**SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Updates provisions relating to food stamp program. Changes name of program to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program.

5 Oregon Laws 1987; and repealing ORS 411.835.

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

7 **SECTION 1.** ORS 411.806 is amended to read:

8 411.806. As used in ORS 411.806 to 411.845, unless the context or a specially applicable statutory  
9 definition requires otherwise:

10 (1) "Administrative costs" means, but is not limited to, costs in connection with:

11 (a) Distributing [*food stamp benefits*] **supplemental nutrition assistance** to recipients under [*a*  
12 *food stamp plan*] **the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;**

13 (b) The compensation of personnel while employed in carrying out ORS 411.806 to 411.845; and

14 (c) Reimbursement of the federal government for any loss described in ORS 411.830.

15 [(2) "*Food stamp plan*" means a plan under which the federal government makes food stamp ben-  
16 efits available to this state or its agencies for distribution to individuals and households certified to  
17 be in economic need of and eligible to receive such food stamp benefits for the purchase of food com-  
18 modities from retail food outlets.]

19 [(3)] (2) "Household" means two or more related or nonrelated individuals who do not reside in  
20 an institution.

21 [(4)] (3) "Issuing agency" means the Department of Human Services.

22 [(5)] (4) "Recipient" means an individual or household determined and certified, pursuant to ORS  
23 [411.811] **411.816** or 411.825, to be eligible to receive [*food stamp benefits*] **supplemental nutrition**  
24 **assistance** under [*a food stamp plan*] **the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program.**

25 (5) "**Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program**" means a program under which the  
26 **federal government makes aid available to the state or its agencies for distribution through**  
27 **electronic benefits transfer or by check to individuals and households certified to be in eco-**  
28 **nomic need of and eligible to receive such aid for the purchase of food from retail food out-**

2 **SECTION 2.** ORS 411.816 is amended to read:

3 411.816. The Department of Human Services shall adopt rules conforming to federal laws and  
4 regulations required to be observed in maintaining the eligibility of this state to receive from the  
5 federal government, and to issue *[food stamp benefits under a food stamp plan]* **supplemental nu-**  
6 **trition assistance under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program.** Rules adopted by the  
7 department pursuant to this section shall relate to and include, but shall not be limited to:

8 (1) The classifications of and requirements of eligibility for individuals and households to receive  
9 *[food stamp benefits under such plans]* **supplemental nutrition assistance under the program.** The  
10 limitations upon the income and resources of individuals and households established as requirements  
11 of eligibility under this section shall not exceed the maximum limitations on income and resources  
12 allowable under federal laws, rules and regulations;

13 (2) The periods during which individuals and households shall be certified or recertified to be  
14 eligible to receive *[food stamp benefits under such plans]* **supplemental nutrition assistance under**  
15 **the program;**

16 (3) The amount of *[food stamp benefits]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** to be issued or al-  
17 lotted to recipients, with respect to any period, under *[a food stamp plan]* **the program;**

18 (4) Periodic redetermination and review of the eligibility of recipients to receive *[food stamp*  
19 *benefits issued under such plans]* **supplemental nutrition assistance under the program;**

20 (5) Cancellation of certifications issued for, and adjustment of the numbers of individuals in any  
21 household eligible to receive *[food stamp benefits]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** issued to re-  
22 cipients under *[such plans]* **the program** for any period in accordance with changes of circum-  
23 stances in individual cases; and

24 (6) Procedures to review, on the basis of substantial hardship, request for such adjustments.

25 **SECTION 3.** ORS 411.818 is amended to read:

26 411.818. (1) The Department of Human Services shall seek approval from the United States De-  
27 partment of Agriculture under 7 U.S.C. 2026 to disregard the amount of the annual cost-of-living  
28 adjustment for Social Security benefits and for Supplemental Security Income benefits in determining  
29 eligibility for *[food stamp benefits]* **supplemental nutrition assistance.**

30 (2) Upon receipt of federal approval to disregard the cost-of-living adjustment for Social Security  
31 benefits or Supplemental Security Income benefits and approval of federal funding, the department  
32 shall immediately adopt temporary rules consistent with the federal approval.

