# House Bill 2157

#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Updates connection date to federal Internal Revenue Code and other provisions of federal tax law.

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to connection to federal tax law; creating new provisions; amending ORS 238A.005, 3 238A.125, 238A.150, 238A.170, 238A.230, 238A.370, 238A.400, 238A.410, 238A.415, 238A.430, 4 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450, 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 311.689, 314.011,  $\mathbf{5}$ 315.004, 316.012, 317.010, 317.097, 458.670 and 657.010; and prescribing an effective date.

#### 6 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

7 SECTION 1. ORS 238A.005 is amended to read:

8 238A.005. For the purposes of this chapter:

9 (1) "Active member" means a member of the pension program or the individual account program

10 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan who is actively employed in a qualifying position.

11 (2) "Actuarial equivalent" means a payment or series of payments having the same value as the 12payment or series of payments replaced, computed on the basis of interest rate and mortality assumptions adopted by the board. 13

14 (3) "Board" means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

15 (4) "Eligible employee" means a person who performs services for a participating public em-16 ployer, including elected officials other than judges. "Eligible employee" does not include:

- 17 (a) Persons engaged as independent contractors;
- 18 (b) Aliens working under a training or educational visa;

(c) Persons, other than workers in the Industries for the Blind Program under ORS 346.190, 19

20 provided sheltered employment or make-work by a public employer;

21(d) Persons categorized by a participating public employer as student employees;

- 22(e) Any person who is an inmate of a state institution;
- 23(f) Employees of foreign trade offices of the Economic and Community Development Department 24 who live and perform services in foreign countries under the provisions of ORS 285A.075 (1)(g);
- 25(g) An employee actively participating in an alternative retirement program established under 26 ORS 353.250 or an optional retirement plan established under ORS 341.551;

27 (h) Employees of the Oregon University System who are actively participating in an optional 28retirement plan offered under ORS 243.800;

(i) Any employee who belongs to a class of employees that was not eligible on August 28, 2003, 29

30 for membership in the system under the provisions of ORS chapter 238 or other law;

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1 (j) Any person who belongs to a class of employees who are not eligible to become members of 2 the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan under the provisions of ORS 238A.070 (2);

3 (k) Any person who is retired under ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245 or ORS chapter 238 and who
4 continues to receive retirement benefits while employed; and

5 (L) Judges.

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(5) "Firefighter" means:

7 (a) A person employed by a local government, as defined in ORS 174.116, whose primary job 8 duties include the fighting of fires;

9 (b) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy state fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals; 10 and

(c) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a
 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled
 fires as described in ORS 477.064.

14 (6) "Fund" means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

15 (7)(a) "Hour of service" means:

(A) An hour for which an eligible employee is directly or indirectly paid or entitled to payment
 by a participating public employer for performance of duties in a qualifying position; and

(B) An hour of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or authorized leave during which an employee does not perform duties but for which the employee is directly or indirectly paid or entitled to payment by a participating public employer for services in a qualifying position, as long as the hour is within the number of hours regularly scheduled for the performance of duties during the period of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or authorized leave.

(b) "Hour of service" does not include any hour for which payment is made or due under a plan
maintained solely for the purpose of complying with applicable workers' compensation laws or unemployment compensation laws.

(8) "Inactive member" means a member of the pension program or the individual account program of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan whose membership has not been terminated, who
is not a retired member and who is not employed in a qualifying position.

(9) "Individual account program" means the defined contribution individual account program of
 the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

(10) "Member" means an eligible employee who has established membership in the pension pro gram or the individual account program of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan and whose
 membership has not been terminated under ORS 238A.110 or 238A.310.

(11) "Participating public employer" means a public employer as defined in ORS 238.005 that
 provides retirement benefits for employees of the public employer under the system.

(12) "Pension program" means the defined benefit pension program of the Oregon Public Service
 Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

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(13) "Police officer" means a police officer as described in ORS 238.005.

(14) "Qualifying position" means one or more jobs with one or more participating public employers in which an eligible employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year,
excluding any service in a job for which benefits are not provided under the Oregon Public Service
Retirement Plan pursuant to ORS 238A.070 (2).

44 (15) "Retired member" means a pension program member who is receiving a pension as provided
 45 in ORS 238A.180 to 238A.195.

1 (16)(a) "Salary" means the remuneration paid to an active member in return for services to the 2 participating public employer, including remuneration in the form of living quarters, board or other 3 items of value, to the extent the remuneration is includable in the employee's taxable income under 4 Oregon law. Salary includes the additional amounts specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection, 5 but does not include the amounts specified in paragraph (c) of this subsection, regardless of whether 6 those amounts are includable in taxable income.

