SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Changes definition of "beverage" and "beverage container." Specifies application of laws regulating redemption of beverage containers. Expands application of such laws one year after date on which Oregon Liquor Control Commission determines that at least 60 percent of beverage containers are returned or on January 1, 2018, whichever comes first. Increases refund value for beverage containers [beginning on January 1 of calendar year] by

specified date following determination by commission that, in each of two previous calendar years, less than 80 percent of total number of beverage containers sold in Oregon were returned.

[Authorizes] Requires commission to create one pilot project for establishment of beverage container redemption center.

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8	SECTION 1. ORS 459A.700 is amended to read:
9	459A.700. As used in ORS 459.992 (3) and (4) and 459A.700 to 459A.740, unless the context re-
10	quires otherwise:
11	(1) "Beverage" [means water and flavored water, beer or other malt beverages and mineral waters,
12	soda water and similar carbonated soft drinks in liquid form and intended for human consumption]
13	means a fluid described in section 2 of this 2011 Act.
14	(2)[(a)] "Beverage container" [means an individual, separate, sealed glass, metal or plastic bottle
15	or can containing a beverage in a quantity less than or equal to three fluid liters] means a container

ORS 459A.705 is amended to read: 40 459A.705. (1) Except as provided in [subsection (2)] subsections (2) and (3) of this section, every 41 beverage container sold or offered for sale in this state shall have a refund value of not less than 42 43 five cents. (2)(a) Every beverage container sold or offered for sale in this state shall have a refund 44 value of not less than 10 cents, beginning on the later of: 45

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1 (A) Eight months after the Oregon Liquor Control Commission determines that, in each 2 of the two previous calendar years, the number of beverage containers returned for the re-3 fund value specified in this section was less than 80 percent of the total number of beverage 4 containers that were sold in this state; or

5 (B) January 1 of the calendar year following the determination by the commission de-6 scribed in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph.

7 (b) The commission may not make a determination under this subsection before January
8 1, 2016.

12 [(2)] (3) Every beverage container certified as provided in ORS 459A.725, sold or offered for sale 13 in this state, shall have a refund value of not less than two cents.

15 471.501. Nothing in this chapter prevents a brewery licensed under ORS 471.220 or a brewerypublic house licensed under ORS 471.200 from establishing a refund value for malt beverage con-16 tainers under the provisions of ORS 459A.705 that is in excess of five cents, or in excess of 10 17 18 cents as described in ORS 459A.705 (2), per container for the purpose of encouraging purchasers to return the containers directly to the brewery or brewery-public house. A refund value in excess 19 of five cents, or in excess of 10 cents as described in ORS 459A.705 (2), per container may be 20paid under this section only to persons who are not licensed under this chapter and who return the 2122containers directly to the brewery or brewery-public house.

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PILOT PROJECT

<u>SECTION 5.</u> (1)(a) Pursuant to the provisions of ORS 459A.735, the Oregon Liquor Control Commission shall approve one beverage container redemption center pilot project in a city having a population of less than 300,000, operated by a distributor cooperative serving a majority of the dealers in this state.

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 459A.700 to 459A.740, the beverage container redemption center operated under the pilot project may not refuse to accept and to
pay the refund value of up to 300 individual empty beverage containers, as established by
ORS 459A.705, returned by any one person during one day.

(2)(a) The commission shall specify two convenience zones for the pilot project. The first
convenience zone shall be the sector within the one and one-half mile radius around the
beverage container redemption center pilot project, and the second convenience zone shall
be the sector within the three mile radius around the beverage container redemption center
pilot project.

(b) All dealers doing business within the first convenience zone that occupy a space of 5,000 or more square feet in a single area may participate in, and be served by, the pilot project and, if such a dealer participates in, and is served by, the pilot project, the dealer may, notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 459A.700 to 459A.740, refuse to accept and to pay the refund value of empty beverage containers.

44 (c) All dealers doing business within the second convenience zone that occupy a space 45 of 5,000 or more square feet in a single area may participate in, and be served by, the pilot

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1	project and, if such a dealer participates in, and is served by, the pilot project, the dealer
2	may, notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 459A.700 to 459A.740, refuse to accept and
3	to pay the refund value of more than 24 individual empty beverage containers returned by
4	any one person during one day.
5	(d) All dealers doing business within either convenience zone that occupy a space of less
6	than 5,000 square feet in a single area may, notwithstanding any other provision of ORS
7	459A.700 to 459A.740, refuse to accept and to pay the refund value of more than 24 individual
8	empty beverage containers returned by any one person during one day.
9	(e) Any dealer doing business in either convenience zone that occupies a space of 5,000
10	or more square feet in a single area that does not participate in, and is not served by, the
11	pilot project may not refuse to accept and to pay the refund value of up to 300 individual
12	empty beverage containers, as established by ORS 459A.705, returned by any one person
13	during one day and must provide services similar to those provided by the pilot project, in-
14	cluding hand counting of individual empty beverage containers that are returned for the re-
15	fund value established by ORS 459A.705.
16	(3) The commission may adopt all rules necessary to implement and administer the pro-
17	visions of this section.
