

SENATE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3323

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” delete the rest of the line and delete line 3
2 and insert “131.125, 131.602, 161.005, 166.715, 167.051, 167.057, 342.143 and 443.004; repealing ORS
3 167.054; and declaring an emergency.”.

4 Delete lines 5 through 31 and delete pages 2 through 4 and insert:

5 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 167.051 is amended to read:

6 “167.051. As used in ORS [*167.054 and*] 167.057:

7 “[*1*] *‘Child’ means a person under 13 years of age.*]

8 “[*2*] (1) *‘Furnishes’ means to sell, give, rent, loan or otherwise provide.*

9 “[*3*] (2) *‘Minor’ means a person under 18 years of age.*

10 “[*4*] (3) *‘Sexual conduct’ means:*

11 (a) Human masturbation or sexual intercourse;

12 (b) Genital-genital, oral-genital, anal-genital or oral-anal contact, whether between persons of
13 the same or opposite sex or between humans and animals;

14 (c) Penetration of the vagina or rectum by any object other than as part of a medical diagnosis
15 or as part of a personal hygiene practice; or

16 (d) Touching of the genitals, pubic areas or buttocks of the human male or female or of the
17 breasts of the human female.

18 “[*5*] *‘Sexually explicit material’ means material containing visual images of:*]

19 “[*a*] *Human masturbation or sexual intercourse;*]

20 “[*b*] *Genital-genital, oral-genital, anal-genital or oral-anal contact, whether between persons of the*
21 *same or opposite sex or between humans and animals; or]*

22 “[*c*] *Penetration of the vagina or rectum by any object other than as part of a personal hygiene*
23 *practice.]*

24 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 167.057 is amended to read:

25 “167.057. (1) A person commits the crime of luring a minor if the person[:]

26 “[*a*] furnishes to, or uses with, a minor a visual representation or explicit verbal description
27 or narrative account of sexual conduct[; and]

28 “[*b*] *Furnishes or uses the representation, description or account for the purpose of:*]

29 “[*A*] *Arousing or satisfying the sexual desires of the person or the minor; or]*

30 “[*B*] **for the purpose of** inducing the minor to engage in sexual conduct.

31 (2) A person is not liable to prosecution for violating subsection (1) of this section if the person
32 furnishes or uses a representation, description or account of sexual conduct that forms merely an
33 incidental part of an otherwise nonoffending whole and serves some purpose other than titillation.

34 (3) In a prosecution under subsection (1) of this section, it is an affirmative defense:

35 (a) That the representation, description or account was furnished or used for the purpose of

1 psychological or medical treatment and was furnished by a treatment provider or by another person
2 acting on behalf of the treatment provider;

3 “(b) That the defendant had reasonable cause to believe that the person to whom the represen-
4 tation, description or account was furnished or with whom the representation, description or ac-
5 count was used was not a minor; or

6 “(c) That the defendant was less than three years older than the minor at the time of the alleged
7 offense.

8 “(4) In a prosecution under subsection (1) of this section, it is not a defense that the person to
9 whom the representation, description or account was furnished or with whom the representation,
10 description or account was used was not a minor but was a law enforcement officer posing as a
11 minor.

12 “(5) Luring a minor is a Class C felony.

13 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 131.125 is amended to read:

14 “131.125. (1) A prosecution for aggravated murder, murder, attempted murder or aggravated
15 murder, conspiracy or solicitation to commit aggravated murder or murder or any degree of
16 manslaughter may be commenced at any time after the commission of the attempt, conspiracy or
17 solicitation to commit aggravated murder or murder, or the death of the person killed.

18 “(2) A prosecution for any of the following felonies may be commenced within six years after
19 the commission of the crime or, if the victim at the time of the crime was under 18 years of age,
20 anytime before the victim attains 30 years of age or within 12 years after the offense is reported to
21 a law enforcement agency or the Department of Human Services, whichever occurs first:

22 “(a) Criminal mistreatment in the first degree under ORS 163.205.

23 “(b) Rape in the third degree under ORS 163.355.

24 “(c) Rape in the second degree under ORS 163.365.

25 “(d) Rape in the first degree under ORS 163.375.

26 “(e) Sodomy in the third degree under ORS 163.385.

27 “(f) Sodomy in the second degree under ORS 163.395.

28 “(g) Sodomy in the first degree under ORS 163.405.

29 “(h) Unlawful sexual penetration in the second degree under ORS 163.408.

30 “(i) Unlawful sexual penetration in the first degree under ORS 163.411.

31 “(j) Sexual abuse in the second degree under ORS 163.425.

32 “(k) Sexual abuse in the first degree under ORS 163.427.

33 “(L) Using a child in a display of sexual conduct under ORS 163.670.

34 “(m) Encouraging child sexual abuse in the first degree under ORS 163.684.

35 “(n) Incest under ORS 163.525.

36 “(o) Promoting prostitution under ORS 167.012.

37 “(p) Compelling prostitution under ORS 167.017.

38 “(q) Luring a minor under ORS 167.057.

39 “(3) A prosecution for any of the following misdemeanors may be commenced within four years
40 after the commission of the crime or, if the victim at the time of the crime was under 18 years of
41 age, anytime before the victim attains 22 years of age or within four years after the offense is re-
42 ported to a law enforcement agency or the Department of Human Services, whichever occurs first:

43 “(a) Sexual abuse in the third degree under ORS 163.415.

44 “[*(b) Furnishing sexually explicit material to a child under ORS 167.054.*]

45 “[*(c)*] (b) Exhibiting an obscene performance to a minor under ORS 167.075.

1 “[(d)] (c) Displaying obscene materials to minors under ORS 167.080.