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(b) "Salary" includes the following amounts:

8 (A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan that are made 9 at the election of the employee.

10 (B) Contributions to a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity that are made at the election of the 11 employee.

12 (C) Any amount that is contributed to a cafeteria plan or qualified transportation fringe benefit 13 plan by the employer at the election of the employee and that is not includable in the taxable in-14 come of the employee by reason of 26 U.S.C. 125 or 132(f)(4), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] **De-**15 **cember 31, 2008**.

(D) Any amount that is contributed to a cash or deferred arrangement by the employer at the election of the employee and that is not included in the taxable income of the employee by reason of 26 U.S.C. 402(e)(3), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] **December 31, 2008**.

(E) Retroactive payments made to an employee to correct a clerical error, pursuant to an award by a court or by order of or pursuant to a conciliation agreement with an administration agency charged with enforcing federal or state law protecting the employee's rights to employment or wages, which shall be allocated to and deemed paid in the periods in which the work was done or in which the work would have been done.

(F) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by
the employer and deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS 238A.335
(1) and (2)(a).

(G) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is not paidby the employer under ORS 238A.335.

(H) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS
 652.190.

31 (c) "Salary" does not include the following amounts:

(A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer's business which is reimbursed by the
 employer.

34 (B) Payments made on account of an employee's death.

35 (C) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave, vacation leave or other paid 36 leave.

(D) Any severance payment, accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future periodor advance against future wages.

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(E) Any retirement incentive, retirement bonus or retirement gratuitous payment.

40 (F) Payment for a leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have agreed that 41 no future services in a qualifying position will be performed.

42 (G) Payments for instructional services rendered to institutions of the Department of Higher
43 Education or the Oregon Health and Science University when those services are in excess of full44 time employment subject to this chapter. A person employed under a contract for less than 12
45 months is subject to this subparagraph only for the months covered by the contract.

(H) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by 1 2 the employer and is not deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS 3 238A.335 (1) and (2)(b).

(I) Any amount in excess of \$200,000 for a calendar year. If any period over which salary is 4 determined is less than 12 months, the \$200,000 limitation for that period shall be multiplied by a 5 fraction, the numerator of which is the number of months in the determination period and the de-6 nominator of which is 12. The board shall adopt rules adjusting this dollar limit to incorporate 7 cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service. 8

9 (17) "System" means the Public Employees Retirement System.

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SECTION 2. ORS 238A.125 is amended to read: 238A.125. (1) Upon retiring at normal retirement age, a vested pension program member shall 11 12 be paid an annual pension for the life of the member as follows:

13 (a) For service as a police officer or firefighter, 1.8 percent of final average salary multiplied by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as a police officer or firefighter. 14 15(b) For service as other than a police officer or firefighter, 1.5 percent of final average salary multiplied by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as other than a police 16 17 officer or firefighter.

18 (2) Notwithstanding any provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, the annual benefit payable to a member under the pension program and under any other tax-qualified defined benefit plan main-19 tained by the participating public employer may not exceed the applicable limitations set forth in 2026 U.S.C. 415(b), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] December 31, 2008. The Public Employees Re-2122tirement Board shall adopt rules for the administration of this limitation, including adjustments in 23the annual dollar limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service. 24

25(3) The board shall make no actuarial adjustment in a member's pension calculated under this section by reason of the member's retirement after normal retirement age. 26

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SECTION 3. ORS 238A.150 is amended to read:

238A.150. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, an eligible em-28ployee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed ser-2930 vices, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with 31 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to accrue retirement credit, credit toward the probationary period required by ORS 238A.100 and credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS 32238A.115 under rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2) 33 34 of this section.

35 (2) The board shall adopt rules establishing benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the purpose 36 37 of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all federal 38 law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed services, including 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] December 31, 2008. Benefits and service 39 40 credit under rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed benefits and 41 service credit required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed services.

42SECTION 4. ORS 238A.170 is amended to read:

238A.170. (1) An active member of the pension program who is 70-1/2 years of age or older must 43 retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which the member 44 terminates employment with all participating public employers. An inactive member of the pension 45

1 program must retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which

2 the member attains 70-1/2 years of age.

