4 352.071, 352.074, 352.221, 352.223, 352.239, 352.247, 352.360, 352.510, 352.520, 352.530, 352.560, 352.570,
5 352.580, 352.610, 352.650, 352.655, 542.710, 567.005, 567.010, 576.768 and 759.445 and section 2, chapter
6 788, Oregon Laws 2005, and section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2007; repealing ORS 351.456,
7 351.513, 351.515, 351.523, 351.524, 351.526, 351.528, 351.529, 351.533, 351.534, 351.537, 351.540, 351.626,
8 351.668, 352.600 and 352.630 and section 3, chapter 788, Oregon Laws 2005; appropriating money; and
9 declaring an emergency.”.

10 Delete lines 17 through 29 and delete pages 2 through 62 and insert:

11 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 351.010 is amended to read:

12 “351.010. The [*Department of Higher Education*] **Oregon University System is established and**
13 **is organized as described in ORS 352.002. The system** shall be conducted under the control of a
14 board of 12 directors, to be known as the State Board of Higher Education. The board shall consist
15 of:

16 “(1) Two students, who at the time of their appointment to the board, are admitted at different
17 public institutions of higher education in Oregon listed in ORS 352.002.

18 “(2) One member of the faculty at Oregon State University, Portland State University or Uni-
19 versity of Oregon.

20 “(3) One member of the faculty at Eastern Oregon University, Oregon Institute of Technology,
21 Southern Oregon University or Western Oregon University.

22 “(4) Eight members of the general public who are not students or faculty at the time of their
23 appointment.

24 “**SECTION 2.** (1) **The amendments to ORS 351.010 by section 1 of this 2009 Act are in-**
25 **tended to change the name of the ‘Department of Higher Education’ to the ‘Oregon Univer-**
26 **sity System.’**

27 “(2) **For the purpose of harmonizing and clarifying statute sections published in Oregon**
28 **Revised Statutes, the Legislative Counsel may substitute for words designating the ‘Depart-**
29 **ment of Higher Education,’ wherever they occur in Oregon Revised Statutes, other words**
30 **designating the ‘Oregon University System.’**

31 “**SECTION 3.** (1) **The Oregon University System Fund is established in the State Treas-**
32 **ury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Any interest or other income derived from**
33 **moneys in the fund is credited to the fund.**

34 “(2) **Except for moneys received from the General Fund or otherwise designated by**
35 **statute or federal law, all moneys received by the State Board of Higher Education or the**

1 Oregon University System shall be paid into the State Treasury and credited to the Oregon
2 University System fund. All moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to the State
3 Board of Higher Education for purposes authorized by law.

4 “(3) The moneys in the Oregon University System Fund may be invested as provided in
5 ORS 293.701 to 293.820.

6 “(4) The board may establish accounts and subaccounts within the Oregon University
7 System Fund when the board determines that accounts or subaccounts are necessary or
8 desirable. Except when otherwise specified by a statute establishing an account, the board
9 may credit any interest or income derived from moneys in the fund to any account or sub-
10 account within the fund.

11 “(5) The board shall keep a record of all moneys deposited into the fund. The record shall
12 indicate by separate cumulative accounts and subaccounts the sources from which the
13 moneys are derived and the individual activity or program against which each withdrawal is
14 charged.

15 “**SECTION 4.** (1) The Oregon University System Appropriations Fund is established in the
16 State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund.

17 “(2) Except for moneys otherwise designated by statute, all moneys received from the
18 General Fund and appropriated to the State Board of Higher Education or the Oregon Uni-
19 versity System shall be paid into the State Treasury and credited to the Oregon University
20 System Appropriations Fund.

21 “(3) The board may establish accounts and subaccounts within the Oregon University
22 System Appropriations Fund when the board determines that accounts or subaccounts are
23 necessary or desirable.

24 “(4) The board shall keep a record of all moneys deposited into the fund. The record shall
25 indicate by separate cumulative accounts and subaccounts the sources from which the
26 moneys are derived and the individual activity or program against which each withdrawal is
27 charged.

