

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 2287

By COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, delete “repealing ORS 5.110” and insert “creating new provisions;  
2 amending ORS 1.202, 1.204, 2.565, 18.235, 21.010, 21.110, 21.114, 21.270, 21.275, 21.310, 21.325, 46.570,  
3 105.130, 125.060, 131.897, 135.265, 135.921, 137.225, 137.293, 137.295, 137.540, 305.490, 419A.262 and  
4 813.240; appropriating money; and providing for revenue raising that requires approval by a three-  
5 fifths majority”.

6 Delete line 4 and insert:

### “COLLECTION ACCOUNT FEES

7  
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9  
10 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 1.202 is amended to read:

11 “1.202. (1) All circuit courts and appellate courts of this state, and all commissions, departments  
12 and divisions of the judicial branch of state government, shall add a fee of not less than \$50 and  
13 not more than [~~\$100~~] **\$200** to any judgment that includes a monetary obligation that the court or  
14 judicial branch is charged with collecting. The fee shall be added to cover the cost of establishing  
15 and administering an account for the debtor and shall be added without further notice to the debtor  
16 or further order of the court. The fee shall be added only if the court gives the defendant a period  
17 of time in which to pay the obligation after the financial obligation is imposed. Fees under this  
18 subsection shall be deposited in the [*General Fund*] **Judicial Department Collections Account**  
19 **established under ORS 1.204 and may be used only for the purposes specified in ORS 1.204.**

20 “(2) All circuit courts and appellate courts of this state, and all commissions, departments and  
21 divisions of the judicial branch of state government, [*that use the Department of Revenue or private*  
22 *collection agencies*] shall add a fee to any [*judgment referred for collection that includes a monetary*  
23 *obligation*] **monetary obligation** that the state court or the commission, department or division is  
24 charged with collecting, **that has been reduced to judgment and that remains unpaid 60 days**  
25 **after the judgment has been entered.** The fee shall be added to cover the costs of collection  
26 [*charged by the Department of Revenue or private collection agency*] and shall be added to the mone-  
27 tary obligation without further notice to the debtor or further order of the court. The **amount of**  
28 **the fee shall be established by order of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, but** may not  
29 exceed the [*actual costs of collection charged by the Department of Revenue or private collection*  
30 *agency*] **Department of Revenue’s average cost of collection for all judgments, as determined**  
31 **by the Department of Revenue on July 1 of every odd-numbered year.** Fees under this sub-  
32 section shall be deposited in the Judicial Department Collections Account established under ORS  
33 1.204 and may be used only for the purposes specified in ORS 1.204.

34 “(3) [*A court may not waive or suspend*] **The Chief Justice may adopt policies governing the**  
35 **waiver or suspension of** the fees required to be added to judgments under the provisions of this

1 section.

2 **“SECTION 1a. (1) The amendments to ORS 1.202 (1) by section 1 of this 2009 Act provid-**  
3 **ing that fees collected under ORS 1.202 (1) be deposited in the Judicial Department Col-**  
4 **lections Account apply to all such fees collected on or after January 1, 2010, without regard**  
5 **to the date of entry of the judgment for which the fee is imposed.**

6 **“(2) The amendments to ORS 1.202 (2) by section 1 of this 2009 Act apply only to judg-**  
7 **ments entered on or after January 1, 2010.**

8 **“SECTION 2.** ORS 1.204 is amended to read:

9 “1.204. (1) The State Court Administrator may establish a collections and revenue management  
10 program within the Judicial Department for the purpose of administering accounts and collections.  
11 Subject to policies and procedures prescribed by the State Court Administrator, the collections and  
12 revenue management program may collect, by any means authorized by law, all amounts owing to  
13 the state that are subject to collection by the state courts or by a commission, department or divi-  
14 sion in the judicial branch of state government. The State Court Administrator may establish a  
15 separate unit within the program for the collection of parking fines in counties with populations of  
16 more than 500,000.

17 “(2) There is established within the General Fund the Judicial Department Collections Account.  
18 The account shall consist of moneys deposited in the account under the provisions of subsection (3)  
19 of this section **and ORS 1.202**. All moneys in the **Judicial Department Collections** Account are  
20 continuously appropriated to the Judicial Department and may be used only for the purposes speci-  
21 fied in subsection (3) of this section **and ORS 1.202**.

22 “(3) All moneys collected by the collections and revenue management program established under  
23 this section shall be deposited in the Judicial Department Collections Account. At the end of each  
24 calendar month, the State Court Administrator shall distribute the amounts in the account in the  
25 following order of priority:

26 “(a) Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, the collections and revenue manage-  
27 ment program shall be reimbursed for actual costs and expenses of the program, including personnel  
28 expenses, incurred in the administration and collection of accounts. The amount of reimbursement  
29 may not exceed the actual costs and expenses incurred by the collections and revenue management  
30 program. The State Court Administrator may designate a single percentage amount to be retained  
31 from all moneys collected under the program, but must adjust that percentage amount periodically  
32 to reflect actual program costs.

33 “(b) All moneys not expended under paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be distributed as  
34 otherwise provided by law for the amounts collected.

35 “(4) The collections and revenue management program may not be reimbursed under subsection  
36 (3) of this section from any of the following amounts collected under the program, and all such  
37 amounts collected under the program shall be distributed as otherwise provided by law:

38 “(a) Restitution and compensatory fines paid under judgments in criminal actions;

39 “(b) Legal aid fees collected under ORS 21.480;

40 “(c) Law library fees collected under ORS 21.350;

41 “(d) Dispute resolution surcharges imposed under ORS 36.170; and

42 “(e) Fees imposed under ORS 21.112.

43 **“(5) If at the end of any biennium the Judicial Department determines that the moneys**  
44 **available in the Judicial Department Collections Account exceed the amount necessary to**  
45 **fund the collections and revenue management program for a period of six months, the de-**

1 **partment shall transfer all moneys in excess of that amount in the General Fund.**

3 **“APPELLATE MEDIATION FEES**

4  
5 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 2.565 is amended to read:

6 “2.565. The Appellate Mediation Program Revolving Account is established within the General  
7 Fund. The Judicial Department shall pay into the State Treasury [~~\$40~~] **\$85** of each filing fee paid  
8 by petitioners under the provisions of ORS 21.010, and [~~\$24~~] **\$85** of each filing fee paid by respond-  
9 ents under the provisions of ORS 21.010. The State Treasurer shall deposit the moneys in the Gen-  
10 eral Fund to the credit of the Appellate Mediation Program Revolving Account. The moneys in the  
11 account are appropriated continuously to the Judicial Department, and may be used only for the  
12 purpose of administering the appellate mediation program established under the provisions of ORS  
13 2.560, including payment of administrative costs and costs of providing mediation services to indi-  
14 gent parties.

15 **“SECTION 3a. The amendments to ORS 2.565 by section 3 of this 2009 Act apply only to**  
16 **filings under ORS 21.010 made on or after January 1, 2010.**

17  
18 **“FILING FEES**

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20 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 21.010 is amended to read:

21 “21.010. (1) Except as provided in subsection [(2)] **(3)** of this section, the appellant in an appeal  
22 or the petitioner in a judicial review in the Supreme Court or the Court of Appeals shall pay [*a*  
23 *filing fee of \$154 in the manner prescribed by ORS 19.265*] **\$239 as the filing fee for a single**  
24 **party.** The respondent in such case and any other person appearing in the appeal, upon entering  
25 first appearance or filing first brief in the court, shall pay to the State Court Administrator [*the sum*  
26 *of \$154*] **\$239 as the filing fee for a single party.** The party entitled to costs and disbursements  
27 on such appeal shall recover from the opponent the amount so paid.