3 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, the entire interest of a 4 member of the pension program must be distributed over a time period commencing no later than 5 the required beginning date set forth in subsection (1) of this section, and must be distributed in a 6 manner that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regu-7 lations implementing that section, as in effect on [*August 29, 2003*] **December 31, 2008**. The Public 8 Employees Retirement Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution require-9 ments.

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**SECTION 5.** ORS 238A.230 is amended to read:

11 238A.230. (1) If a member of the pension program who is vested dies before the member's effec-12 tive date of retirement, the Public Employees Retirement Board shall pay the death benefit provided 13 for in this section to the spouse of the member or to any other person who is constitutionally re-14 quired to be treated in the same manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits.

(2)(a) The death benefit to be paid under this section shall be for the life of the spouse or other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same manner as a spouse, and shall be the actuarial equivalent of 50 percent of the pension that would otherwise have been paid to the deceased member.

(b) For the purpose of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the amount of the pension that wouldotherwise have been paid to the deceased member shall be calculated:

(A) As of the date of death if the member dies after the earliest retirement date for the member
 under ORS 238A.165; or

(B) As if the member became an inactive member on the date of death and thereafter retired
at the earliest retirement date if the member dies before the earliest retirement date for the member
under ORS 238A.165.

(3) The death benefit provided under this section is first effective on the first day of the month 2627following the date of death of the member. The surviving spouse or other person entitled to the death benefit may elect to delay payment of the death benefit, but payment must commence no later 28than December 31 of the calendar year in which the member would have reached 70-1/2 years of age. 2930 (4) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, distributions of death 31 benefits under the pension program must comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26 32U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations implementing that section, as in effect on [August 29, 2003] December 31, 2008. The board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution require-33 34 ments.

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#### SECTION 6. ORS 238A.370 is amended to read:

238A.370. Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the annual addition 36 37 to the employee and employer accounts of a member of the individual account program for a cal-38 endar year, together with the annual additions to the accounts of the member under any other defined contribution plan maintained by the participating public employer for a calendar year, may 39 not exceed the lesser of \$40,000, or 100 percent of the member's compensation for that calendar year. 40 For purposes of this section, "annual addition" has the meaning given that term in 26 U.S.C. 41 42 415(c)(2), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] December 31, 2008, and "compensation" has the meaning given the term "participant's compensation" in 26 U.S.C. 415(c)(3), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] 43 December 31, 2008. The Public Employees Retirement Board shall adopt rules for the adminis-44 tration of this limitation, including adjustments in the annual dollar limitation to reflect cost-of-45

1 living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

**SECTION 7.** ORS 238A.400 is amended to read:

238A.400. (1) Upon retirement on or after the earliest retirement date, as described in ORS
238A.165, a member of the individual account program shall receive in a lump sum the amounts in
the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account to the extent the member
is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320.

(2) In lieu of a lump sum payment under subsection (1) of this section, a member of the individ-7 ual account program may elect to receive the amounts in the member's employee account and em-8 9 ployer account, to the extent the member is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, in substantially equal installments paid over a period of 5, 10, 15 or 20 years, or over a period that is 10 equal to the anticipated life span of the member as actuarially determined by the Public Employees 11 12 Retirement Board. Installments may be made on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis. In no event 13 may the period selected by the member exceed the time allowed by the minimum distribution requirements described in subsection (5) of this section. The board shall by rule establish the manner 14 15 in which installments will be adjusted to reflect investment gains and losses on the unpaid balance 16 during the payout period elected by the member under this subsection. The board by rule may establish minimum monthly amounts payable under this subsection. The board may require that a 17 18 lump sum payment, or an installment schedule different than the schedules provided for in this 19 subsection, be used to pay the vested amounts in the member's accounts if those amounts are not 20adequate to generate the minimum monthly amounts specified by the rule.

(3) A member of the individual account program electing to receive installments under subsection (2) of this section must designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries. In the event the member dies before all amounts in the employee and vested employer accounts are paid, all remaining installment payments shall be made to the beneficiary or beneficiaries designated by the member. A beneficiary may elect to receive a lump sum distribution of the remaining amounts.

(4) A member who is entitled to receive retirement benefits under ORS chapter 238 may receive vested amounts in the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account in the manner provided by this section when the member retires for service under the provisions of ORS chapter 238.

(5) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the entire interest of a member of the individual account program must be distributed over a time period commencing no later than the latest retirement date set forth in ORS 238A.170, and must be distributed in a manner that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regulations implementing that section, as in effect on [*January 1, 2008*] **December 31, 2008**. The board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

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SECTION 8. ORS 238A.410 is amended to read:

238A.410. (1) If a member of the individual account program dies before retirement, the amounts in the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account, to the extent the member is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, shall be paid in a lump sum to the beneficiary or beneficiaries designated by the member for the purposes of this section.

