

Senate Bill 10

Sponsored by Senator COURTNEY, Representatives HANNA, ROBLAN

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Clarifies whether provisions that reference session of Legislative Assembly have annual or biennial implications. Makes certain other adjustments to provisions that reference session of Legislative Assembly.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

12 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

PROVISIONS RELATING TO PRESESSION FILING OF MEASURES

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16 **SECTION 1.** ORS 171.130 is amended to read:

17 171.130. (1) At any time in advance of any regular or special session of the Legislative Assembly
18 fixed by the Legislative Counsel Committee, or at any time in advance of a special session as may
19 be fixed by joint rules of both houses of the Legislative Assembly, the following may file a proposed
20 legislative measure with the Legislative Counsel:

21 (a) Members who will serve in the session and members-elect.

22 (b) Interim and statutory committees of the Legislative Assembly.

23 (2) On or before December 15 of [*the year preceding a regular legislative session*] **an even-**
24 **numbered year**, or at any time in advance of a special session as may be fixed by joint rules of both
25 houses of the Legislative Assembly, the following may file a proposed legislative measure with the
26 Legislative Counsel:

27 (a) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services, to implement the fiscal recommendations
28 of the Governor contained in the budget report of the Governor.

29 (b) The person who will serve as Governor during the session.

30 (c) The Secretary of State, the State Treasurer, the Attorney General, the Commissioner of the

1 Bureau of Labor and Industries and the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

2 (d) The Judicial Department.

3 (3) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, a statewide elected official who initially as-
 4 sumes office in January of an odd-numbered year may submit proposed measures for introduction
 5 by members or committees of the Legislative Assembly until the calendar day designated by rules
 6 of either house of the Legislative Assembly. The exemption granted by this subsection to a newly
 7 elected Governor does not apply to state agencies in the executive branch.

8 (4) On or before December 15 of [*the year preceding a regular legislative session*] **an even-**
 9 **numbered year**, a state agency may file a proposed legislative measure with the Legislative Coun-
 10 sel through a member or committee of the Legislative Assembly.

11 (5) The Legislative Counsel shall order each measure filed pursuant to subsections (1) to (4) of
 12 this section prepared for printing and may order the measure printed. If the person filing a measure
 13 specifically requests in writing that the measure be made available for distribution, the Legislative
 14 Counsel shall order the measure printed and shall make copies of the printed measure available for
 15 distribution before the beginning of the session to members and members-elect and to others upon
 16 request.

17 (6) Copies of all measures filed and prepared for printing or printed pursuant to this section
 18 shall be forwarded by the Legislative Counsel to the chief clerk of the house designated by the
 19 person filing the measure for introduction.

20 (7) The costs of carrying out this section shall be paid out of the money appropriated for the
 21 expenses of that session of the Legislative Assembly for which the measure is to be printed.

22 (8) The Legislative Counsel Committee may adopt rules or policies to accomplish the purpose
 23 of this section.

24 (9) This section does not affect any law or any rule of the Legislative Assembly or either house
 25 thereof relating to the introduction of legislative measures.

26 **SECTION 2.** ORS 184.843 is amended to read:

27 184.843. (1) There is created the Road User Fee Task Force.

28 (2) The purpose of the task force is to develop a design for revenue collection for Oregon's roads
 29 and highways that will replace the current system for revenue collection. The task force shall con-
 30 sider all potential revenue sources.

31 (3) The task force shall consist of 12 members, as follows:

32 (a) Two members shall be members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker
 33 of the House of Representatives.

34 (b) Two members shall be members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate.

35 (c) Four members shall be appointed by the Governor, the Speaker and the President acting
 36 jointly. In making appointments under this paragraph, the appointing authorities shall consider in-
 37 dividuals who are representative of the telecommunications industry, of highway user groups, of the
 38 Oregon transportation research community and of national research and policy-making bodies such
 39 as the Transportation Research Board and the American Association of State Highway and Trans-
 40 portation Officials.

41 (d) One member shall be an elected city official, appointed by the Governor, the Speaker and the
 42 President acting jointly.

43 (e) One member shall be an elected county official, appointed by the Governor, the Speaker and
 44 the President acting jointly.

45 (f) Two members shall be members of the Oregon Transportation Commission, appointed by the

1 chairperson of the commission.

