SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Allows substituted service of investigative demands in connection with certain actions to be accomplished in manner provided for service of summons in action or suit.

Relating to service of investigative demands; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 124.125

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 124.125 is amended to read:

6 124.125. (1) The Attorney General, the Department of Human Services or [any] **a** district attor-7 ney may bring an action against [any] **a** person [who] **that** engages in conduct described in ORS 8 124.105 and 124.110. In addition to remedies otherwise provided in ORS 124.100 to 124.140, upon 9 prevailing in the action, the court shall award to the Attorney General, Department of Human Ser-10 vices or district attorney costs of investigation and penalties. Penalties awarded under this section 11 may not exceed \$25,000 per occurrence.

12 (2) The Attorney General may intervene in [any] **a** civil action brought under ORS 124.100 if the 13 Attorney General certifies that, in the opinion of the Attorney General, the action is of general 14 public importance. In the action, the state [shall be] is entitled to the same relief as if the Attorney 15 General instituted the action under the provisions of this section.

(3) When it appears that a person is engaging in conduct described in ORS 124.105 or 124.110, the Attorney General or [any] **a** district attorney may execute in writing and cause to be served an investigative demand upon [any] **a** person who is believed to have information, documentary material or physical evidence relevant to the alleged or suspected violation. The investigative demand shall require the person, under oath or otherwise, to appear and testify, to answer written interrogatories or to produce relevant documentary material or physical evidence for examination, at a reasonable time and place as stated in the investigative demand.

(4) At any time before the return date specified in an investigative demand, or within 20 days
after the demand has been served, whichever period is shorter, a petition to extend the return date,
or to modify or set aside the demand, stating good cause, including a request for privileged material,
may be filed in the appropriate court.

(5) Service of an investigative demand under subsection (3) of this section shall be made personally within this state. If personal service within this state cannot be made, substituted service
may be made by any of the following methods:

30 (a) Personal service of the investigative demand outside [of] this state;

31 (b) Mailing the investigative demand by registered or certified mail to the last-known place of

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business, residence or abode within or outside [of] this state of the person for whom [service] the 1 2 investigative demand is intended; (c) [As to any person other than a natural person,] In the manner provided for service of summons 3 4 in an action or suit; or $\mathbf{5}$ (d) [Such service as the court may direct.] Service in accordance with the direction of a court. (6) If [any] a person after being served with an investigative demand under subsection (3) of this 6 section fails or refuses to obey an investigative demand issued by the Attorney General or a district 7 attorney, the Attorney General or district attorney may, after notice to an appropriate court and 8 9 after a hearing, request an order: 10 (a) Granting injunctive relief to restrain the person from engaging in conduct that is involved in the alleged or suspected violation; or 11 12(b) Granting other relief as may be required, until the person obeys the investigative demand. 13 (7) [Any] Disobedience of [any] **a** final order of a court under subsection (6) of this section shall be punished as a contempt of court. 14 15(8) ORS 192.550 to 192.595 apply to the disclosure of financial records by a financial institution pursuant to the service of an investigative demand under subsection (3) of this section. 16 SECTION 2.
