House Bill 2674

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Presession filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Judiciary)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Reduces possession of user quantity of controlled substance in Schedules I and II to Class A misdemeanor. Punishes by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both. Defines "user quantity" as quantity of controlled substance that is less than quantities listed in ORS 475.900 (2)(b) and possession of which is not commercial drug offense.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 475.840 is amended to read:

6 475.840. (1) Except as authorized by ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980, it is unlawful

for [any] **a** person to manufacture or deliver a controlled substance. [Any] **A** person who violates this subsection with respect to:

9 (a) A controlled substance in Schedule I, is guilty of a Class A felony, except as otherwise provided in ORS [475.860] **475.886 and 475.890**.

(b) A controlled substance in Schedule II, is guilty of a Class B felony, except as otherwise
 provided in ORS 475.856, 475.858, 475.860, 475.862, 475.878, 475.880, 475.882, 475.888, [475.890,]

13 475.892, 475.904 and 475.906.

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(c) A controlled substance in Schedule III, is guilty of a Class C felony, except as otherwise

[any] a person to create or deliver a counterfeit substance. [Any] A person who violates this subsection with respect to:

34	(b) Unlawful possession of heroin is a Class A misdemeanor if the person possesses a user
35	quantity of heroin.
36	SECTION 3. ORS 475.864 is amended to read:
37	475.864. (1) It is unlawful for $[any]$ a person knowingly or intentionally to possess marijuana.
38	(2)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection and subsections (3) and (4)
39	of this section, unlawful possession of marijuana is a Class B felony.
40	(b) Except as provided in subsections (3) and (4) of this section, unlawful possession of
41	marijuana is a Class A misdemeanor if the person possesses a user quantity of marijuana.
42	(3) [Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section,] Unlawful possession of marijuana is a vio-
43	lation if the amount possessed is less than one avoirdupois ounce of the dried leaves, stems and

14	misdemeanor if the person possesses a user quantity of

17	475.884. (1) It is unlawful for $[any]$ a person knowingly or intentionally to possess cocaine unless
18	the substance was obtained directly from, or pursuant to, a valid prescription or order of a practi-
19	tioner while acting in the course of professional practice, or except as otherwise authorized by ORS
20	475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980.
21	(2)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, unlawful possession of cocaine
22	is a Class C felony.
23	(b) Unlawful possession of cocaine is a Class A misdemeanor if the person possesses a
24	user quantity of cocaine.
25	SECTION 6. ORS 475.894 is amended to read:
26	475.894. (1) It is unlawful for $[any]$ a person knowingly or intentionally to possess methamphet-
27	amine unless the substance was obtained directly from, or pursuant to, a valid prescription or order
28	of a practitioner while acting in the course of professional practice, or except as otherwise author-
29	ized by ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980.
30	(2)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, unlawful possession of meth-
31	amphetamine is a Class C felony.
32	(b) Unlawful possession of methamphetamine is a Class A misdemeanor if the person
33	possesses a user quantity of methamphetamine.
34	SECTION 7. ORS 475.005 is amended to read:
35	475.005. As used in ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980, unless the context requires
36	otherwise:
37	(1) "Abuse" means the repetitive excessive use of a drug short of dependence, without legal or
38	medical supervision, which may have a detrimental effect on the individual or society.
39	(2) "Administer" means the direct application of a controlled substance, whether by injection,
40	inhalation, ingestion or any other means, to the body of a patient or research subject by:
41	(a) A practitioner or an authorized agent thereof; or
42	(b) The patient or research subject at the direction of the practitioner.
43	(3) "Administration" means the Drug Enforcement Administration of the United States Depart-
44	ment of Justice, or its successor agency.
45	(4) "Agent" means an authorized person who acts on behalf of or at the direction of a man-