28 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 348.010 is amended to read:

29 “348.010. (1) *[The Department of Higher Education shall maintain with the State Treasurer a fund*
30 *separate and distinct from the General Fund known as the Higher Education Student Loan Fund,*
31 *which shall consist of:] An account in the Oregon University System Fund established under*
32 *section 3 of this 2009 Act is designated for the purpose of granting student loans under the*
33 *terms established by the National Defense Education Act of 1958, as amended, under the*
34 *terms of the Health Professions Educational Assistance Act of 1963, as amended, and under*
35 *the terms of the Nurses Training Act of 1964, as amended.*

36 “(2) The account designated under this section consists of:

37 “(a) All moneys made available to the State Board of Higher Education for student loan pur-
38 poses by state appropriations and by the federal government under terms of the National Defense
39 Education Act of 1958, **as amended**, *[and amendments thereto, and]* under **the** terms of the Health
40 Professions Educational Assistance Act of 1963, **as amended**, and **under the terms of** the Nurses
41 Training Act of 1964, **as amended** *[and amendments thereto];*

42 “(b) Repayments of loans identified in paragraph (a) of this subsection;

43 “(c) Interest earned on student loans identified in paragraph (a) of this subsection; and

44 “(d) Earnings from investments of the *[Higher Education Student Loan Fund]* **account.**

45 “[2) All moneys in the Higher Education Student Loan Fund are continuously appropriated to the

1 Department of Higher Education for the purpose of granting student loans under the terms established
2 by the National Defense Education Act of 1958 and amendments thereto, under terms of the Health
3 Professions Educational Assistance Act of 1963 and the Nurses Training Act of 1964 and amendments
4 thereto.]

5 “(3) The repayment in whole or part of any student loan made under terms of the National De-
6 fense Education Act of 1958, **as amended**, [and amendments thereto,] under **the** terms of the Health
7 Professions Educational Assistance Act of 1963, **as amended**, and **under the terms of** the Nurses
8 Training Act of 1964, **as amended** [and amendments thereto], shall be made pursuant to the pro-
9 visions of the applicable federal statutes and repayment to the [Higher Education Student Loan
10 Fund] **account designated under this section** shall be made in accordance with applicable federal
11 statutes.

12 “[4] Funds in the Higher Education Student Loan Fund not needed for student loans may be in-
13 vested by the State Treasurer as other public funds are invested under ORS 293.701 to 293.820. The
14 State Treasurer shall credit to the Higher Education Student Loan Fund any interest or other income
15 derived from such investment.]

16 “(4) **Income and interest derived from moneys in the account designated by this section**
17 **are credited to the account.**

18 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 351.060 is amended to read:

19 “351.060. The State Board of Higher Education may:

20 “(1) Control and provide for, subject to the conditions of this section, the custody and occupa-
21 tion of the grounds, buildings, books, papers and documents belonging to each and all the insti-
22 tutions, departments or activities under the control of the State Board of Higher Education.

23 “(2) Manage, control and apply all property of whatever nature given to or appropriated for the
24 use, support or benefit of any or all of the institutions, departments or activities under the control
25 of the State Board of Higher Education, according to the terms and conditions of such gift or ap-
26 propriation. Moneys received under this section shall be deposited [with the State Treasurer in an
27 account or fund separate and distinct from the General Fund] **in a designated account in the**
28 **Oregon University System Fund established by section 3 of this 2009 Act.** Interest earned by
29 the account [or fund] shall be credited to the account [or fund].

30 “(3) Erect, improve, repair, maintain, equip and furnish buildings, structures and lands for higher
31 education.

32 “(4) Acquire, receive, hold, control, convey, sell, manage, operate, lease, lend, [invest,] improve
33 and develop any and all property, real or personal:

34 “(a) Given to any of the institutions, departments or activities under the control of the State
35 Board of Higher Education by private donors, whether such gifts are made to the State Board of
36 Higher Education or to the State of Oregon; or

37 “(b) Acquired by any other method or from any source by the State Board of Higher Education
38 for the benefit of any of the institutions, departments or activities under the control of the board,
39 except for any structure, equipment or asset encumbered by a certificate of participation.

40 “(5) Manage mineral and geothermal resource rights and proceeds therefrom acquired or held
41 for the state by the board pursuant to this chapter and ORS chapter 567. This includes leasing
42 mineral and geothermal resource rights consistent with ORS 273.785.

43 “(6) Take and hold mortgages on real and personal property acquired by way of gift or arising
44 out of transactions entered into in accordance with the powers, duties and authority given to the
45 board by this section, ORS 351.070 and 351.150.

1 “(7) Institute, maintain and participate in suits and actions and other judicial proceedings, in the
2 name of the State of Oregon, for the foreclosure of such mortgages or for the purpose of carrying
3 into effect any and all of the powers, duties and authority given to the State Board of Higher Edu-
4 cation by this section and ORS 351.070 and 351.150.

