SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Suspends certain provision of Ballot Measure 57 (2008) **from February 15, 2010**, until January 1, 2012. Provides that moneys not expended as result of suspension are dedicated to public safety purposes.

Increases maximum reduction in term of incarceration for appropriate institutional behavior or participation in adult basic skills development program for certain classes of inmates. Sunsets increase on July 1, 2013.

Prohibits State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, after board denies petition for change in terms of confinement of prisoner convicted of aggravated murder or murder, from granting prisoner subsequent hearing that is less than two years, or more than 10 years, from date petition is denied. Specifies procedures for granting hearing after period of two years and contents of board order.

Prohibits board from considering release of certain prisoners on parole or post-prison supervision less than two years, or more than 10 years, from date on which release on parole or post-prison supervision is denied. Specifies procedures for granting hearing after period of two years and contents of board order.

Modifies law related to probation and post-prison supervision for persons under supervision by community corrections. Sunsets modifications on July 1, 2011.

Modifies procedures related to reprieves, commutations and pardons for certain inmates. Sunsets modification on July 1, 2011.

[Punishes possession of controlled substances as Class A misdemeanor under certain circumstances. Punishes by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both. Imposes special assessment of \$100 on person convicted of possession of controlled substance. Sunsets provisions on July 1, 2011.]

Modifies crime of kidnapping in first degree.

Increases penalty for assault in third degree if defendant commits assault by means of motor vehicle and was driving while under influence of intoxicants.

[Increases penalty for crime of strangulation under certain circumstances to maximum of five years' imprisonment, \$125,000 fine, or both.]

Directs Department of State Police to create targeted enforcement program. Appropriates moneys for purposes of program.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

2 Whereas the voters approved Ballot Measure 57; and

3 Whereas more than 100 offenders have been incarcerated under Ballot Measure 57, and these
4 offenders will, along with other offenders sentenced under Ballot Measure 57, remain incarcerated;
5 and

6 Whereas the majority of offenders will complete their sentences and eventually be released back
7 into the community; and

8 Whereas it is in the interest of public safety to develop sentencing policies based on evidence-
9 based research that reward prosocial behavior; and

16 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

17 **SECTION 1. (1)(a) If the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision denies a pe-**
18 **tion for a change in the terms of confinement filed by a prisoner convicted of aggravated**
19 **murder or murder, the board may not grant the prisoner a subsequent hearing that is less**
20 **than two years, or more than 10 years, from the date the petition is denied.**

21 **(b) The board may not grant the prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from**
22 **the date a petition is denied unless the board finds that it is not reasonable to expect that**
23 **the prisoner would be granted a change in the terms of confinement before the date of the**
24 **subsequent hearing.**

25 **(c) The board shall determine the date of the subsequent hearing in accordance with**
26 **rules adopted by the board. Rules adopted under this paragraph must be based on the foun-**
27 **dation principles of criminal law described in section 15, Article I of the Oregon Constitution.**

28 **(2) If the board grants the prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the date**
29 **a petition is denied, the prisoner may submit a request for an interim hearing not earlier**
30 **than the date that is two years from the date the petition is denied and at intervals of not**
31 **less than two years thereafter. If the board finds, based upon a request for an interim**
32 **hearing, that there is reasonable cause to believe that the prisoner may be granted a change**
33 **in the terms of confinement, the board shall conduct a hearing as soon as is reasonably**
34 **convenient.**

35 **(3) When the board grants a prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the**
36 **date a petition is denied and when the board denies a petition for an interim hearing, the**
37 **board shall issue a final order. The order shall be accompanied by findings of fact and con-**
38 **clusions of law. The findings of fact shall consist of a concise statement of the underlying**
39 **facts supporting the findings as to each contested issue of fact and as to each ultimate fact**
40 **required to support the board's order. Unless the prisoner bears the burden of persuasion,**
41 **the order shall include findings necessary to deny the prisoner a change in the terms of**
42 **confinement for any period of time when the prisoner would be presumed to be eligible for**
43 **a change in the terms of confinement.**

44 **SECTION 2. (1)(a) If the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision denies parole**
45 **to a prisoner sentenced for a crime committed prior to November 1, 1989, the board may not**

1 **grant the prisoner a subsequent hearing that is less than two years, or more than 10 years,**
2 **from the date parole is denied, unless the two-year period would exceed the maximum sen-**
3 **tence imposed by the court.**