28 **“(2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, the appellant in an appeal or the**  
29 **petitioner in a judicial review in the Supreme Court or the Court of Appeals shall pay \$239**  
30 **for each additional person named as an appellant or petitioner. The respondent in such case,**  
31 **and any other person appearing in the appeal, shall pay \$239 to the State Court Administra-**  
32 **tor for each additional person named as a respondent. The party entitled to costs and dis-**  
33 **bursements on such appeal shall recover from the opponent the amount so paid. Fees**  
34 **collected under this subsection shall be deposited by the clerk of the court in the State Ju-**  
35 **dicial Stabilization Fund.**

36 “[~~(2)~~] **(3)** Filing and appearance fees may not be assessed in appeals from habeas corpus pro-  
37 ceedings under ORS 34.710, post-conviction relief proceedings under ORS 138.650, juvenile court  
38 under ORS 419A.200 and the involuntary commitment of persons determined to be mentally ill under  
39 ORS 426.135 or persons determined to be mentally retarded under ORS 427.295, or on judicial review  
40 of orders of the Psychiatric Security Review Board under ORS 161.385 (9) or orders of the State  
41 Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision.

42 “[~~(3)~~] **(4)** Filing and appearance fees shall be assessed in an appeal from an appeal to a circuit  
43 court from a justice court or municipal court in an action alleging commission of a state offense  
44 designated as a violation or an action alleging violation of a city charter or ordinance, but not in  
45 an action alleging commission of a state crime.

1 “[(4)] (5) Filing and appearance fees shall only be assessed in an appeal in a contempt proceed-  
2 ing seeking imposition of remedial sanctions under the provisions of ORS 33.055.

3 **“SECTION 4a. The amendments to ORS 21.010 by section 4 of this 2009 Act apply only to**  
4 **filings and appearances under ORS 21.010 made on or after January 1, 2010.**

5 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 21.110 is amended to read:

6 “21.110. (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, at the time of filing in the circuit  
7 court of any civil action, suit or proceeding, including appeals, the clerk of the circuit court shall  
8 collect from the plaintiff, appellant or moving party the sum of [§107] **\$117** as [a] **the** flat and uni-  
9 form filing fee **for a single party**. In addition, at the time of filing any appearance in any such  
10 action, suit or proceeding by any defendant or respondent appearing separately, or upon the part  
11 of defendants or respondents appearing jointly, the clerk shall collect from the party or parties the  
12 sum of [§107] **\$117** as [a] **the** flat and uniform filing fee **for a single party**.

13 **“(b) Except as otherwise provided in this section, at the time of filing any civil action,**  
14 **suit or proceeding, including appeals, in the circuit court the clerk of the circuit court shall**  
15 **collect from the plaintiff, appellant or moving party the sum of \$117 for each additional party**  
16 **named in the pleading. In addition, at the time of filing any appearance in such action, suit**  
17 **or proceeding by a defendant or respondent appearing separately, or upon the part of de-**  
18 **fendants or respondents appearing jointly, the clerk shall collect from the party or parties**  
19 **the sum of \$117 for each additional party named in the pleading. Fees collected under this**  
20 **paragraph shall be deposited by the clerk of the court in the State Judicial Stabilization**  
21 **Fund.**

22 “(2) In the following actions, the clerk of the circuit court shall collect the sum of \$68 as a flat  
23 and uniform filing fee from the plaintiff, appellant or moving party at the time the action is filed,  
24 and shall collect the sum of \$68 as a flat and uniform filing fee from any defendant or respondent  
25 appearing separately, or upon the part of defendants or respondents appearing jointly, at the time  
26 of filing any appearance in the action:

27 “(a) Actions for the recovery of money or damages only when the amount claimed does not ex-  
28 ceed \$10,000.

29 “(b) Actions for the recovery of specific personal property when the value of the property  
30 claimed and the damages for the detention do not exceed \$10,000.

31 “(c) Actions for the recovery of any penalty or forfeiture, whether given by statute or arising  
32 out of contract, not exceeding \$10,000.

33 “(d) Actions to enforce, marshal and foreclose liens upon personal property where the amount  
34 claimed for such liens does not exceed \$10,000.

35 “(e) Actions of interpleader, and in the nature of interpleader, when the amount of money or the  
36 value of the property involved does not exceed \$10,000.

37 “(f) Actions for injunctive relief under ORS chapter 90 when the amount of any damages claimed  
38 does not exceed \$10,000.

39 “(3) The clerk of the court shall collect the sum of \$300 as a flat and uniform filing fee from the  
40 petitioner in a proceeding under ORS 181.823 or 181.826, at the time the petition is filed. Fees  
41 collected under this subsection shall be deposited into the Judicial Department Operating Account  
42 established in ORS 1.009.

43 “(4) For purposes of subsection (2) of this section, the amount claimed, value of property, dam-  
44 ages or any amount in controversy does not include any amount claimed as costs and disbursements  
45 or attorney fees as defined by ORCP 68 A.

1 “(5) A pleading or other document shall be filed by the clerk only if the fee required under this  
2 section is paid by the person filing the document, or if a request for a fee waiver or deferral is  
3 granted by the court. No part of any such filing fee shall be refunded to any party. The uniform fee  
4 shall cover all services to be performed by the court or clerk in any such action, suit or proceeding,  
5 except where additional fees are specially authorized by law.

6 “(6) Any plaintiff, appellant, moving party, defendant or respondent that files an action or ap-  
7 pearance that is subject to the filing fees established under subsection (2) of this section must in-  
8 clude in the caption of the pleading the following words: ‘Claim of not more than \$10,000.’

9 “(7) The fees imposed by this section do not apply to:

10 “(a) Protective proceedings under ORS chapter 125;

11 “(b) Proceedings for dissolution of marriage, annulment of marriage or separation;

12 “(c) Filiation proceedings under ORS 109.124 to 109.230;

13 “(d) Proceedings to determine custody or support of a child under ORS 109.103;

14 “(e) Probate, adoption or change of name proceedings;

15 “(f) Proceedings involving dwelling units to which ORS chapter 90 applies and for which the fee  
16 is provided by ORS 105.130; or

17 “(g) Any counterclaim, cross-claim or third-party claim filed by a party who has appeared in the  
18 action or proceeding.

19 “(8) The fees described in this section shall not be charged to a district attorney or to the Di-  
20 vision of Child Support of the Department of Justice for the filing of any case, motion, document,  
21 stipulated order, process or other document relating to the provision of support enforcement ser-  
22 vices as described in ORS 25.080.

23 “(9) **The fees in this section do not apply to applications filed under ORS 137.225 or**  
24 **419A.262.**

25 “**SECTION 5a. The amendments to ORS 21.110 by section 5 of this 2009 Act apply only to**  
26 **filings and appearances under ORS 21.110 (1) made on or after January 1, 2010.**

27  
28 **“HEARING FEES**

29  
30 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 21.270 is amended to read:

31 “21.270. (1) In any civil action, suit or proceeding in the circuit court, [*other than a protective*  
32 *proceeding under ORS chapter 125 or a probate, adoption or change of name proceeding,*] trial fees  
33 shall be collected as provided in this section.

34 “(2) The clerk of the circuit court shall collect from the plaintiff, appellant or moving party, for  
35 a trial on the merits without a jury, a trial fee of [\$77] **\$150** for each full or partial day of the trial.  
36 The amount of the fee for the first day of trial shall be collected in advance and is due and payable  
37 when the action, suit or proceeding is set for trial. The amount of the fee for subsequent days of  
38 trial shall be collected on the day the trial concludes.