2 (4)(a) The term of a legislator appointed to the task force is four years except that the legislator
 3 ceases to be a member of the task force when the legislator ceases to be a legislator. A legislator
 4 may be reappointed to the task force.

5 (b) The term of a member of the task force appointed under subsection (3)(c) of this section is
 6 four years and the member may be reappointed.

7 (c) The term of a member of the task force appointed under subsection (3)(d) or (e) of this section
 8 is four years except that the member ceases to be a member of the task force when the member
 9 ceases to be a city or county elected official. A city or county elected official may be reappointed
 10 to the task force.

11 (d) The term of a member of the Oregon Transportation Commission appointed to the task force
 12 is four years except that the member ceases to be a member of the task force when the member
 13 ceases to be a member of the commission. A member of the commission may be reappointed to the
 14 task force.

15 (5) A legislator appointed to the task force is entitled to per diem and other expense payments
 16 as authorized by ORS 171.072 from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly. Other members
 17 of the task force are entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS 292.495.

18 (6) The Department of Transportation shall provide staff to the task force.

19 (7) The task force shall study alternatives to the current system of taxing highway use through
 20 motor vehicle fuel taxes. The task force shall gather public comment on alternative approaches and
 21 shall make recommendations to the Department of Transportation and the Oregon Transportation
 22 Commission on the design of pilot programs to be used to test alternative approaches. The task force
 23 may also make recommendations to the department and the commission on criteria to be used to
 24 evaluate pilot programs. The task force may evaluate any pilot program implemented by the de-
 25 partment and report the results of the evaluation to the Legislative Assembly, the department and
 26 the commission.

27 (8) In addition to the requirements of subsection (9) of this section, the task force shall propose
 28 to the Seventy-second Legislative Assembly options for the design of a revenue collection system for
 29 Oregon's roads and highways that would replace the current system for revenue collection.

30 (9) The task force shall report to each regular session of the Legislative Assembly on the work
 31 of the task force, the department and the commission in designing, implementing and evaluating pilot
 32 programs.

33 (10) Official action by the task force requires the approval of a majority of the members of the
 34 task force.

35 (11) Notwithstanding ORS 171.130 and 171.133, the task force by official action may recommend
 36 legislation. Legislation recommended by the task force must indicate that it is introduced at the
 37 request of the task force. Legislative measures proposed by the task force shall be prepared in time
 38 for pre-session filing with the Legislative Counsel by December 15 of [*the year preceding a regular*
 39 *session of the Legislative Assembly*] **an even-numbered year.**

40 **SECTION 3.** Section 1, chapter 782, Oregon Laws 2009, is amended to read:

41 **Sec. 1.** (1) The Oregon Broadband Advisory Council is established within the Oregon Business
 42 Development Department. The council shall consist of 14 members, of whom:

43 (a) The Governor shall appoint 12 members as follows:

44 (A) One member to represent the counties of this state.

45 (B) One member to represent the cities of this state.

1 (C) Three members to represent telecommunications service providers and Internet service pro-
 2 viders in this state. At least one member must represent rural telecommunications consortia.

3 (D) One member to represent Oregon tribes.

4 (E) One member to represent education.

5 (F) One member to represent economic development.

6 (G) One member to represent public safety.

7 (H) One member to represent health.

8 (I) One member to represent government's electronic interface with the public.

9 (J) One member from the Public Utility Commission.

10 (b) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one nonvoting member who is a
 11 member of the House of Representatives.

12 (c) The President of the Senate shall appoint one nonvoting member who is a member of the
 13 Senate.

14 (2) The term of office of each voting member is four years, but a voting member serves at the
 15 pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a voting member, the Governor shall
 16 appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next following. A voting member is eligible
 17 for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to
 18 become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

19 (3) The nonvoting legislative members shall serve two-year terms and are eligible for reap-
 20 pointment.

21 (4) Members of the council are not entitled to compensation, but voting members may be paid
 22 expenses if funding is available from contributions accepted under section 3 (2), **chapter 782,**
 23 **Oregon Laws 2009** [*of this 2009 Act*].

24 (5) The council shall select one of its voting members as chairperson and another voting member
 25 as vice chairperson, for such terms and with duties and powers necessary for the performance of the
 26 functions of such offices as the council determines.

27 (6) A majority of the voting members of the council constitutes a quorum for the transaction
 28 of business.

