House Bill 2415

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Directs Department of State Police to adopt rules identifying states that allow holder of Oregon concealed handgun license to carry concealed handgun and have substantially similar eligibility requirements.

Provides nonresidents who are licensed to carry concealed handgun in state identified by Department of State Police with protections provided to persons with Oregon concealed handgun license.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

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4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 166.173 is amended to read:

6 166.173. (1) A city or county may adopt ordinances to regulate, restrict or prohibit the pos-

7 session of loaded firearms in public places as defined in ORS 161.015.

- 8 (2) Ordinances adopted under subsection (1) of this section do not apply to or affect:
- 9 (a) A law enforcement officer in the performance of official duty.
- 10 (b) A member of the military in the performance of official duty.
- 11 (c) A person who is licensed under ORS 166.291 and 166.292 to carry a concealed handgun.
- 12 (d) A person who is not a resident of this state and who possesses a valid license that

the Department of State Police has determined by rule is a reciprocal license under section
6 of this 2011 Act.

[(d)] (e) A person authorized to possess a loaded firearm while in or on a public building or
 court facility under ORS 166.370.

[(e)] (f) An employee of the United States Department of Agriculture, acting within the scope
 of employment, who possesses a loaded firearm in the course of the lawful taking of wildlife.

19 **SECTION 2.** ORS 166.260 is amended to read:

20 166.260. (1) ORS 166.250 does not apply to or affect:

- (a) Sheriffs, constables, marshals, parole and probation officers, police officers, whether active
 or honorably retired, or other duly appointed peace officers.
- (b) Any person summoned by any such officer to assist in making arrests or preserving the
 peace, while said person so summoned is actually engaged in assisting the officer.
- 25 (c) The possession or transportation by any merchant of unloaded firearms as merchandise.

A peace officer may not arrest or charge a person for violating ORS 166.250 (1)(a) or 24 (b) or 166.370 (1) if the person has in the person's immediate possession: 25(1) A valid license to carry a firearm as provided in ORS 166.291 and 166.292; or 2627(2) If the person is not a resident of this state, a valid license that the Department of State Police has determined by rule is a reciprocal license under section 6 of this 2011 Act. 28SECTION 4. ORS 166.370 is amended to read: 2930 166.370. (1) Any person who intentionally possesses a loaded or unloaded firearm or any other 31 instrument used as a dangerous weapon, while in or on a public building, shall upon conviction be 32guilty of a Class C felony. (2)(a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a person who inten-33 34 tionally possesses: (A) A firearm in a court facility is guilty, upon conviction, of a Class C felony. A person who 35 intentionally possesses a firearm in a court facility shall surrender the firearm to a law enforcement 36 37 officer. 38 (B) A weapon, other than a firearm, in a court facility may be required to surrender the weapon to a law enforcement officer or to immediately remove it from the court facility. (2) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply to a person casting an artificial light: 38 (a) From the headlights of a motor vehicle that is being operated on a road in the usual manner. 39 (b) When the bow and arrow, rifle, gun, revolver or other firearm that the person has in the 40 possession or immediate physical presence of the person is disassembled or stored, or in the trunk 41 or storage compartment of the motor vehicle. 42 (c) When the ammunition or arrows are stored separate from the weapon. 43 (d) On land owned or lawfully occupied by that person. 44 (e) On publicly owned land when that person has an agreement with the public body to use that 45

1 property. 2 (f) When the person is a peace officer or government employee engaged in the performance of official duties. 3 (g) When the person has been issued a license under ORS 166.291 and 166.292 to carry a con-4 cealed weapon. 5 (h) When the person is not a resident of this state and possesses a valid license that the 6 Department of State Police has determined by rule is a reciprocal license under section 6 of 7 this 2011 Act. 8 9 (3) A peace officer may issue a citation to a person for a violation of subsection (1) of this section when the violation is committed in the presence of the peace officer or when the peace officer 10 has probable cause to believe that a violation has occurred based on a description of the vehicle 11 12 or other information received from a peace officer who observed the violation. (4) Violation of subsection (1) of this section is punishable as a Class B violation. 13 (5) As used in this section, "peace officer" has the meaning given that term in ORS 161.015. 14 15 SECTION 6. (1) As used in this section, "reciprocal license" means a license or permit issued in another state by a state or local law enforcement agency, a court or other issuing 16 authority that authorizes the licensee or permittee to carry a concealed handgun in the state 17 in which the license or permit was issued, if the other state: 18 19 (a) Authorizes a person who is licensed under ORS 166.291 and 166.292 to carry a concealed handgun in the other state; and 20(b) Imposes eligibility requirements for the issuance of the license or permit that are 2122substantially similar to the requirements of ORS 166.291 and 166.292. 23(2) The Department of State Police shall adopt rules that identify states that issue reciprocal licenses. 24SECTION 7. (1) Section 6 of this 2011 Act and the amendments to ORS 166.173, 166.260, 25166.262, 166.370 and 166.663 by sections 1 to 5 of this 2011 Act become operative on January 26271, 2012. (2) The Department of State Police may adopt rules or take any other action before the 28operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable the de-2930 partment to exercise, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this sec-31 tion, all the duties, functions and powers conferred on the department by this 2011 Act. SECTION 8. The amendments to ORS 166.173, 166.260, 166.262, 166.370 and 166.663 by 32sections 1 to 5 of this 2011 Act apply to conduct occurring on or after January 1, 2012. 33 34 SECTION 9. This 2011 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2011 Act takes effect 35 36 on its passage. 37