39 “(3)(a) The clerk shall collect from the plaintiff or appellant, for a trial by a jury of more than  
40 six persons, a jury trial fee of [\$193] **\$250** for each full or partial day of the trial. The clerk shall  
41 collect from the plaintiff or appellant, for a trial by a jury of six persons, a jury trial fee of [\$110]  
42 **\$175** for each full or partial day of the trial. The amount of the fee for the first day of trial shall  
43 be collected in advance and is due and payable when the action, suit or proceeding is set for trial  
44 by jury. The amount of the fee for subsequent days of trial shall be collected on the day the trial  
45 concludes.

1 “(b) If the plaintiff or appellant waives a trial by jury, and the defendant or respondent desires  
2 a trial by jury, the clerk shall collect the jury trial fee from the defendant or respondent, and not  
3 from the plaintiff or appellant.

4 “(c) A case in which the jury trial fee for the first day of trial has not been paid shall be tried  
5 by the court without a jury, unless the court otherwise orders. If a case in which the jury trial fee  
6 for the first day of trial has not been paid is tried by a jury, the clerk shall tax against the losing  
7 party the total amount of the jury trial fee. The jury trial fee constitutes a monetary obligation  
8 payable to the court, and may be made part of the judgment in the case by the clerk without further  
9 notice to the debtor or further order of the court.

10 “(4) If a counterclaim, cross-claim or third party claim is tried on any day other than a day on  
11 which the claim of the plaintiff is tried, the clerk shall collect from the party asserting the  
12 counterclaim, cross-claim or third party claim the trial fee or jury trial fee, whichever is applicable,  
13 for that day, and shall not collect the applicable fee for that day from the plaintiff. If the party as-  
14 serting a counterclaim, cross-claim or third party claim waives a trial by jury on the claim, and the  
15 party defending against the claim desires a trial by jury on the claim, the clerk shall collect the jury  
16 trial fee from the defending party and not from the asserting party.

17 “(5) The fees provided for in this section include any reporting of the trial proceedings, but not  
18 the preparation of transcripts of a report.

19 “(6) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3)(c) of this section, the fees provided for in this  
20 section that are paid by a party shall be considered costs and disbursements and may be taxed and  
21 collected as other costs and disbursements by the prevailing party.

22 “(7) A court shall order that a trial fee paid under the provisions of this section be refunded to  
23 the party that paid the fee if all claims in the action or proceeding are decided without the com-  
24 mencement of a trial and the party that paid the fee files a motion and affidavit requesting refund  
25 of the fee not more than 15 days after entry of judgment disposing of the action or proceeding.

26 **“SECTION 6a. The amendments to ORS 21.270 by section 6 of this 2009 Act apply only to**  
27 **trials conducted on or after January 1, 2010.**

28 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 21.275 is amended to read:

29 “21.275. (1) In any civil action, suit or proceeding in the circuit court, *[other than a protective*  
30 *proceeding under ORS chapter 125 or a probate, adoption or change of name proceeding,]* hearing fees  
31 for reported hearings shall be collected as provided in this section. There is no hearing fee under  
32 this section for a hearing not reported.

33 “(2) As used in this section:

34 “(a) ‘Hearing’ means an actual appearance of one or more parties before the court for an ex-  
35 amination by the court without a jury, other than a trial or during a trial for which a trial fee is  
36 required, of issues of fact or law arising from a motion, application, petition or other document filed  
37 with the court by a moving party, but does not include a conference solely for the purpose of case  
38 settlement or case scheduling.

39 “(b) ‘Moving party’ means a party who files with the court a motion, application, petition or  
40 other document referred to in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

41 “(c) ‘Nonmoving party’ means a party other than a moving party.

42 “(3) The clerk of the circuit court shall collect the hearing fees. The fee for a reported hearing  
43 is ~~[\$33]~~ **\$100** if the hearing period is not more than three hours or ~~[\$77]~~ **\$175** if the hearing period  
44 is more than three hours. The fee does not include the preparation of transcripts of a report.

45 “(4) If a hearing in respect to the document filed by the moving party is required by statute or

1 rule, the document shall indicate whether the moving party requests that the hearing be reported,  
2 and if reporting is requested, shall contain an estimate of the hearing period. If the moving party  
3 requests reporting, the moving party shall pay the applicable hearing fee, based upon the estimate  
4 of the hearing period, when the document is filed. If the moving party does not request reporting  
5 and a nonmoving party files a request for reporting with the court, the request shall contain an  
6 estimate of the hearing period, and the nonmoving party shall pay the applicable hearing fee, based  
7 upon the estimate of the hearing period, when the request is filed.

8 “(5) If a hearing in respect to the document filed by the moving party is not required by statute  
9 or rule, the document shall indicate whether the moving party requests a hearing. The document  
10 also shall indicate whether the moving party requests that the hearing be reported, and if reporting  
11 is requested, shall contain an estimate of the hearing period. If the moving party requests reporting,  
12 the moving party shall pay the applicable hearing fee, based upon the estimate of the hearing period,  
13 when the document is filed. If the moving party does not request reporting and a nonmoving party  
14 files a request for reporting with the court, the request shall contain an estimate of the hearing  
15 period, and the nonmoving party shall pay the applicable hearing fee, based upon the estimate of the  
16 hearing period, when the request is filed.

17 “(6) If a hearing in respect to the document filed by the moving party is not required by statute  
18 or rule or requested by the moving party and a nonmoving party files a request for hearing with the  
19 court, the request also shall indicate whether the nonmoving party requests that the hearing be  
20 reported, and if reporting is requested, shall contain an estimate of the hearing period. If the non-  
21 moving party requests reporting the nonmoving party shall pay the applicable hearing fee, based  
22 upon the estimate of the hearing period, when the request is filed. If the nonmoving party does not  
23 request reporting and the moving party files a request for reporting with the court, the request shall  
24 contain an estimate of the hearing period, and the moving party shall pay the applicable hearing fee,  
25 based upon the estimate of the hearing period, when the request is filed.

26 “(7) If a hearing in respect to the document filed by the moving party is not required by statute  
27 or rule or requested by a party, but the court on its own motion orders a hearing and a party files  
28 a request that the hearing be reported with the court, the request shall contain an estimate of the  
29 hearing period, and the party shall pay the applicable hearing fee, based upon the estimate of the  
30 hearing period, when the request is filed. If the court on its own motion orders a hearing, no party  
31 requests reporting and the court on its own motion orders that the hearing be reported, the court  
32 order shall contain an estimate of the hearing period, and each party shall pay an equal propor-  
33 tionate share of the applicable hearing fee, based upon the estimate of the hearing period, before the  
34 hearing is held.

35 “(8) No document containing a request for reporting or other request for reporting referred to  
36 in subsections (4) to (7) of this section shall be deemed filed unless the fee required by those sub-  
37 sections of the filing party is paid by the party.

38 “(9) The fees provided for in this section that are paid by a party shall be considered costs and  
39 disbursements and may be taxed and collected as other costs and disbursements by the prevailing  
40 party.

41 **“SECTION 7a. The amendments to ORS 21.275 by section 7 of this 2009 Act apply only to**  
42 **hearings conducted on or after January 1, 2010.**

44 **“NAME CHANGE FEE**  
45





1 “(c) With the assistance of the plaintiff or an agent of the plaintiff, complete the applicable  
2 summons and provide to the plaintiff or an agent of the plaintiff sufficient copies of the summons  
3 and complaint for service.

4 “(3) After a complaint is filed under subsection (2) of this section, if the defendant demands a  
5 trial, the plaintiff shall pay an additional filing fee of \$29 and the defendant shall pay a filing fee  
6 of \$42.

