

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3199

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after the semicolon delete the rest of the line and insert “creating
2 new provisions; amending ORS 1.002, 21.010, 21.110, 197.830, 284.612, 291.242, 291.252, 311.701,
3 327.535, 401.806, 759.425 and 802.110 and section 2, chapter 132, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled House
4 Bill 2244), and sections 33 and 38, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled House Bill 2287),
5 and section 2, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled House Bill 5027); and declaring an
6 emergency.”.

“ADMINISTRATIVE

11 **“SECTION 1. For the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, notwithstanding ORS 471.810,**
12 **amounts to be distributed from the Oregon Liquor Control Commission Account that are**
13 **attributable to a per bottle surcharge imposed by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission on**
14 **June 3, 2009, shall be credited to the General Fund.**

15 **“SECTION 2.** ORS 291.242 is amended to read:

16 “291.242. (1) [No] An appropriation to which the allotment system is applicable [shall] **does not**
17 become available to any state agency for expenditure [thereby] during any allotment period until:

18 “[1] (a) The agency submits to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services an estimate,
19 in such form as the department prescribes, for [such] **the** allotment period, of the amount required
20 for each activity to be carried on during that period; and

21 “[2] (b) The estimate is approved, increased or decreased by the department and funds allotted
22 therefor.

23 **“(2) At the time a state agency submits an estimate to the department under subsection**
24 **(1)(a) of this section, the agency shall submit a copy of the estimate to the Legislative Fiscal**
25 **Office. The department may not allot funds under subsection (1)(b) of this section until the**
26 **agency submits a copy of the estimate to the Legislative Fiscal Office.**

27 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 291.252 is amended to read:

28 “291.252. (1) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services may at any time modify or
29 amend any allotment previously made by it, upon application of, or upon notice to, the agency con-
30 cerned, but no such modification or amendment shall reduce an allotment below the amount required
31 to meet valid obligations or commitments previously incurred against the allotted funds.

32 **“(2)(a) An agency that applies for modification or amendment of an allotment as au-**
33 **thorized by subsection (1) of this section shall submit a copy of the application to the Leg-**
34 **islative Fiscal Office at the same time it submits the application to the department.**

35 **“(b) If the department modifies or amends an allotment upon notice to an agency as au-**

1 **thorized by subsection (1) of this section, the department shall notify the Legislative Fiscal**
2 **Office of the modification or amendment at the same time it notifies the agency.**

3 **“NOTE:** Sections 4 to 9 were deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renumbered.

4 **“SECTION 10.** ORS 311.701 is amended to read:

5 **“311.701. (1)** There is established in the State Treasury the Senior Property Tax Deferral Re-
6 volving Account to be used by the Department of Revenue for the purpose of making the payments
7 to:

8 **“(a)** County tax collectors of property taxes deferred for tax years beginning on or after January
9 1, 1983, as required by ORS 311.676.

10 **“(b)** The appropriate local officer of special assessment improvement amounts deferred on or
11 after October 15, 1983, as required by ORS 311.730.

12 **“(c)** The department for its expenses in administering the property tax and special assessment
13 senior deferral programs.

14 **“(2)** The Senior Property Tax Deferral Revolving Account may include a reserve for payment
15 of department administrative expenses.

16 **“(3)** All sums of money received by the Department of Revenue under ORS 311.666 to 311.701
17 as repayments of deferred property taxes or under ORS 311.702 to 311.735 as repayments of deferred
18 special assessment improvement amounts, including the interest accrued under ORS 311.674 (3) or
19 311.711 (3) shall, upon receipt, be credited to the revolving account and are continuously appropri-
20 ated to the department for the purposes of subsection (1) of this section.

21 **“(4)** If there *[is]* **are** not sufficient *[money]* **moneys** in the revolving account to make the pay-
22 ments required by subsection (1) of this section, *[there is appropriated from the General Fund an*
23 *amount sufficient which together with the money in the revolving account will provide an amount suf-*
24 *ficient to make the required payments]* **and the amount appropriated from the General Fund is**
25 **not sufficient when added together with the moneys in the revolving account to provide an**
26 **amount sufficient to make the required payments, the State Treasurer, in the capacity of**
27 **investment officer for the Oregon Investment Council, may lend to the Department of Re-**
28 **venue such amounts as may be necessary to make the payments. The State Treasurer may**
29 **lend moneys that may be invested as provided in ORS 293.701 to 293.820. Any moneys lent**
30 **under this subsection shall be repaid within five years together with interest at a rate de-**
31 **termined by the State Treasurer and consistent with the investment standards of ORS**
32 **293.721 and 293.726.**

33 **“(5)(a)** On November 30 of each year, if the amount in the revolving account exceeds the greater
34 of 35 percent of the total amount needed to make the payments described in subsection (1) of this
35 section for the previous property tax year or \$5 million, the department shall calculate the differ-
36 ence between the amount in the revolving account and the greater of an amount that equals 35
37 percent of the total amount needed to make the payments described in subsection (1) of this section
38 for the previous property tax year or \$5 million.

