## SUMMARY

**Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

### **PRESUMPTIVE FINES FOR VIOLATIONS**

**SECTION 1. Sections 2 to 4 and 6b of this 2011 Act are added to and made a part of ORS chapter 153.**

**SECTION 2. Presumptive fines; generally. (1) Except as provided in section 3 of this 2011 Act, the presumptive fines for violations are:**

- (a) \$435 for a Class A violation.**
- (b) \$260 for a Class B violation.**
- (c) \$160 for a Class C violation.**
- (d) \$110 for a Class D violation.**

**(2) The presumptive fine for a specific fine violation is:**

- (a) The amount specified by statute as the presumptive fine for the violation; or**
- (b) An amount equal to the greater of 20 percent of the maximum fine prescribed for the violation, or the minimum fine prescribed by statute for the violation.**

**SECTION 3. Presumptive fines; highway work zones, school zones and safety corridors.**

**(1) If an individual is charged with a traffic violation, as defined in ORS 801.557, and the enforcement officer issuing the citation notes on the citation that the offense occurred in a highway work zone and is subject to the provisions of ORS 811.230, occurred in a posted school zone and is subject to the provisions of ORS 811.235, or occurred in a safety corridor and is subject to the provisions of ORS 811.483, the presumptive fine for the violation is:**

- (a) \$870 for a Class A violation.**
- (b) \$520 for a Class B violation.**
- (c) \$320 for a Class C violation.**
- (d) \$220 for a Class D violation.**

**(2) The presumptive fine for a specific fine violation that is subject to this section is an amount equal to twice the presumptive fine determined for the violation under section 2 (2) of this 2011 Act.**

**SECTION 4. Minimum fine for violations. (1) Except as otherwise provided by law, a court may not defer, waive, suspend or otherwise reduce the fine for a violation that is subject to**

1 the presumptive fines established by section 2 (1) or 3 (1) of this 2011 Act to an amount that  
2 is less than:

- 3 (a) \$220 for a Class A violation.
- 4 (b) \$130 for a Class B violation.
- 5 (c) \$80 for a Class C violation.
- 6 (d) \$60 for a Class D violation.

7 (2) Except as otherwise provided by law, a court may not defer, waive, suspend or oth-  
8 erwise reduce the fine for a specific fine violation to an amount that is less than 20 percent  
9 of the presumptive fine for the violation.

10 (3) This section does not affect the manner in which a court imposes or reduces mone-  
11 tary obligations other than fines.

12 (4) The Department of Revenue or Secretary of State may audit any court to determine  
13 whether the court is complying with the requirements of this section. In addition, the De-  
14 partment of Revenue or Secretary of State may audit any court to determine whether the  
15 court is complying with the requirements of sections 33 to 38 and 47 to 50 of this 2011 Act.  
16 The Department of Revenue or Secretary of State may file an action under ORS 34.105 to  
17 34.240 to enforce the requirements of this section and of sections 33 to 38 and 47 to 50 of this  
18 2011 Act.

19 **SECTION 5.** ORS 153.093, 153.125, 153.128, 153.131, 153.134, 153.138, 153.142 and 153.145 are  
20 repealed.

21 **SECTION 6.** Sections 2 to 4 of this 2011 Act and the repeal of ORS 153.093, 153.125,  
22 153.128, 153.131, 153.134, 153.138, 153.142 and 153.145 by section 5 of this 2011 Act apply only  
23 to offenses committed on or after January 1, 2012. Any offense committed before January  
24 1, 2012, shall continue to be governed by ORS 153.093, 153.125, 153.128, 153.131, 153.134, 153.138,  
25 153.142 and 153.145 as in effect immediately before January 1, 2012.

26 **SECTION 6a.** ORS 153.015 is amended to read:

27 153.015. (1) An offense described in the Oregon Revised Statutes that is designated as a violation  
28 but does not specify the classification of the violation is an unclassified violation. An unclassified  
29 violation is a Class B violation.

30 (2) A specific fine violation is any offense described in the Oregon Revised Statutes that is  
31 **designated as a specific fine violation or:**

- 32 (a) Is not designated as a crime or as a class A, B, C or D violation;
- 33 (b) Is not punishable by a term of imprisonment as a penalty for committing the offense; and
- 34 (c) Is punishable by a specific fine as the penalty for committing the offense.

36 **REPLACEMENT FINE AMOUNT FOR UNITARY ASSESSMENT**

37  
38 **SECTION 6b.** (1) In any criminal action in which a fine is imposed, the lesser of the fol-  
39 lowing amounts is payable to the state before any other distribution of the fine is made:

- 40 (a) \$60; or
- 41 (b) The amount of the fine if the fine is less than \$60.

42 (2) A justice or municipal court shall forward the amount prescribed under subsection  
43 (1) of this section to the Department of Revenue for deposit in the Criminal Fine Account.

45 **MAXIMUM FINES FOR VIOLATIONS**

**SECTION 7.** ORS 153.018 is amended to read:

153.018. (1) The penalty for committing a violation is a fine. The law creating a violation may impose other penalties in addition to a fine but may not impose a term of imprisonment.