7 “(4) An action pursuant to ORS 105.110 shall be brought in the name of a person entitled to  
8 possession as plaintiff. The plaintiff may appear in person or through an attorney. In an action to  
9 which ORS chapter 90 applies, the plaintiff may also appear through a nonattorney who is an agent  
10 or employee of the plaintiff or an agent or employee of an agent of the plaintiff.

11 “(5) Notwithstanding ORS 9.160, 9.320 and ORS chapter 180, a state agency may appear in an  
12 action brought pursuant to ORS 105.110 through an officer or employee of the agency if:

13 “(a) The Attorney General consents to the representation of the agency by an officer or em-  
14 ployee in the particular action or in the class of actions that includes the particular action; and

15 “(b) The agency, by rule, authorizes an officer or employee to appear on its behalf in the par-  
16 ticular type of action being conducted.

17 “(6) In addition to the fees charged under subsection (2) of this section, the clerk shall collect  
18 a surcharge from the plaintiff at the time a complaint is filed that is subject to the filing fees es-  
19 tablished by subsection (2) of this section and from a defendant at the time a defendant demands a  
20 trial in the action. The surcharge shall be deposited by the State Court Administrator into the State  
21 Treasury to the credit of the Housing and Community Services Department Low Income Rental  
22 Housing Fund established by ORS 458.350. The amount of the surcharge shall be \$10.

23 “(7) A document or pleading shall be filed by the clerk only if the fees and surcharges required  
24 under this section are paid by the person filing the document or pleading or if an application for a  
25 waiver or deferral of fees and court costs is granted by the court under ORS 21.680 to 21.698. Fees  
26 and surcharges provided for in this section may not be refunded.

27 “**SECTION 10a. The amendments to ORS 105.130 by section 10 of this 2009 Act apply only**  
28 **to filings made under ORS 105.130 on or after January 1, 2010.**

29  
30 **“SECURITY RELEASE DEPOSITS**

31  
32 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 135.265 is amended to read:

37 “(2) The defendant shall execute a release agreement and deposit with the clerk of the court  
38 before which the proceeding is pending a sum of money equal to 10 percent of the security amount,  
39 but in no event shall such deposit be less than \$25. The clerk shall issue a receipt for the sum de-  
40 posited. Upon depositing this sum the defendant shall be released from custody subject to the con-  
41 dition that the defendant appear to answer the charge in the court having jurisdiction on a day  
42 certain and thereafter as ordered by the court until discharged or final order of the court. Once  
43 security has been given and a charge is pending or is thereafter filed in or transferred to a court  
44 of competent jurisdiction the latter court shall continue the original security in that court subject  
45 to ORS 135.280 and 135.285. When conditions of the release agreement have been performed and the

1 defendant has been discharged from all obligations in the cause, the clerk of the court shall return  
2 to the person shown by the receipt to have made the deposit, unless the court orders otherwise, 85  
3 percent of the sum which has been deposited and shall retain as security release costs 15 percent,  
4 but not less than \$5 [*nor more than \$200*], of the amount deposited. The interest that has accrued  
5 on the full amount deposited shall also be retained by the clerk. The amount retained by the clerk  
6 of a circuit court shall be paid over as directed by the State Court Administrator for deposit in the  
7 Criminal Fine and Assessment Account created under ORS 137.300. The amount retained by a jus-  
8 tice of the peace shall be deposited in the county treasury. The amount retained by the clerk of a  
9 municipal court shall be deposited in the municipal corporation treasury. At the request of the de-  
10 fendant the court may order whatever amount is repayable to defendant from such security amount  
11 to be paid to defendant's attorney of record.

38 "EXPUNCTION FEES

39  
40 "SECTION 24. ORS 137.225 is amended to read:

41 "137.225. (1)(a) At any time after the lapse of three years from the date of pronouncement of  
42 judgment, any defendant who has fully complied with and performed the sentence of the court and  
43 whose conviction is described in subsection (5) of this section by motion may apply to the court  
44 where the conviction was entered for entry of an order setting aside the conviction; or

45 "(b) At any time after the lapse of one year from the date of any arrest, if no accusatory in-

1 strument was filed, or at any time after an acquittal or a dismissal of the charge, the arrested per-  
2 son may apply to the court that would have jurisdiction over the crime for which the person was  
3 arrested, for entry of an order setting aside the record of the arrest. For the purpose of computing  
4 the one-year period, time during which the arrested person has secreted himself or herself within  
5 or without the state is not included.

6 “(2)(a) A copy of the motion and a full set of the defendant’s fingerprints shall be served upon  
7 the office of the prosecuting attorney who prosecuted the crime or violation, or who had authority  
8 to prosecute the charge if there was no accusatory instrument filed, and opportunity shall be given  
9 to contest the motion. The fingerprint card with the notation ‘motion for setting aside conviction,’  
10 or ‘motion for setting aside arrest record’ as the case may be, shall be forwarded to the Department  
11 of State Police bureau of criminal identification. Information resulting from the fingerprint search  
12 along with the fingerprint card shall be returned to the prosecuting attorney.

13 “(b) When a prosecuting attorney is served with a copy of a motion to set aside a conviction  
14 under this section, the prosecuting attorney shall provide a copy of the motion and notice of the  
15 hearing date to the victim, if any, of the crime by mailing a copy of the motion and notice to the  
16 victim’s last-known address.

17 “(c) **A person making an application under subsection (1) of this section must pay a fee**  
18 **to the court of \$100 at the time the application is filed. Fees collected under this paragraph**  
19 **shall be deposited by the clerk of the court in the State Judicial Stabilization Fund.**

20 “[c] (d) **In addition to the fee required under subsection (1)(c) of this section,** when a  
21 person makes [*a motion*] **an application** under subsection (1)(a) of this section, the person must pay  
22 a fee of \$80. The person shall attach a certified check payable to the Department of State Police in  
23 the amount of \$80 to the fingerprint card that is served upon the prosecuting attorney. The office  
24 of the prosecuting attorney shall forward the check with the fingerprint card to the Department of  
25 State Police bureau of criminal identification.

26 “(3) Upon hearing the motion, the court may require the filing of such affidavits and may require  
27 the taking of such proofs as it deems proper. The court shall allow the victim to make a statement  
28 at the hearing. Except as otherwise provided in subsection (11) of this section, if the court deter-  
29 mines that the circumstances and behavior of the applicant from the date of conviction, or from the  
30 date of arrest as the case may be, to the date of the hearing on the motion warrant setting aside  
31 the conviction, or the arrest record as the case may be, it shall enter an appropriate order that shall  
32 state the original arrest charge and the conviction charge, if any and if different from the original,  
33 date of charge, submitting agency and disposition. The order shall further state that positive iden-  
34 tification has been established by the bureau and further identified as to state bureau number or  
35 submitting agency number. Upon the entry of the order, the applicant for purposes of the law shall  
36 be deemed not to have been previously convicted, or arrested as the case may be, and the court  
37 shall issue an order sealing the record of conviction and other official records in the case, including  
38 the records of arrest whether or not the arrest resulted in a further criminal proceeding.

39 “(4) The clerk of the court shall forward a certified copy of the order to such agencies as di-  
40 rected by the court. A certified copy must be sent to the Department of Corrections when the person  
41 has been in the custody of the Department of Corrections. Upon entry of the order, the conviction,  
42 arrest or other proceeding shall be deemed not to have occurred, and the applicant may answer  
43 accordingly any questions relating to its occurrence.

44 “(5) The provisions of subsection (1)(a) of this section apply to a conviction of:

45 “(a) A Class C felony, except for criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205

1 when it would constitute child abuse, as defined in ORS 419B.005, or any sex crime.

2 “(b) The crime of possession of the narcotic drug marijuana when that crime was punishable as  
3 a felony only.