33 (3) The Department of Human Services shall annually renew an application approved by the  
34 United States Department of Agriculture under subsections (1) and (2) of this section.

35 **SECTION 4.** ORS 411.825 is amended to read:

36 411.825. (1) The Department of Human Services shall determine and certify *[to]* the eligibility  
37 of all individuals and households to receive *[food stamp benefits under a food stamp plan]* **supple-**  
38 **mental nutrition assistance under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program.**

39 (2) The department shall:

40 (a) Issue to recipients *[food stamp benefits]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** made available  
41 from the federal government under *[such plan]* **the program;** and

42 (b) Account to the federal government for all such *[food stamp benefits]* **supplemental nutrition**  
43 **assistance.**

44 (3) In order to carry out the provisions of ORS 411.806 to 411.845, the department is authorized  
45 to contract with any governmental agencies or private agencies for distribution of *[food stamp ben-*

1 *efits*] **supplemental nutrition assistance.**

2 **SECTION 5.** ORS 411.830 is amended to read:

3 411.830. (1) Any loss for which this state or its agencies may be liable to reimburse the federal  
4 government, in accordance with federal laws or regulations applicable to *[food stamp plans]* **the**  
5 **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program**, shall be paid from funds appropriated to the De-  
6 partment of Human Services for the purposes of ORS 411.806 to 411.845.

7 (2) Subsection (1) of this section shall not relieve any person of any civil or criminal liability  
8 to this state.

9 **SECTION 6.** ORS 411.837 is amended to read:

10 411.837. Counties, state institutions and agencies, issuing agencies, retail food outlets, wholesale  
11 food concerns, banks and all persons who participate in or administer any part of *[a food stamp*  
12 *plan]* **the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program** shall comply with all state and federal  
13 laws, rules and regulations applicable to such plans.

14 **SECTION 7.** ORS 411.840 is amended to read:

15 411.840. (1) *[No person shall]* **A person may not** knowingly obtain or attempt to obtain, or aid  
16 or abet another person in obtaining or attempting to obtain, *[any food stamp benefit under a food*  
17 *stamp plan]* **any supplemental nutrition assistance** to which the person or such other person is  
18 not entitled to receive or use under ORS 411.806 to 411.845, or under any rule or regulation  
19 promulgated pursuant to ORS 411.806 to 411.845.

20 (2) *[No person shall]* **A person may not** knowingly give, sell, trade or otherwise dispose of  
21 **supplemental nutrition assistance** to another person **who is** not entitled to receive or use the  
22 *[same]* **assistance** pursuant to ORS 411.806 to 411.845, or pursuant to any rule or regulation  
23 promulgated pursuant to ORS 411.806 to 411.845[.].

24 *[(a) Any food stamp benefit received under a food stamp plan; or]*

25 *[(b) Any food commodity received wholly or partially in exchange for a food stamp benefit received*  
26 *under a food stamp plan.]*

27 **SECTION 8.** ORS 411.845 is amended to read:

28 411.845. (1) If any person obtains, gives, sells, trades or otherwise disposes of any *[food stamp*  
29 *benefit]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** in violation of ORS 411.840, the district attorney shall  
30 prosecute, for and in the name of the State of Oregon, a civil action or suit to recover from such  
31 person[.].

32 *[(a) The food stamp benefit so obtained by such person; or]*

33 *[(b)]* the *[value of the food stamp benefit so]* **amount of the supplemental nutrition assistance**  
34 obtained, given, sold, traded or otherwise disposed of by such person.

35 (2) In any suit or action prosecuted under subsection (1) of this section, the state is entitled to  
36 recover interest and its costs and disbursements incurred in such suit or action.

37 (3) *[Food stamp benefits and]* Moneys recovered by the state under this section shall be ac-  
38 counted for or paid to the federal and state governments, as their respective interests therein may  
39 appear.