29 (7) The council shall meet at least once every three months at a place, day and hour determined
 30 by the council. The council may also meet at other times and places specified by the call of the
 31 chairperson or of a majority of the members of the council.

32 (8) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the voting members. The
 33 council may recommend legislation, which must be prepared in time for pre-session filing [*at the next*
 34 *regular session*] **by December 15 of the year preceding an odd-numbered year regular session**
 35 of the Legislative Assembly.

36 (9) The Oregon Business Development Department shall provide staff or facilities to the council.

37 (10) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the Public Utility Commission and the
 38 Department of Education may provide staff or facilities to the council.

39 (11) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist the
 40 council in the performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to
 41 confidentiality, to furnish such information and advice as the members of the council consider nec-
 42 essary to perform their duties.

 44 **PROVISIONS RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE**
 45 **COMMITTEES, EMERGENCY BOARD**

AND EDUCATION COMMISSION OF THE STATES

SECTION 4. ORS 171.415 is amended to read:

171.415. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this section, a committee or employee of the Legislative Assembly having possession of legislative records that are not required for the regular performance of official duties shall, within 10 days after the adjournment sine die of a regular or special session, deliver all such legislative records to the Legislative Administration Committee.

(2) The chairperson, member or employee of a legislative interim committee responsible for maintaining the legislative records of that committee shall, within 10 days after the committee ceases to function or before January 1 next preceding the beginning of [*a regular biennial*] **an odd-numbered year regular** session of the Legislative Assembly, whichever is earlier, deliver all such legislative records to the Legislative Administration Committee.

(3) This section does not apply to the records of the Emergency Board, the Legislative Administration Committee, the Legislative Counsel Committee or the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.

SECTION 5. ORS 171.580 is amended to read:

171.580. (1) There is created a Joint Legislative Audit Committee consisting of the cochairs of the Joint Committee on Ways and Means, members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker and members of the Senate appointed by the President.

(2) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof and in the interim between sessions.

(3) The term of a member shall expire upon the **date of the** convening of the **odd-numbered year regular session of the** Legislative Assembly [*in regular session*] next following the commencement of the member's term. When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the committee in the interim between **odd-numbered year regular** sessions, until such vacancy is filled, the membership of the committee shall be considered not to include the vacant position for the purpose of determining whether a quorum is present and a quorum is a majority of the remaining members.

(4) Members of the committee shall receive an amount equal to that authorized under ORS 171.072 from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly for each day spent in the performance of their duties as members of the committee or any subcommittee thereof in lieu of reimbursement for in-state travel expenses. However, when engaged in out-of-state travel, members shall be entitled to receive their actual and necessary expenses therefor in lieu of the amount authorized by this subsection. Payment shall be made from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly.

(5) The committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present. A quorum consists of a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

(6) Action by the committee requires the affirmative vote of a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

(7) The Legislative Fiscal Office shall furnish to the committee such services of personnel and such other facilities as are necessary to enable the committee to carry out its functions as directed by law, with such assistance as the Division of Audits and Oregon Department of Administrative Services can provide.

SECTION 6. ORS 171.615 is amended to read:

171.615. (1) An interim committee may function during the period beginning at the adjournment sine die of [*that*] **the odd-numbered year regular** session of the Legislative Assembly during which

1 it was created, and ending at the convening of the next **odd-numbered year** regular [*biennial leg-*
2 *islative*] session **of the Legislative Assembly.**

3 **(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, the activities of an interim committee**
4 **are suspended during the period beginning at the convening of the even-numbered year reg-**
5 **ular session of the Legislative Assembly and ending at the adjournment sine die of that**
6 **session.**

7 **SECTION 7.** ORS 171.852 is amended to read:

8 171.852. (1) There is hereby created a Joint Legislative Committee on Information Management
9 and Technology. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall
10 appoint the members of the committee.

11 (2) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during
12 sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof, and in the interim between sessions.

13 (3) The term of a member shall expire upon the **date of the** convening of the **odd-numbered**
14 **year regular session of the** Legislative Assembly [*in regular session*] next following the com-
15 mencement of the member's term. When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the committee in
16 the interim between **odd-numbered year regular** sessions, until such vacancy is filled, the mem-
17 bership of the committee shall be deemed not to include the vacant position for the purpose of de-
18 termining whether a quorum is present and a quorum is a majority of the remaining members.