4 “(c) A crime punishable as either a felony or a misdemeanor, in the discretion of the court, ex-  
5 cept for:

6 “(A) Any sex crime; and

7 “(B) The following crimes when they would constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005:

8 “(i) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205; and

9 “(ii) Endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a).

10 “(d) A misdemeanor, including a violation of a municipal ordinance, for which a jail sentence  
11 may be imposed, except for endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a) when it  
12 would constitute child abuse, as defined in ORS 419B.005, or any sex crime.

13 “(e) A violation, whether under state law or local ordinance.

14 “(f) An offense committed before January 1, 1972, that if committed after that date would be:

15 “(A) A Class C felony, except for any sex crime or for the following crimes when they would  
16 constitute child abuse as defined in ORS 419B.005:

17 “(i) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205; and

18 “(ii) Endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a).

19 “(B) A crime punishable as either a felony or a misdemeanor, in the discretion of the court,  
20 except for any sex crime or for the following crimes when they would constitute child abuse as de-  
21 fined in ORS 419B.005:

22 “(i) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205; and

23 “(ii) Endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a).

24 “(C) A misdemeanor, except for endangering the welfare of a minor under ORS 163.575 (1)(a)  
25 when it would constitute child abuse, as defined in ORS 419B.005, or any sex crime.

26 “(D) A violation.

27 “(6) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, the provisions of subsection (1) of this section  
28 do not apply to:

29 “(a) A person convicted of, or arrested for, a state or municipal traffic offense.

30 “(b) A person convicted, within the 10-year period immediately preceding the filing of the motion  
31 pursuant to subsection (1) of this section, of any other offense, excluding motor vehicle violations,  
32 whether or not the other conviction is for conduct associated with the same criminal episode that  
33 caused the arrest or conviction that is sought to be set aside. Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this  
34 section, a conviction that has been set aside under this section shall be considered for the purpose  
35 of determining whether this paragraph is applicable.

36 “(c) A person who at the time the motion authorized by subsection (1) of this section is pending  
37 before the court is under charge of commission of any crime.

38 “(7) The provisions of subsection (1)(b) of this section do not apply to a person arrested within  
39 the three-year period immediately preceding the filing of the motion for any offense, excluding motor  
40 vehicle violations, and excluding arrests for conduct associated with the same criminal episode that  
41 caused the arrest that is sought to be set aside.

42 “(8) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to convictions and arrests that oc-  
43 curred before, as well as those that occurred after, September 9, 1971. There is no time limit for  
44 making an application.

45 “(9) For purposes of any civil action in which truth is an element of a claim for relief or affir-

1 mative defense, the provisions of subsection (3) of this section providing that the conviction, arrest  
2 or other proceeding be deemed not to have occurred do not apply and a party may apply to the  
3 court for an order requiring disclosure of the official records in the case as may be necessary in the  
4 interest of justice.

5 “(10) Upon motion of any prosecutor or defendant in a case involving records sealed under this  
6 section, supported by affidavit showing good cause, the court with jurisdiction may order the reo-  
7 pening and disclosure of any records sealed under this section for the limited purpose of assisting  
8 the investigation of the movant. However, such an order has no other effect on the orders setting  
9 aside the conviction or the arrest record.

10 “(11) Unless the court makes written findings by clear and convincing evidence that granting  
11 the motion would not be in the best interests of justice, the court shall grant the motion and enter  
12 an order as provided in subsection (3) of this section if the defendant has been convicted of one of  
13 the following crimes and is otherwise eligible for relief under this section:

14 “(a) Abandonment of a child, ORS 163.535.

15 “(b) Attempted assault in the second degree, ORS 163.175.

16 “(c) Assault in the third degree, ORS 163.165.

17 “(d) Coercion, ORS 163.275.

18 “(e) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree, ORS 163.205.

19 “(f) Attempted escape in the first degree, ORS 162.165.

20 “(g) Incest, ORS 163.525, if the victim was at least 18 years of age.

21 “(h) Intimidation in the first degree, ORS 166.165.

22 “(i) Attempted kidnapping in the second degree, ORS 163.225.

23 “(j) Criminally negligent homicide, ORS 163.145.

24 “(k) Attempted robbery in the second degree, ORS 164.405.

25 “(L) Robbery in the third degree, ORS 164.395.

26 “(m) Supplying contraband, ORS 162.185.

27 “(n) Unlawful use of a weapon, ORS 166.220.

28 “(12) As used in this section, ‘sex crime’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 181.594.

29 “**SECTION 24a. The amendments to ORS 137.225 by section 24 of this 2009 Act apply only**  
30 **to applications made under ORS 137.225 (1) on or after January 1, 2010.**

31 “**SECTION 25.** ORS 419A.262 is amended to read:

32 “419A.262. (1) An expunction proceeding shall be commenced **by filing an application** in the  
33 county where the subject person resided at the time of the most recent termination. **A fee of \$100**  
34 **must be paid to the court when the application is filed. Fees collected under this subsection**  
35 **shall be deposited by the clerk of the court in the State Judicial Stabilization Fund.**

36 “(2) Upon application of either a person who is the subject of a record or a juvenile department,  
37 or upon its own motion, the juvenile court shall order expunction if, after a hearing when the matter  
38 is contested, it finds that:

39 “(a) At least five years have elapsed since the date of the person’s most recent termination;

40 “(b) Since the date of the most recent termination, the person has not been convicted of a felony  
41 or a Class A misdemeanor;

42 “(c) No proceedings seeking a criminal conviction or an adjudication in a juvenile court are  
43 pending against the person;

44 “(d) The person is not within the jurisdiction of any juvenile court on the basis of a petition  
45 alleging an act or behavior as defined in ORS 419B.100 (1)(a) to (c) and (f) or 419C.005; and

1       “(e) The juvenile department is not aware of any pending investigation of the conduct of the  
2 person by any law enforcement agency.

3       “(3) In the case of an application by the juvenile department or of the court acting upon its own  
4 motion, expunction shall not be ordered if actual notice of expunction has not been given to the  
5 person in accordance with subsection (10) of this section unless the person has reached 21 years of  
6 age.

7       “(4) When a person who is the subject of a record kept by a juvenile court or juvenile depart-  
8 ment reaches 18 years of age, the juvenile court, after a hearing when the matter is contested, shall  
9 order expunction if:

10       “(a) The person never has been found to be within the jurisdiction of the court; or

11       “(b) The conditions of subsection (2) of this section have been met.

12       “(5) Expunction shall not be ordered under this section if actual notice of expunction has not  
13 been given to the person in accordance with subsection (10) of this section unless the person has  
14 reached 21 years of age.

15       “(6) Subsections (4) and (5) of this section apply only to cases resulting in termination after  
16 September 13, 1975.

17       “(7) Notwithstanding subsections (2) and (4) to (6) of this section, upon application of a person  
18 who is the subject of a record kept by a juvenile court or juvenile department, upon application of  
19 the juvenile department, or upon its own motion, the juvenile court, after a hearing when the matter  
20 is contested, may order expunction of all or any part of the person’s record if it finds that to do so  
21 would be in the best interests of the person and the public. In the case of an application by the ju-  
22 venile department or of the court acting upon its own motion, expunction shall not be ordered if  
23 actual notice of expunction has not been given to the person in accordance with subsection (10) of  
24 this section unless the person has reached 21 years of age.

25       “(8) When an expunction proceeding is commenced by application of the person whose records  
26 are to be expunged, the person shall set forth as part of the application the names of the juvenile  
27 courts, juvenile departments, institutions and law enforcement and other agencies that the person  
28 has reason to believe possess an expungible record of the person. The juvenile department shall  
29 provide the names and addresses of the juvenile courts, juvenile departments, institutions and law  
30 enforcement and other agencies that a reasonable search of department files indicates have  
31 expungible records.

