

House Bill 2699

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Pre-session filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Judiciary)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Modifies crime of prostitution.

Creates crime of patronizing a prostitute. Punishes by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 167.007 is amended to read:

6 167.007. (1) A person commits the crime of prostitution if[.]

7 [(a)] the person engages in, or offers or agrees to engage in, sexual conduct or sexual contact
8 in return for a fee.]; or]

9 [(b) *The person pays or offers or agrees to pay a fee to engage in sexual conduct or sexual*
10 *contact.*]

11 (2) Prostitution is a Class A misdemeanor.

12 **SECTION 2.** **Section 3 of this 2011 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 167.007 to**
13 **167.017.**

14 **SECTION 3.** (1) **A person commits the crime of patronizing a prostitute if the person**
15 **pays, or offers or agrees to pay, a fee to engage in sexual conduct or sexual contact.**

16 **(2) Patronizing a prostitute is a Class A misdemeanor.**

17 **SECTION 4.** ORS 12.117 is amended to read:

18 12.117. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 12.110, 12.115 or 12.160, an action based on conduct that con-
19 stitutes child abuse or conduct knowingly allowing, permitting or encouraging child abuse that oc-
20 curs while the person is under 18 years of age must be commenced before the person attains 40
21 years of age, or if the person has not discovered the causal connection between the injury and the
22 child abuse, nor in the exercise of reasonable care should have discovered the causal connection
23 between the injury and the child abuse, not more than five years from the date the person discovers
24 or in the exercise of reasonable care should have discovered the causal connection between the
25 child abuse and the injury, whichever period is longer.

26 (2) As used in subsection (1) of this section, "child abuse" means any of the following:

27 (a) Intentional conduct by an adult that results in:

28 (A) Any physical injury to a child; or

29 (B) Any mental injury to a child which results in observable and substantial impairment of the
30 child's mental or psychological ability to function caused by cruelty to the child, with due regard

1 to the culture of the child;

2 (b) Rape of a child, which includes but is not limited to rape, sodomy, unlawful sexual pene-
3 tration and incest, as those acts are defined in ORS chapter 163;

4 (c) Sexual abuse, as defined in ORS chapter 163, when the victim is a child; or

5 (d) Sexual exploitation of a child, including but not limited to:

6 (A) Conduct constituting violation of ORS 163.435 and any other conduct which allows, employs,
7 authorizes, permits, induces or encourages a child to engage in the performing for people to observe
8 or the photographing, filming, tape recording or other exhibition which, in whole or in part, depicts
9 sexual conduct or contact; and

10 (B) Allowing, permitting, encouraging or hiring a child to engage in prostitution **or to patronize**
11 **a prostitute**, as defined in ORS chapter 167.

12 (3) Nothing in this section creates a new cause of action or enlarges any existing cause of
13 action.

14 **SECTION 5.** ORS 90.396 is amended to read:

15 90.396. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, after at least 24 hours' written
16 notice specifying the acts and omissions constituting the cause and specifying the date and time of
17 the termination, the landlord may terminate the rental agreement and take possession as provided
18 in ORS 105.105 to 105.168, if:

19 (a) The tenant, someone in the tenant's control or the tenant's pet seriously threatens to inflict
20 substantial personal injury, or inflicts any substantial personal injury, upon a person on the prem-
21 ises other than the tenant;

22 (b) The tenant or someone in the tenant's control recklessly endangers a person on the premises
23 other than the tenant by creating a serious risk of substantial personal injury;

24 (c) The tenant, someone in the tenant's control or the tenant's pet inflicts any substantial per-
25 sonal injury upon a neighbor living in the immediate vicinity of the premises;

26 (d) The tenant or someone in the tenant's control intentionally inflicts any substantial damage
27 to the premises or the tenant's pet inflicts substantial damage to the premises on more than one
28 occasion;

29 (e)(A) The tenant intentionally provided substantial false information on the application for the
30 tenancy within the past year;

31 (B) The false information was with regard to a criminal conviction of the tenant that would have
32 been material to the landlord's acceptance of the application; and

33 (C) The landlord terminates the rental agreement within 30 days after discovering the falsity
34 of the information; or

35 (f) The tenant, someone in the tenant's control or the tenant's pet commits any act that is out-
36 rageous in the extreme, on the premises or in the immediate vicinity of the premises. For purposes
37 of this paragraph, an act is outrageous in the extreme if the act is not described in paragraphs (a)
38 to (e) of this subsection, but is similar in degree and is one that a reasonable person in that com-
39 munity would consider to be so offensive as to warrant termination of the tenancy within 24 hours,
40 considering the seriousness of the act or the risk to others. An act that is outrageous in the extreme
41 is more extreme or serious than an act that warrants a 30-day termination under ORS 90.392. Acts
42 that are "outrageous in the extreme" include, but are not limited to, the following acts by a person:

