Requires Department of Human Services to report to interim committees of Legislative Assembly no later than June 30, 2010 on feasibility of implementing system for reimbursement for health care delivered through primary care homes in Medicaid program. Describes provisions of reimbursement system if found feasible. Requires department to apply to Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for any approval needed to obtain federal financial participation.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Similarities to Senate Bill 456
- Model programs in other states
- Department's application process to Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: Under the current payment system, primary care providers are paid for each patient visit; more visits result in higher payments. Typically, medical providers address specific patient complaints when the patient has an appointment, but may not have the time or the incentive to address other medical issues to promote wellness.

The goal of House Bill 3418-A is to develop a payment system that reimburses medical providers for keeping patients healthy, rather than paying them to address single ailments when patients make appointments. A proactive approach to medical treatment may be more effective and less costly than a reactive approach to patient complaints.