40 **SECTION 9.** ORS 411.878 is amended to read:

41 411.878. (1) In establishing and implementing a program to be known as the JOBS Plus Program,  
42 the Legislative Assembly recognizes that early attachment to work and development of knowledge  
43 and skills are the most effective means of helping people make the transition from dependence on  
44 public assistance and subsidizing in poverty to regular employment and self-reliance. It is the intent  
45 of the Legislative Assembly to promote greater economic self-sufficiency among Oregon families and

1 workers by:

2 (a) Increasing the employability of unemployed and underemployed Oregonians through on-the-  
3 job training;

4 (b) Invigorating the public-private workforce partnership through development of jobs with both  
5 private for-profit and public employers;

6 (c) Ensuring that program participants through their employment development plans have op-  
7 portunities to improve work skills, education and employability and to establish recent work histo-  
8 ries with work site training, mentoring, individual education accounts and provision of necessary  
9 support service benefits that include child care, workers' compensation, job placement and a guar-  
10 antee that participation in the JOBS Plus Program does not result in a reduction in net income to  
11 a participant when compared with the participant's combined income from the temporary assistance  
12 for needy families program, the [food stamp] **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance** Program and the  
13 unemployment insurance program; and

14 (d) Exeditiously placing program participants in subsidized and unsubsidized employment.

15 (2) The JOBS Plus Program is created as a program in which residents of the State of Oregon  
16 shall, in lieu of receiving [food stamp] benefits **in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Pro-**  
17 **gram** and payments from the temporary assistance for needy families program, be provided jobs and  
18 paid in a way that promotes self-sufficiency and encourages unemployed Oregonians to improve their  
19 positions in the workforce. Recipients of unemployment insurance also shall be offered employment  
20 under the program. The JOBS Plus Program shall be a public assistance to work strategy for the  
21 State of Oregon and operate under the job opportunities and basic skills program and rules adopted  
22 thereunder to the extent such rules are not inconsistent with ORS 316.680, 411.877 to 411.896 and  
23 657.925. These rules include but are not limited to rules regarding participation requirements, ex-  
24 emptions and support services.

25 **SECTION 10.** ORS 411.880 is amended to read:

26 411.880. The Governor and the Department of Human Services shall work diligently to obtain  
27 all exemptions and waivers from and amendments to federal statutes, rules and regulations neces-  
28 sary to implement the JOBS Plus Program at the earliest possible date, including but not limited to  
29 exemptions under section 1115 (42 U.S.C. 1315) of the Social Security Act and section 17 (7 U.S.C.  
30 2026) of the Food [Stamp] **and Nutrition Act.**

31 **SECTION 11.** ORS 411.882 is amended to read:

32 411.882. In administering the JOBS Plus Program and to the extent permitted by federal law, the  
33 Department of Human Services shall maximize the use of federal grants and apportionments of the  
34 temporary assistance for needy families program, the [food stamp] **Supplemental Nutrition As-**  
35 **sistance** Program and employment related child care.

36 **SECTION 12.** ORS 411.886 is amended to read:

37 411.886. (1) The JOBS Plus Advisory Board is established. The board shall advise the Depart-  
38 ment of Human Services and the Employment Department in the direction and administration of the  
39 JOBS Plus Program established under ORS 316.680, 411.877 to 411.896 and 657.925. The board shall  
40 have seven members, consisting of six representatives of the business community and one employed  
41 former recipient of temporary assistance for needy families, the [food stamp] **Supplemental Nutri-**  
42 **tion Assistance** Program or the unemployment insurance program.

43 (2) The Governor shall appoint new members from nominees recommended by the board.

44 (3) Members appointed to the board shall serve terms of three years.

45 **SECTION 13.** ORS 411.890 is amended to read:

1       411.890. A JOBS Plus Implementation Council shall be established in service areas to be deter-  
2       mined by the Director of Human Services to assist the JOBS Plus Advisory Board, the Department  
3       of Human Services and the Employment Department in the administration of the JOBS Plus Program  
4       and to allow local flexibility in dealing with the particular needs of each county. Each council shall  
5       be primarily responsible for recruiting and encouraging participation of employment providers in the  
6       county. Each council shall be composed of seven members who shall be appointed by the county  
7       commissioners in each county in the district. Council members shall be residents of the district in  
8       which they are appointed and shall serve four-year terms. Six members of the council shall be from  
9       the local business community. At least one member shall be a current or former recipient of the  
10       temporary assistance for needy families program, the *[food stamp]* **Supplemental Nutrition As-**  
11       **sistance** Program or the unemployment insurance program.

