House Bill 2525

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Creates offense of endangering child safety. Punishes by maximum fine of \$90.

| 4 | SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2009 Act is added to and made a part of the Oregon Vehicle |

| 6 | SECTION 2. (1) As used in this section, "vulnerable passenger" means a passenger 13 |
| 7 | years of age or older who, by reason of medical condition or body size, is at greater risk of |
| 8 | injury in the event of an accident or collision than another passenger in the motor vehicle |
| 9 | who is under 13 years of age. |
| 10 | (2) A person commits the offense of endangering child safety if the person operates a |
| 11 | motor vehicle on the highways of this state with a passenger who is: |
| 12 | (a) Under 13 years of age; and |
| 13 | (b) Seated in the front seat when a rear passenger seating position is available. |
| 14 | (3) For the purposes of this section, a rear passenger seating position is available if the |
| 15 | position is equipped with a safety belt or safety harness and is not occupied by a vulnerable |
| 16 | passenger or by a passenger who is under 13 years of age. |
| 17 | (4) The offense described in this section, endangering child safety, is a Class D traffic |
| 18 | violation. |

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