32       “(9) When an expunction proceeding is commenced by application of the juvenile department or  
33 upon the court’s own motion, the application or motion shall set forth the names and addresses of  
34 the juvenile courts, juvenile departments, institutions and law enforcement and other agencies that  
35 a reasonable search of department files indicates have expungible records and those provided by the  
36 subject person.

37       “(10)(a) Notice and a copy of an application for expunction under subsections (2) to (7) of this  
38 section shall be given to:

39       “(A) The district attorney of the county in which the expunction proceeding is commenced and  
40 the district attorney of each county in which the record sought to be expunged is kept; and

41       “(B) The person who is the subject of the record if the person has not initiated the expunction  
42 proceeding.

43       “(b) A district attorney who receives notice under this subsection shall notify the victim of the  
44 acts that resulted in the disposition that is the subject of the application for expunction and shall  
45 mail a copy of the application for expunction to the victim’s last known address.

1           “(11) Within 30 days of receiving the notice of application for expunction under subsection (10)  
2 of this section, a district attorney shall give written notice of any objection and the grounds therefor  
3 to the person whose records are to be expunged and to the juvenile court. If no objection is filed  
4 the court may decide the issue of expunction either without a hearing or after full hearing pursuant  
5 to subsections (12) to (15) of this section.

6           “(12) When an expunction is pending pursuant to subsections (2) to (7) of this section, the court  
7 may proceed with or without a hearing, except that:

8           “(a) The court may not enter an expunction judgment without a hearing if a timely objection to  
9 expunction has been filed pursuant to subsection (11) of this section; and

10           “(b) The court may not deny an expunction without a hearing if the proceeding is based on an  
11 application of the subject.

12           “(13)(a) Notice of a hearing on a pending expunction shall be served on the subject and any  
13 district attorney filing a timely objection pursuant to subsection (11) of this section.

14           “(b) When a district attorney receives notice of a hearing for expunction of a record concerning  
15 a youth or youth offender proceeding under ORS chapter 419C, if the victim of the acts that resulted  
16 in the disposition that is the subject of the application for expunction requests, the district attorney  
17 shall mail notice of the hearing to the victim’s last-known address.

18           “(14) The court shall conduct a hearing on a pending expunction in accord with the provisions  
19 of ORS 419B.195, 419B.198, 419B.201, 419B.205, 419B.208, 419B.310, 419B.812 to 419B.839 and  
20 419B.908. Rules of evidence shall be as in a hearing to establish juvenile court jurisdiction and as  
21 defined in ORS 419B.310 (3) and 419C.400 (2). The burden of proof shall be with the party contesting  
22 expunction.

23           “(15) At the conclusion of a hearing on a pending expunction, the court shall issue judgment  
24 granting or denying expunction.

25           “(16) The juvenile court or juvenile department shall send a copy of an expunction judgment to  
26 each agency subject to the judgment. Upon receipt of a copy of the judgment, the agency shall  
27 comply and, within 21 days of the date of receipt, return the copy to the juvenile court or juvenile  
28 department with an indorsement indicating compliance.

29           “(17) When all agencies subject to an expunction judgment have indicated their compliance or  
30 in any event no later than six weeks following the date the judgment was delivered as required by  
31 subsection (16) of this section, the juvenile court shall provide the person who is the subject of the  
32 record with a copy of the expunction judgment, a list of complying and noncomplying agencies, and  
33 a written notice of rights and effects of expunction. The juvenile court and juvenile department then  
34 shall expunge forthwith all records which they possess and which are subject to the judgment, ex-  
35 cept the original expunction judgment and the list of complying and noncomplying agencies which  
36 must be preserved under seal.

37           “(18) In addition to those agencies identified in ORS 419A.260 (1)(d), the juvenile, circuit, mu-  
38 nicipal and justice courts, and the district and city attorneys of this state, are bound by an  
39 expunction judgment of any juvenile court of appropriate jurisdiction in this state issuing an  
40 expunction judgment.

41           “(19) Upon entry of an expunction judgment, the contact that is the subject of the expunged  
42 record shall not be disclosed by any agency. An agency that is subject to an expunction judgment  
43 shall respond to any inquiry about the contact by indicating that no record or reference concerning  
44 the contact exists.

45           “(20) A person who is the subject of a record that has been expunged under this section may

1 assert that the record never existed and that the contact, which was the subject of the record, never  
2 occurred without incurring a penalty for perjury or false swearing under the laws of this state.

3 “(21) Juvenile courts, by court rule or by order related to a particular matter, may direct that  
4 records concerning a subject person be destroyed. No such records shall be destroyed until at least  
5 three years have elapsed after the date of the subject’s most recent termination. In the event the  
6 record has been expunged, the expunction judgment and list of complying and noncomplying agen-  
7 cies may not be destroyed, but shall be preserved under seal. The destruction of records under this  
8 subsection does not constitute expunction.

9 “(22) An expunction judgment and list of complying and noncomplying agencies shall be released  
10 from confidentiality only on order of the court originating the expunction judgment, based on a  
11 finding that review of a particular case furthers compliance with the expunction provisions of this  
12 chapter.

13 “(23) A subject has a right of action against any person who intentionally violates the  
14 confidentiality provisions of this section. In any such proceeding, punitive damages up to an amount  
15 of \$1,000 may be sought in addition to any actual damages. The prevailing party shall be entitled  
16 to costs and reasonable attorney fees.

17 “(24) Intentional violation of the confidentiality provisions of this section by a public employee  
18 is cause for dismissal.

19 “(25) A person who intentionally releases all or part of an expunged record commits a Class C  
20 misdemeanor.

21 “**SECTION 25a. The amendments to ORS 419A.262 by section 25 of this 2009 Act apply**  
22 **only to applications made under ORS 419A.262 (1) on or after January 1, 2010.**

23  
24 **“BENCH PROBATION FEES AND PROBATION**  
25 **VIOLATION ASSESSMENTS**  
26

27 “**SECTION 26.** ORS 137.540 is amended to read:

28 “137.540. (1) The court may sentence the defendant to probation subject to the following general  
29 conditions unless specifically deleted by the court. The probationer shall:

30 “(a) Pay supervision fees, fines, restitution or other fees ordered by the court.

31 “(b) Not use or possess controlled substances except pursuant to a medical prescription.

32 “(c) Submit to testing of breath or urine for controlled substance or alcohol use if the  
33 probationer has a history of substance abuse or if there is a reasonable suspicion that the  
34 probationer has illegally used controlled substances.

35 “(d) Participate in a substance abuse evaluation as directed by the supervising officer and follow  
36 the recommendations of the evaluator if there are reasonable grounds to believe there is a history  
37 of substance abuse.

38 “(e) Remain in the State of Oregon until written permission to leave is granted by the Depart-  
39 ment of Corrections or a county community corrections agency.

40 “(f) If physically able, find and maintain gainful full-time employment, approved schooling, or a  
41 full-time combination of both. Any waiver of this requirement must be based on a finding by the  
42 court stating the reasons for the waiver.

43 “(g) Change neither employment nor residence without prior permission from the Department  
44 of Corrections or a county community corrections agency.

45 “(h) Permit the parole and probation officer to visit the probationer or the probationer’s work



1 site or residence and to conduct a walk-through of the common areas and of the rooms in the resi-  
2 dence occupied by or under the control of the probationer.

3 “(i) Consent to the search of person, vehicle or premises upon the request of a representative  
4 of the supervising officer if the supervising officer has reasonable grounds to believe that evidence  
5 of a violation will be found, and submit to fingerprinting or photographing, or both, when requested  
6 by the Department of Corrections or a county community corrections agency for supervision pur-  
7 poses.

