# Senate Bill 1043

Sponsored by Senators COURTNEY, FERRIOLI, DEVLIN (Presession filed.)

### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Allows legislative staff to explain vote of member of Legislative Assembly on measures referred to voters.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to elections; amending ORS 260.432; and declaring an emergency.

**3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:** 

4 **SECTION 1.** ORS 260.432 is amended to read:

5 260.432. (1) No person shall attempt to, or actually, coerce, command or require a public em-6 ployee to influence or give money, service or other thing of value to promote or oppose any political 7 committee or to promote or oppose the nomination or election of a candidate, the gathering of sig-8 natures on an initiative, referendum or recall petition, the adoption of a measure or the recall of a 9 public office holder.

10 (2) No public employee shall solicit any money, influence, service or other thing of value or 11 otherwise promote or oppose any political committee or promote or oppose the nomination or 12 election of a candidate, the gathering of signatures on an initiative, referendum or recall petition, 13 the adoption of a measure or the recall of a public office holder while on the job during working 14 hours. However, this section does not restrict the right of a public employee to express personal 15 political views.

(3) Each public employer shall have posted in a conspicuous place likely to be seen by its employees the following notice in printed or typewritten form:

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#### ATTENTION ALL PUBLIC EMPLOYEES:

The restrictions imposed by the law of the State of Oregon on your political activities are that "No public employee shall solicit any money, influence, service or other thing of value or otherwise promote or oppose any political committee or promote or oppose the nomination or election of a candidate, the gathering of signatures on an initiative, referendum or recall petition, the adoption of a measure or the recall of a public office holder while on the job during working hours. However, this section does not restrict the right of a public employee to express personal political views."

It is therefore the policy of the state and of your public employer that you may engage in political activity except to the extent prohibited by state law when on the job during working hours.