(2) *[Except as provided in this section, a sentence to pay a fine for a violation shall be a sentence to pay an amount not exceeding]* **Except as otherwise provided by law, the maximum fine for a violation committed by an individual is:**

(a) *[\$720]* **\$2,000** for a Class A violation.

(b) *[\$360]* **\$1,000** for a Class B violation.

(c) *[\$180]* **\$500** for a Class C violation.

(d) *[\$90]* **\$250** for a Class D violation.

(e) **\$2,000 for a specific fine violation, or the maximum** amount otherwise established by law for *[any]* **the** specific fine violation.

(3) *[If no special corporate fine is specified in the law creating the violation, a sentence to pay a fine for a violation committed by a corporation shall be in an amount not to exceed twice the fine established under this section for a violation by an individual.]* If a special corporate fine is specified in the law creating the violation, the sentence to pay a fine shall be governed by the law creating the violation. **Except as otherwise provided by law, if a special corporate fine is not specified in the law creating the violation, the maximum fine for a violation committed by a corporation is:**

(a) **\$4,000 for a Class A violation.**

(b) **\$2,000 for a Class B violation.**

(c) **\$1,000 for a Class C violation.**

(d) **\$500 for a Class D violation.**

*[(4) If a person or corporation has gained money or property through the commission of a violation, instead of sentencing the defendant to pay the fine provided for in subsection (2) or (3) of this section, the court may sentence the defendant to pay an amount fixed by the court, not exceeding double the amount of the defendant's gain from the commission of the violation. For the purposes of this subsection, the defendant's gain is the amount of money or the value of property, as determined under ORS 164.115, derived from the commission of the violation, less the amount of money or the value of property, as determined under ORS 164.115, returned to the victim of the violation or seized by or surrendered to lawful authority before the time sentence is imposed.]*

**SECTION 8.** The amendments to ORS 153.018 by section 7 of this 2011 Act apply only to offenses committed on or after January 1, 2012. Any offense committed before January 1, 2012, shall continue to be governed by ORS 153.018 as in effect immediately before January 1, 2012.

#### MINIMUM FINES FOR CRIMES

**SECTION 9.** Section 10 of this 2011 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 137.

**SECTION 10. Minimum fines for misdemeanors and felonies.** (1) Unless a specific minimum fine is provided by law, the minimum fine for a misdemeanor is \$100.

(2) Unless a specific minimum fine is provided by law, the minimum fine for a felony is \$200.

(3) A court may waive payment of the minimum fine established by this section, in whole or in part, if the court finds that requiring payment of the minimum fine would be incon-

1 **sistent with justice in the case. In making its determination under this subsection, the court**  
2 **shall consider:**

3 **(a) The financial resources of the defendant and the burden that payment of the mini-**  
4 **imum fine will impose, with due regard to the other obligations of the defendant; and**

5 **(b) The extent to which that burden can be alleviated by allowing the defendant to pay**  
6 **the monetary obligations imposed by the court on an installment basis or on other conditions**  
7 **to be fixed by the court.**

8 **(4) This section does not affect the manner in which a court imposes or reduces mone-**  
9 **tary obligations other than fines.**

10 **SECTION 11.** ORS 475.886 is amended to read:

11 475.886. (1) Except as authorized by ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980, it is unlawful  
12 for any person to manufacture methamphetamine.

13 (2) Unlawful manufacture of methamphetamine is a Class B felony.

14 **(3) The minimum fine for unlawful manufacture of methamphetamine is \$1,000.**

15 **SECTION 12.** ORS 475.888 is amended to read:

16 475.888. (1) Except as authorized by ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980, it is unlawful  
17 for any person to manufacture methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of the real property comprising  
18 a public or private elementary, secondary or career school attended primarily by minors.

19 (2) Unlawful manufacture of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a school is a Class A felony.

20 **(3) The minimum fine for unlawful manufacture of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet**  
21 **of a school is \$1,000.**

22 **SECTION 13.** ORS 475.890 is amended to read:

23 475.890. (1) Except as authorized by ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980, it is unlawful  
24 for any person to deliver methamphetamine.

25 (2) Unlawful delivery of methamphetamine is a Class B felony.

26 (3) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, unlawful delivery of methamphetamine is a  
27 Class A felony if the delivery is to a person under 18 years of age.

28 **(4) The minimum fine for unlawful delivery of methamphetamine is \$500.**

29 **SECTION 14.** ORS 475.892 is amended to read:

30 475.892. (1) Except as authorized by ORS 475.005 to 475.285 and 475.840 to 475.980, it is unlawful  
31 for any person to deliver methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of the real property comprising a public  
32 or private elementary, secondary or career school attended primarily by minors.

33 (2) Unlawful delivery of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a school is a Class A felony.

34 **(3) The minimum fine for unlawful delivery of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a**  
35 **school is \$500.**

36 **SECTION 15.** Section 10 of this 2011 Act and the amendments to ORS 475.886, 475.888,  
37 475.890 and 475.892 by sections 11 to 14 of this 2011 Act apply only to offenses committed on  
38 or after January 1, 2012.

