FISCAL IMPACT OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Seventy-Sixth Oregon Legislative Assembly – 2011 Regular Session Legislative Fiscal Office

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Measure Description:

Creates Citizens' Initiative Review Commission to oversee review of state initiative measures by citizen panels.

Government Unit(s) Affected:

Secretary of State, Legislative Administration, Department of Administrative Services (DAS), Legislative Fiscal Office

Expenditure Impact:

Local Government Mandate:

This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Analysis:

HB 2634 – A Engrossed creates an 11-member Citizens' Initiative Review Commission within the executive branch of state government, charged with ensuring that citizen panels are convened to review initiated measures in a fair and impartial manner.

This fiscal impact statement is for the purpose of transmitting the measure from the House Committee on Rules to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.

New State Agency

The bill establishes the Citizens Initiative Review Fund; authorizes the Commission to accept contributions of moneys and assistance from certain public and private sources; and requires the Commission to make public certain contributions. Interest earned on the fund shall be credited to the fund. Moneys in the fund are continuously appropriated to the commission. While the fiscal impact of establishing a new state agency and for the Treasurer to establish a new account is minimal, the Legislative Fiscal Office (LFO) notes the following:

- The establishment of a new continuously appropriated fund, that is not associated with an
 existing state agency, means that the Department of Administrative Services will need to
 establish a new state agency;
- A new state agency will have an Other Funds expenditure limitation that is subject to the state's budgetary process;
- The revenue source(s) supporting this new fund have yet to be identified.

Furthermore, the expenditure impact associated with this bill is still being determined. The bill authorizes the Commission to appoint an executive director and to enter into contracts to hire staff. If there is sufficient funding, the Commission is required to select citizens for panels to review state measures proposed by initiative petition to be voted on at a general election. The Commission is required to compensate each citizen panelist for each day served on the panel in an amount calculated using the average weekly wage of workers in covered employment in Oregon, as determined by the Employment Department, for the last quarter of the calendar year preceding the fiscal year in which compensation is paid. Citizen panelists are also entitled to reimbursements for travel expenses.

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Department of Administrative Services (DAS)

The bill directs DAS to pay any expenses incurred in the initial appointment and organization of the Citizens' Initiative Review Commission. When the Commission determines that moneys in sufficient amount are available in the Citizens' Initiative Review Fund, the Commission is required to reimburse DAS, without interest.

Legislative Assembly

Members of the Commission who are members of the Legislative Assembly are entitled to compensation and expense reimbursement. The Legislative Assembly budget contains funding for the participation of legislators on interim committees. If the cumulative effect of the enactment of other bills exceeds expenditure levels assumed in Legislative Administration's budget, Legislative Administration may need to seek additional resources.

Secretary of State

HB 2634 requires the Secretary of State to set by rule a date by which statements drafted by the citizens' panel must be filed. The Secretary of State is also directed to prescribe the size and manner of placement of the statements submitted by the citizens' panel to be printed in the voters' pamphlet. The bill requires the Commission to transfer to the Secretary of State all moneys necessary to pay the costs of printing any statements submitted by the citizens' panel to be printed in the voters' pamphlet.

A more complete fiscal analysis on the bill will be prepared as the measure is considered in the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.

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