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ufacturer, distributor or dispenser. It does not include a common or contract carrier, public 1 2 warehouseman or employee of the carrier or warehouseman. 3 (5) "Board" means the State Board of Pharmacy. (13) "Drug" means: 28(a) Substances recognized as drugs in the official United States Pharmacopoeia, official 2930 Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia of the United States or official National Formulary, or any supplement 31 to any of them; 32(b) Substances intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of 33 disease in humans or animals; 34 (c) Substances (other than food) intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of 35 humans or animals; and (d) Substances intended for use as a component of any article specified in paragraph (a), (b) or 36 37 (c) of this subsection; however, the term does not include devices or their components, parts or ac-38 cessories. (14) "Electronically transmitted" or "electronic transmission" means a communication sent or 39 received through technological apparatuses, including computer terminals or other equipment or 40 mechanisms linked by telephone or microwave relays, or any similar apparatus having electrical, 41 digital, magnetic, wireless, optical, electromagnetic or similar capabilities. 42 (15) "Manufacture" means the production, preparation, propagation, compounding, conversion 43 or processing of a controlled substance, either directly or indirectly by extraction from substances 44 of natural origin, or independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a combination of extraction 45

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1 and chemical synthesis, and includes any packaging or repackaging of the substance or labeling or

2 relabeling of its container, except that this term does not include the preparation or compounding

3 of a controlled substance:

4 (a) By a practitioner as an incident to administering or dispensing of a controlled substance in 5 the course of professional practice; or

6 (b) By a practitioner, or by an authorized agent under the practitioner's supervision, for the 7 purpose of, or as an incident to, research, teaching or chemical analysis and not for sale.

8 (16) "Marijuana":

9 (a) Except as provided in this subsection, means all parts of the plant Cannabis family 10 Moraceae, whether growing or not; the resin extracted from any part of the plant; and every com-11 pound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant or its resin.

(b) Does not mean the mature stalks of the plant, fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, any other compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the mature stalks (except the resin extracted therefrom), fiber, oil, or cake, or the sterilized seed of the plant which is incapable of germination.

(c) Does not mean industrial hemp, as defined in ORS 571.300, or industrial hemp commodities
 or products.

(17) "Person" includes a government subdivision or agency, business trust, estate, trust or anyother legal entity.

(18) "Practitioner" means physician, dentist, veterinarian, scientific investigator, certified nurse practitioner, physician assistant or other person licensed, registered or otherwise permitted by law to dispense, conduct research with respect to or to administer a controlled substance in the course of professional practice or research in this state but does not include a pharmacist or a pharmacy.

(19) "Prescription" means a written, oral or electronically transmitted direction, given by a practitioner for the preparation and use of a drug. When the context requires, "prescription" also means the drug prepared under such written, oral or electronically transmitted direction. Any label affixed to a drug prepared under written, oral or electronically transmitted direction shall prominently display a warning that the removal thereof is prohibited by law.

(20) "Production" includes the manufacture, planting, cultivation, growing or harvesting of a
 controlled substance.

(21) "Research" means an activity conducted by the person registered with the federal Drug
 Enforcement Administration pursuant to a protocol approved by the United States Food and Drug
 Administration.

(22) "Ultimate user" means a person who lawfully possesses a controlled substance for the use
of the person or for the use of a member of the household of the person or for administering to an
animal owned by the person or by a member of the household of the person.

(23) "User quantity" means a quantity of a controlled substance:

(a) That is less than the quantities listed in ORS 475.900 (2)(b); and

(b) The possession of which is not a commercial drug offense within the meaning of ORS
475.900 (1)(b).

41 SECTION 8. ORS 161.570 is amended to read:

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42 161.570. (1) As used in this section, "nonperson felony" has the meaning given that term in the
43 rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

44 (2) A district attorney may elect to treat a Class C nonperson felony or a [violation of] felony 45 described in ORS 475.840 (3)(a), 475.854, 475.864 [(2)] or 475.874 as a Class A misdemeanor. The

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election must be made by the district attorney orally or in writing at the time of the first appearance of the defendant. If a district attorney elects to treat a Class C felony or a [violation of] felony
described in ORS 475.840 (3)(a), 475.854, 475.864 [(2)] or 475.874 as a Class A misdemeanor under
this subsection, the court shall amend the accusatory instrument to reflect the charged offense as
a Class A misdemeanor.

(3) If, at some time after the first appearance of a defendant charged with a Class C nonperson

20 <u>SECTION 9.</u> This 2011 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 21 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2011 Act takes effect 22 on its passage.

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