5 “(8) Acquire, receive, hold, control, sell, manage, operate, lease or lend any goods, supplies,
6 materials, equipment, services and information technology, for the use, support or benefit of any of
7 the institutions, departments or activities under the control of the board.

8 “(9) Delegate any of the powers, duties or functions granted to the board under this section to
9 any state institution of higher education within the Oregon University System.

10 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 351.170 is amended to read:

11 “351.170. (1) The State Board of Higher Education shall establish such rates, charges and fees
12 for use of buildings, structures or projects referred to in ORS 351.160 (1), including revenue-
13 producing buildings and structures already constructed, as, in the judgment of the board, will pro-
14 vide the required revenues to make the particular new building, project or structure self-liquidating
15 and self-supporting, and as will provide the funds with which to amortize the principal of and pay
16 the interest on the bonds issued to finance such buildings, structures or projects.

17 “(2) The board shall charge and collect from each regular student a building fee at a rate not
18 to exceed \$45 for each regular term, for not less than three terms in each regular academic year,
19 and not to exceed \$67.50 if instruction is on a semester basis, or an equivalent rate of charge when
20 instruction is on a different basis. The board is authorized to maintain adequate [*sinking funds*]
21 **accounts** for bonds outstanding. The fee shall be in addition to tuition and other fees charged to
22 students and shall be deposited [*with the State Treasurer and credited to the appropriate subfund of*
23 *the Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund*] **in the appropriate subaccount of the account main-**
24 **tained in the Oregon University System Fund under ORS 351.460.**

25 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 351.210 is amended to read:

26 “351.210. (1) The State Board of Higher Education may sell or otherwise dispose of any worn
27 out, obsolete or otherwise unsuitable equipment, goods, supplies, material or information technology,
28 the disposal of which would in the board’s judgment be to the financial benefit of the institutions
29 under the board’s control. This section does not apply to any equipment, goods, supplies, material
30 or information technology encumbered by a certificate of participation.

31 “(2) The board may delegate any of its duties, functions or powers granted to the board under
32 this section to the Chancellor of the Oregon University System or any state institution of higher
33 education within the Oregon University System.

34 “(3) The proceeds from any sales or disposals made pursuant to authority granted in this section
35 shall be deposited in [*the State Treasury to the credit of the Department of Higher Education*] **a des-**
36 **ignated account in the Oregon University System Fund established by section 3 of this 2009**
37 **Act** and may be expended by the board for any purpose authorized by law in the same manner as
38 the board is authorized to make other expenditures. [*Any moneys deposited in the State Treasury*
39 *under this section are continuously appropriated to the department.*]

40 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 351.250 is amended to read:

41 “351.250. Moneys received by the board as a result of ownership or management of property
42 acquired under ORS 351.220 to 351.250 or of transactions regarding such property shall be credited
43 to [*a special fund in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund, to be designated*
44 *‘Higher Education Invention Fund’*] **a designated account in the Oregon University System Fund**
45 **established by section 3 of this 2009 Act** and shall only be applied by the State Board of Higher

1 Education to payment of the agreed share, if any, to assignors, and for the advancement of research
2 or for the acquisition and development of intellectual property, or both. Interest earned by the
3 *[fund]* **account** shall be credited to the *[fund]* **account**.

4 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 351.450 is amended to read:

5 “351.450. (1) The moneys realized from sales of bonds issued to construct, improve, repair, equip
6 and furnish buildings and other structures for higher education, and to purchase and improve sites
7 therefor, shall be credited to [*a special fund in the State Treasury separate and distinct from the*
8 *General Fund, to be designated the Higher Education Bond Building Fund*] **a designated account**
9 **in the Oregon University System Fund established by section 3 of this 2009 Act.**

10 “[*2*] *In the Higher Education Bond Building Fund there shall be:*]

11 “**(2) The account designated by this section shall have:**

12 “(a) A separate [*subfund*] **subaccount** for the credit of moneys realized from sales of bonds is-
13 sued pursuant to Article XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution and ORS 351.350;

14 “(b) A separate [*subfund*] **subaccount** for the credit of moneys realized from sales of bonds is-
15 sued pursuant to Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution and ORS 351.345; and

16 “(c) A separate [*subfund*] **subaccount** for the credit of moneys realized from the sales of revenue
17 bonds issued pursuant to ORS chapter 286A.

