A-Engrossed House Joint Memorial 17

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Urges United States Secretary of Commerce to approve immediate removal of California sea lions from Columbia River as means of protecting salmon and steelhead that are threatened or endangered.]

Urges United States Congress to undertake recommended revisions to federal Marine Mammal Protection Act that allow for regulation of pinniped predation on threatened and endangered salmonids and to approve immediate removal of California sea lions in Columbia River and other Oregon rivers during salmon runs.

JOINT MEMORIAL

- To the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled:
- We, your memorialists, the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in legisblative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows:
- Whereas some 13 populations of fish are listed as threatened or endangered species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973; and
 - Whereas California sea lions are having a significant negative impact on the recovery of many salmon and steelhead populations in the Pacific Northwest; and
 - Whereas California sea lions have been protected since 1972 by the federal Marine Mammal Protection Act; and
 - Whereas populations of California sea lions have remained unchecked and have grown from 10,000 in the 1950s to about 300,000 currently, and that population increase has been reflected in growing numbers of California sea lions occurring in the Pacific Northwest; and
 - Whereas substantial opportunities for human interaction exist for recreational and sport anglers, and significant safety concerns related to these interactions are escalating each year; and
 - Whereas California sea lion foraging areas have expanded to Bonneville Dam and throughout the Willamette River up to Willamette Falls; and
 - Whereas while in the Columbia River and other Oregon rivers, the California sea lion forage base is primarily salmon, resulting in a conservatively estimated take of more than 25,000 salmon each year; and
 - Whereas growing, healthy and robust West Coast pinniped populations are increasing, as are their predation levels on threatened and endangered salmonids in many areas; and
- Whereas the Oregon State Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, in cooperation with the National Oceanic

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and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service and the United States Army Corps of Engineers, have performed extensive research to document and track this growing problem and conducted years of tests and programs to reduce the number of California sea lions and their predation rates, which have had limited success; and

Whereas all reasonable and known nonlethal means of removal have been tried; and

Whereas the Oregon State Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game have concluded that additional removal options are necessary to gain control of the California sea lion situation, reduce the risk of increasing the predation losses and reduce safety concerns related to human interaction; and

Whereas the Oregon State Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game appealed to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service for authorization to remove known predatory California sea lions foraging in the Columbia River; and

Whereas the State of Oregon also worked with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service in the late 1990s, as directed by Congress under the 1994 amendments to the federal Marine Mammal Protection Act, to study, evaluate, and report to Congress on the negative impacts of pinniped predation on West Coast salmonids; and

Whereas the Oregon State Department of Fish and Wildlife worked with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service to prepare a report on these problems to Congress in 1999 and make recommendations for an amendment to the federal Marine Mammal Protection Act that could help management agencies address these predation problems; and

Whereas the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service 1999 report was submitted to Congress more than a decade ago and Congress has taken no action to date to acknowledge the work of the states and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service by adopting the recommendations that Congress asked for and received in the report; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

That we, the members of the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly, respectfully request and strongly urge Congress to undertake the revisions to the federal Marine Mammal Protection Act recommended in the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's National Marine Fisheries Service 1999 report submitted to Congress to help state and federal fish and wildlife management agencies with the growing problem of pinniped predation on threatened and endangered salmonids in inland waters by providing new management options and tools not currently provided in the federal Marine Mammal Protection Act and to approve the immediate removal by any means necessary of California sea lions in the Columbia River and other Oregon rivers during salmon runs; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this memorial shall be sent to the United States Secretary of Commerce and to each member of the Oregon Congressional Delegation.