8 “(j) Obey all laws, municipal, county, state and federal.

9 “(k) Promptly and truthfully answer all reasonable inquiries by the Department of Corrections  
10 or a county community corrections agency.

11 “(L) Not possess weapons, firearms or dangerous animals.

12 “(m) If recommended by the supervising officer, successfully complete a sex offender treatment  
13 program approved by the supervising officer and submit to polygraph examinations at the direction  
14 of the supervising officer if the probationer:

15 “(A) Is under supervision for a sex offense under ORS 163.305 to 163.467;

16 “(B) Was previously convicted of a sex offense under ORS 163.305 to 163.467; or

17 “(C) Was previously convicted in another jurisdiction of an offense that would constitute a sex  
18 offense under ORS 163.305 to 163.467 if committed in this state.

19 “(n) Participate in a mental health evaluation as directed by the supervising officer and follow  
20 the recommendation of the evaluator.

21 “(o) Report as required and abide by the direction of the supervising officer.

22 “(p) If required to report as a sex offender under ORS 181.596, report with the Department of  
23 State Police, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency:

24 “(A) When supervision begins;

25 “(B) Within 10 days of a change in residence;

26 “(C) Once each year within 10 days of the probationer’s date of birth;

27 “(D) Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or attends an  
28 institution of higher education; and

29 “(E) Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution of  
30 higher education.

31 “(2) In addition to the general conditions, the court may impose any special conditions of pro-  
32 bation that are reasonably related to the crime of conviction or the needs of the probationer for the  
33 protection of the public or reformation of the probationer, or both, including, but not limited to, that  
34 the probationer shall:

35 “(a) For crimes committed prior to November 1, 1989, and misdemeanors committed on or after  
36 November 1, 1989, be confined to the county jail or be restricted to the probationer’s own residence  
37 or to the premises thereof, or be subject to any combination of such confinement and restriction,  
38 such confinement or restriction or combination thereof to be for a period not to exceed one year  
39 or one-half of the maximum period of confinement that could be imposed for the offense for which  
40 the defendant is convicted, whichever is the lesser.

41 “(b) For felonies committed on or after November 1, 1989, be confined in the county jail, or be  
42 subject to other custodial sanctions under community supervision, or both, as provided by rules of  
43 the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

44 “(c) For crimes committed on or after December 5, 1996, sell any assets of the probationer as  
45 specifically ordered by the court in order to pay restitution.

1 “(3) When a person who is a sex offender is released on probation, the court shall impose as a  
2 special condition of probation that the person not reside in any dwelling in which another sex  
3 offender who is on probation, parole or post-prison supervision resides, without the approval of the  
4 person’s supervising parole and probation officer, or in which more than one other sex offender who  
5 is on probation, parole or post-prison supervision resides, without the approval of the director of the  
6 probation agency that is supervising the person or of the county manager of the Department of  
7 Corrections, or a designee of the director or manager. As soon as practicable, the supervising parole  
8 and probation officer of a person subject to the requirements of this subsection shall review the  
9 person’s living arrangement with the person’s sex offender treatment provider to ensure that the  
10 arrangement supports the goals of offender rehabilitation and community safety. As used in this  
11 subsection:

12 “(a) ‘Dwelling’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 469.160.

13 “(b) ‘Dwelling’ does not include a residential treatment facility or a halfway house.

14 “(c) ‘Halfway house’ means a publicly or privately operated profit or nonprofit residential facil-  
15 ity that provides rehabilitative care and treatment for sex offenders.

16 “(d) ‘Sex offender’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 181.594.

17 “(4)(a) If the person is released on probation following conviction of a sex crime, as defined in  
18 ORS 181.594, or an assault, as defined in ORS 163.175 or 163.185, and the victim was under 18 years  
19 of age, the court, if requested by the victim, shall include as a special condition of the person’s  
20 probation that the person not reside within three miles of the victim unless:

21 “(A) The victim resides in a county having a population of less than 130,000 and the person is  
22 required to reside in that county;

23 “(B) The person demonstrates to the court by a preponderance of the evidence that no mental  
24 intimidation or pressure was brought to bear during the commission of the crime;

25 “(C) The person demonstrates to the court by a preponderance of the evidence that imposition  
26 of the condition will deprive the person of a residence that would be materially significant in aiding  
27 in the rehabilitation of the person or in the success of the probation; or

28 “(D) The person resides in a halfway house. As used in this subparagraph, ‘halfway house’ means  
29 a publicly or privately operated profit or nonprofit residential facility that provides rehabilitative  
30 care and treatment for sex offenders.

31 “(b) A victim may request imposition of the special condition of probation described in this  
32 subsection at the time of sentencing in person or through the prosecuting attorney.

33 “(c) If the court imposes the special condition of probation described in this subsection and if  
34 at any time during the period of probation the victim moves to within three miles of the  
35 probationer’s residence, the court may not require the probationer to change the probationer’s resi-  
36 dence in order to comply with the special condition of probation.

37 “(5) When a person who is a sex offender, as defined in ORS 181.594, is released on probation,  
38 the Department of Corrections or the county community corrections agency, whichever is appropri-  
39 ate, shall notify the chief of police, if the person is going to reside within a city, and the county  
40 sheriff of the county in which the person is going to reside of the person’s release and the conditions  
41 of the person’s release.

42 “(6) Failure to abide by all general and special conditions imposed by the court and supervised  
43 by the Department of Corrections or a county community corrections agency may result in arrest,  
44 modification of conditions, revocation of probation or imposition of structured, intermediate sanc-  
45 tions in accordance with rules adopted under ORS 137.595.

1       “(7) The court may order that probation be supervised by the court. If the court orders  
2 that probation be supervised by the court, the defendant shall pay a fee of \$100 to the court.  
3 Fees collected under this subsection shall be deposited by the clerk of the court in the State  
4 Judicial Stabilization Fund.

5       “[(7)] (8) The court may at any time modify the conditions of probation.

6       “[(8)] (9) A court may not order revocation of probation as a result of the probationer’s failure  
7 to pay restitution unless the court determines from the totality of the circumstances that the pur-  
8 poses of the probation are not being served.

9       “[(9)] (10) It is not a cause for revocation of probation that the probationer failed to apply for  
10 or accept employment at any workplace where there is a labor dispute in progress. As used in this  
11 subsection, ‘labor dispute’ has the meaning for that term provided in ORS 662.010.

12       “(11) If the court determines that a defendant has violated the terms of probation, the  
13 court shall impose a \$50 assessment against the defendant. The assessment becomes part of  
14 the judgment and may be collected in the same manner as a fine.

15       “[(10)] (12) As used in this section, ‘attends,’ ‘institution of higher education,’ ‘works’ and ‘car-  
16 ries on a vocation’ have the meanings given those terms in ORS 181.594.

17       “**SECTION 26a.** The amendments to ORS 137.540 by section 26 of this 2009 Act apply only  
18 to orders of probation and probation violation determinations made on or after January 1,  
19 2010.

21                                   “STATE COURT AUTOMATION ASSESSMENT;  
22                                   STATE COURT TECHNOLOGY ACCOUNT

24       “**SECTION 27.** (1) The State Court Technology Account is established, separate and dis-  
25 tinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the State Court Technology Account shall  
26 be credited to the account. The account shall consist of amounts deposited in the account  
27 under:

28       “(a) Section 28 of this 2009 Act; and

29       “(b) ORS 137.295 (5).

30       “(2) All amounts in the State Court Technology Account are continuously appropriated  
31 to the Judicial Department for the purpose of paying expenses related to acquisition, devel-  
32 opment, support and maintenance of the Judicial Department’s technology systems, equip-  
33 ment and services, including payment of debt service on certificates of participation issued  
34 for technology projects of the department.