2 “(4) In the case of crimes described in subsection (2)(L) of this section, the victim is the child
3 engaged in sexual conduct. In the case of the crime described in subsection (2)(n) of this section,
4 the victim is the party to the incest other than the party being prosecuted. In the case of crimes
5 described in subsection (2)(o) and (p) of this section, the victim is the child whose acts of
6 prostitution are promoted or compelled.

7 “(5) A prosecution for arson in any degree may be commenced within six years after the com-
8 mission of the crime.

9 “(6) Except as provided in subsection (7) of this section or as otherwise expressly provided by
10 law, prosecutions for other offenses must be commenced within the following periods of limitations
11 after their commission:

12 “(a) For any other felony, three years.

13 “(b) For any misdemeanor, two years.

14 “(c) For a violation, six months.

15 “(7) If the period prescribed in subsection (6) of this section has expired, a prosecution never-
16 theless may be commenced as follows:

17 “(a) If the offense has as a material element either fraud or the breach of a fiduciary obligation,
18 prosecution may be commenced within one year after discovery of the offense by an aggrieved party
19 or by a person who has a legal duty to represent an aggrieved party and who is not a party to the
20 offense, but in no case shall the period of limitation otherwise applicable be extended by more than
21 three years;

22 “(b) If the offense is based upon misconduct in office by a public officer or employee, prosecution
23 may be commenced at any time while the defendant is in public office or employment or within two
24 years thereafter, but in no case shall the period of limitation otherwise applicable be extended by
25 more than three years; or

26 “(c) If the offense is an invasion of personal privacy under ORS 163.700, prosecution may be
27 commenced within one year after discovery of the offense by the person aggrieved by the offense,
28 by a person who has a legal duty to represent the person aggrieved by the offense or by a law
29 enforcement agency, but in no case shall the period of limitation otherwise applicable be extended
30 by more than three years.

31 “(8) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, if the defendant is identified after the period
32 described in subsection (2) of this section on the basis of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) sample com-
33 parisons, a prosecution for:

34 “(a) Rape in the first degree, sodomy in the first degree, unlawful sexual penetration in the first
35 degree or sexual abuse in the first degree may be commenced at any time after the commission of
36 the crime.

37 “(b) Rape in the second degree, sodomy in the second degree or unlawful sexual penetration in
38 the second degree may be commenced within 25 years after the commission of the crime.

39 “(9) Notwithstanding subsection (8) of this section, if a prosecution for a felony listed in sub-
40 section (8) of this section would otherwise be barred by subsection (2) of this section, the prose-
41 cution must be commenced within two years of the DNA-based identification of the defendant.

33 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 166.715 is amended to read:

34 “166.715. As used in ORS 166.715 to 166.735, unless the context requires otherwise:

35 “(1) ‘Documentary material’ means any book, paper, document, writing, drawing, graph, chart,
36 photograph, phonograph record, magnetic tape, computer printout, other data compilation from
37 which information can be obtained or from which information can be translated into usable form,
38 or other tangible item.

39 “(2) ‘Enterprise’ includes any individual, sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, business
40 trust or other profit or nonprofit legal entity, and includes any union, association or group of indi-
41 viduals associated in fact although not a legal entity, and both illicit and licit enterprises and gov-
42 ernmental and nongovernmental entities.

43 “(3) ‘Investigative agency’ means the Department of Justice or any district attorney.

44 “(4) ‘Pattern of racketeering activity’ means engaging in at least two incidents of racketeering
45 activity that have the same or similar intents, results, accomplices, victims or methods of commis-

1 sion or otherwise are interrelated by distinguishing characteristics, including a nexus to the same
2 enterprise, and are not isolated incidents, provided at least one of such incidents occurred after
3 November 1, 1981, and that the last of such incidents occurred within five years after a prior inci-
4 dent of racketeering activity. Notwithstanding ORS 131.505 to 131.525 or 419A.190 or any other
5 provision of law providing that a previous prosecution is a bar to a subsequent prosecution, conduct
6 that constitutes an incident of racketeering activity may be used to establish a pattern of
7 racketeering activity without regard to whether the conduct previously has been the subject of a
8 criminal prosecution or conviction or a juvenile court adjudication, unless the prosecution resulted
9 in an acquittal or the adjudication resulted in entry of an order finding the youth not to be within
10 the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

11 “(5) ‘Person’ means any individual or entity capable of holding a legal or beneficial interest in
12 real or personal property.

13 “(6) ‘Racketeering activity’ includes conduct of a person committed both before and after the
14 person attains the age of 18 years, and means to commit, to attempt to commit, to conspire to
15 commit, or to solicit, coerce or intimidate another person to commit:

16 “(a) Any conduct that constitutes a crime, as defined in ORS 161.515, under any of the following
17 provisions of the Oregon Revised Statutes:

18 “(A) ORS 59.005 to 59.451, 59.710 to 59.830, 59.991 and 59.995, relating to securities;

19 “(B) ORS 162.015, 162.025 and 162.065 to 162.085, relating to bribery and perjury;

20 “(C) ORS 162.235, 162.265 to 162.305, 162.325, 162.335, 162.355 and 162.365, relating to obstruct-
21 ing governmental administration;

22 “(D) ORS 162.405 to 162.425, relating to abuse of public office;

23 “(E) ORS 162.455, relating to interference with legislative operation;

24 “(F) ORS 163.095 to 163.115, 163.118, 163.125 and 163.145, relating to criminal homicide;

25 “(G) ORS 163.160 to 163.205, relating to assault and related offenses;

26 “(H) ORS 163.225 and 163.235, relating to kidnapping;

27 “(I) ORS 163.275, relating to coercion;

28 “(J) ORS 163.670 to 163.693, relating to sexual conduct of children;
