Appropriates moneys from General Fund to Department of Corrections for certain biennial expenses.

Limits certain biennial expenditures from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by department.

Limits biennial expenditures by department from federal funds.

Reduces, for biennium ending June 30, 2009, certain appropriations from General Fund

Increases, for biennium ending June 30, 2009, appropriations from General Fund to department for community corrections.

Declares emergency, effective [July 1, 2009] on passage.

17	SECTION 6. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation	
18	made to the Department of Corrections for debt service established by section 1 (5), chapter	
19	594, Oregon Laws 2007, for the biennium ending June 30, 2009, is reduced by \$77,311.	
20	SECTION 7. This 2009 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public	
21	peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2009 Act takes effect	

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on its passage.