43 (A) Prostitution, **patronizing a prostitute** or [*promotion of*] **promoting** prostitution, as de-
44 scribed in ORS 167.007 and 167.012 **and section 3 of this 2011 Act**;

45 (B) Manufacture, delivery or possession of a controlled substance, as described in ORS 475.005,

1 but not including:

2 (i) The medical use of marijuana in compliance with ORS 475.300 to 475.346;

3 (ii) Possession of, or delivery for no consideration of, less than one avoirdupois ounce of
4 marijuana as described in ORS 475.860 (3) or 475.864 (3); or

5 (iii) Possession of prescription drugs;

6 (C) Intimidation, as described in ORS 166.155 and 166.165; or

7 (D) Burglary as described in ORS 164.215 and 164.225.

8 (2) If the cause for a termination notice given pursuant to subsection (1) of this section is based
9 upon the acts of the tenant's pet, the tenant may cure the cause and avoid termination of the
10 tenancy by removing the pet from the premises prior to the end of the notice period. The notice
11 must describe the right of the tenant to cure the cause. If the tenant returns the pet to the premises
12 at any time after having cured the violation, the landlord, after at least 24 hours' written notice
13 specifying the subsequent presence of the offending pet, may terminate the rental agreement and
14 take possession as provided in ORS 105.105 to 105.168. The tenant does not have a right to cure this
15 subsequent violation.

16 (3) For purposes of subsection (1) of this section, someone is in the tenant's control if that per-
17 son enters or remains on the premises with the tenant's permission or consent after the tenant
18 reasonably knows or should know of that person's act or likelihood to commit any act of the type
19 described in subsection (1) of this section.

20 (4) An act can be proven to be outrageous in the extreme even if the act is one that does not
21 violate a criminal statute. Notwithstanding the references to criminal statutes in subsection (1)(f)
22 of this section, the landlord's burden of proof in an action for possession under subsection (1) of this
23 section is the civil standard of proof by a preponderance of the evidence.

24 (5) If a good faith effort by a landlord to terminate the tenancy under subsection (1)(f) of this
25 section and to recover possession of the rental unit under ORS 105.105 to 105.168 fails by decision
26 of the court, the landlord may not be found in violation of any state statute or local ordinance re-
27 quiring the landlord to remove that tenant upon threat of fine, abatement or forfeiture as long as
28 the landlord continues to make a good faith effort to terminate the tenancy.

29 **SECTION 6.** ORS 105.555 is amended to read:

30 105.555. (1) The following are declared to be nuisances and shall be enjoined and abated as
31 provided in ORS 105.550 to 105.600:

32 (a) Any place that, as a regular course of business, is used for the purpose of prostitution and
33 any place where acts of prostitution **or patronizing a prostitute** occur;

34 (b) Any place that is used and maintained for profit and for the purpose of gambling or a lottery,
35 as defined in ORS 167.117, by any person, partnership or corporation organized for profit and
36 wherein take place any of the acts or wherein are kept, stored or located any of the games, devices
37 or things that are forbidden by or made punishable by ORS 167.108 to 167.164;

38 (c) Any place that has been determined to be not fit for use under ORS 453.876 and that has
39 not been decontaminated and certified as fit for use under ORS 453.885 within 180 days after the
40 determination under ORS 453.876; and

41 (d) Any place where activity involving the unauthorized delivery, manufacture or possession of
42 a controlled substance, as defined in ORS 475.005, occurs or any place wherein are kept, stored or
43 located any of the devices, equipment, things or substances used for unauthorized delivery, manu-
44 facture or possession of a controlled substance. As used in this paragraph, "devices, equipment,
45 things" does not include hypodermic syringes or needles. This paragraph does not apply to acts that

2 (2) Nothing in ORS 105.550 to 105.600, 166.715 and 167.158 applies to property to the extent that
3 the devices, equipment, things or substances that are used for delivery, manufacture or possession
4 of a controlled substance are kept, stored or located in or on the property for the purpose of lawful
5 sale or use of these items.

