WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Requires Department of Administrative Services (DAS) to establish policies, methods, and means by which it and other public agencies, by intergovernmental agreement, will manage motor pool resources cost-effectively and efficiently. Requires DAS to establish a pilot program with at least one public agency. Requires DAS to report on the costs, benefits, and effectiveness of its actions each biennium to the Legislative Assembly.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Government Efficiency Task Force's emphasis on collaborating with local government
- Unanimous support of the Task Force for increased partnership and consolidation of motor pool services
- Multiple government motor pools operated separately in Lane County
- Size of all motor pools in Oregon
- Effort to remove redundancy
- Existing intergovernmental agreements for motor pool services

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT: Clarifies that the intergovernmental agreements referenced are for the purpose of establishing a motor pool for common use. Deletes pilot program with public safety agency. Specifies that the bill does not apply to procuring or equipping emergency services vehicles.

BACKGROUND: House Bill 2920 (2009) created the Task Force on Effective and Cost-Efficient Service Provision. The Task Force was charged with reviewing state and county shared services in four areas: Assessment and Taxation, Elections, Human Services, and Criminal Justice, with the objective of considering a redistribution of functions in those areas. It examined the system of delivering services, with a focus on restructuring government to be more effective and cost-efficient. Its recommendations aimed to achieve clarification and rationalization of what currently exists, and how functions can be transferred when warranted.

The Task Force Subcommittee on Criminal Justice put forth a recommendation for encouraging DAS Fleet Management and local agencies to foster increased partnership and consolidation of motor pool services. House Bill 2854 is a result of that recommendation.