39 **“(b)** No later than February 1 of each year, the department shall transfer an amount equal to
40 the difference described in paragraph (a) of this subsection into the Oregon Project Independence
41 Fund established in ORS 410.422.

42 **“SECTION 11. Section 12 of this 2009 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter**
43 **286A.**

44 **“SECTION 12. (1)** The Legislative Assembly finds that the American Recovery and Rein-
45 vestment Act of 2009 (P.L. 111-5) provides that the State of Oregon may receive, allocate and

1 reallocate the authority to issue certain kinds of state and local government bonds that
2 qualify for tax credits, federal subsidies or exclusion of bond interest from gross income
3 under the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

4 “(2) As described in subsections (3) to (6) of this section, state agencies and the Private
5 Activity Bond Committee may allocate and reallocate or take any additional actions that are
6 desirable to maximize the benefits of bonding programs created or expanded by the American
7 Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (P.L. 111-5).

8 “(3) The Department of Education, with the approval of the Governor, may allocate, re-
9 allocate and otherwise manage this state’s qualified school construction bonding authority.

10 “(4) The Economic and Community Development Department may allocate, reallocate and
11 otherwise manage this state’s recovery zone economic development bonding authority and
12 this state’s recovery zone facility bonding authority.

13 “(5) The State Department of Energy may allocate, reallocate and otherwise manage this
14 state’s qualified energy conservation bonding authority.

15 “(6) The Private Activity Bond Committee may allocate, reallocate and otherwise manage
16 any bonding authority that is created or expanded by the American Recovery and Reinvest-
17 ment Act of 2009 (P.L. 111-5) if that responsibility is not assigned to a state agency by this
18 section, or if an agency that is assigned that responsibility requests the Private Activity
19 Bond Committee to allocate that authority on behalf of that agency.

20 “(7) The Department of Education, the Economic and Community Development Depart-
21 ment, the State Department of Energy and the Private Activity Bond Committee may adopt
22 rules to implement the provisions of this section including, but not limited to, rules pre-
23 scribing:

24 “(a) Application processes and requirements to receive a subsequent allocation or real-
25 location;

26 “(b) Standards upon which an allocation or reallocation may be based; and

27 “(c) Any conditions that must be met to receive an allocation or reallocation of the
28 bonding authority or to receive the benefits of such bonding authority.

29 “**SECTION 13.** For the biennium ending June 30, 2009, notwithstanding ORS 283.076, the
30 amount of \$1,123,741 is transferred from the Oregon Department of Administrative Services
31 Operating Fund to the General Fund for general governmental purposes. The transfer shall
32 be made on or before June 30, 2009.

33 “**SECTION 14.** Section 2, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled House Bill 5027), is
34 amended to read:

35 “**Sec. 2.** For the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, expenditures by the Oregon Liquor Control
36 Commission for liquor purchases [*and bank transaction fees*] are not limited.

37 “**SECTION 15.** For the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, notwithstanding ORS 30.282 and
38 278.425, the amount of \$30,000,000 is transferred from the Insurance Fund to the General
39 Fund for general governmental purposes. The transfer shall be made on July 1, 2009.

41 **“CONSUMER AND BUSINESS SERVICES**

42
43 “**SECTION 16.** ORS 759.425 is amended to read:

44 “759.425. (1) The Public Utility Commission shall establish and implement a competitively neu-
45 tral and nondiscriminatory universal service fund. **Subject to subsection (6) of this section, the**

1 **commission shall use the universal service fund** to ensure basic telephone service is available
2 at a reasonable and affordable rate. The Public Utility Commission may adopt rules to conform the
3 universal service fund to section 254 of the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 (Public Law
4 104-104), and to related rules adopted by the Federal Communications Commission, to the extent that
5 the Public Utility Commission determines is appropriate. The commission may delay implementation
6 for rural telecommunications carriers, as defined in the federal Act, for up to six months after the
7 date the Federal Communications Commission adopts a cost methodology for rural carriers.

8 “(2)(a) The Public Utility Commission shall establish the price a telecommunications utility may
9 charge its customers for basic telephone service. The commission in its discretion shall periodically
10 review and evaluate the status of telecommunications services in the state and designate the ser-
11 vices included in basic telephone service. The commission in its discretion shall periodically review
12 and adjust as necessary the price a telecommunications utility may charge for basic telephone ser-
13 vice.

14 “(b) The provisions of this subsection do not apply to the basic telephone service provided by
15 a telecommunications utility described in ORS 759.040.

16 “(3)(a) The Public Utility Commission shall establish a benchmark for basic telephone service
17 as necessary for the administration and distribution of the universal service fund. The universal
18 service fund shall provide explicit support to an eligible telecommunications carrier that is equal
19 to the difference between the cost of providing basic telephone service and the benchmark, less any
20 explicit compensation received by the carrier from federal sources specifically targeted to recovery
21 of local loop costs and less any explicit support received by the carrier from a federal universal
22 service program.