12       **SECTION 14.** ORS 411.892 is amended to read:

13       411.892. (1)(a) All employers, including public and private sector employers within the State of  
14       Oregon, are eligible to participate in the JOBS Plus Program. The Department of Human Services  
15       or Employment Department, as appropriate, shall adopt by rule a method to disqualify employers  
16       from participating in the program. No employer is required to participate in the JOBS Plus Program.  
17       In the event that there are unassigned participants whom no employer desires to utilize, the par-  
18       ticipants may be assigned to work for a public agency.

19       (b) The maximum number of program participants that any employer is authorized to receive at  
20       any one time may not exceed 10 percent of the total number of the employer's employees. However,  
21       each employer may receive one participant. The Director of Human Services or Director of the  
22       Employment Department, as appropriate, may waive the limit in special circumstances.

23       (c) The Department of Human Services or Employment Department, as appropriate, by rule shall  
24       establish criteria for excluding employers from participation for failure to abide by program re-  
25       quirements, showing a pattern of terminating participants prior to the completion of training or  
26       other demonstrated unwillingness to comply with the stated intent of the program.

27       (2) The Department of Human Services or Employment Department, as appropriate, shall ensure  
28       that jobs made available to program participants:

29       (a) Do not require work in excess of 40 hours per week;

30       (b) Are in conformity with section 3304(a)(5) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act;

31       (c) Are not used to displace regular employees or to fill unfilled positions previously established;  
32       and

33       (d) Do not pay a wage that is substantially less than the wage paid for similar jobs in the local  
34       economy with appropriate adjustments for experience and training.

35       (3)(a) Eligibility for the program shall be limited to residents who are:

36       (A) Adults and caretaker relatives who are receiving temporary assistance for needy families  
37       benefits;

38       (B) Adult *[food stamp]* **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance** Program recipients except as de-  
39       scribed in subsection (5)(b) of this section;

40       (C) Unemployment compensation recipients; and

41       (D) Unemployed noncaretaker parents of children who are receiving temporary assistance for  
42       needy families benefits.

43       (b) In addition to those residents eligible for the program under paragraph (a) of this subsection,  
44       additional residents who are seeking employment may be eligible for the program if there are  
45       legislatively allocated funds available from the savings attributable to the program in the Unem-

1   ployment Compensation Trust Fund or in the temporary assistance for needy families budget of the  
2   Department of Human Services.

3       (4)(a) Individuals desiring work through the program shall contact the nearest Department of  
4   Human Services office serving the county in which they reside if they are temporary assistance for  
5   needy families program or *[food stamp]* **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance** Program applicants or  
6   recipients or noncustodial parents of individuals receiving temporary assistance for needy families.  
7   Unemployment insurance applicants or recipients or others seeking employment may gain access to  
8   the program through their local Employment Department office.

9       (b) With the assistance of the local JOBS Plus Implementation Councils and the JOBS Plus  
10   Advisory Board, the Department of Human Services shall develop a job inventory of sufficient size  
11   to accommodate all of the participants who desire to work in the program. In consultation with the  
12   participant, the department shall try to match the profile of each participant with the needs of an  
13   employer when assigning a participant to work with the employer.

14       (c) Either the employer or the participant may terminate the assignment by contacting the ap-  
15   propriate Department of Human Services or Employment Department office. In such event, the De-  
16   partment of Human Services or Employment Department shall reassess the needs of the participant  
17   and assign the participant to another JOBS Plus Program placement or another job opportunity and  
18   basic skills program component and, at the employer's request, provide the employer with another  
19   participant.

20       (d)(A) Subject to ORS 657.925 (6)(d), if after four months in a placement, a participant has not  
21   been hired for an unsubsidized position, the employer shall allow the worker to undertake eight  
22   hours of job search per week. Participating employers shall consider such time as hours worked for  
23   the purposes of paying wages.