18 “(3) The moneys received from the issuance of temporary bonds under ORS 351.470 for the pur-
19 pose of interim financing pending the sale of the bonds shall also be credited to the appropriate
20 [*subfund of the Higher Education Bond Building Fund*] **subaccount of the account designated by**
21 **this section.**

22 “(4) The moneys in the [*fund are continuously appropriated to defray*] **account designated by**
23 **this section shall be used for the purpose of defraying** the costs of the projects to be financed
24 through sale of the bonds and for the purpose of retiring temporary bonds issued under ORS 351.470
25 and [*shall*] **may** not be used for any other purpose[, *except that such moneys may, with the approval*
26 *of the State Treasurer, be invested until needed*] **unless designated for investment by the**
27 **Chancellor of the Oregon University System.** If a surplus remains after application to [*such pur-*
28 *pose*] **the purposes described in this subsection**, the surplus[,] and earnings from temporary
29 investments[,] shall be credited to [*the Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund by the appropriate*
30 *subfund*] **the account maintained in the Oregon University System Fund under ORS 351.460.**

31 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 351.455 is amended to read:

32 “351.455. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, the [*Department of Higher Education*]
33 **Oregon University System** may expend moneys from the [*Higher Education Bond Building Fund*
34 *subfund established*] **account in the Oregon University System Fund designated** by ORS
35 351.450, including moneys realized from the sale of bonds issued pursuant to Article XI-F(1) of the
36 Oregon Constitution and ORS 351.350, and from the sale of revenue bonds authorized by ORS
37 351.315, for the planning, constructing, altering, repairing, furnishing and equipping of buildings and
38 facilities of the kind and character prescribed by Article XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution and for
39 the acquisition of land.

40 “**SECTION 12.** ORS 351.460 is amended to read:

41 “351.460. (1) The State Board of Higher Education shall maintain [*with the State Treasurer a*
42 *Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund, separate and distinct from the General Fund. The Higher Ed-*
43 *ucation Bond Sinking Fund shall comprise*] **an account within the Oregon University System**
44 **Fund established by section 3 of this 2009 Act** [*four separate subfunds*] to provide for the payment
45 of the principal of and the interest upon:

1 “(a) The bonds issued under authority of Article XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution and ORS
2 351.350[, and];

3 “(b) **The bonds issued** under authority of Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution and ORS
4 351.345[.];

5 “(c) Revenue bonds authorized by ORS 351.315[, and]; **and**

6 “(d) Amounts due under financial agreements entered into under ORS 351.356. [*The moneys in*
7 *the sinking fund are continuously appropriated to the board for such purposes. The fund may be in-*
8 *vested by the State Treasurer, and the earnings from such investments shall be credited to the appro-*
9 *priate subfunds of the fund.*]

10 “(2) **The account maintained under this section comprises four subaccounts for each of**
11 **the purposes of the account identified in subsection (1) of this section.**

12 “(3) **Income and interest derived from moneys in the subaccounts of the account main-**
13 **tained under this section are credited to the appropriate subaccount.**

14 “[(2)] (4) [*The Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund shall consist of*] **The sources of moneys**
15 **for the account maintained under this section are:**

16 “(a) All moneys received from ad valorem taxes levied pursuant to ORS 291.445[.];

17 “(b) All moneys that the Legislative Assembly may provide in lieu of such taxes[.];

18 “(c) All of the net revenues received from the projects or undertakings for the financing of
19 which the bonds were issued, including gifts, grants and building fees[, *such*];

20 “(d) Unpledged revenues of buildings and projects of like character [*as shall be*] **that are** allo-
21 cated by the board[.];

22 “(e) All moneys received as accrued interest upon bonds sold[.];

23 “(f) All earnings from investments of the [*fund,*] **account;**

24 “(g) All proceeds of the sale of refunding bonds; and

25 “(h) All moneys that the State of Oregon has agreed to hold in the [*Higher Education Bond*
26 *Sinking Fund*] **account** to pay amounts due under financial agreements entered into under ORS
27 351.356. [*Moneys credited to the Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund shall be credited to the ap-*
28 *propriate subfunds of the fund.*]

29 “[(3)] (5) The board may credit the [*Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund*] **account maintained**
30 **under this section** with moneys received from either a sale or interfund transfer of land, buildings
31 and facilities. When the land, buildings or facilities are sold[.] or the use [*thereof is*] **of the land,**
32 **buildings or facilities are** rededicated so that a transfer from one [*subfund*] **subaccount** to [*the*
33 *other*] **another subaccount** is appropriate, the moneys received shall be credited to the appropriate
34 [*subfund*] **subaccount.**