23 “(b) The commission in its discretion shall periodically review the benchmark and adjust it as
24 necessary to reflect:

25 “(A) Changes in competition in the telecommunications industry;

26 “(B) Changes in federal universal service support; and

27 “(C) Other relevant factors as determined by the commission.

28 “(c) Except for a telecommunications utility described in ORS 759.040, the commission shall seek
29 to limit the difference between the price a telecommunications utility may charge for basic tele-
30 phone service and the benchmark.

31 “(4) Except as provided in subsections [(6)] (7) and [(7)] (8) of this section, there is imposed on
32 the sale of all retail telecommunications services sold in this state a universal service surcharge.
33 Unless otherwise provided by the Public Utility Commission by rule, the surcharge shall be a uni-
34 form percentage of the sale of retail telecommunications services in an amount sufficient to support
35 the purpose of the universal service fund. The surcharge may be shown as a separate line item by
36 all telecommunications carriers using language prescribed by the commission. A telecommunications
37 carrier shall deposit amounts collected into the universal service fund according to a schedule
38 adopted by the commission.

39 “(5) The Public Utility Commission is authorized to establish a universal service fund, separate
40 and distinct from the General Fund. The fund shall consist of all universal service surcharge moneys
41 collected by telecommunications carriers and paid into the fund. The fund shall be used only for the
42 purpose described in this section, and for payment of expenses incurred by the commission or a third
43 party appointed by the commission to administer this section. All moneys in the fund are contin-
44 uously appropriated to the commission to carry out the provisions of this section. Interest on mon-
45 eys deposited in the fund shall accrue to the fund.

1 “(6) In addition to the purpose specified in subsection (1) of this section, moneys in the
2 universal service fund may be used by the Public Utility Commission to facilitate the avail-
3 ability of broadband at fair and reasonable rates throughout this state. The amount of
4 moneys in the universal service fund used for this purpose may not exceed the amount the
5 state is required to expend to receive the maximum amount of funds available from federal
6 sources for broadband services. If in-kind services are allowed for a state’s share of a map-
7 ping project, the state shall use in-kind services before expending universal service funds.
8 The commission may use an independent contractor to perform mapping services.

9 “[6] (7) For purposes of this section, ‘retail telecommunications service’ does not include radio
10 communications service, radio paging service, commercial mobile radio service, personal communi-
11 cations service or cellular communications service.

12 “[7(a)] (8)(a) Notwithstanding subsection [6] (7) of this section, a person who primarily pro-
13 vides radio communications service, radio paging service, commercial mobile radio service, personal
14 communications service or cellular communications service may request designation as an eligible
15 telecommunications carrier by the Public Utility Commission for purposes of participation in the
16 universal service fund.

17 “(b) In the event a person who primarily provides radio communications service, radio paging
18 service, commercial mobile radio service, personal communications service or cellular communi-
19 cations service seeks designation as an eligible telecommunications carrier for purposes of partic-
20 ipation in the universal service fund, the person shall provide written notice to the Public Utility
21 Commission requesting designation as an eligible telecommunications carrier within 60 days of the
22 date the commission establishes the fund. Upon receiving notice, the commission may designate the
23 person as an eligible telecommunications carrier for purposes of participation in the fund.

24 “(c) A person who primarily provides radio communications service, radio paging service, com-
25 mercial mobile radio service, personal communications service or cellular communications service
26 who fails to request designation as an eligible telecommunications carrier within 60 days of the date
27 the universal service fund is established by the Public Utility Commission may not be designated
28 as an eligible telecommunications carrier unless the person has contributed to the fund for at least
29 one year immediately prior to requesting designation.

30 “[8] (9) A pay telephone provider may apply to the Public Utility Commission, on a form de-
31 veloped by the commission, for a refund of the universal service surcharge imposed on the provider
32 under subsection (4) of this section for the provision of pay telephone service.

33 “**SECTION 17. The amendments to ORS 759.425 by section 16 of this 2009 Act apply to all**
34 **moneys in the universal service fund, whether deposited before, on or after the effective date**
35 **of this 2009 Act.**

36 “**SECTION 17a.** Section 2, chapter 132, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled House Bill 2244), is
37 amended to read:

38 “**Sec. 2.** The amendments to ORS 432.312 by section 1 [*of this 2009 Act*], **chapter 132, Oregon**
39 **Laws 2009 (Enrolled House Bill 2244)**, apply to death certificates [*issued*] **filed** on or after [*the ef-*
40 *fective date of this 2009 Act*] **July 1, 2009.**

41
42 “**ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**

43
44 “**SECTION 18. (1) The Oregon Progress Board may accept contributions of moneys and**
45 **assistance from the United States Government or its agencies or from any other source,**

1 public or private, and agree to conditions placed on the moneys not inconsistent with the
2 duties of the board.

3 “(2) There is established in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General
4 Fund, the Oregon Progress Board Fund. The fund consists of moneys received by the board
5 under this section and such other moneys as may otherwise be made available by law. In-
6 terest earned on the fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund are continuously
7 appropriated to the board and may be used only for the performance of the functions of the
8 board.