24       (B) Subject to ORS 657.925 (6)(d), if after six months in a placement, a participant has not been  
25   hired for an unsubsidized position, the placement shall be terminated, and the caseworker shall re-  
26   assess the participant's employment development plan.

27       (e) The Department of Human Services may pay placement and barrier removal payments to  
28   temporary assistance for needy families and *[food stamp]* **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance** Pro-  
29   gram participants as necessary to enable participation in the JOBS Plus Program.

30       (f) The Department of Human Services shall accept eligible volunteers into the program prior  
31   to mandating program participation by eligible persons.

32       (5)(a) Assignment of participants to available jobs shall be based on a preference schedule de-  
33   veloped by the Department of Human Services and the Employment Department. Any temporary  
34   assistance for needy families recipient or *[food stamp]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** recipient  
35   may volunteer for the program.

36       (b) The following individuals may not be required to participate in the program:

37       (A) Temporary assistance for needy families and *[food stamp]* **supplemental nutrition assist-**  
38   **ance** recipients who are eligible for Supplemental Security Income benefits or other ongoing state  
39   or federal maintenance benefits based on age or disability.

40       (B) *[Food stamp]* **Supplemental nutrition assistance** applicants or recipients who are employed  
41   full-time or are college students eligible for *[food stamps]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** and  
42   enrolled full-time in a community college or an institution of higher education, or enrolled half-time  
43   in a community college or an institution of higher education and working at least 20 hours per week.

44       (C) Teenage parents who remain in high school if progressing toward a diploma. Teenage par-  
45   ents not in school are eligible for the JOBS Plus Program.

1 (c) The Department of Human Services shall provide life skills classes and opportunities to  
2 achieve General Educational Development (GED) certificates to appropriate participants in con-  
3 junction with working in the JOBS Plus Program.

4 (d) Temporary assistance for needy families and *[food stamp]* **supplemental nutrition assist-**  
5 **ance** benefits shall be suspended at the end of the calendar month in which an employer makes the  
6 first wage payment to a participant who is a custodial parent in a family that receives temporary  
7 assistance for needy families or to any adult member of a household receiving *[food stamp benefits]*  
8 **supplemental nutrition assistance**. Failure of the participant to cooperate with the requirements  
9 of the JOBS Plus Program may result in the participant's removal, in accordance with rules adopted  
10 by the Department of Human Services, from the JOBS Plus Program and suspension of the partic-  
11 ipant's temporary assistance for needy families grant and *[food stamp benefits]* **supplemental nu-**  
12 **trition assistance**. A temporary assistance for needy families and *[food stamp benefits]*  
13 **supplemental nutrition assistance** recipient who has been removed from the program for failing  
14 to cooperate shall be eligible to reapply to participate in the program and shall have eligibility for  
15 program services determined without regard to the length of time the person was not participating  
16 following removal.

17 (6)(a) Employers shall pay all participating individuals at least the hourly rate of the Oregon  
18 minimum wage.

19 (b) Sick leave, holiday and vacation absences shall conform to the individual employer's rules  
20 for temporary employees.

21 (c) Group health insurance benefits shall be provided by the employer to program participants  
22 if, and to the extent that, state or federal law requires the employer to provide such benefits.

23 (d) All persons participating in the JOBS Plus Program shall be considered to be temporary  
24 employees of the individual employer providing the work and shall be entitled only to benefits re-  
25 quired by state or federal law.

26 (e) Employers shall provide workers' compensation coverage for each JOBS Plus Program par-  
27 ticipant.

28 (7) In the event that the net monthly full-time wage paid to a participant would be less than the  
29 level of income from the temporary assistance for needy families program and the *[food stamp*  
30 *benefit]* **supplemental nutrition assistance** amount equivalent that the participant would otherwise  
31 receive, the Department of Human Services shall determine and pay a supplemental payment as  
32 necessary to provide the participant with that level of net income. The department shall determine  
33 and pay in advance supplemental payments to participants on a monthly basis as necessary to en-  
34 sure equivalent net program wages. Participants shall be compensated only for time worked.

