A-Engrossed Senate Bill 441

Ordered by the Senate May 5 Including Senate Amendments dated May 5

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND GENERAL GOVERNMENT

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Creates Task Force on School Reform. Directs task force to study reform of kindergarten through grade 12 public schools and make recommendations.]

[Declares emergency, effective on passage.]

Specifies that Department of Education is not required to conduct evaluations related to funds received from School Improvement Fund during 2009-2011 biennium.

Specifies that Superintendent of Public Instruction is not required to issue school district

and school performance reports during 2009-2011 biennium.

Specifies that school districts are not required to administer certain programs and perform certain duties during 2009-2011 biennium. Specifies that Superintendent of Public Instruction may not withhold any State School Fund moneys from school districts for not administering those programs or performing those duties.

Removes requirement that school districts send copies of school district and school per-

formance reports to parents.

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Changes circumstances under which school district must submit local district continuous improvement plan to Department of Education.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2009.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

- Relating to education; creating new provisions; amending ORS 329.095 and 329.105; and declaring an emergency.
- 4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
 - SECTION 1. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 326.051, during the 2009-2011 biennium, the State Board of Education may not require school districts to meet any of the requirements that have been suspended under sections 2 to 16 of this 2009 Act.
 - (2) Notwithstanding ORS 327.103, during the 2009-2011 biennium, the Superintendent of Public Instruction may not withhold any State School Fund moneys from school districts for not complying with any of the requirements that have been suspended under sections 2 to 16 of this 2009 Act.
 - SECTION 2. Notwithstanding ORS 327.297, during the 2009-2011 biennium, the Department of Education is not required to conduct evaluations related to funds received from the School Improvement Fund and school districts are not required to provide any information that would have been used for the evaluations.
 - SECTION 3. Notwithstanding ORS 329.105, during the 2009-2011 biennium, the Superintendent of Public Instruction is not required to issue school district and school performance reports and school districts are not required to provide any information that would have been required for the reports.
 - SECTION 4. Notwithstanding ORS 329.485 (6), during the 2009-2011 biennium, school dis-

tricts are not required to make alternative placements available to students who do not meet or exceed the academic content standards within one year.

SECTION 5. Notwithstanding ORS 329.498 and 329.499, during the 2009-2011, school districts are not required to collect data and report on the number of minutes of physical education that are provided to students, the physical capacity of public schools to provide physical education or the additional facilities required by public schools to provide physical education.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> Notwithstanding ORS 336.222, during the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to provide alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs.

<u>SECTION 7.</u> Notwithstanding ORS 337.050, during the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to purchase instructional materials for the time periods prescribed by the State Board of Education.

SECTION 8. Notwithstanding ORS 340.085, the Department of Education is not required to report on the Expanded Options Program and school districts are not required to provide any of the information that would have been used for the report.

SECTION 9. Notwithstanding ORS 342.610, during the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to provide a minimum salary to substitute teachers and may pay substitute teachers for less than one-half day.

SECTION 10. Notwithstanding ORS 343.407 and 343.409, during the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to identify talented and gifted students or provide educational programs and services to talented and gifted students.

SECTION 11. During the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to provide a minimum amount of instructional time each day to students or a minimum number of instructional days each school year.

<u>SECTION 12.</u> During the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to provide guidance and counseling programs.

<u>SECTION 13.</u> During the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to provide media programs.

SECTION 14. During the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to comply with any restrictions on the size of classes imposed by the State Board of Education.

<u>SECTION 15.</u> During the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to participate in surveys conducted by the Department of Education to determine the level of readiness of children entering kindergarten.

<u>SECTION 16.</u> During the 2009-2011 biennium, school districts are not required to provide compliance with state standards unless:

- (1) The school district adopts a new standard, in which case the school district must report only on the new standard; or
- (2) The school district did not comply with all of the standards for the previous reporting period, in which case the school district must report only on the standards for which the school district was not in compliance.

SECTION 17. ORS 329.105 is amended to read:

329.105. (1) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall collect data and produce annual school district and school performance reports containing information on student performance, student behavior and school characteristics. The purpose of the performance reports is to provide information to parents and to improve schools through greater parental involvement.