9 “SECTION 19. (1) The Oregon Progress Board may enter into an agreement with:

10 “(a) Any state agency for the provision of clerical, technical and management personnel
11 to the board to serve as the board’s staff and for the provision of other administrative, op-
12 erational or overhead expenses necessary to accomplish the public purposes of the board.

13 “(b) A nongovernmental entity for the provision of administrative, operational or over-
14 head expenses necessary to accomplish the public purposes of the board.

15 “(2) As used in this section:

16 “(a) ‘Public institution of higher education’ means a community college or a state insti-
17 tution of higher education listed in ORS 352.002.

18 “(b) ‘State agency’ means any officer, board, commission, department, division or insti-
19 tution in the executive or administrative branch of state government or a public institution
20 of higher education.

21 “SECTION 20. ORS 284.612 is amended to read:

22 “284.612. (1) The Governor shall serve as chair of the Oregon Progress Board and may appoint
23 an executive officer for the board for a term and with such duties and powers as the board deter-
24 mines to be necessary or appropriate.

25 “(2) A majority of the voting members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of
26 business.

27 “(3) The board shall meet as the board determines necessary at times and places specified by
28 call of the chair or a majority of the members of the board.

29 “[*(4) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services shall provide clerical, technical and*
30 *management personnel to the board to serve as the board’s staff.*]

31 “SECTION 21. (1) If the Oregon Progress Board enters into an agreement with a state
32 agency other than the Oregon Department of Administrative Services under section 19 of
33 this 2009 Act, the Director of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services shall:

34 “(a) Deliver to the state agency all records and property within the jurisdiction of the
35 director that relate to the duties, functions and powers of the board; and

36 “(b) Transfer to the state agency those employees engaged primarily in the exercise of
37 the duties, functions and powers of the board.

38 “(2) The state agency shall take possession of the records and property, and shall take
39 charge of the employees and employ them in the exercise of the duties, functions and powers
40 of the board, without reduction of compensation but subject to change or termination of
41 employment or compensation as provided by law.

42 “(3) The Governor shall resolve any dispute between the department and the state agency
43 relating to transfers of records, property and employees under this section, and the Gover-
44 nor’s decision is final.

45 “SECTION 22. The unexpended balances of amounts authorized to be expended by the

1 Oregon Department of Administrative Services for the biennium ending June 30, 2009, from
2 revenues dedicated, continuously appropriated, appropriated or otherwise made available for
3 the purpose of administering and enforcing the duties, functions and powers of the Oregon
4 Progress Board are transferred to the Oregon Progress Board Fund established by section
5 18 of this 2009 Act.

6 **“NOTE:** Sections 23 to 32 were deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renu-
7 bered.

8 **“SECTION 33.** Notwithstanding ORS 461.543 (4), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2009,
9 the amount allocated from the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund to the
10 Sports Lottery Account may not exceed \$9,665,082.

11 **“SECTION 34.** (1) Notwithstanding the restrictions in ORS 285B.455, for the biennium
12 beginning July 1, 2009, moneys in the Special Public Works Fund may be used for any pur-
13 poses for which the Economic and Community Development Department may lawfully use
14 funds.

15 **“(2)** Notwithstanding the restrictions in ORS 285B.563, for the biennium beginning July
16 1, 2009, moneys in the Water Fund may be used for any purposes for which the Economic
17 and Community Development Department may lawfully use funds.

18 **“(3)** Nothing in this section allows the department to use lottery moneys for any purpose
19 not permitted by the Oregon Constitution.

20 **“SECTION 35.** Notwithstanding the restrictions in ORS 777.267, for the biennium begin-
21 ning July 1, 2009, moneys in the Marine Navigation Improvement Fund shall be used by the
22 Economic and Community Development Department for principal and interest payments on
23 lottery revenue bonds.

24 **“SECTION 36.** Notwithstanding ORS 461.547, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, the
25 amount that would otherwise be transferred to counties under ORS 461.547 each fiscal
26 quarter shall be reduced by \$625,000 each quarter, and that amount shall be transferred to
27 the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund.

28 **“SECTION 37.** Notwithstanding and in lieu of ORS 565.447, there is allocated for the
29 biennium beginning July 1, 2009, from the Administrative Services Economic Development
30 Fund, to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the amount of \$3,043,303 for the
31 purpose of supporting county fairs in this state. Funds allocated under this section shall be
32 deposited in the County Fair Account established by ORS 565.445.

34 **“JUDICIAL BRANCH**

35
36 **“SECTION 37a.** ORS 1.002 is amended to read:

37 **“1.002.** (1) The Supreme Court is the highest judicial tribunal of the judicial department of gov-
38 ernment in this state. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court is the presiding judge of the court
39 and the administrative head of the judicial department of government in this state. The Chief Justice
40 shall exercise administrative authority and supervision over the courts of this state consistent with
41 applicable provisions of law and the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure. The Chief Justice, to facilitate
42 exercise of that administrative authority and supervision, may:

43 **“(a)** Make rules and issue orders appropriate to that exercise.