(2) If a member of the individual account program is married at the time of death, or there exists at the time of death any other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits, the spouse or other person shall be the beneficiary for purposes of the death benefit payable under this section unless the spouse or other person consents to the designation of a different beneficiary or beneficiaries before the designation

has been made and the consent has not been revoked by the spouse or other person as of the time 1 2 of the member's death. Consent and revocation of consent must be in writing, acknowledged by a notary public, and submitted to the Public Employees Retirement Board in accordance with rules 3 adopted by the board. If the member's spouse is designated as the member's beneficiary and the 4 marriage of the member and spouse is subsequently dissolved, the former spouse shall be treated as 5 predeceasing the member for purposes of this section, unless the member expressly designates the 6 former spouse as beneficiary after the effective date of the dissolution or the former spouse is re-7 quired to be designated as a beneficiary under the provisions of ORS 238.465. 8

9 (3) For purposes of this section and ORS 238A.400 (3), if a member fails to designate a benefi-10 ciary, or if the person or persons designated do not survive the member, the death benefit provided 11 for in this section shall be paid to the following person or persons, in the following order of priority: 12 (a) The member's surviving spouse or other person who is constitutionally required to be treated 13 in the same memory of a spouse:

(b) The member's surviving children, in equal shares; or

15 (c) The member's estate.

(4) The entire amount of a deceased member's vested accounts must be distributed by December
31 of the fifth calendar year after the year in which the member died. Notwithstanding any other
provision of this chapter, distributions of death benefits under the individual account program must
comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations implementing that section, as in effect on [August 29, 2003] December 31, 2008. The Public Employees
Retirement Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

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SECTION 9. ORS 238A.415 is amended to read:

23 238A.415. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, an eligible em-24 ployee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed ser-25 vices, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with 26 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to credit toward the probationary period required 27 by ORS 238A.300, credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS 238A.320 and contributions under 28 rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.

(2) The board shall adopt rules establishing contributions and service credit for any period of 2930 service in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the 31 purpose of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all federal law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed ser-32vices, including 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on [August 29, 2003] December 31, 2008. Contributions 33 34 and service credit under rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed 35 contributions and service credit required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed 36 services.

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## SECTION 10. ORS 238A.430 is amended to read:

238A.430. (1) To the extent required by law, and except as otherwise provided by rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board under subsection (4) of this section, any portion of a distribution of benefits described in subsection (2) of this section shall, at the election of and in lieu of distribution to the distributee, be paid directly to an eligible retirement plan specified by the distributee.

43 (2) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to a distribution of any benefit under44 the pension program or the individual account program except:

45 (a) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least

1 annually for the life or life expectancy of the distributee, or for the joint lives or life expectancies

2 of the distributee and a designated beneficiary;

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3 (b) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least
4 annually for a specified period of 10 years or more; and

(c) A distribution to the extent that the distribution is required under 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9).

37 <u>SECTION 11.</u> ORS 305.230, as amended by section 1, chapter 45, Oregon Laws 2008, is amended
 38 to read:

305.230. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 9.320:

(a) Any person who is qualified to practice law or public accountancy in this state, any person who has been granted active enrollment to practice before the Internal Revenue Service and who is qualified to prepare tax returns in this state or any person who is the authorized employee of a taxpayer and is regularly employed by the taxpayer in tax matters may represent the taxpayer before a tax court magistrate or the Department of Revenue in any conference or proceeding with respect to the administration of any tax.

1 (b) Any person who is licensed by the State Board of Tax Practitioners or who is exempt from 2 such licensing requirement as provided for and limited by ORS 673.610 may represent a taxpayer 3 before a tax court magistrate or the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to the 4 administration of any tax on or measured by net income.

5 (c) Any shareholder of an S corporation, as defined in section 1361 of the Internal Revenue 6 Code, as amended and in effect on December 31, [2007] **2008**, may represent the corporation in any 7 proceeding before a tax court magistrate or the department in the same manner as if the share-8 holder were a partner and the S corporation were a partnership. the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to the administration of any ad
valorem property tax.

 partner under ORS 305.242 may represent those partners in any conference or proceeding with re spect to the administration of any tax on or measured by net income.

(f) Any person authorized under rules adopted by the department may represent a taxpayer before the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to any tax. Rules adopted under this paragraph, to the extent feasible, shall be consistent with federal law that governs representation before the Internal Revenue Service, as federal law is amended and in effect on December 31, [2007] 2008.