35 (8) In addition to and not in lieu of the payments provided for under subsections (6) and (7) of  
36 this section, participants shall be entitled to retain the full child support payments collected by the  
37 Department of Justice.

38 (9) Program participants who are eligible for federally and state funded medical assistance at  
39 the time they enter the program shall remain eligible as long as they continue to participate in the  
40 program. In conformity with existing state day care program regulations, child day care shall be  
41 provided for all program participants who require it.

42 (10) JOBS Plus Program employers shall:

43 (a) Endeavor to make JOBS Plus Program placements positive learning and training experiences;

44 (b) Maintain health, safety and working conditions at or above levels generally acceptable in the  
45 industry and no less than that of comparable jobs of the employer;

1 (c) Provide on-the-job training to the degree necessary for the participants to perform their du-  
2 ties;

3 (d) Recruit volunteer mentors from among their regular employees to assist the participants in  
4 becoming oriented to work and the workplace; and

5 (e) Sign an agreement to abide by all requirements of the program, including the requirement  
6 that the program not supplant existing jobs. All agreements shall include provisions noting the em-  
7 ployer's responsibility to repay reimbursements in the event the employer violates program rules.  
8 When a professional placement service, professional employment organization or temporary employ-  
9 ment agency is acting as an employer pursuant to subsection (14) of this section, agreements under  
10 this paragraph shall require a three-party agreement between the professional placement service,  
11 professional employment organization or temporary employment agency, the organization where the  
12 participant has been placed to perform services and the State of Oregon. The three-party agreement  
13 shall include provisions requiring that all JOBS Plus reimbursements received by the professional  
14 placement service, professional employment organization or temporary employment agency be cred-  
15 ited to the organization where the participant has been placed to perform services.

16 (11) Program participant wages shall be subject to federal and state income taxes, Social Secu-  
17 rity taxes and unemployment insurance tax or reimbursement as applicable under ORS chapter 657,  
18 which shall be withheld and paid in accordance with state and federal law. Supplemental payments  
19 made pursuant to subsection (7) of this section shall not be subject to state income taxes under ORS  
20 chapter 316 and, to the extent allowed by federal law, shall not be subject to federal income taxes  
21 and Social Security taxes.

22 (12)(a)(A) The Department of Human Services shall reimburse employers for the employers'  
23 share of Social Security, unemployment insurance and workers' compensation premiums paid on be-  
24 half of program participants, other than those who are unemployment insurance claimants, referred  
25 to the employer by the Department of Human Services, as well as the minimum wage earnings paid  
26 by the employer to program participants referred to the employer by the Department of Human  
27 Services.

28 (B) The Employment Department shall reimburse employers \$5 per hour paid by the employer  
29 as earnings to JOBS Plus Program participants, who are unemployment insurance claimants and are  
30 referred to the employer by the Employment Department.

31 (b) If the Department of Human Services or Employment Department finds that an employer has  
32 violated any of the rules of the JOBS Plus Program, the appropriate department:

33 (A) Shall withhold any amounts due to employers under paragraph (a) of this subsection.

34 (B) May seek repayment of any amounts paid to employers under paragraph (a) of this sub-  
35 section.

36 (13) Subject to ORS 657.925 (6)(d), for unemployment insurance claimants participating in the  
37 JOBS Plus Program:

38 (a) If after nine weeks in a placement, a participant has not been hired for an unsubsidized po-  
39 sition, the employer shall allow the worker to undertake up to five hours of job search per week.

1 Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the office of the State Fire

3 (m) Disclose information to the Oregon Student Assistance Commission for the purpose of per-  
4 forming the commission's duties under ORS chapter 348 and Title IV of the Higher Education Act  
5 of 1965. The information disclosed may include the names and addresses of employers and employees  
6 and payroll data of employers and employees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not  
7 be disclosed by the commission in any manner that would identify an employing unit or employee  
8 except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission's duties under ORS chapter 348 or Title  
9 IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not  
10 prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall  
11 be paid by the commission.