- (2)(a) In consultation with representatives of parents, teachers, school district boards and school administrators, the State Board of Education shall adopt, by rule, criteria for identifying outstanding schools, satisfactory schools and schools in need of improvement. Such criteria shall take into account student performance, improvement in student performance, the participation rate of students on the statewide assessments, student attendance rates and graduation rates. The Superintendent of Public Instruction, based on the criteria adopted by the State Board of Education, shall assign a rating to each school that identifies the school as outstanding, satisfactory or in need of improvement.
- (b) The ratings received by a school shall be included in the school district and school performance reports.
- (c) If a school is designated as in need of improvement, the school shall file a school improvement plan with the Superintendent of Public Instruction and with the school district board.
- (d) The Department of Education shall work with stakeholders to design and implement an accountability system of progressive interventions for and provide technical assistance to schools and school districts that do not demonstrate improvement.
- (3) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall include in the school performance reports data for the following areas, for each school, that are available to the Department of Education from the most recent school year:
 - (a) Enrollment in English as a second language courses under ORS 336.079;
- 20 (b) Attendance rates;

- (c) School safety, such as expulsions involving weapons in the school;
- 22 (d) Disaggregated data on students who met or exceeded the academic content standards estab-23 lished by the board;
 - (e) Dropout rates and the number of students who dropped out of school;
 - (f) Parent and community involvement such as volunteer hours;
 - (g) The percentage of classes taught by a teacher identified as highly qualified under rules adopted by the United States Department of Education; and
 - (h) School staff, identified by category.
 - (4) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall include in the school district performance reports data for the following areas, for each school district, that are available to the Department of Education from the most recent school year:
 - (a) Resident students who attend a public school in another school district;
 - (b) Facilities used for distance learning;
 - (c) Election results of any bond levy proposed to the electors of the district;
 - (d) Expenditures;
 - (e) Level of support from the education service district;
 - (f) Administrators not assigned to a specific school;
 - (g) School district staff, identified by category; and
- 39 (h) Students who are eligible for special education.
 - (5) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall notify the public and the media by January 30 of each year that school district and school performance reports are available at schools and school districts and at the Department of Education website and offices. The superintendent shall also include notice that copies of school improvement plans and district continuous improvement plans can be obtained from school and school district offices. Each school district shall [send a copy of] notify the parents of children enrolled in a public school in the school district that the

school district and applicable school performance reports are available on the Department of Education website and shall, upon the request of a parent, send [to each parent of a child enrolled in a public school in the school district] a copy of the reports to the parent.

SECTION 18. ORS 329.095 is amended to read:

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329.095. (1) The Department of Education shall require school districts and schools to conduct self-evaluations and update their local district continuous improvement plans on a biennial basis. The self-evaluation process shall involve the public in the setting of local goals. The school districts shall ensure that representatives from the demographic groups of their school population are invited to participate in the development of local district continuous improvement plans to achieve the goals.

- (2) As part of setting local goals, school districts shall undertake a communications process that involves parents, students, teachers, school employees and community representatives to explain and discuss the local goals and their relationship to programs under this chapter.
- (3) At the request of the school district, department staff shall provide ongoing technical assistance in the development and implementation of the local district continuous improvement plan.
 - (4) The local district continuous improvement plan shall include:
 - (a) A rigorous curriculum aligned with state standards;
 - (b) High-quality instructional programs;
- (c) Short-term and long-term professional development plans;
- 20 (d) Programs and policies to achieve a safe educational environment;
- 21 (e) A plan for family and community engagement;
- 22 (f) Staff leadership development;
 - (g) High-quality data systems;
 - (h) Improvement planning that is data-driven;
- 25 (i) Education service plans for students who have or have not exceeded all of the academic content standards;
 - (j) A review of demographics, student performance, staff characteristics and student access to, and use of, educational opportunities; and
 - (k) District efforts to achieve local efficiencies and efforts to make better use of resources.
 - (5) A school district must submit a local district continuous improvement plan to the Department of Education only when the school district sets a new local goal or changes an existing local goal.

SECTION 19. This 2009 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2009 Act takes effect July 1, 2009.

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