(3) "Financial institution" means: 10 (a) An organization regulated under ORS chapters 706 to 716, 722 or 723; or 11 12 (b) In the case of individual development accounts established for the purpose described in ORS 458.685 (1)(c), a financial institution as defined in ORS 348.841. 13 (4) "Individual development account" means a contract between an account holder and a 14 15 fiduciary organization, for the deposit of funds into a financial institution by the account holder, and the deposit of matching funds into the financial institution by the fiduciary organization, to allow 16 the account holder to accumulate assets for use toward achieving a specific purpose approved by 17 18 the fiduciary organization. 19 (5) "Lower income household" means a household having an income equal to or less than 80 percent of the median household income for the area as determined by the Housing and Community 20Services Department. In making the determination, the department shall give consideration to any 2122data on area household income published by the United States Department of Housing and Urban 23Development. (6) "Resident of this state" has the meaning given that term in ORS 316.027. 24 SECTION 27. ORS 657.010, as amended by section 17, chapter 45, Oregon Laws 2008, is 25amended to read: 2627657.010. 10 (7) "Employment office" means a free public employment office or branch thereof, operated by 11 this state or maintained as a part of a state-controlled system of public employment offices.

(8) "Hospital" means an organization that has been licensed, certified or approved by the De-partment of Human Services as a hospital.

14 (9) "Institution of higher education" means an educational institution that:

(a) Admits as regular students only individuals having a certificate of graduation from a high
 school, or the recognized equivalent of such a certificate;

(b) Is legally authorized in this state to provide a program of education beyond high school;

(c) Provides an educational program for which it awards a bachelor's or higher degree, or provides a program that is acceptable for full credit toward such a degree, a program of post-graduate

 recognized occupation; and

22 (d) Is a public or other nonprofit institution.

(10) "Internal Revenue Code" means the federal Internal Revenue Code, as amended and in ef fect on December 31, [2007] 2008.

(11) "Nonprofit employing unit" means an organization, or group of organizations, described in
section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code that is exempt from income tax under section 501(a)
of the Internal Revenue Code.

(12) "State" includes, in addition to the states of the United States of America, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. However, for all purposes of this chapter the Virgin Islands shall be considered a state on and after the day on which the United States Secretary of Labor first approves the Virgin Islands' law under section 3304(a) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act as amended by Public Law 94-566.

(13) "Taxes" means the money payments to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund re quired, or voluntary payments permitted, by this chapter.

(14) "Valid claim" means any claim for benefits made in accordance with ORS 657.260 if the
 individual meets the wages-paid-for-employment requirements of ORS 657.150.

(15) "Week" means any period of seven consecutive calendar days ending at midnight, as the
director may, by regulation, prescribe. The director may by regulation prescribe that a "week" shall
be "in," "within," or "during" the calendar quarter that includes the greater part of such week.

40 <u>SECTION 28.</u> (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this section, the 41 amendments to statutes by sections 1 to 27 of this 2009 Act apply to transactions or activities 42 occurring on or after January 1, 2009, in tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2009.

(2) The effective and applicable dates, and the exceptions, special rules and coordination
with the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, relative to those dates, contained in the Food,
Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (P.L. 110-245), the Housing and Economic Recovery

1 Act of 2008 (P.L. 110-289), the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008, the Energy 2 Improvement and Extension Act of 2008 and the Tax Extenders and Alternative Minimum 3 Tax Relief Act of 2008 (P.L. 110-343) and the Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing 4 Adoptions Act of 2008 (P.L. 110-351) and other federal law amending the Internal Revenue 5 Code apply for Oregon personal income and corporate excise and income tax purposes, to the 6 extent they can be made applicable, in the same manner as they are applied under the 7 Internal Revenue Code and related federal law.

(c) Any changes required because of the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690,
307.130, 307.147, 308A.450, 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 311.689, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010,
317.097, 458.670 and 657.010 by sections 11 to 27 of this 2009 Act for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2010, shall be made by filing an amended return within the time prescribed
by law.

(d) If a taxpayer fails to file an amended return under paragraph (c) of this subsection,
the Department of Revenue shall make any changes under paragraph (c) of this subsection
on the return to which the changes relate within the period specified for issuing a notice of
deficiency or claiming a refund as otherwise provided by law with respect to that return, or
within one year after a return for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2009, and before January 1, 2010, is filed, whichever period expires later.