35 “[(4)] (6) The board shall apply student building fees, revenues, gifts and grants for the payment
36 of the principal of and the interest upon the bonds issued under authority of Article XI-F(1) of the
37 Oregon Constitution and upon revenue bonds authorized by ORS 351.315 until such time as the
38 proper [*subfund of the sinking fund*] **subaccount** and investments [*thereof*] **of the subaccount,** as
39 supplemented by expected future income will, in the judgment of the board, be sufficient to meet in
40 full the principal of and the interest upon all such outstanding bonds. Except for student building
41 fees, income not [*thus*] required for the [*sinking fund*] **account as described in this subsection**
42 shall be transferred to [*such other fund and account as the board shall designate*] **other accounts**
43 **and subaccounts within the Oregon University System Fund that are designated by the**
44 **board.** Student building fees for buildings constructed from the proceeds of bonds issued under Ar-
45 ticle XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution or ORS 351.315 shall be applied only to those bonds au-

1 thorized under Article XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution or ORS 351.315.

2 “[*(5) The board may create a subfund in the Higher Education Bond Sinking Fund to pay amounts*
3 *due under financial agreements entered into under ORS 351.356 and may credit to that subfund any*
4 *moneys that the State of Oregon is obligated to use to pay those amounts due.*]

5 “[*(6)(a)*] **(7)(a)** The board may not use the [*sinking fund*] **account maintained under this sec-**
6 **tion** for any purpose other than the purposes for which the [*fund*] **account** was created.

7 “(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the board may transfer any surplus in the
8 [*sinking fund*] **account** to other [*funds designated by the board*] **accounts in the Oregon University**
9 **System Fund** if a balance remains in the [*sinking fund*] **account** from sources other than student
10 building fees for buildings constructed from the proceeds of bonds issued under Article XI-F(1) of the
11 Oregon Constitution and:

12 “(A) The purposes for which the [*fund*] **account** was created have been fulfilled; or

13 “(B) A reserve sufficient to meet all existing and future obligations and liabilities of the [*fund*]
14 **account** has been set aside.

15 “**SECTION 13.** ORS 351.470 is amended to read:

16 “351.470. Pending receipt of the proceeds from the expected sale of bonds authorized by this
17 chapter, to the State of Oregon or to the United States Government or any agency thereof, the State
18 Board of Higher Education may, with the approval of the State Treasurer, procure interim financing
19 from the State of Oregon, the United States Government or any agency thereof, or from any private
20 lending agency, by issuing to such private or public lending agency temporary bonds, without ad-
21 vertisement of such bonds for sale, in order to finance temporarily building projects authorized by
22 the board pursuant to Article XI-F(1) or Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution or ORS 351.160, if
23 the bond issue to be temporarily financed by the issuance of temporary bonds has been authorized
24 by the State Board of Higher Education and a purchase plan has been formulated with and is being
25 considered by the State of Oregon or the United States Government or any agency thereof. The
26 proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be deposited in the [*Higher Education Bond Building Fund*
27 *and credited to the appropriate subfund of such fund*] **account in the Oregon University System**
28 **Fund designated by ORS 351.450**, and shall be used to retire the temporary bonds issued under this
29 section. The principal amount of temporary bonds issued under this section may not exceed the
30 principal amount of the bond issue for which a purchase plan has been formulated. The temporary
31 bonds may be extended, renewed or refunded but maturity dates may not be later than two years
32 from the date of issue of the original temporary bonds for the related building project.

33 “**SECTION 14.** ORS 351.545 is amended to read:

34 “351.545. (1) [*The State Board of Higher Education shall maintain with the State Treasurer, a*
35 *Higher Education Isolation Facility Bond Sinking Fund, separate and distinct from the General Fund.*
36 *The Higher Education Isolation Facility Bond Sinking Fund shall*] **An account in the Oregon**
37 **University System Fund established by section 3 of this 2009 Act is designated to** provide for
38 the payment of principal and interest of bonds issued under the authority of Article XI-F(1) of the
39 Oregon Constitution and ORS 351.350 in an amount equal to the amount authorized for expenditure
40 by section 3 (2)(b), chapter 709, Oregon Laws 1971, and expended as provided therein. [*The sinking*
41 *fund may be invested by the State Treasurer, and the earnings from such investments shall be credited*
42 *to the sinking fund.*] **Income and interest derived from moneys in the account are credited to**
43 **the account.**

44 “(2) [*The Higher Education Isolation Facility Bond Sinking Fund shall consist*] **The account**
45 **designated by this section consists** of moneys received as net revenues from the isolation facilities