12 (n) Disclose information to the Department of Transportation to assist the Department of  
13 Transportation in carrying out the duties of the Department of Transportation relating to collection  
14 of delinquent and liquidated debts, including taxes, under ORS 184.610 to 184.666, 184.670 to 184.733  
15 and 805.263, ORS chapter 319 and the Oregon Vehicle Code. The information disclosed may include  
16 the names and addresses of employers and employees and payroll data of employers and employees.  
17 The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the Department of Transpor-  
18 tation in any manner that would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent nec-  
19 cessary to carry out the Department of Transportation's duties relating to collection of delinquent  
20 and liquidated debts or in auditing or reviewing any report or return required or permitted to be  
21 filed under the revenue and tax laws administered by the Department of Transportation. The De-  
22 partment of Transportation may not disclose any information received to any private collection  
23 agency or for any other purpose. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared  
24 for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by  
25 the Department of Transportation.

26 (o) Disclose to any person establishment level information secured pursuant to this chapter from  
27 federal, state and local government employing units. If the information disclosed under this para-  
28 graph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the infor-  
29 mation shall be paid by the party requesting the information.

30 (p) Disclose to any person the industrial classification code assigned to an employing unit. If the  
31 information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Depart-  
32 ment, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the party requesting the information.

33 (5) Any officer appointed by or any employee of the Director of the Employment Department  
34 who discloses confidential information, except with the authority of the director, pursuant to rules  
35 or as otherwise required by law, may be disqualified from holding any appointment or employment  
36 with the Employment Department.

37 (6) Any person or any officer or employee of an entity to whom information is disclosed by the  
38 Employment Department under this section who divulges or uses the information for any purpose  
39 other than that specified in the provision of law or agreement authorizing the use or disclosure may  
40 be disqualified from performing any service under contract or disqualified from holding any ap-  
41 pointment or employment with the state agency that engaged or employed that person, officer or  
42 employee. The Employment Department may immediately cancel or modify any information sharing  
43 agreement with an entity when a person or an officer or employee of that entity discloses confi-  
44 dential information, other than as specified in law or agreement.

45 **SECTION 25.** Section 6, chapter 290, Oregon Laws 1987, as amended by section 1, chapter 622,

1 Oregon Laws 1991, and section 1, chapter 29, Oregon Laws 2007, is amended to read:

2 **Sec. 6.** (1) In carrying out the provisions of section 2, chapter 290, Oregon Laws 1987, the Public  
3 Utility Commission shall establish a plan to provide assistance to low income customers through  
4 differential rates or otherwise. The plan of assistance shall be designed to use, to the maximum extent  
5 possible, the available funding offered by the Federal Communications Commission, and may  
6 provide different levels of assistance to low income customers based upon differences in local exchange  
7 rates. The plan established by the commission shall prescribe the amount of assistance to  
8 be provided and the time and manner of payment.

9 (2) For the purpose of establishing a plan to provide assistance to low income customers under  
10 this section, the commission shall require all public utilities, cooperative corporations and  
11 unincorporated associations providing local exchange telecommunication service to participate in  
12 the plan, except as provided in subsection (3) of this section.

13 (3) In lieu of participation in the commission's plan to assist low income customers, a public  
14 utility, cooperative corporation or unincorporated association providing local exchange telecommu-  
15 nication service may apply to the commission to establish an alternative plan for the purpose of  
16 carrying out the provisions of section 2, chapter 290, Oregon Laws 1987, for its own customers. The  
17 commission shall adopt standards for determining the adequacy of alternative plans.

18 (4) The commission may contract with any governmental agency to assist the commission in the  
19 administration of any assistance plan adopted pursuant to this section.

20 (5)(a) As used in sections 2 to 6, chapter 290, Oregon Laws 1987, "low income customer" means  
21 an individual determined by the commission:

22 (A) To be receiving benefits from the [*federal food stamp*] **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance**  
23 Program or from another low income public assistance program for which eligibility requirements  
24 limit participation to individuals with income that does not exceed 135 percent of federal poverty  
25 guidelines; or

26 (B) To be a resident of a long term care facility, as defined in ORS 442.015, or a residential care  
27 facility, as defined in ORS 443.400:

28 (i) Who receives medical assistance under ORS chapter 414; and

29 (ii) Who has income that does not exceed 135 percent of federal poverty guidelines.

