WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Exempts individuals 16 years of age and younger from requirement to obtain business license if the individual operates as a sole proprietor under the individual's own name.

## ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Un-named municipality that reportedly "harassed" kids running lemonade stand
- Youth-group fund-raising and young entrepreneurs

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: No amendment.

BACKGROUND: Of 219 Oregon cities surveyed by the League of Oregon Cities (LOC) in 2001, 64 reported having general business license requirements, either for revenue or business-regulation purposes. Requirements differ and exemptions differ. The City of Bend, for example, does not require a business license for any service business, such as a lemonade stand, if the owner is less than 18 years old. The City of Portland does not require a business license from any business grossing less than $\$ 50,000$ per year. Several cities, including Ashland and Troutdale, exempt babysitting businesses from the business license requirement. In the 2001 LOC survey, 47 cities, not including Portland, reported annual business-license revenue totaling over $\$ 3,200,000$.