1 for which the expenditure of funds is authorized by section 3 (2)(b), chapter 709, Oregon Laws 1971,
2 including gifts, grants and building fees, moneys received as accrued interest on bonds sold, earnings
3 from investments on the [*sinking fund*] **account**, the proceeds of the sale of refunding bonds and any
4 accrued interest on such refunding bonds, moneys appropriated to the [*sinking fund*] **account** by the
5 Legislative Assembly and moneys received for the purposes of the [*sinking fund*] **account** from all
6 other sources. [*All moneys in the sinking fund are continuously appropriated to the board for the*]
7 **Moneys in the account may be used only for the** purposes provided in subsection (1) of this
8 section.

9 “(3) [*The sinking fund shall not be used for any purpose other than that for which the fund was*
10 *created; but should a balance remain therein*] **If the account designated by this section has a**
11 **balance** after the purpose for which the [*fund*] **account** was created has been fulfilled, or the
12 [*sinking fund*] **account** and **the** investments [*thereof*] **of the account**, will, in the judgment of the
13 board, be sufficient to meet in full the principal of and the interest upon all Higher Education Iso-
14 lation Facility bonds, then [*such excess funds*] **any excess moneys** may be transferred by the board
15 to [*funds*] **an account** to be used for research related to veterinary medicine.

16 “**SECTION 15.** ORS 351.590 is amended to read:

17 “351.590. (1) [*The State Board of Higher Education shall maintain with the State Treasurer a fund,*
18 *separate and distinct from the General Fund, known as the Higher Education Student Activities Fund*
19 *in which shall be deposited*] **An account in the Oregon University System Fund established by**
20 **section 3 of this 2009 Act is designated for the purpose of receiving** all revenue from incidental

11 bation officers who are transferred to county employment under ORS 423.549 and adult parole and
12 probation officers, as defined in ORS 181.610, who are classified as police officers for the purposes
13 of this chapter by the county governing body. If a county classifies adult parole and probation offi-
14 cers as police officers for the purposes of this chapter, and the employees so classified are repres-
15 ented by a labor organization, any proposal by the county to change that classification or to cease
16 to classify adult parole and probation officers as police officers for the purposes of this chapter is
17 a mandatory subject of bargaining.

18 “(g) Police officers appointed under ORS 276.021 or 276.023.

19 “(h) Employees of the Port of Portland who are classified as airport police by the Board of
20 Commissioners of the Port of Portland.

21 “(i) Employees of the State Department of Agriculture who are classified as livestock police of-
22 ficers by the Director of Agriculture.

23 “(j) Employees of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training who are classified by
24 the department as other than secretarial or clerical personnel.

25 “(k) Investigators of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice.

26 “(L) Corrections officers as defined in ORS 181.610.

27 “(m) Employees of the Oregon State Lottery Commission who are classified by the Director of
28 the Oregon State Lottery as enforcement agents pursuant to ORS 461.110.

29 “(n) The Director of the Department of Corrections.

30 “(o) An employee who for seven consecutive years has been classified as a police officer as de-
31 fined by this section, and who is employed or transferred by the Department of Corrections to fill
32 a position designated by the Director of the Department of Corrections as being eligible for police
33 officer status.

34 “(p) An employee of the Department of Corrections classified as a police officer on or prior to
35 July 27, 1989, whether or not that classification was authorized by law, as long as the employee
36 remains in the position held on July 27, 1989. The initial classification of an employee under a sys-

38 “(q) Employees of a school district who are appointed and duly sworn members of a law
39 enforcement agency of the district as provided in ORS 332.531 or otherwise employed full-time as
40 police officers commissioned by the district.

41 “(r) Employees at youth correction facilities and juvenile detention facilities under ORS
42 419A.050, 419A.052 and 420.005 to 420.915 who are required to hold valid Oregon teaching licenses
43 and who have supervisory, control or teaching responsibilities over juveniles committed to the cus-
44 tody of the Department of Corrections or the Oregon Youth Authority.

45 “(s) Employees at youth correction facilities as defined in ORS 420.005 whose primary job de-

1 description involves the custody, control, treatment, investigation or supervision of juveniles placed
2 in such facilities.

3 “(t) Employees of the Oregon Youth Authority who are classified as juvenile parole and pro-
4 bation officers.