39  
40 **FINES FOR CRIMES TREATED AS CLASS A VIOLATIONS**  
41 **AND FELONIES TREATED AS CLASS A MISDEMEANORS**  
42

43 **SECTION 16.** ORS 161.566 is amended to read:

44 161.566. (1) Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, a prosecuting attorney may elect  
45 to treat any misdemeanor as a Class A violation. The election must be made by the prosecuting at-

1 torney orally at the time of the first appearance of the defendant or in writing filed on or before the  
2 time scheduled for the first appearance of the defendant. If no election is made within the time al-  
3 lowed, the case shall proceed as a misdemeanor.

4 (2) If a prosecuting attorney elects to treat a misdemeanor as a Class A violation under this  
5 section, the court shall amend the accusatory instrument to reflect the charged offense as a Class  
6 A violation and clearly denominate the offense as a Class A violation in any judgment entered in  
7 the matter. Notwithstanding ORS 153.018, the *[maximum]* fine that a court may impose upon con-  
8 viction of a violation under this section may not:

9 (a) **Be less than the presumptive fine established by section 2 of this 2011 Act for a Class**  
10 **A violation; or**

11 (b) Exceed the amount provided in ORS 161.635 for the class of misdemeanor receiving violation  
12 treatment.

13 (3) If a prosecuting attorney elects to treat a misdemeanor as a Class A violation under this  
14 section, and the defendant fails to make any required appearance in the matter, the court may enter  
15 a default judgment against the defendant in the manner provided by ORS 153.102. Notwithstanding  
16 ORS 153.018, the *[maximum]* fine that the court may impose under a default judgment entered pur-  
17 suant to ORS 153.102 *[is]* **may not:**

18 (a) **Be less than the presumptive fine established by section 2 of this 2011 Act for a Class**  
19 **A violation; or**

20 (b) **Exceed** the maximum fine for the class of misdemeanor receiving violation treatment.

21 (4) A prosecuting attorney may not elect to treat misdemeanors created under ORS 811.540 or  
22 813.010 as violations under the provisions of this section.

23 (5) The election provided for in this section may be made by a city attorney acting as prose-  
24 cuting attorney in the case of municipal ordinance offenses, a county counsel acting as prosecuting  
25 attorney under a county charter in the case of county ordinance offenses, and the Attorney General  
26 acting as prosecuting attorney in those criminal actions or proceedings within the jurisdiction of the  
27 Attorney General.

28 *[(6) Notwithstanding ORS 137.290 (1)(d), the unitary assessment imposed upon conviction of a vi-*  
29 *olation under this section is the amount provided in ORS 137.290 for the misdemeanor receiving vio-*  
30 *lation treatment.]*

31 **SECTION 17.** ORS 161.568 is amended to read:

32 161.568. (1) Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, a court may elect to treat any  
33 misdemeanor as a Class A violation for the purpose of entering a default judgment under ORS  
34 153.102 if:

35 (a) A complaint or information has been filed with the court for the misdemeanor;

36 (b) The defendant has failed to make an appearance in the proceedings required by the court  
37 or by law; and

38 (c) The court has given notice to the district attorney for the county and the district attorney  
39 has informed the court that the district attorney does not object to treating the misdemeanor as a  
40 Class A violation.

41 (2) If the court treats a misdemeanor as a Class A violation under this section, the court shall  
42 amend the accusatory instrument to reflect the charged offense as a Class A violation and clearly  
43 denominate the offense as a Class A violation in the judgment entered in the matter.

4 (b) **Exceed** the maximum fine for the class of misdemeanor receiving violation treatment.

7 [(5) *Notwithstanding ORS 137.290 (1)(d), the unitary assessment imposed upon conviction of a vi-*  
8 *olation under this section is the amount provided in ORS 137.290 for the misdemeanor receiving vio-*  
9 *lation treatment.*]

10 **SECTION 18.** ORS 161.570 is amended to read:

11 161.570. (1) As used in this section, “nonperson felony” has the meaning given that term in the  
12 rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

13 (2) A district attorney may elect to treat a Class C nonperson felony or a violation of ORS  
14 475.840 (3)(a), 475.854, 475.864 (2) or 475.874 as a Class A misdemeanor. The election must be made  
15 by the district attorney orally or in writing at the time of the first appearance of the defendant. If  
16 a district attorney elects to treat a Class C felony or a violation of ORS 475.840 (3)(a), 475.854,  
17 475.864 (2) or 475.874 as a Class A misdemeanor under this subsection, the court shall amend the  
18 accusatory instrument to reflect the charged offense as a Class A misdemeanor.

19 (3) If, at some time after the first appearance of a defendant charged with a Class C nonperson  
20 felony or a violation of ORS 475.840 (3)(a), 475.854, 475.864 (2) or 475.874, the district attorney and

28 district attorney shall adopt written guidelines for determining when and under what circumstances

41 **SENTENCE OF DISCHARGE**

42  
43 **SECTION 20.** ORS 161.715 is amended to read:

44 161.715. (1) Any court empowered to suspend imposition or execution of sentence or to sentence  
45 a defendant to probation may discharge the defendant if:

1 (a) The conviction is for an offense other than murder, treason or a Class A or B felony; and

2 (b) The court is of the opinion that no proper purpose would be served by imposing any condi-  
3 tion upon the defendant's release.

4 (2) If a sentence of discharge is imposed for a felony, the court shall set forth in the record the  
5 reasons for its action.