44 **“(b)** Require appropriate reports from the judges, other officers and employees of the courts of
45 this state and municipal courts.

1 “(c) Pursuant to policies approved by the Judicial Conference of the State of Oregon, assign or
2 reassign on a temporary basis all judges of the courts of this state to serve in designated locations
3 within or without the county or judicial district for which the judge was elected.

4 “(d) Set staffing levels for all courts of the state operating under the Judicial Department and
5 for all operations in the Judicial Department.

6 “(e) Establish time standards for disposition of cases.

7 “(f) Establish budgets for the Judicial Department and all courts operating under the Judicial
8 Department.

9 “(g) Assign or reassign all court staff of courts operating under the Judicial Department.

10 “(h) Pursuant to policies approved by the Judicial Conference of the State of Oregon, establish
11 personnel rules and policies for judges of courts operating under the Judicial Department.

12 “(i) Take any other action appropriate to the exercise of the powers specified in this section and
13 other law, and appropriate to the exercise of administrative authority and supervision by the Chief
14 Justice over the courts of this state.

15 “(2) The Chief Justice may make rules for the use of electronic applications in the courts, in-
16 cluding but not limited to rules relating to:

17 “(a) Applications based on the use of the Internet and other similar technologies;

18 “(b) The use of an electronic document, or use of an electronic image of a paper document in
19 lieu of the original paper copy, for a document, process or paper that is served, delivered, received,
20 filed, entered or retained in any action or proceeding;

21 “(c) The use of electronic signatures or another form of identification for any document, process
22 or paper that is served, delivered, received, filed, entered or retained in any action or proceeding
23 and that is required by any law or rule to be signed;

24 “(d) The use of electronic transmission for the service of documents in a proceeding, other than
25 service of a summons or service of an initial complaint or petition;

26 “(e) Payment of statutory or court-ordered monetary obligations through electronic media;

27 “(f) Electronic storage of court documents;

28 “(g) Use of electronic citations in lieu of the paper citation forms as allowed under ORS 153.770,
29 including use of electronic citations for parking ordinance violations that are subject to ORS 221.333
30 or 810.425;

31 “(h) Public access through electronic means to court documents that are required or authorized
32 to be made available to the public by law; and

33 “(i) Transmission of open court proceedings through electronic media.

34 “(3) Rules adopted by the Chief Justice under subsection (2) of this section must be consistent
35 with the laws governing courts and court procedures, but any person who serves, delivers, receives,
36 files, enters or retains an electronic document, or an electronic image of a paper document in lieu
37 of the original paper copy, in the manner provided by a rule of the Chief Justice under subsection
38 (2) of this section shall be considered to have complied with any rule or law governing service, de-
39 livery, reception, filing, entry or retention of a paper document.

40 “(4) Rules made and orders issued by the Chief Justice under this section shall permit as much
41 variation and flexibility in the administration of the courts of this state as are appropriate to the
42 most efficient manner of administering each court, considering the particular needs and circum-
43 stances of the court, and consistent with the sound and efficient administration of the judicial de-
44 partment of government in this state.

45 **“(5) The Chief Justice may establish fees for the use of the Oregon Judicial Information**

1 **Network.**

2 “[5] (6) The judges, other officers and employees of the courts of this state shall comply with
3 rules made and orders issued by the Chief Justice. Rules and orders of a court of this state, or a
4 judge thereof, relating to the conduct of the business of the court shall be consistent with applicable
5 rules made and orders issued by the Chief Justice.

6 “[6] (7) The Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals and the presiding judge of each judicial dis-
7 trict of this state are the administrative heads of their respective courts. They are responsible and
8 accountable to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court in the exercise of their administrative au-
9 thority and supervision over their respective courts. Other judges of the Court of Appeals or court
10 under a presiding judge are responsible and accountable to the Chief Judge or presiding judge, and
11 to the Chief Justice, in respect to exercise by the Chief Justice, Chief Judge or presiding judge of
12 administrative authority and supervision.

13 “[7] (8) The Chief Justice may delegate the exercise of any of the powers specified by this
14 section to the presiding judge of a court, and may delegate the exercise of any of the administrative
15 powers specified by this section to the State Court Administrator, as may be appropriate.

3 ment or state agency, on reconsideration, affirms the order or modifies the order with only minor
4 changes.

5 “(14) The board shall issue a final order within 77 days after the date of transmittal of the re-
6 cord. If the order is not issued within 77 days the applicant may apply in Marion County or the
7 circuit court of the county where the application was filed for a writ of mandamus to compel the
8 board to issue a final order.

9 “(15)(a) Upon entry of its final order the board may, in its discretion, award costs to the pre-
10 vailing party including the cost of preparation of the record if the prevailing party is the local
11 government, special district or state agency whose decision is under review. The deposit required
12 by subsection (9) of this section shall be applied to any costs charged against the petitioner.

13 “(b) The board shall also award reasonable attorney fees and expenses to the prevailing party
14 against any other party who the board finds presented a position without probable cause to believe
15 the position was well-founded in law or on factually supported information.