5 “(17) ‘Public employer’ means the state, one of its agencies, any city, county, or municipal or
6 public corporation, any political subdivision of the state or any instrumentality thereof, or an agency
7 created by one or more such governmental organizations to provide governmental services. For
8 purposes of this chapter, such agency created by one or more governmental organizations is a gov-
9 ernmental instrumentality and a legal entity with power to enter into contracts, hold property and
10 sue and be sued.

11 “(18) ‘Prior service credit’ means credit provided under ORS 238.442 or under ORS 238.225 (2)
12 to (6) (1999 Edition).

13 “(19) ‘Qualifying position’ means one or more jobs with one or more participating public em-
14 ployers in which an employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year, excluding
15 any service in a job for which a participating public employer does not provide benefits under this
16 chapter pursuant to an application made under ORS 238.035.

17 “(20) ‘Retirement credit’ means a period of time that is treated as creditable service for the
18 purposes of this chapter.

19 “(21)(a) ‘Salary’ means the remuneration paid an employee in cash out of the funds of a public
20 employer in return for services to the employer, plus the monetary value, as determined by the
21 Public Employees Retirement Board, of whatever living quarters, board, lodging, fuel, laundry and
22 other advantages the employer furnishes the employee in return for services.

23 “(b) ‘Salary’ includes but is not limited to:

24 “(A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan, which are
25 deemed salary paid in each month of deferral;

26 “(B) The amount of participation in a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity, which is deemed salary
27 paid in each month of participation;

28 “(C) Retroactive payments made to an employee to correct a clerical error or pursuant to an
29 award by a court or by order of or a conciliation agreement with an administration agency charged
30 with enforcing federal or state law protecting the employee’s rights to employment or wages, which
31 shall be allocated to and deemed paid in the periods in which the work was done or in which it
32 would have been done; and

33 “(D) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS

35 “(c) ‘Salary’ or ‘other advantages’ does not include:

36 “(A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer’s business which is reimbursed by the
37 employer;

38 “(B) Payments for insurance coverage by an employer on behalf of employee or employee and
39 dependents, for which the employee has no cash option;

40 “(C) Payments made on account of an employee’s death;

41 “(D) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave;

42 “(E) Any accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period or an advance
43 against future wages;

44 “(F) Any retirement incentive, retirement severance pay, retirement bonus or retirement
45 gratuitous payment;

1 “(G) Payments for periods of leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have
2 agreed that no future services qualifying pursuant to ORS 238.015 (3) will be performed, except for
3 sick leave and vacation;

4 “(H) Payments for instructional services rendered to institutions of the [*Department of Higher*
5 *Education*] **Oregon University System** or the Oregon Health and Science University when such
6 services are in excess of full-time employment subject to this chapter. A person employed under a
7 contract for less than 12 months is subject to this subparagraph only for the months to which the
8 contract pertains; or

9 “(I) Payments made by an employer for insurance coverage provided to a domestic partner of
10 an employee.

11 “(22) ‘School year’ means the period beginning July 1 and ending June 30 next following.

12 “(23) ‘System’ means the Public Employees Retirement System.

13 “(24) ‘Vested’ means being an active member of the system in each of five calendar years.

14 “(25) ‘Volunteer firefighter’ means a firefighter whose position normally requires less than 600
15 hours of service per year.

16 “**SECTION 48.** ORS 238A.005 is amended to read:

17 “238A.005. For the purposes of this chapter:

18 “(1) ‘Active member’ means a member of the pension program or the individual account program
19 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan who is actively employed in a qualifying position.

20 “(2) ‘Actuarial equivalent’ means a payment or series of payments having the same value as the
21 payment or series of payments replaced, computed on the basis of interest rate and mortality as-
22 sumptions adopted by the board.

23 “(3) ‘Board’ means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

36 “(h) Employees of the Oregon University System who are actively participating in an optional
37 retirement plan offered under ORS 243.800;

38 “(i) Any employee who belongs to a class of employees that was not eligible on August 28, 2003,
39 for membership in the system under the provisions of ORS chapter 238 or other law;

40 “(j) Any person who belongs to a class of employees who are not eligible to become members
41 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan under the provisions of ORS 238A.070 (2);

42 “(k) Any person who is retired under ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245 or ORS chapter 238 and who
43 continues to receive retirement benefits while employed; and

44 “(L) Judges.