6 (3) If the court imposes a sentence of discharge, the defendant shall be released with respect to  
7 the conviction for which the sentence is imposed without imprisonment, [*fine*,] probationary super-  
8 vision or conditions. **The judgment entered by the court shall include a monetary obligation**  
9 **payable to the state in an amount equal to the minimum fine for the offense established by**  
10 **section 10 of this 2011 Act.**

11 (4) If a defendant pleads not guilty and is tried and found guilty, a sentence of discharge is a  
12 judgment on a conviction for all purposes, including an appeal by the defendant.

13 (5) If a defendant pleads guilty, a sentence of discharge is not appealable, but for all other  
14 purposes is a judgment on a conviction.

16 **FINES IN JUVENILE PROCEEDINGS**

17  
18 **SECTION 21.** ORS 419C.459 is amended to read:

19 419C.459. [*In circumstances under which, if the youth offender were an adult, a fine not exceeding*  
20 *a certain amount could be imposed under the Oregon Criminal Code, the court may impose such a fine*  
21 *upon the youth offender. In determining whether to impose a fine and, if so, then in what amount, the*  
22 *court shall consider whether the youth offender will be able to pay a fine and whether payment of a*  
23 *fine is likely to have a rehabilitative effect on the youth offender. Fines ordered paid under this section*  
24 *shall be collected by the clerk of the court.*] **If a youth is found to be within the jurisdiction of**  
25 **the court under ORS 419C.005 by reason of committing an offense or by reason of committing**  
26 **an act that would constitute an offense if committed by an adult, the youth offender is sub-**  
27 **ject to the same fines, including the minimum fines established under sections 4 and 10 of**  
28 **this 2011 Act, that are applicable to adults who commit the offense. In determining the**  
29 **amount of the fine, the court shall consider the potential rehabilitative effect of a fine.**

30 **SECTION 22.** The amendments to ORS 419C.459 by section 21 of this 2011 Act apply only  
31 to acts committed on or after January 1, 2012. Any act committed before January 1, 2012,  
32 shall continue to be governed by ORS 419C.459 as in effect immediately before January 1,

18 presumptive fine;**

43 **DISTRIBUTION OF PAYMENTS UNDER JUDGMENT**  
44 **IN CRIMINAL ACTION**  
45

(Priorities for Application of Payments)

**SECTION 32.** Sections 33 to 38 of this 2011 Act are added to and made a part of ORS chapter 137.

**SECTION 33. Priorities for application of payments on judgments in criminal actions.** (1) There are five levels of priority for application of payments on judgments of conviction in criminal actions, with Level I obligations having the highest priority and Level V having the lowest priority. All payments on a judgment of conviction in a criminal action shall be applied first against the unpaid obligations in the level with highest priority until those obligations have been paid in full, and shall then be applied against the obligations in the level with the next highest level of priority, until all obligations under the judgment have been paid in full.

(2) Except as provided in section 35 of this 2011 Act, if there is more than one person or public body to whom an obligation is payable under a level, the court shall divide each payment based on each person's or public body's proportionate share of the total amount of obligations in that level.

**SECTION 34. Level I obligations.** Compensatory fines under ORS 137.101 are Level I obligations.

**SECTION 35. Level II obligations.** (1) There are two types of Level II obligations:

(a) Type 1 obligations include awards of restitution as defined in ORS 137.103, awards of restitution under ORS 419C.450 and money awards made under ORS 811.706.

(b) Type 2 obligations include all fines and other monetary obligations payable to the state for which the law does not expressly provide other disposition, including fines payable to the state by justice and municipal courts under sections 6b, 48 and 49 of this 2011 Act.

(2) If a judgment contains both types of Level II obligations, the court shall apply 50 percent of amounts creditable to Level II obligations to Type 1 obligations and 50 percent of the amounts to Type 2 obligations, until all obligations in one of the two types have been paid in full. All subsequent amounts creditable to Level II obligations shall be applied against the other type of obligations until those obligations have been paid in full.

(3) If there is more than one person for whose benefit a Type 1 money award has been made, the clerk shall pay the moneys credited to Type 1 obligations in the following order of priority:

(a) If the judgment contains a money award payable to the person or persons against whom the defendant committed the offense, the clerk shall first pay all moneys credited to Type 1 obligations to those persons, and shall continue to do so until all those obligations are paid in full. If there is more than one person to whom an obligation is payable under this paragraph, the court shall divide each payment under this paragraph based on each person's proportionate share of the total amount of obligations subject to payment under this paragraph.

(b) If the judgment contains a money award payable to the Criminal Injuries Compensation Account, the clerk shall thereafter transfer moneys credited to Type 1 obligations to the account until the award is paid in full.

(c) If the judgment contains a money award payable to any other victims, as defined in ORS 137.103, the clerk shall thereafter pay the moneys credited to Type 1 obligations to those victims until those victims are paid in full.

**SECTION 36. Level III obligations.** Level III obligations are fines payable to a county or

1 city.

2 **SECTION 37. Level IV obligations.** Level IV obligations are amounts that the law ex-  
3 pressly directs be paid to a specific account or public body as defined in ORS 174.109.

4 **SECTION 38. Level V obligations.** Level V obligations are amounts payable for reward  
5 reimbursement under ORS 131.897.