16 “(16) Orders issued under this section may be enforced in appropriate judicial proceedings.

17 “(17)(a) The board shall provide for the publication of its orders that are of general public in-
18 terest in the form it deems best adapted for public convenience. The publications shall constitute
19 the official reports of the board.

20 “(b) Any moneys collected or received from sales by the board shall be paid into the Board
21 Publications Account established by ORS 197.832.

22 “(18) Except for any sums collected for publication of board opinions, all fees collected by the
23 board under this section that are not awarded as costs shall be paid over to the State Treasurer to
24 be credited to the General Fund.

25 “**SECTION 39. The amendments to ORS 197.830 by section 38 of this 2009 Act apply to**
26 **appeals filed on or after the effective date of this 2009 Act.**

27 “**SECTION 40. For the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, notwithstanding ORS 541.750,**
28 **541.830 and 541.840, from moneys paid into the Water Development Administration and Bond**
29 **Sinking Fund under ORS 541.750, the amount of \$300,000 is transferred from the Water De-**
30 **velopment Administration and Bond Sinking Fund to the General Fund for general govern-**
31 **mental purposes. The transfer shall be made on July 1, 2009.**

32 “**SECTION 40a. If House Bill 3369 does not become law, then notwithstanding sections 8**
33 **and 9, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5535), the State Treasurer**
34 **may not issue lottery bonds for the Water Resources Department or the Water Resources**
35 **Commission.**

36 “**SECTION 41. For the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, notwithstanding ORS 273.105 and**
37 **327.410, the amount of \$664,952 of unexpended moneys remaining from the 2006 settlement**
38 **agreement for removal of the New Carissa from the territorial sea is transferred from the**
39 **Distributable Income Account to the General Fund for general governmental purposes. The**
40 **transfer shall be made on July 1, 2009.**

42 “PUBLIC SAFETY
43

44 “**SECTION 42. For the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, notwithstanding ORS 180.095, the**
45 **amount of \$2,000,000 is transferred from the Consumer Protection and Education Revolving**

1 Account to the General Fund for general governmental purposes. The transfer shall be made
2 on July 1, 2009.

3 **“SECTION 43.** Section 44 of this 2009 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 181.610 to
4 181.712.

5 **“SECTION 44.** Notwithstanding any contrary provision of ORS 181.610 to 181.712:

6 **“(1)** The Department of Corrections shall provide training for basic certification of cor-
7 rections officers employed by the Department of Corrections.

8 **“(2)** The Department of Corrections shall develop proposed training standards for the
9 basic certification of corrections officers employed by the Department of Corrections and
10 provide the proposed standards to the Corrections Policy Committee. After reviewing the
11 proposed standards provided by the Department of Corrections, the Corrections Policy
12 Committee shall recommend, and the Board on Public Safety Standards and Training shall
13 adopt by rule, minimum training standards for basic certification of corrections officers
14 employed by the Department of Corrections. The minimum training standards adopted under
15 this subsection must meet or exceed the minimum training standards for the basic certifi-
16 cation of corrections officers employed by a law enforcement unit other than the Depart-
17 ment of Corrections.

18 **“(3)** The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training shall conduct periodic au-
19 dits of the training provided by the Department of Corrections to ensure compliance with the
20 standards adopted under subsection (2) of this section. If the Department of Public Safety
21 Standards and Training finds that the training complies with the standards, the department
22 shall accredit the training for the same term and upon the same conditions as training pro-
23 grams for corrections officers that are employed by a law enforcement unit other than the
24 Department of Corrections.

25 **“(4)** Training provided in accordance with this section constitutes training necessary for
26 certification as a corrections officer under ORS 181.610 to 181.712.

27 **“(5)** Nothing in this section limits the ability of any law enforcement unit to employ a
28 corrections officer who is provided training in accordance with this section.

29 **“NOTE:** Section 45 was deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renumbered.

30 **“SECTION 46.** No later than March 1, 2011, the Department of Public Safety Standards
31 and Training shall report to the Legislative Assembly in the manner provided in ORS 192.245
32 on the efficacy of the training described in section 44 of this 2009 Act.

33 **“NOTE:** Section 46a was deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renumbered.

34 **“SECTION 46b.** (1) Section 44 of this 2009 Act applies to corrections officers hired by the
35 Department of Corrections on or after the effective date of this 2009 Act and before January
36 2, 2014.

37 **“(2)** Nothing in the repeal of section 44 of this 2009 Act by section 46d of this 2009 Act:

38 **“(a)** Prohibits the Department of Corrections from completing the basic training of cor-
39 rections officers who are hired on or after the effective date of this 2009 Act and before
40 January 2, 2014.

41 **“(b)** Affects the certification, or the eligibility for certification, of a corrections officer
42 who is provided basic training by the Department of Corrections in accordance with section
43 44 of this 2009 Act.

44 **“NOTE:** Section 46c was deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renumbered.

45 **“SECTION 46d.** Sections 43, 44 and 46 of this 2009 Act are repealed on January 2, 2014.

