House Joint Memorial 23

Sponsored by Representative WITT; Representative BARNHART (at the request of Mike Sullivan, Association of Western Pulp and Paper Workers, and Bill Kluting, Carpenters Industrial Council)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Urges President of United States to direct United States Trade Representative not to enter into South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements. Urges Congress of United States to oppose South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements.

JOINT MEMORIAL

To the President of the United States, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, and the Office of the United States Trade Representative:

We, your memorialists, the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in legislative session assembled, respectfully represent as follows:

Whereas it is possible to craft a trade policy that encourages balanced trade, job creation and sustainable development both at home and abroad without undermining the traditional American values associated with constitutional federalism; and

Whereas on February 9, 2011, the United States Trade Representative testified before the House Committee on Ways and Means of the United States Congress about plans to move forward with the proposed South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements this year; and

Whereas these free trade agreements are largely modeled after the North American Free Trade Agreement, which took effect in 1994 and greatly increased the trade deficit of the United States; and

Whereas more than 51,000 Oregon jobs have been certified by the United States Department of Labor to have been lost to direct movement of service sector work offshore or to displacement of workers because of the influx of imports; and

Whereas tens of thousands of additional jobs have likely been lost, but have not been accounted for, because the United States Department of Labor did not include offshore movement of service sector work in its data sets until 2009; and

Whereas the loss of tens of thousands of Oregon jobs not only has an obvious impact on the state's unacceptably high unemployment level, but significantly reduces state and local tax revenues; and

Whereas the nonpartisan Economic Policy Institute has found that the South Korean and Colombian free trade agreements will further increase the trade deficit of the United States and cost the nation 214,000 additional jobs; and

Whereas the South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements would grant foreign businesses that operate in Oregon new rights and privileges that exceed the rights and privileges of Oregon's domestic businesses, including the ability to challenge Oregon laws as nontariff

barriers to trade and, thereby, subject those laws to binding arbitration in international dispute resolution bodies that are not bound by the United States judicial system; and

Whereas similar provisions in the North American Free Trade Agreement have already generated cases against state and local land use decisions, state environmental policies, state public health policies, state court rulings and state and local contracts; and

Whereas those cases are likely not to be heard by a state or federal court; and

Whereas the South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements make it more difficult for this state's Legislative Assembly to be fiscally responsible on behalf of the citizens of this state; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

- (1)(a) The President of the United States is respectfully urged to direct the United States Trade Representative, Ambassador Ron Kirk, not to enter into the South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements; and
- (b) The Congress of the United States is respectfully urged to oppose the South Korean, Colombian and Panamanian free trade agreements.
- (2) A copy of this memorial shall be sent to the President of the United States, to the Senate Majority Leader, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to the United States Trade Representative and to each member of the Oregon Congressional Delegation.
