## A-Engrossed House Bill 3311

## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Requires Oregon Health Authority to explore ways to improve birth outcomes for women [of color] who face disproportionately greater risk of poor birth outcomes and to report to legislative committees in February 2012.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

- 3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
  - SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:
    - (a) "Community health worker" means an individual who has expertise or experience in public health and who works in an urban or rural community, either for pay or as a volunteer in association with a local health care system, to improve the health of members of the community and increase the capacity of the community to meet the health care needs of its residents, and who:
  - (A) Shares ethnicity, language, socioeconomic status and life experiences with the residents that the worker serves;
    - (B) Provides culturally appropriate health education and information;
- 13 (C) Assists people in receiving the care they need;
  - (D) Gives peer counseling and guidance on health behaviors;
  - (E) Empowers individuals and communities to achieve wellness; or
    - (F) Provides direct services such as first aid or blood pressure screening.
  - (b) "Doula" means a birth companion who provides personal, nonmedical support to women and families throughout a woman's pregnancy, childbirth and post-partum experience.
  - (2) The Oregon Health Authority, including the Office of Multicultural Health and Services, shall explore options for providing or utilizing doulas and other community health workers in the state medical assistance program to improve birth outcomes for women who face a disproportionately greater risk of poor birth outcomes.
  - (3) The authority shall report to the House committee on health care and any other appropriate legislative committee in February 2012:
    - (a) Its findings under subsection (2) of this section; and