4 (b) **The board may not grant the prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from**
5 **the date parole is denied unless the board finds that it is not reasonable to expect that the**
6 **prisoner would be granted parole before the date of the subsequent hearing.**

7 (c) **The board shall determine the date of the subsequent hearing pursuant to rules**
8 **adopted by the board. Rules adopted under this paragraph must be based on the foundation**
9 **principles of criminal law described in section 15, Article I of the Oregon Constitution.**

10 (2) **If the board grants a prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the date**
11 **parole is denied, the prisoner may submit a request for an interim hearing not earlier than**
12 **the date that is two years from the date parole is denied and at intervals of not less than**
13 **two years thereafter. If the board finds, based upon a request for an interim hearing, that**
14 **there is reasonable cause to believe that the prisoner may be granted parole, the board shall**
15 **conduct a hearing as soon as is reasonably convenient.**

16 (3) **When the board grants a prisoner a hearing that is more than two years from the**
17 **date parole is denied and when the board denies a petition for an interim hearing, the board**
18 **shall issue a final order. The order shall be accompanied by findings of fact and conclusions**

23 **prisoner would be presumed to be eligible for parole.**

24 **SECTION 3.** ORS 144.125 is amended to read:

25 144.125. (1) **Prior to the scheduled release of any prisoner on parole and prior to release re-**
26 **scheduled under this section, the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may upon re-**
27 **quest of the Department of Corrections or on its own initiative interview the prisoner to review the**
28 **prisoner's parole plan and psychiatric or psychological report, if any, and the record of the priso-**
29 **ner's conduct during confinement. To accommodate such review by the board, the Department of**
30 **Corrections shall provide to the board any psychiatric or psychological reports held by the depart-**
31 **ment regarding the prisoner. However, if the psychiatrist or psychologist who prepared any report**
32 **or any treating psychiatrist or psychologist determines that disclosure to the prisoner of the con-**
33 **tents of the report would be detrimental to the prisoner's mental or emotional health, the psychia-**
34 **trist or psychologist may indorse upon the report a recommendation that it not be disclosed to the**
35 **prisoner. The department may withhold from the board any report so indorsed.**

36 (2) **The board shall postpone a prisoner's scheduled release date if it finds, after a hearing, that**
37 **the prisoner engaged in serious misconduct during confinement. The board shall adopt rules defining**
38 **serious misconduct and specifying periods of postponement for such misconduct.**

39 (3)(a) **If the board finds the prisoner has a present severe emotional disturbance such as to**
40 **constitute a danger to the health or safety of the community, the board may order the postponement**
41 **of the scheduled parole release until a specified future date. **The board may not postpone a pris-****
42 **oner's scheduled release date to a date that is less than two years, or more than 10 years,**
43 **from the date of the hearing, unless the prisoner would be held beyond the maximum sen-**
44 **tence. The board shall determine the scheduled release date, and the prisoner may petition**
45 **for interim review, in accordance with section 2 of this 2009 Act.**

1 (b) If the board finds the prisoner has a present severe emotional disturbance such as to con-
2 stitute a danger to the health or safety of the community, but also finds that the prisoner can be
3 adequately controlled with supervision and mental health treatment and that the necessary super-
4 vision and treatment are available, the board may order the prisoner released on parole subject to
5 conditions that are in the best interests of community safety and the prisoner's welfare.

6 (4) Each prisoner shall furnish the board with a parole plan prior to the scheduled release of
7 the prisoner on parole. The board shall adopt rules specifying the elements of an adequate parole
8 plan and may defer release of the prisoner for not more than three months if it finds that the parole
9 plan is inadequate. The Department of Corrections shall assist prisoners in preparing parole plans.

10 **SECTION 4.** ORS 144.228 is amended to read:

11 144.228. (1)(a) Within six months after commitment to the custody of the Department of Cor-
12 rections of any person sentenced under ORS 161.725 and 161.735 as a dangerous offender, the State
13 Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision shall set a date for a parole consideration hearing in-
14 stead of an initial release date as otherwise required under ORS 144.120 and 144.125. The parole
15 consideration hearing date shall be the time the prisoner would otherwise be eligible for parole
16 under the board's rules.

