## SENATE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL 858

In line 2 of the printed bill, delete "; and appropriating money".

2	After line 2, insert:
3	"Whereas nearly 29 percent of Oregon's eighth-graders and more than 46 percent of Oregon's
4	eleventh-graders reported regular alcohol use last year, and nearly 38,000 youths in Oregon may
5	have a serious alcohol problem; and
6	"Whereas young people in Oregon who begin drinking alcoholic beverages before 15 years of
7	age are four times more likely to develop alcohol dependence than those who begin drinking at 21
8	years of age or later; and
9	"Whereas the younger a person is when the person starts drinking alcoholic beverages, the more
10	likely the person is to become alcoholic; and
11	"Whereas alcohol is the most frequently used drug by high school and middle school students
12	in Oregon; and
13	"Whereas the brain goes through dynamic changes in adolescence and alcohol can seriously
14	damage long-term and short-term growth processes; and
15	"Whereas alcohol use is the leading cause of death among youths and contributes substantially
16	to motor vehicle crashes, traumatic injuries, suicides and family and school problems among ado-
17	lescents; and
18	"Whereas alcohol is a factor in two-thirds of all sexual assaults and date rapes of teens and
19	college students and contributes to unprotected sex among youths, increasing their risk of con-
20	tracting human immunodeficiency virus or other sexually transmitted diseases; now, therefore,".
21	In line 4, before "The" insert "Subject to the availability of funds dedicated to the purpose,".
22	In line 7, before "The" insert "Subject to the availability of funds dedicated to the purpose,".
23	Delete lines 10 through 17 and insert:
24	"SECTION 3. The State Board of Education, the Department of Education and the De-
25	partment of Human Services shall work collaboratively to develop methods for:
26	"(1) Ensuring that district school boards and schools in this state comply with ORS
27	336.222 and the rules adopted by the State Board of Education relating to underage alcohol
28	use prevention; and
29	"(2) Working with schools and their local communities to implement effective strategies
30	for preventing underage alcohol use.".

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