6 **SECTION 39.** Sections 33 to 38 of this 2011 Act and the repeal of ORS 137.295 by section  
7 118 of this 2011 Act apply to all payments on judgments of conviction of an offense, without  
8 regard to whether the offense was committed before, on or after January 1, 2012.

10 (Application of Security Deposits Against  
11 Child Support Obligation)  
12

13 **SECTION 40.** ORS 25.715 is amended to read:

14 25.715. (1) The court may order that the portion of a security deposit made under ORS 135.265  
15 that would otherwise be returned to the person who made the deposit or the amount of child support  
16 arrearages, whichever is less, be paid to an obligee or the Division of Child Support of the Depart-  
17 ment of Justice if:

- 18 (a) The defendant is an obligor who owes child support arrearages;
- 19 (b) The obligee or the administrator has filed a motion requesting the court to make such an  
20 order;
- 21 (c) The obligee or the administrator has served the defendant with a copy of the motion;
- 22 (d) The defendant has an opportunity to respond and request a hearing; and
- 23 (e) The court has determined that such an order is appropriate.

24 (2) The court may order that a portion of a security [amount] **deposit that is** forfeited under  
25 ORS 135.280 be paid to the division and be applied to any unsatisfied child support judgment and  
26 to provide security for child support payments in accordance with ORS 25.230 if:

- 27 (a) The defendant is an obligor who owes child support;
- 28 (b) The administrator has filed a motion requesting the court to make such an order;
- 29 (c) The motion specifies the amount to be applied to the child support judgment under ORS  
30 135.280; and
- 31 (d) The court has determined that such an order is appropriate.

32 **SECTION 41.** ORS 135.280 is amended to read:

33 135.280. (1) Upon failure of a person to comply with any condition of a release agreement or  
34 personal recognizance, the court having jurisdiction may, in addition to any other action provided  
35 by law, issue a warrant for the arrest of the person at liberty upon a personal recognizance, condi-  
36 tional or security release.

37 (2) A warrant issued under subsection (1) of this section by a municipal judge may be executed  
38 by any peace officer authorized to execute arrest warrants.

39 (3) If the defendant does not comply with the conditions of the release agreement, the court  
40 having jurisdiction shall enter an order declaring the entire security amount to be forfeited. Notice  
41 of the order of forfeiture shall be given forthwith by personal service, by mail or by such other  
42 means as are reasonably calculated to bring to the attention of the defendant and, if applicable, of  
43 the sureties the order of forfeiture. If, within 30 days after the court declares the forfeiture, the  
44 defendant does not appear or satisfy the court having jurisdiction that appearance and surrender  
45 by the defendant was, or still is, impossible and without fault of the defendant, the court shall enter

1 judgment for the state, or appropriate political subdivision thereof, against the defendant and, if  
 2 applicable, the sureties for the entire security amount set under ORS 135.265 and the costs of the  
 3 proceedings. At any time before or after entry of the judgment, the defendant or the sureties may  
 4 apply to the court for a remission of the forfeiture or to modify or set aside the judgment. The court,  
 5 upon good cause shown, may remit the forfeiture or any part thereof or may modify or set aside the  
 6 judgment as in other criminal cases, except the portion of the security [*amount*] **deposit** that the  
 7 court ordered to be applied to child support under subsection (4) of this section, as the court con-  
 8 sidered reasonable under the circumstances of the case. The court shall adopt procedures to ensure  
 9 that the amount deposited under ORS 135.265 is available for a reasonable period of time for dis-  
 10 position under subsection (4) of this section.

11 (4) After entry of a judgment for the state, the court, upon a motion filed under ORS 25.715,  
 12 may order that a portion of the security [*amount*] **deposit** be applied to any unsatisfied child support

 31 the offense was defined by a statute of this state and the judgment was entered by a justice court,

 33 *Assessment*] Account [*created under ORS 137.300*], if the offense was defined by a statute of this  
 34 state and the judgment was entered by a circuit court. The provisions of this section shall not apply  
 35 to [*base fine*] amounts deposited upon appearance under ORS 153.061.

36 (6) When the judgment of forfeiture is entered, the security deposit or deposit with the clerk is,  
 37 by virtue of the judgment alone and without requiring further execution, forfeited to and may be  
 38 kept by the state or its appropriate political subdivision. Except as provided in subsection (4) of this  
 39 section, the clerk shall reduce, by the value of the deposit so forfeited, the debt remaining on the  
 40 judgment and shall cause the amount on deposit to be transferred to the revenue account of the  
 41 state or political subdivision thereof entitled to receive the proceeds of execution under this section.

42 (7) The stocks, bonds, personal property and real property shall be sold in the same manner as

15 of the legal and other services to be provided at state expense that are related to the provision of  
16 appointed counsel, the court shall [*order*] **enter a limited judgment requiring that** the person  
17 [*to*] pay to the Public Defense Services Account in the General Fund, through the clerk of the court,  
18 the amount that it finds the person is able to pay without creating substantial hardship in providing  
19 basic economic necessities to the person or the person's dependent family. The amount that a court  
20 may [*order*] **require** the person to pay is subject to the guidelines and procedures issued by the  
21 Public Defense Services Commission as provided in subsection (4) of this section.