17 (b)(A) At the parole consideration hearing, the prisoner shall be given a release date in ac-
18 cordance with the rules of the board if the board finds the prisoner no longer dangerous or finds
19 that the prisoner remains dangerous but can be adequately controlled with supervision and mental
20 health treatment and that the necessary resources for supervision and treatment are available to the
21 prisoner. If the board is unable to make such findings, *[reviews]* **a review** will be conducted *[at least*
22 *once every two years]* **no less than two years, and no more than 10 years, from the date of the**
23 **previous review**, until the board is able to make such findings, at which time release on parole
24 shall be ordered if the prisoner is otherwise eligible under the rules.

25 **(B) The board may not grant the prisoner a review hearing that is more than two years**
26 **from the date of the previous hearing unless the board finds that it is not reasonable to ex-**
27 **pect that the prisoner would be granted a release date before the date of the subsequent**
28 **hearing.**

29 **(C) The board shall determine the date of the review hearing in accordance with rules**
30 **adopted by the board. Rules adopted under this subparagraph must be based on the founda-**
31 **tion principles of criminal law described in section 15, Article I of the Oregon Constitution.**

32 **(D)** In no event shall the prisoner be held beyond the maximum sentence less good time credits
33 imposed by the court.

34 (c) Nothing in this section *[shall preclude]* **precludes** a prisoner from submitting a request for
35 a parole consideration hearing prior to the earliest time the prisoner is eligible for parole *[or a*
36 *two-year review]*. **If the board grants a prisoner a review hearing that is more than two years**
37 **from the date of the previous hearing, the prisoner may submit a request for an interim**
38 **review hearing not earlier than the date that is two years from the date of the previous**
39 **hearing and at intervals of not less than two years thereafter.** Should the board find, based
40 upon *[the]* **a request described in this paragraph**, that there is a reasonable cause to believe that
41 the prisoner is no longer dangerous or that necessary supervision and treatment are available based
42 upon the information provided in the request, it shall conduct a review as soon as is reasonably
43 convenient.

44 **(d) When the board grants a prisoner a review hearing that is more than two years from**
45 **the date of the previous hearing and when the board denies a petition for an interim hearing,**

1 **the board shall issue a final order. The order shall be accompanied by findings of fact and**
2 **conclusions of law. The findings of fact shall consist of a concise statement of the underlying**
3 **facts supporting the findings as to each contested issue of fact and as to each ultimate fact**
4 **required to support the board's order. Unless the prisoner bears the burden of persuasion,**
5 **the order shall include findings necessary to deny the prisoner a release date for any period**
6 **of time when the prisoner would be presumed to be eligible for a release date.**

7 (2) For the parole consideration hearing, the board shall cause to be brought before it and
8 consider all information regarding such person. The information shall include:

9 (a) The written report of the examining psychiatrist or psychologist which shall contain all the
10 facts necessary to assist the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision in making its de-
11 termination. The report of the examining psychiatrist or psychologist shall be made within two
12 months of the date of its consideration; and

13 (b) A written report to be made by the executive officer of the Department of Corrections in-
14 stitution in which the person has been confined. The executive officer's report shall contain:

15 (A) A detailed account of the person's conduct while confined, all infractions of rules and dis-
16 cipline, all punishment meted out to the person and the circumstances connected therewith, as well
17 as the extent to which the person has responded to the efforts made in the institution to improve
18 the person's mental and moral condition.

19 (B) A statement as to the person's present attitude towards society, towards the sentencing
20 judge, towards the prosecuting district attorney, towards the arresting police officer and towards the
21 person's previous criminal career.

22 (C) The work and program record of the person while in or under the supervision of the De-
23 partment of Corrections. The program history shall include a summary of any psychological or sub-
24 stance abuse treatment and other activities that will assist the board in understanding the
25 psychological adjustment and social skills and habits of the person and that will assist the board in
26 determining the likelihood for successful community reentry.

27 **SECTION 5.** ORS 144.232 is amended to read:

28 144.232. (1) A person sentenced under ORS 161.725 and 161.735 as a dangerous offender for fel-
29 onies committed on or after November 1, 1989, shall be considered for release to post-prison super-
30 vision. The offender is eligible for release to post-prison supervision after having served the required
31 incarceration term established under ORS 161.737.

