House Joint Resolution 52

Sponsored by Representative THATCHER

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Urges Oregonians to help preserve Oregon's history and history of circuit riders.

1	JOINT RESOLUTION
2	Whereas the Legislative Assembly believes it is important that Oregonians remember and sus-
3	tain Oregon's heritage by preserving records of Oregon's history; and
4	Whereas itinerant preachers known as circuit riders traveled on horseback around the Oregon
5	Territory and played an important role in Oregon's early history; and
6	Whereas circuit rider Jason Lee came to the Oregon Territory in 1834 to establish a mission for
7	Native Americans, eventually settling near the present site of downtown Salem; and
8	Whereas the mission's school was built in 1841 and was transformed into the Oregon Institute
9	in 1844; and
10	Whereas Jason Lee and other circuit riders were instrumental in forming the Oregon Territory's
11	provisional government, which was sworn into office on July 5, 1843; and
12	Whereas the original Oregon Institute building was constructed on what is now the campus of
13	Willamette University and housed the first session of the legislature to meet in Salem and the first
14	United States court in the Oregon Territory; and
15	Whereas Oregon became the 33rd state in the Union in 1859, more than 20 years after Jason
16	Lee traveled to Washington, D.C., to petition for statehood; and
17	Whereas an equestrian statue was unveiled in 1924 on the east lawn of the State Capitol in
18	honor of circuit rider Robert Booth and to commemorate the achievements of all the circuit riders;
19	and
20	Whereas the history of the circuit riders has not been adequately recorded and is in danger of
21	being lost; now, therefore,
22	Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:
23	That we, the members of the Seventy-fifth Legislative Assembly, encourage all Oregonians to
24	participate in the efforts of groups that are working to preserve Oregon's history, particularly the
25	history of the circuit riders.