30 (b) The commission must be able to verify the continuing participation of a low income customer  
31 in a program described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

32 **SECTION 26.** ORS 813.602 is amended to read:

33 813.602. (1) When a person is convicted of driving while under the influence of intoxicants in  
34 violation of ORS 813.010 or of a municipal ordinance, the Department of Transportation, in addition  
35 to any other requirement, shall require that an approved ignition interlock device be installed and  
36 used in any vehicle operated by the person:

37 (a) Before the person is eligible for a hardship permit. The requirement is a condition of the  
38 hardship permit for the duration of the hardship permit.

39 (b) For a first conviction, for one year after the ending date of the suspension or revocation  
40 caused by the conviction. Violation of the condition imposed under this paragraph is a Class A  
41 traffic violation.

42 (c) For a second or subsequent conviction, for two years after the ending date of the suspension  
43 or revocation caused by the conviction. Violation of the condition imposed under this paragraph is  
44 a Class A traffic violation.

45 (2) If the court determines that approved ignition interlock devices are reasonably available, the

1 court may require as a condition of a driving while under the influence of intoxicants diversion  
2 agreement that an approved ignition interlock device be installed in any vehicle operated by the  
3 person. Courts may not exercise authority under this subsection during any period the courts have  
4 notice from the Office of Economic Analysis of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services  
5 that there are not sufficient moneys in the Intoxicated Driver Program Fund to pay the costs under  
6 subsection (4) of this section. The Office of Economic Analysis of the Oregon Department of Ad-  
7 ministrative Services may not issue any notice under this subsection if federal funds are available  
8 to pay the cost of the interlock devices for indigents and costs of analysis of the use of interlock  
9 devices.

10 (3) Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, if an ignition interlock system is ordered  
11 or required under subsection (1) or (2) of this section, the person so ordered or required shall pay  
12 to the provider the reasonable costs of leasing, installing and maintaining the device. A payment  
13 schedule may be established for the person by the department.

14 (4) The department may waive, in whole or in part, or defer the defendant's responsibility to pay  
15 all or part of the costs under subsection (3) of this section if the defendant meets the criteria for  
16 indigence established for waiving or deferring such costs under subsection (5) of this section. If the  
17 defendant's responsibility for costs is waived, then notwithstanding ORS 813.270, the costs described  
18 in subsection (3) of this section must be paid from the Intoxicated Driver Program Fund.

19 (5) The department, by rule, shall establish criteria and procedures it will use for qualification  
20 to waive or defer costs described under subsection (3) of this section for indigence. The criteria must  
21 be consistent with the standards for indigence adopted by the federal government for purposes of  
22 the [food stamp] **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance** Program.

23 (6) At the end of the suspension or revocation resulting from the conviction, the department  
24 shall suspend the driving privileges or right to apply for driving privileges of a person who has not  
25 submitted proof to the department that an ignition interlock device has been installed or who  
26 tampers with an ignition interlock device after it has been installed. If the suspension is for failing  
27 to submit proof of installation, the suspension continues until the department receives proof that the  
28 ignition interlock device has been installed or until one year after the ending date of the suspension  
29 resulting from the first conviction or two years after the ending date of the suspension resulting  
30 from a second or subsequent conviction, whichever comes first. If the suspension is for tampering  
31 with an ignition interlock device, the suspension continues until one year after the ending date of  
32 the suspension resulting from the first conviction or two years after the ending date of the suspen-  
33 sion resulting from a second or subsequent conviction. A person whose driving privileges or right  
34 to apply for privileges is suspended under this subsection is entitled to administrative review, as  
35 described in ORS 809.440, of the action.

36 (7) The department shall adopt rules permitting medical exemptions from the requirements of  
37 installation and use of an ignition interlock device under subsection (1) of this section.

38 **SECTION 27. ORS 411.835 is repealed.**

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