32 (2) The State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision shall hold a release hearing no later
33 than 10 days prior to the date on which the offender becomes eligible for release on post-prison
34 supervision as provided in subsection (1) of this section.

35 (3) The dangerous offender's eligibility for and release to post-prison supervision shall be deter-
36 mined in a manner consistent with the procedures and criteria required by ORS 144.228 for the
37 parole determination process applicable to dangerous offenders sentenced for crimes committed prior
38 to November 1, 1989.

39 (4) An offender released under this section shall serve the remainder of the sentence term im-
40 posed under ORS 161.725, 161.735 and 161.737 on post-prison supervision, however:

41 (a) Notwithstanding ORS 137.010 or the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, the
42 State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may sanction an offender to the supervision of
43 the local authority for a maximum period of 180 days for any supervision violation. The sanction
44 may be imposed repeatedly during the term of post-prison supervision for subsequent supervision
45 violations.

1 (b) After release under this section, the board may at any time return the offender to prison and
2 require the offender to submit to a psychiatric or psychological examination as provided for in ORS
3 144.226. If the board finds that the offender's dangerousness has returned and cannot be adequately
4 controlled with supervision and mental and physical health treatment, or that resources for super-
5 vision and treatment are not available to the offender, the board may defer the offender's release
6 from prison for an indefinite period of time. An offender returned to prison under this paragraph is
7 entitled to periodic reviews [*once every two years*] for possible release to post-prison supervision as
8 provided by subsection (3) of this section.

9 **SECTION 6.** ORS 163.105 is amended to read:

10 163.105. Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS chapter 144 and ORS 421.450 to 421.490:

11 (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 137.700, when a defendant is convicted of aggravated
12 murder as defined by ORS 163.095, the defendant shall be sentenced, pursuant to ORS 163.150, to
13 death, life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole or life imprisonment.

14 (b) A person sentenced to life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole under
15 this section shall not have that sentence suspended, deferred or commuted by any judicial officer,
16 and the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may not parole the prisoner nor reduce
17 the period of confinement in any manner whatsoever. The Department of Corrections or any execu-
18 tive official may not permit the prisoner to participate in any sort of release or furlough program.

19 (c) If sentenced to life imprisonment, the court shall order that the defendant shall be confined
20 for a minimum of 30 years without possibility of parole, release to post-prison supervision, release
21 on work release or any form of temporary leave or employment at a forest or work camp.

22 (2) At any time after completion of a minimum period of confinement pursuant to subsection
23 (1)(c) of this section, the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, upon the petition of a
24 prisoner so confined, shall hold a hearing to determine if the prisoner is likely to be rehabilitated
25 within a reasonable period of time. The sole issue is whether or not the prisoner is likely to be re-
26 habilitated within a reasonable period of time. At the hearing, the prisoner has:

7 163.115. (1) Except as provided in ORS 163.118 and 163.125, criminal homicide constitutes mur-
8 der:

9 (a) When it is committed intentionally, except that it is an affirmative defense that, at the time
10 of the homicide, the defendant was under the influence of an extreme emotional disturbance;

11 (b) When it is committed by a person, acting either alone or with one or more persons, who
12 commits or attempts to commit any of the following crimes and in the course of and in furtherance
13 of the crime the person is committing or attempting to commit, or during the immediate flight
14 therefrom, the person, or another participant if there be any, causes the death of a person other
15 than one of the participants:

16 (A) Arson in the first degree as defined in ORS 164.325;

17 (B) Criminal mischief in the first degree by means of an explosive as defined in ORS 164.365;

18 (C) Burglary in the first degree as defined in ORS 164.225;

19 (D) Escape in the first degree as defined in ORS 162.165;

20 (E) Kidnapping in the second degree as defined in ORS 163.225;

21 (F) Kidnapping in the first degree as defined in ORS 163.235;

22 (G) Robbery in the first degree as defined in ORS 164.415;

23 (H) Any felony sexual offense in the first degree defined in this chapter;

24 (I) Compelling prostitution as defined in ORS 167.017; or

31 Criminal Justice Commission may be given credit for all time thus served in any order or judgment
32 of confinement resulting from revocation of probation.

33 (8) In the case of any defendant whose sentence has been suspended but who has not been sen-
34 tenced to probation, the court may issue a warrant and cause the defendant to be arrested and
35 brought before the court at any time within the maximum period for which the defendant might or-
36 iginally have been sentenced. Thereupon the court, after summary hearing, may revoke the sus-
37 pension of sentence and cause the sentence imposed to be executed.