45 “(5) ‘Firefighter’ means:

1 “(a) A person employed by a local government, as defined in ORS 174.116, whose primary job
2 duties include the fighting of fires;

3 “(b) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy state fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals;

5 “(c) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a
6 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled

8 “(6) ‘Fund’ means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

9 “(7)(a) ‘Hour of service’ means:

10 “(A) An hour for which an eligible employee is directly or indirectly paid or entitled to payment
11 by a participating public employer for performance of duties in a qualifying position; and

12 “(B) An hour of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or authorized
13 leave during which an employee does not perform duties but for which the employee is directly or
14 indirectly paid or entitled to payment by a participating public employer for services in a qualifying
15 position, as long as the hour is within the number of hours regularly scheduled for the performance
16 of duties during the period of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or au-

33 “(13) ‘Police officer’ means a police officer as described in ORS 238.005.

35 ployers in which an eligible employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year,
36 excluding any service in a job for which benefits are not provided under the Oregon Public Service
37 Retirement Plan pursuant to ORS 238A.070 (2).

38 “(15) ‘Retired member’ means a pension program member who is receiving a pension as provided
39 in ORS 238A.180 to 238A.195.

40 “(16)(a) ‘Salary’ means the remuneration paid to an active member in return for services to the
41 participating public employer, including remuneration in the form of living quarters, board or other
42 items of value, to the extent the remuneration is includable in the employee’s taxable income under
43 Oregon law. Salary includes the additional amounts specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection,
44 but does not include the amounts specified in paragraph (c) of this subsection, regardless of whether
45 those amounts are includable in taxable income.

1 “(b) ‘Salary’ includes the following amounts:

2 “(A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan that are

3 made at the election of the employee.

4 “(B) Contributions to a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity that are made at the election of the

6 “(C) Any amount that is contributed to a cafeteria plan or qualified transportation fringe benefit

7 plan by the employer at the election of the employee and that is not includable in the taxable in-

8 come of the employee by reason of 26 U.S.C. 125 or 132(f)(4), as in effect on August 29, 2003.

9 “(D) Any amount that is contributed to a cash or deferred arrangement by the employer at the

10 election of the employee and that is not included in the taxable income of the employee by reason

11 of 26 U.S.C. 402(e)(3), as in effect on August 29, 2003.

12 “(E) Retroactive payments made to an employee to correct a clerical error, pursuant to an

13 award by a court or by order of or pursuant to a conciliation agreement with an administration

22 “(H) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS

23 652.190.

24 “(c) ‘Salary’ does not include the following amounts:

25 “(A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer’s business which is reimbursed by the

26 employer.

27 “(B) Payments made on account of an employee’s death.

28 “(C) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave, vacation leave or other paid

29 leave.

30 “(D) Any severance payment, accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period

31 or advance against future wages.

32 “(E) Any retirement incentive, retirement bonus or retirement gratuitous payment.

33 “(F) Payment for a leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have agreed that

34 no future services in a qualifying position will be performed.

44 determined is less than 12 months, the \$200,000 limitation for that period shall be multiplied by a

45 fraction, the numerator of which is the number of months in the determination period and the de-

31 “**SECTION 51.** ORS 270.110 is amended to read:

32 “270.110. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, whenever the state or any
33 agency thereof possesses or controls real property not needed for public use, or whenever the public
34 interest may be furthered, the state or its agency may sell, exchange, convey or lease for any period
35 not exceeding 99 years all or any part of its interest in the property to or with the state or any
36 political subdivision of the state or the United States or any agency thereof or private individual
37 or corporation. Except where the state is exchanging real property, the consideration for the
38 transfer or lease may be cash or real property, or both.

39 “(2) If the ownership, right or title of the state to any real property set apart by deed, will or
40 otherwise for a burial ground or cemetery, or for the purpose of interring the remains of deceased
41 persons, is limited or qualified or the use of such real property is restricted, whether by dedication
42 or otherwise, the state or its agency may, after first declaring by resolution that such real property
43 is not needed for public use, or that the sale, exchange, conveyance or lease thereof will further the
44 public interest, file a complaint in the circuit court for the county in which such real property is
45 located against all persons claiming any right, title or interest in such real property, whether the

1 interest be contingent, conditional or otherwise, for authority to sell, exchange, convey or lease all

6 property, a statement of the nature of the restrictions, qualifications or limitations, and a statement

8 deem proper, taking into consideration the limitations, qualifications or restrictions, the resolution
9 and all other matters pertinent thereto. Neither costs nor disbursements may be recovered against
10 any defendant.

41 promulgated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board of the Financial Accounting Foun-
42 dation that are in effect on August 10, 2001; and

43 “(b) Post-secondary educational activities that are partially funded by student tuition and fees.