22 (2) Failure to [*obey an order*] **comply with the requirements of a limited judgment entered**  
23 under this section is not grounds for contempt or grounds for withdrawal by the appointed  
24 attorney[, *but any part of the amount ordered under this section and not paid may be:*]

25 [*(a) Enforced against the person as if the order is a civil judgment; or*]

26 [*(b) Enforced as otherwise permitted by law*].

27 (3) Except as authorized in this section, no person, organization or governmental agency may  
28 request or accept a payment or promise of payment for assisting in the representation of a person  
29 by appointment.

30 (4) The commission shall promulgate and issue guidelines and procedures:

31 151.225. (1) There is created a Public Defense Services Account in the General Fund. The Public

20 under the judgment is payable to the state if the conviction resulted from a prosecution  
21 arising out of an arrest or complaint made by an officer of the Oregon State Police or by any  
22 other enforcement officer employed by state government, as defined in ORS 174.111.

23 (2) If a circuit court enters a judgment of conviction for a traffic offense and the con-  
24 viction resulted from a prosecution arising out of an arrest or complaint made by a sheriff,  
25 deputy sheriff, city police officer or any other enforcement officer employed by a local gov-  
26 ernment, as defined in ORS 174.116:

27 (a) The amount prescribed by section 6b (1) of this 2011 Act is payable to the state and  
28 must be deposited in the Criminal Fine Account;

29 (b) One-half of the amount remaining after any payment required by paragraph (a) of this

31 must be forwarded to the Department of Revenue for deposit in the Criminal Fine Account;

33 (b) The remaining amount of the fine is payable to the city in which the court is located.

34 (3) If a municipal court enters a judgment of conviction for a traffic offense and the  
35 conviction resulted from a prosecution arising out of an arrest or complaint made by an  
36 enforcement officer employed by any other local government, as defined in ORS 174.116:

37 (a) The amount prescribed by section 6b (1) of this 2011 Act is payable to the state and

3 before January 1, 2012, shall continue to be deposited in the general fund of the county.

4 **SECTION 51d.** Any amounts received by a circuit court on or after January 1, 2012, on

6 have been deposited into the Arrest and Return Account under ORS 161.665 (7), as in effect

11 **SECTION 52.** ORS 137.300 is amended to read:

12 137.300. *[(1) The Criminal Fine and Assessment Account is established in the General Fund of the*  
13 *State Treasury. All moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the Department of Revenue*  
14 *to be distributed by the Department of Revenue according to allocations made by the Legislative As-*  
15 *sembly. The Department of Revenue shall keep a record of moneys transferred into and out of the ac-*  
16 *count. The Department of Revenue shall report monthly to the Attorney General the amount of moneys*  
17 *received from the state courts in each county and from each city court.]*

18 *[(2) The Legislative Assembly shall allocate moneys in the account according to the following pri-*  
19 *ority:]*

20 *[(a) Public safety standards, training and facilities;]*

21 *[(b) Criminal injuries compensation and assistance to victims of crime and children reasonably*  
22 *suspected of being victims of crime;]*

23 *[(c) Forensic services of the Oregon State Police including, but not limited to, services of the State*  
24 *Medical Examiner; and]*

25 *[(d) Maintenance and operation of the Law Enforcement Data System.]*

26 *[(3) Moneys in the account may not be allocated for:]*

27 *[(a) The payment of debt service obligations; or]*

28 *[(b) Any purpose other than those listed in subsection (2) of this section.]*

29 *[(4) The Department of Revenue shall deposit in the General Fund all moneys remaining in the*  
30 *account after the distributions required by subsections (1) and (2) of this section have been made.]*

31 *[(5) The Department of Revenue shall establish by rule a process for distributing moneys in the*  
32 *account.]*

33 *[(6) The Department of Justice shall report monthly to the Department of Revenue the amount of*  
34 *moneys ordered to be applied to child support under ORS 135.280.]*

35 **(1) The Criminal Fine Account is established in the General Fund. Except as otherwise**  
36 **provided by law, all amounts collected in state courts as monetary obligations in criminal**  
37 **actions shall be deposited by the courts in the account. All moneys in the account are con-**  
38 **tinuously appropriated to the Department of Revenue to be distributed by the Department**  
39 **of Revenue as provided in this section. The Department of Revenue shall keep a record of**  
40 **moneys transferred into and out of the account.**

41 **(2) The Legislative Assembly shall first allocate moneys from the Criminal Fine Account**  
42 **for the following purposes, in the following order of priority:**

43 **(a) Allocations for public safety standards, training and facilities.**

44 **(b) Allocations for criminal injuries compensation and assistance to victims of crime and**  
45 **children reasonably suspected of being victims of crime.**

1 (c) Allocations for the forensic services provided by the Oregon State Police, including,  
2 but not limited to, services of the State Medical Examiner.

3 (d) Allocations for the maintenance and operation of the Law Enforcement Data System.

4 (3) After making allocations under subsection (2) of this section, the Legislative Assem-  
5 bly shall allocate moneys from the Criminal Fine Account for the following purposes:

6 (a) Allocations to the Law Enforcement Medical Liability Account established under ORS  
7 414.815.

8 (b) Allocations to the State Court Facilities and Security Account established under ORS  
9 1.178.