1 807.150 and 807.370 to the State Treasurer for deposit in the Student Driver Training Fund. The
2 moneys deposited in the Student Driver Training Fund under this paragraph are continuously ap-
3 propriated to the department for the following purposes:

4 “(A) To the extent of not more than 10 percent of the amount transferred into the Student
5 Driver Training Fund in any biennium, to pay the expenses of administering ORS 336.795, 336.800,

7 “(B) The remaining moneys, for reimbursing school districts as provided under ORS 336.805.

8 “(d) After deduction of expenses of collection, transfer and administration, the department shall
9 pay moneys collected for the Motorcycle Safety Subaccount under ORS 807.170 to the State Treas-
10 urer for deposit in the Motorcycle Safety Subaccount of the Transportation Safety Account. Moneys
11 paid to the State Treasurer under this paragraph shall be used for the purpose of ORS 802.320.

12 “(e) After deduction of expenses for the administration of the issuance of customized registration
13 plates under ORS 805.240, the department shall place moneys received from the sale of customized
14 registration plates in the Passenger Rail Transportation Account. The moneys placed in the account
15 are continuously appropriated to the department and shall be used for the payment of expenses in-
16 curred in administering passenger rail programs.

17 “(f) After deduction of expenses of collection, transfer and administration, the department shall
18 pay moneys from any registration fees established by the governing bodies of counties or a district,
19 as defined in ORS 801.237, under ORS 801.041 or 801.042 to the appropriate counties or districts.
20 The department shall make the payments on at least a monthly basis unless another basis is estab-
21 lished by the intergovernmental agreements required by ORS 801.041 and 801.042 between the de-
22 partment and the governing bodies of a county or a district.

23 “(g) After deducting the expenses of the department in collecting and transferring the moneys,
24 the department shall make disbursements and payments of moneys collected for or dedicated to any
25 other purpose or fund except the State Highway Fund, including but not limited to, payments to the
26 Department of Transportation Operating Fund established by ORS 184.642 (1) and (2).

27 “(3) The department shall refund from the Department of Transportation Driver and Motor Ve-
28 hicle Suspense Account any excess or erroneous payment to a person who made the payment or to
29 the person’s legal representative when the department determines that money has been received by
30 it in excess of the amount legally due and payable or that it has received money in which it has
31 no legal interest. Refunds payable under this subsection are continuously appropriated for such
32 purposes in the manner for payment of refunds under this section. If the department determines that
33 a refund is due, the department may refund the amount of excess or erroneous payment without a
34 claim being filed. Except as provided in ORS 319.290, 319.375, 319.820 and 319.831, any claim for a
35 refund from the department must be filed within 12 months after the date payment is received by
36 the department.

37 “(4) After payment of those expenses and disbursements approved for payment before general ad-
38 ministrative expenses related to the provision of driver and motor vehicle services, the department
39 shall pay from the Department of Transportation Driver and Motor Vehicle Services Administrative
40 Account its general administrative expenses incurred in the administration of any law related to
41 driver and motor vehicle services that the department is charged with administering and any other
42 expenses the department is permitted by law to pay from moneys held by the department before
43 transfer of the moneys to the State Highway Fund. The following limitations apply to payments of
44 administrative expenses under this subsection:

45 “(a) The department shall make payment of the expenses of administering the issuance of winter

1 recreation parking permits under ORS 811.595 from those moneys received from issuing the permits
2 or from moneys received under ORS 153.630 from violation of the requirement to have the permit.

3 “(b) The department shall pay its expenses for administering the registration and titling of
4 snowmobiles under ORS 821.060 and 821.100 from the fees collected from administering those
5 sections. The department shall also pay its expenses for the administration of the snowmobile driver
6 permit program under ORS 821.160 from the moneys otherwise described in this paragraph.

7 “(c) The department shall pay its expenses for determining the amount of money to be withheld
8 under ORS 802.120 from the fees collected for administering the registration and titling of
9 snowmobiles. The amount used to pay expenses under this paragraph shall be such sum as necessary
10 but shall not exceed \$10,000 during each biennium.

11 “(d) The department shall retain not more than \$15,000 in any biennium for the expenses of
12 collecting and transferring moneys to the Student Driver Training Fund under this section and for
13 the administration of ORS 336.810 (3).

14 “(5) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the department shall transfer to the State
15 Highway Fund the moneys not used for payment of the general administrative expenses or for ap-
16 proved expenses and disbursements before payment of general administrative expenses. The following
17 apply to this subsection:

18 “(a) If the Director of Transportation certifies the amount of principal or interest of highway
19 bonds due on any particular date, the department may make available for the payment of such in-
20 terest or principal any sums that may be necessary to the extent of moneys on hand available for
21 the State Highway Fund regardless of the dates otherwise specified under this section.

22 “(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection the department shall not make available
23 for purposes described in paragraph (a) of this subsection any moneys described in ORS 367.605
24 when there are not sufficient amounts of such moneys in the State Highway Fund for purposes of
25 bonds issued under ORS 367.615.