38 (9) If a probationer fails to appear or report to a court for further proceedings as required by
39 an order under subsection (3) of this section, the failure to appear may be prosecuted in the county
40 to which the probationer was ordered to appear or report.

41 (10) The probationer may admit or deny the violation by being physically present at the hearing
42 or by means of simultaneous electronic transmission as described in ORS 131.045.

43 (11)(a) The victim has the right:

44 (A) Upon request made within the time period prescribed in the notice required by ORS 147.417,
45 to be notified by the district attorney of any hearing before the court that may result in the revo-

2 (B) To appear personally at the hearing; and

3 (C) If present, to reasonably express any views relevant to the issues before the court.

43 (4) **After reviewing the report submitted under subsection (3) of this section, the super-**
44 **visory authority may extend the active post-prison supervision period or return the offender**

42 (7) As used in this section:

43 (a) "Downward departure" means a downward dispositional departure or a downward
44 durational departure under the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

45 (b) "Previous conviction" has the meaning given that term in ORS 137.717.

1 **SECTION 32.** ORS 137.545, as amended by section 20 of this 2009 Act, is amended to read:

43 (7) The amendments to ORS 421.121 by section 19 of this 2009 Act apply to inmates who:

44 (a) Are sentenced for a crime committed on or after July 1, 2013; and

45 (b) Are not prohibited by any other provision of law from obtaining a reduction in the

1 term of incarceration under ORS 421.121.

2 (8) The amendments to ORS 137.545 by section 20 of this 2009 Act apply to crimes com-
3 mitted before July 1, 2011.

4 (9) Section 21 of this 2009 Act applies to persons:

5 (a) Convicted of a crime committed before July 1, 2011; and

6 (b) Who are on probation on or after the effective date of the rules adopted by the De-
7 partment of Corrections under section 21 (3) of this 2009 Act.

8 (10) Section 31 of this 2009 Act applies to crimes committed:

9 (a) On or after February 15, 2010; and

10 (b) Before January 1, 2012.

11 (11) The amendments to ORS 137.545 by section 32 of this 2009 Act apply to crimes com-
12 mitted on or after July 1, 2011.

13 (12) Section 40 of this 2009 Act and the amendments to ORS 163.165 and 163.235 by
14 sections 39 and 43 of this 2009 Act apply to conduct occurring on or after the effective date
15 of this 2009 Act.

16 (13) Except as provided in subsection (14) of this section, section 23 of this 2009 Act ap-
17 plies to persons:

18 (a) Convicted of a crime committed before July 1, 2011; and

19 (b) Sentenced to the legal and physical custody of the supervisory authority under ORS
20 137.124 (2).

21 (14)(a) A person sentenced to the legal and physical custody of a supervisory authority
22 under ORS 137.124 (2) shall serve an active period of post-prison supervision of at least two
23 additional months if, on the effective date of this 2009 Act, the person has served:

24 (A) Four months or more of active post-prison supervision for crimes in crime categories
25 1 to 3; or

26 (B) Ten months or more of active post-prison supervision for crimes in crime categories
27 4 to 10.

28 (b) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, the supervisory authority shall
29 place an offender described in paragraph (a) of this subsection on inactive supervision status
30 on the date that is two months after the effective date of this 2009 Act.

31 (c) At any time before the date that is two months after the effective date of this 2009
32 Act:

33 (A) The parole and probation officer responsible for supervising an offender described in
34 paragraph (a) of this subsection may send a report described in section 23 (3) of this 2009
35 Act to the supervisory authority for review; and

36 (B) After reviewing the report, the supervisory authority may extend the active post-
37 prison supervision period in accordance with section 23 (4) of this 2009 Act.

38 (d) Section 23 of this 2009 Act and the provisions of this subsection and subsection (13)
39 of this section do not apply to a person sentenced to the legal and physical custody of a su-
40 pervisory authority under ORS 137.124 (2) whose term of active post-prison supervision im-
41 posed by the sentencing court expires on or before the date that is two months after the
42 effective date of this 2009 Act.

43 **SECTION 50.** This 2009 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public
44 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2009 Act takes effect
45 on its passage.