10 (c) Allocations to the Department of Corrections for community corrections grants under  
11 ORS 423.520.

12 (d) Allocations to the Oregon Health Authority for the purpose of grants under ORS  
13 430.345 for the establishment, operation and maintenance of alcohol and drug abuse pre-  
14 vention, early intervention and treatment services provided through a county.

15 (e) Allocations to the Oregon State Police for the purpose of the enforcement of the laws  
16 relating to driving under the influence of intoxicants.

17 (f) Allocations to the Arrest and Return Account established under ORS 133.865.

18 (g) Allocations to the Intoxicated Driver Program Fund established under ORS 813.270.

19 (4) It is the intent of the Legislative Assembly that allocations from the Criminal Fine  
20 Account under subsection (3) of this section be consistent with historical funding of the en-  
21 tities, programs and accounts listed in subsection (3) of this section from monetary obli-  
22 gations imposed in criminal proceedings.

23 (5) Moneys in the Criminal Fine Account may not be allocated for the payment of debt  
24 service obligations.

25 (6) The Department of Revenue shall deposit in the General Fund all moneys remaining  
26 in the Criminal Fine Account after the distributions listed in subsections (2) and (3) of this  
27 section have been made.

28 (7) The Department of Revenue shall establish by rule a process for distributing moneys  
29 in the Criminal Fine Account.

30 **SECTION 52a.** Any funds in the Criminal Fine and Assessment Account on January 1,

34 (1) Systems critical components of the Oregon criminal justice system exist that require the  
35 highest priority considerations for funding from the Criminal Fine [*and Assessment*] Account.

36 (2) The systems critical components of the Oregon criminal justice system are interrelated and  
37 essential to the initiation and successful conclusion of criminal investigations.

38 (3) The interests of victims of crime and other Oregonians are advanced by the ability of the  
39 public safety community to respond professionally to reports of criminal activity and to successfully  
40 investigate criminal cases in a manner that protects the constitutional rights of all Oregonians.

41 (4) The effective training of police officers, corrections officers, parole and probation officers  
42 and other first responders increases the likelihood that crimes will be solved quickly and that the  
43 needs of victims of crime will be met.

44 (5) The collection of evidence at crime scenes, the forensic processing of the evidence by quali-  
45 fied, well-trained technicians and the work of medical examiners are critical statewide functions that

1 allow all Oregonians an equal opportunity to justice.

2 (6) The collection of criminal information such as that retained in the Law Enforcement Data  
3 System enhances the ability of investigators to identify criminals and the unnamed victims of violent  
4 crimes.

5 (7) Timely intervention on behalf of victims of crime through effective assistance programs  
6 makes recovery from victimization possible and is necessary to the well-being of Oregonians ad-  
7 versely affected by violent crime.

8 **SECTION 53. Notwithstanding ORS 137.300, for the period beginning July 1, 2011, and**

1 (2) There is allocated \$3,223,179 from the Criminal Fine Account to the Department of

1 497.415. (1) When any person is convicted of a violation of law or any rule adopted pursuant  
2 thereto or otherwise fails to comply with the requirements of a citation in connection with such  
3 violation as provided in subsection (2) of this section, the court may order the State Fish and  
4 Wildlife Commission to revoke all licenses, tags and permits issued to that person pursuant to the  
5 wildlife laws. Revocation of licenses, tags and permits is in addition to and not in lieu of other  
6 penalties provided by law.

7 (2) The license, tag and permit revocation provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to  
8 the following persons:

9 (a) Any person who is convicted of a violation of the wildlife laws, or any rule adopted pursuant  
10 thereto, or who otherwise fails to comply with the requirements of a citation in connection with any  
11 such offense [*when the base fine amount for the offense is \$50 or more*].

12 (b) Any person who is convicted of a violation of ORS 164.245, 164.255, 164.265, 164.345, 164.354  
13 or 164.365 committed while the person was angling, taking shellfish, hunting or trapping or who  
14 otherwise fails to comply with the requirements of a citation in connection with any such offense  
15 [*when the base fine amount for the offense is \$50 or more*].

16 (c) Any person who is convicted of a violation of ORS 166.630 or 166.638 committed while  
17 hunting or who otherwise fails to comply with the requirements of a citation in connection with any  
18 such offense [*when the base fine amount for the offense is \$50 or more*].

19 (3) When a court orders the revocation of a license, tag or permit pursuant to this section, the  
20 court shall take up any such licenses, tags and permits and forward them, together with a copy of  
21 the revocation order, to the commission. Upon receipt thereof, the commission shall cause revoca-  
22 tion of the appropriate licenses, tags and permits in accordance with the court order.

23 (4) For purposes of the Wildlife Violator Compact:

24 (a) The commission shall suspend a violator's license as defined in ORS 496.750 for failure to  
25 comply with the terms of a citation from a party state. A copy of a report of failure to comply from  
26 the licensing authority of the issuing state shall be conclusive evidence. Suspension under this par-  
27 agraph commences on the date the commission issues a final order pursuant to the provisions of

6 shall apply for or obtain another such license, tag or permit for the period of five years.

7 (c) Upon being the subject of a court order under this subsection for a third time, a person is  
8 prohibited from applying for or obtaining another such license, tag or permit.