26 “(6) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the following moneys shall be trans-
27 ferred to the State Highway Fund at the times described:

28 “(a) Moneys received under ORS 802.120 and not used for the payment of administrative ex-
29 penses of the department shall be transferred before July 31 of each year.

30 “(b) Moneys received from the registration of snowmobiles that is not to be used for payment
31 of administrative expenses of the department shall be transferred within 30 days after the end of the
32 quarter.

33 “(c) Moneys received from the issuance of winter recreation parking permits or under ORS
34 153.630 from violation of the requirement to have a winter recreation parking permit and that is not
35 used for payment of administrative expenses of the department shall be transferred within 30 days
36 after the end of the quarter.

37 “(7) The following moneys transferred to the State Highway Fund under this section may be
38 used only for the purposes described as follows:

39 “(a) Moneys collected from the issuance of winter recreation parking permits or under ORS
40 153.630 for violation of the requirement to have a winter recreation parking permit, and the interest
41 on such moneys, shall be used to enforce the requirement for winter recreation parking permits and
42 to remove snow from winter recreation parking locations designated under ORS 810.170. Any re-
43 maining moneys shall, upon approval by the Winter Recreation Advisory Committee:

44 “(A) Be used to maintain parking locations developed with moneys obtained under ORS 810.170
45 and snowmobile facilities that are parking lots developed with moneys as provided under this sec-

1 tion;

2 “(B) Be used to develop additional winter recreation parking locations under ORS 810.170; or

3 “(C) Be carried over to be used in subsequent years for the purposes and in the manner de-
4 scribed in this paragraph.

5 “(b) Moneys received from the registration of snowmobiles or under ORS 802.120 *[shall]* **may**
6 be used for **development and maintenance of multiuse trails within urban growth boundaries**
7 **described in section 31, chapter _____, Oregon Laws 2009 (Enrolled House Bill 2001), or for**
8 the development and maintenance of snowmobile facilities, including the acquisition of land therefor
9 by any means other than the exercise of eminent domain. Moneys received under ORS 802.120 may
10 also be used for the enforcement of ORS 811.590, 821.100 to 821.120, 821.140, 821.150, 821.190, 821.210
11 and 821.240 to 821.290.

12 “(8) The department shall maintain the Revolving Account for Emergency Cash Advances sepa-
13 rate from other moneys described in this section. From the account, the department may pay for the
14 taking up of dishonored remittances returned by banks or the State Treasurer and for emergency
15 cash advances to be subsequently reimbursed. The account shall be used only as a revolving fund.
16 The department shall at all times be accountable for the amount of the account, either in cash or
17 unreimbursed items and advances. The moneys in the account are continuously appropriated for the
18 purposes of this subsection. The amount of the account under this subsection shall not exceed
19 \$40,000 from moneys received by the department in the performance of its driver and motor vehicle
20 services functions and moneys otherwise appropriated for purposes of this subsection. The account
21 under this subsection shall be kept on deposit with the State Treasurer. The State Treasurer is au-
22 thorized to honor and pay all properly signed and indorsed checks or warrants drawn against the
23 account.

27 “**SECTION 49.** ORS 327.535 is amended to read:

28 “327.535. (1) Subject to subsections (2) and (3) of this section, *[any]* **a school district that pro-**
29 **vides lunch at any school site shall make *[breakfasts]* breakfast accessible as part of a breakfast**
30 **program** if 25 percent or more of the students at the site are eligible for free or reduced price
31 lunches under the United States Department of Agriculture’s current Income Eligibility Guidelines
32 or the school site qualifies for assistance under Chapter I of Title I of the federal Elementary and
33 Secondary Education Act of 1965.

34 “(2) *[The]* **A school district that makes breakfast accessible as provided under subsection**
35 **(1) of this section** may apply to the State Board of Education for a waiver for all or for particular
36 grade levels if it is financially unable to implement a breakfast program. The state board may grant
37 a waiver to the school district for a period not to exceed two years, after which the school district
38 must reestablish its claim of financial hardship if the waiver is to be extended.

39 “(3) If the per meal federal reimbursement for the *[free and reduced price]* breakfast program
40 falls below the 1991 reimbursement levels, a school district may elect to discontinue the program
41 until federal funding is restored to those levels. No waiver is required for such election.

42 “(4) **A school district that makes breakfast accessible at any school site shall make**
43 **breakfast accessible at that school site at no charge to all students who are eligible for free**
44 **or reduced price lunches under the United States Department of Agriculture’s current In-**
45 **come Eligibility Guidelines. For each breakfast that a school district provides free of charge**

1 to a student who is eligible for a reduced price lunch, the Department of Education shall
2 provide reimbursement to the school district for the actual amount that a student would
3 have been required to pay for the reduced price breakfast.

4 “SECTION 50. The amendments to ORS 327.535 by section 49 of this 2009 Act first apply
5 to the 2009-2010 school year.

9 “SECTION 51. The unit captions used in this 2009 Act are provided only for the conven-
10 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any
11 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2009 Act.

12 “SECTION 52. This 2009 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public
13 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2009 Act takes effect
14 on its passage.”.