34 133.724. (1) An ex parte order for the interception of wire, electronic or oral communications
 35 may be issued by any circuit court judge upon written application made upon oath or affirmation
 36 of the individual who is the district attorney or a deputy district attorney authorized by the district
 37 attorney for the county in which the order is sought. The application shall include:

38 (a) The name of the district attorney or the deputy district attorney making the application and
 39 the authority of the district attorney or the deputy district attorney to make the application;

40 (b) The identity of the investigative or law enforcement officer making the application and the
 41 officer authorizing the application;

42 (c) A statement demonstrating that there is probable cause to believe that an individual is
 43 committing, has committed or is about to commit:

44 (A) A particular felony of murder, kidnapping, arson, robbery, bribery, extortion or other crime
 45 dangerous to life and punishable as a felony;

1 (B) A crime punishable as a felony under ORS 166.720, 475.840, 475.846 to 475.894 or 475.904 to
 2 475.910 or as a misdemeanor under ORS 167.007 **or section 3 of this 2011 Act**; or

3 (C) Any conspiracy to commit any of the foregoing crimes;

4 (d) A statement of the details, if known, of the particular crime alleged under paragraph (c) of
 5 this subsection;

6 (e) A particular description of the nature and location of the facilities from which or the place
 7 where the wire, electronic or oral communication is to be intercepted, if known;

8 (f) A particular description of the type of wire, electronic or oral communication sought to be
 9 intercepted;

10 (g) The identity of the person, if known, suspected of committing the crime and whose wire,
 11 electronic or oral communications are to be intercepted;

12 (h) A full and complete statement as to whether or not other investigative procedures have been
 13 tried and failed or why other investigative procedures reasonably appear to be unlikely to succeed
 14 if tried or are likely to be too dangerous;

15 (i) A statement of the period of time for which the interception is required to be maintained. If
 16 the nature of the investigation is such that the authorization for interception should not automat-
 17 ically terminate when the described type of wire, electronic or oral communication has been first
 18 obtained, a description of facts establishing probable cause to believe that additional communi-
 19 cations of the same type will occur thereafter;

20 (j) A statement as to whether any prior application has been made to intercept wire, electronic
 21 or oral communications from the same person and, if such prior application exists, a statement of
 22 the current status of that application; and

23 (k) Where the application is for the extension of an existing order, a statement setting forth the
 24 results thus far obtained from the interception, or a reasonable explanation of the failure to obtain
 25 such results.

26 (2) The judge may require the applicant to furnish further testimony or documentary evidence
 27 in support of the application.

28 (3) Upon examination of such application and evidence the judge may enter an ex parte order,
 29 as requested or as modified, authorizing or approving interception of wire, electronic or oral com-
 30 munications within the state if the judge determines on the basis of the facts submitted by the ap-
 31 plicant that:

32 (a) There is probable cause for belief that an individual is committing, has committed or is about
 33 to commit a particular crime described in subsection (1)(c) of this section;

34 (b) There is probable cause for belief that particular communications concerning that crime will
 35 be obtained through such interception;

36 (c) Normal investigative procedures have been tried and have failed or reasonably appear to be
 37 unlikely to succeed if tried or are likely to be too dangerous; and

38 (d) There is probable cause for belief that the facilities from which, or the place where, the wire,
 39 electronic or oral communications to be intercepted are being used, or are about to be used, in
 40 connection with the planning or the commission of that crime are open to the public or are owned
 41 by, leased to, listed in the name of, or commonly used by the individual suspected.

42 (4) Each order authorizing or approving the interception of any wire, electronic or oral com-
 43 munication shall specify:

44 (a) The identity of the person, if known, whose communications are to be intercepted;

45 (b) The nature and location of the communications facilities as to which, or the place where,

1 authority to intercept is granted;

2 (c) A particular description of the type of communication sought to be intercepted, and a state-
3 ment of the particular crime to which it relates;

4 (d) The identity of the agency authorized to intercept the communications and of the person
5 authorizing the application;

6 (e) The period of time during which such interception is authorized, including a statement as to
7 whether or not the interception shall automatically terminate when the described communication
8 has been first obtained; and

9 (f) The name of the applicant, date of issuance, and the signature and title of the issuing judge.

10 (5) An order entered pursuant to this section may not authorize or approve the interception of
11 any wire, electronic or oral communication for any period longer than is necessary to achieve the
12 objective of authorization and in no event for longer than 30 days. Extensions of any order may be
13 granted, but only when application for an extension is made in accordance with subsection (1)(k)
14 of this section and the court makes the findings required by subsection (3) of this section. The period
15 of extension shall be no longer than the authorizing judge deems necessary to achieve the purpose
16 for which it is granted and in no event for longer than 30 days. Every order and extension of that
