## **House Concurrent Resolution 39**

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON RULES

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## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

In memoriam: Robert Blackford Duncan, 1920-2011.

| 2  | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan was born in Normal, Illinois, on December 4, 1920; and                 |
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| 3  | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan attended college at both the University of Alaska and Illinois         |
| 4  | Wesleyan University; and   |
| 5  | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan met fellow student Marijane Beverly Dill while attending               |
| 6  | Illinois Wesleyan University; and  |
| 7  | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan married Marijane Beverly Dill on December 19, 1942; and                |
| 8  | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan and Marijane Beverly Duncan are survived by their seven                |
| 9  | children: Nancy, Angus, David, James, Laurie, Bonnie and Jeanne; and                                   |
| 10 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan worked at a variety of jobs while and immediately after at-            |
| 11 | tending school, including in the placer gold fields of Alaska, for a seed corn company in Illinois and |
| 12 | for a bank in Chicago; and   |
| 13 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan served the United States during World War II, both as a                |
| 14 | mariner for the United States Merchant Marine and as a member of the United States Navy; and           |
| 15 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan attended the University of Michigan Law School; and                    |
| 16 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan earned his law degree in 1948 and passed the bar in October            |
| 17 | of that year; and  |
| 18 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan and his family moved from Michigan to Medford, where he                |
| 19 | practiced law before beginning his political service; and  |
| 20 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan served the State of Oregon as both a member of the Oregon              |
| 21 | Legislative Assembly and a member of the United States Congress; and                                   |
| 22 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan was first nominated as a write-in candidate for the Oregon             |
| 23 | House of Representatives in 1954, but declined for economic reasons; and                               |
| 24 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan was first elected to the Oregon House of Representatives in            |
| 25 | 1956; and  |
| 26 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan served as Speaker of the House for two legislative sessions,           |
| 27 | in 1959 and 1961; and  |
| 28 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan was the first person in Oregon history to serve as Speaker             |
| 29 | of the House for two consecutive regular sessions; and   |
| 30 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan was elected to the United States House of Representatives              |
| 31 | in 1962, representing Oregon's fourth congressional district from 1963 until 1967; and                 |
| 32 | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan was again elected to the United States House of Represen-              |

| 1          | tatives in 1974, representing Oregon's third congressional district from 1975 until 1981; and   |

| 4          | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan's elected political service, at both the state level and the    |
| 5          | federal level, totaled 22 years; and  |
| 6          | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan, first as chairman of the United States House Appropriations    |
| 7          | Subcommittee on Transportation in the 1970s and then as a lobbyist in the 1980s, played a major |
| 8          | role in bringing light rail transportation to Portland; and                                     |
| 9          | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan ended his political career by serving as a member of the        |
| LO         | Northwest Power Planning Council from 1984 to 1988, serving as chairman of the council in 1987; |

| 12         | Whereas Robert Blackford Duncan survived his wife, Marijane Beverly Duncan, who died on         |
| 13         | November 9, 1990; and   |