35       “(3) The department may accept gifts, grants or contributions from any source, whether  
36 public or private, for deposit in the State Court Technology Account.

37       “**SECTION 28.** (1) In addition to any other fees and assessments provided by law, the  
38 clerk of the court shall collect a \$10 state court automation assessment at the time any fee  
39 is paid in a civil proceeding under ORS 21.110, 21.111, 21.114 or 21.310 or in an appeal or pe-  
40 tition for review under ORS 21.010.

41       “(2) Fees collected under this section shall be deposited by the clerk of the court in the  
42 State Court Technology Account.

43       “**SECTION 28a.** Section 28 of this 2009 Act applies only to filings made on or after Janu-  
44 ary 1, 2010, in civil proceedings and appeals described in section 28 of this 2009 Act.

45       “**SECTION 29.** In all cases of conviction for the commission of a crime or violation, ex-

1 **cluding parking violations, a circuit court shall impose upon the defendant a state court au-**  
2 **tomation assessment in addition to any other monetary obligation imposed. Except when a**  
3 **defendant successfully asserts the defense set forth in ORS 419C.522, the assessment shall**  
4 **also be imposed by the circuit court in juvenile cases under ORS chapter 419C. The assess-**  
5 **ment is a penal obligation in the nature of a fine.**

6 **“SECTION 29a. Section 29 of this 2009 Act applies only to judgments of conviction entered**  
7 **on or after January 1, 2010.**

8 **“SECTION 30.** ORS 137.295 is amended to read:

9 “137.295. (1) When a defendant convicted of a crime or violation in the circuit, justice or mu-  
10 nicipal court, or allowed diversion in such a case, makes a payment of money to be credited against  
11 monetary obligations imposed as a result of that conviction or diversion, the clerk shall distribute  
12 the payment as provided in this section.

13 “(2) There are [*four*] **five** categories of monetary obligations. The categories are as follows:

14 “(a) Category 1 consists of compensatory fines under ORS 137.101.

15 “(b) Category 2 consists of restitution as defined in ORS 137.103 and restitution under ORS  
16 419C.450 and a monetary obligation imposed under ORS 811.706.

17 “(c) Category 3 consists of the unitary assessment imposed under ORS 137.290, costs imposed  
18 under ORS 151.505 or 161.665 and those fines, costs, forfeited security amounts and other monetary  
19 obligations payable to the state or to the General Fund of the state in criminal and quasi-criminal  
20 cases for which moneys the law does not expressly provide other disposition.

21 **“(d) Category 4 consists of the state court automation assessment imposed under section**  
22 **29 of this 2009 Act.**

23 “[*d*] (e) Category [*4*] **5** consists of monetary obligations imposed upon the defendant as a result  
24 of the conviction, but which do not fall under category 1, category 2, [*or*] category 3 **or category**  
25 **4** of the obligation categories. These include, but are not limited to, fines and other monetary obli-  
26 gations that the law expressly directs be paid to an agency, person or political subdivision of the  
27 state, and any other obligation to reimburse for payment of a reward under ORS 131.897.  
28 Notwithstanding paragraph (c) of this subsection, the portion of assessments collected as required  
29 by ORS 137.290 (2)(c) and (d) shall be considered category [*4*] **5** obligations.

30 “(3) As long as there remains unpaid any obligation under category 1, the clerk shall credit to-  
31 ward category 1 all of each payment received.

32 “(4) After the total obligation has been credited under category 1, then as long as there remains  
33 unpaid any obligation under both categories 2 and 3, the clerk shall credit toward each such cate-  
34 gory 50 percent of each payment received.

35 “(5) The clerk shall monthly transfer the moneys credited under category 1 and under category  
36 2 to the victims for whose benefit moneys under that category were ordered paid. If there are mul-  
37 tiple victims for whose benefit moneys have been ordered paid under category 2, the clerk shall first  
38 transfer moneys credited under category 2 to the victim, as defined in ORS 137.103 (4)(a). When the  
39 moneys due the victim, as defined in ORS 137.103 (4)(a), have been fully paid, the clerk shall transfer  
40 moneys credited under category 2 to the Criminal Injuries Compensation Account if moneys have  
41 been ordered paid to the account under category 2. When the moneys due the account have been  
42 fully paid, the clerk shall transfer moneys credited under category 2 to any other victims, as defined  
43 in ORS 137.103 (4)(b) or (d), for whose benefit moneys under that category were ordered paid in  
44 proportion to the amounts ordered. The clerk of a circuit court shall monthly transfer the moneys  
45 credited under category 3 as directed by the State Court Administrator for deposit in the State

1 Treasury to the credit of the Criminal Fine and Assessment Account established under ORS 137.300.  
2 The clerk of a justice or municipal court shall monthly transfer the moneys credited under category  
3 3 to the Department of Revenue as provided in ORS 305.830. **The clerk of a circuit court shall**  
4 **monthly transfer the moneys credited under category 4 as directed by the State Court Ad-**  
5 **ministrator for deposit in the State Treasury to the credit of the State Court Technology**  
6 **Account established under section 27 of this 2009 Act.**

7 “(6) When the entire amount owing [*for purposes of either*] **under** category 2, [*or*] category 3  
8 **or category 4** has been credited, further payments by the defendant shall be credited by the clerk  
9 entirely to the unpaid balance of whichever of those categories remains unpaid, until [*both*] category  
10 2, [*and*] category 3 **and category 4** have been entirely paid.

11 “(7) When category 1, category 2, [*and*] category 3 **and category 4** have been entirely paid and  
12 any obligation remains owing under category [4] **5**, the clerk shall credit further payments by the  
13 defendant to the obligations under category [4] **5** and shall monthly transfer the moneys so received  
14 to the appropriate recipient, giving first priority to counties and cities entitled to revenues gener-  
15 ated by prosecutions in justice and municipal courts and giving last priority to persons entitled to  
16 moneys as reimbursement for reward under ORS 131.897. The clerk shall monthly transfer the por-  
17 tion of assessments collected as required by ORS 137.290 (2)(c) and (d) to the county for adminis-  
18 tration of substance abuse treatment programs described in ORS 430.420.

19 “(8) Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, the clerk of a circuit court shall monthly  
20 transfer the moneys attributable to parking violations to the State Treasurer for deposit in the  
21 General Fund.

22 “(9) The clerk of a justice or municipal court must make the transfers required by this section  
23 not later than the last day of the month immediately following the month in which a payment is  
24 made.

25 “**SECTION 31.** ORS 131.897 is amended to read:

26 “131.897. (1) In addition to any other sentence it may impose as a result of a criminal conviction,  
27 the court may order that a defendant reimburse to a person, organization, association or public body  
28 or officer, any sum or portion thereof offered and paid by the person, organization, association or  
29 public body or officer under ORS 131.885 to 131.895, as a reward for information leading to the ap-  
30 prehension of the defendant. Reimbursement under this section shall be ordered paid into the court,  
31 for further transfer by the clerk to the person, organization, association or public body or officer  
32 entitled to it. The monetary obligation described in this section is a category [4] **5** obligation under  
33 ORS 137.295.

34 “(2) In determining whether to order reimbursement under this section, the court shall take into  
35 account:

36 “(a) The financial resources of the defendant and the burden that reimbursement will impose,  
37 with due regard to the other obligations of the defendant; and

38 “(b) The ability of the defendant to make reimbursement on an installment basis or on other  
39 conditions to be fixed by the court.

40 “**SECTION 32.** **The unit captions used in this 2009 Act are provided only for the conven-**  
41 **ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any**  
42 **legislative intent in the enactment of this 2009 Act.”.**