40 (2) The commission may refuse to issue the permit referred to in subsection (1)(b) of this section  
41 if the commission finds that release of the fish into a body of water would adversely affect existing  
42 fish populations.

43 (3) Subsection (1)(a) of this section does not apply to live fish that are for aquaria use.

44 (4) [*Notwithstanding ORS 496.992,*] Violation of subsection (1)(b) of this section is:

45 (a) A Class C felony if the violation is committed intentionally or knowingly.

1 (b) A Class A misdemeanor if the violation is committed recklessly or with criminal negligence.

2 (5)(a) Notwithstanding ORS 497.415 (1), (2), (3) and (5), when a person is convicted of violating  
3 subsection (1)(b) of this section, the court in which the conviction occurs shall notify the commis-  
4 sion, which shall revoke all angling licenses and tags issued to that person pursuant to the wildlife  
5 laws. Revocation of licenses and tags is in addition to and not in lieu of other penalties provided

36 163.575. (1) A person commits the crime of endangering the welfare of a minor if the person  
37 knowingly:

38 (a) Induces, causes or permits an unmarried person under 18 years of age to witness an act of  
39 sexual conduct or sadomasochistic abuse as defined by ORS 167.060; or

40 (b) Permits a person under 18 years of age to enter or remain in a place where unlawful activity  
41 involving controlled substances is maintained or conducted; or

42 (c) Induces, causes or permits a person under 18 years of age to participate in gambling as de-  
43 fined by ORS 167.117; or

44 (d) Distributes, sells, or causes to be sold, tobacco in any form to a person under 18 years of  
45 age; or

1 (e) Sells to a person under 18 years of age any device in which tobacco, marijuana, cocaine or  
2 any controlled substance, as defined in ORS 475.005, is burned and the principal design and use of  
3 which is directly or indirectly to deliver tobacco smoke, marijuana smoke, cocaine smoke or smoke  
4 from any controlled substance into the human body including but not limited to:

5 (A) Pipes, water pipes, hookahs, wooden pipes, carburetor pipes, electric pipes, air driven pipes,  
6 corncob pipes, meerschaum pipes and ceramic pipes, with or without screens, permanent screens,  
7 hashish heads or punctured metal bowls;

8 (B) Carburetion tubes and devices, including carburetion masks;

9 (C) Bongs;

10 (D) Chillums;

11 (E) Ice pipes or chillers;

12 (F) Cigarette rolling papers and rolling machines; and

13 (G) Cocaine free basing kits.

14 (2) Endangering the welfare of a minor by violation of subsection (1)(a), (b), (c) or (e) of this  
15 section, involving other than a device for smoking tobacco, is a Class A misdemeanor.

16 (3) Endangering the welfare of a minor by violation of subsection (1)(d) of this section or by vi-  
17 olation of subsection (1)(e) of this section, involving a device for smoking tobacco, is a Class A vi-  
18 olation [*and the court shall impose a fine of not less than \$100*].

35 street address if the address is listed on the government-issued photo identification described in  
36 sub-subparagraph (vi) of this subparagraph.

37 (v) A description of, and the license number and issuing state shown on the license plate affixed  
38 to, the motor vehicle, if any, used to transport the individual who conducts, or the nonferrous metal  
39 property or private metal property that is the subject of, the transaction.

40 (vi) A photocopy of a current, valid driver license or other government-issued photo identifica-  
41 tion belonging to the individual with whom the scrap metal business conducts the transaction.

42 (vii) A photograph of, or video surveillance recording depicting, a recognizable facial image of  
43 the individual with whom the scrap metal business conducts the transaction.

44 (viii) A general description of the nonferrous metal property or private metal property that  
45 constitutes the predominant part of the transaction. The description must include any identifiable

1 marks on the property, if readily discernible, and must specify the weight, quantity or volume of the  
2 nonferrous metal property or private metal property.

3 (b) Require the individual with whom the scrap metal business conducts a transaction to sign  
4 and date a declaration printed in conspicuous type, either on the record described in this subsection

15 of the scrap metal business to witness the individual sign the declaration, and also to sign and date  
16 the declaration in a space provided for that purpose.

17 (d) For one year following the date of the transaction, keep a copy of the record and the signed  
18 and dated declaration described in this subsection. If the scrap metal business uses a video surveil-  
19 lance recording as part of the record kept in accordance with this subsection, the scrap metal  
20 business need not keep the video surveillance recording for one year, but shall retain the video  
21 surveillance recording for a minimum of 30 days following the date of the transaction. The scrap  
22 metal business shall at all times keep the copies at the current place of business for the scrap metal

4 may substitute for words designating the "Criminal Fine and Assessment Account," wher-  
5 ever they occur in statutory law, other words designating the "Criminal Fine Account."

9 **SECTION 331.** The unit and section captions used in this 2011 Act are provided only for  
10 the convenience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or  
11 express any legislative intent in the enactment of this 2011 Act.

13 **OPERATIVE DATES**

15 **SECTION 332.** (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, the provisions of  
16 this 2011 Act become operative January 1, 2012.

18 ments to ORS 1.178, sections 2, 2b and 2d, chapter 659, Oregon Laws 2009, and section 24,