19 (4) Members of the committee shall receive an amount equal to that authorized under ORS
20 171.072 from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly for each day spent in the performance
21 of their duties as members of the committee or any subcommittee thereof in lieu of reimbursement
22 for in-state travel expenses. However, when engaged in out-of-state travel, members shall be entitled
23 to receive their actual and necessary expenses therefor in lieu of the amount authorized by this
24 subsection. Payment shall be made from funds appropriated to the Legislative Fiscal Office.

25 (5) The committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present. A quorum consists of
26 a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee
27 members from the Senate.

28 (6) Action by the committee requires the affirmative vote of a majority of committee members
29 from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

30 (7) The Legislative Fiscal Office shall furnish to the committee such services of personnel and
31 such other facilities as are necessary to enable the committee to carry out its functions as provided
32 by law.

33 **SECTION 8.** ORS 171.857 is amended to read:

34 171.857. (1) **For each odd-numbered year regular session of the Legislative Assembly,** the
35 President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly appoint a
36 special legislative committee to issue a report pursuant to section 8, Article VIII of the Oregon
37 Constitution.

38 (2) The committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present. A quorum consists of
39 a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee
40 members from the Senate.

41 (3) Action by the committee requires the affirmative vote of a majority of committee members
42 from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

43 (4) The Legislative Assembly in the report shall:

44 (a) Demonstrate that the amount within the budget appropriated for the state's system of
45 kindergarten through grade 12 public education is the amount of moneys as determined by the

1 Quality Education Commission established by ORS 327.500 that is sufficient to meet the quality
2 goals; or

3 (b) Identify the reasons that the amount appropriated for the state's system of kindergarten
4 through grade 12 public education is not sufficient, the extent of the insufficiency and the impact
5 of the insufficiency on the ability of the state's system of kindergarten through grade 12 public ed-
6 ucation to meet the quality goals. In identifying the impact of the insufficiency, the Legislative As-
7 sembly shall include in the report how the amount appropriated in the budget may affect both the
8 current practices and student performance identified by the commission under ORS 327.506 (4)(a) and
9 the best practices and student performance identified by the commission under ORS 327.506 (4)(b).

10 (5)(a) Notwithstanding subsection (4) of this section, the Legislative Assembly may make a de-
11 termination that the report of the Quality Education Commission should not be used as the basis for
12 carrying out the reporting requirements of section 8, Article VIII of the Oregon Constitution, and
13 subsection (4) of this section. If the report is not used, the Legislative Assembly shall identify the
14 reasons for not using the report to meet the reporting requirements and shall outline an alternative
15 methodology for making the findings required by section 8, Article VIII of the Oregon Constitution.

16 (b) The alternative methodology shall be based on:

17 (A) Research, data and public values; and

18 (B) The performance of successful schools, professional judgment or a combination of the per-
19 formance of successful schools and professional judgment.

20 (c) The Legislative Assembly shall include in the report that uses the alternative methodology
21 a determination of how the amount appropriated may affect the ability of the state's system of
22 kindergarten through grade 12 public education to meet quality goals established by law, including
23 expected student performance against those goals.

24 (6) The Legislative Assembly shall identify in the report whether the state's system of post-
25 secondary public education has quality goals established by law. If there are quality goals, the
26 Legislative Assembly shall include in the report a determination that the amount appropriated in
27 the budget is sufficient to meet those goals or an identification of the reasons the amount appro-
28 priated is not sufficient, the extent of the insufficiency and the impact of the insufficiency on the
29 ability of the state's system of post-secondary public education to meet those quality goals.

30 (7) The report shall be issued within 180 days after [*the regular session of*] the Legislative As-
31 sembly adjourns sine die.

32 (8) The Legislative Assembly shall provide public notice of the report's issuance, including
33 posting the report on the Internet and providing a print version of the report upon request.

34 **SECTION 9.** ORS 173.191 is amended to read:

35 173.191. (1) The Legislative Counsel Committee shall consist of the Speaker of the House of
36 Representatives, the President of the Senate, members of the House appointed by the Speaker and
37 members of the Senate appointed by the President. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and
38 the President of the Senate may each designate from among the members of the appropriate house
39 an alternate to exercise powers as a member of the committee. The appointing authorities shall ap-
40 point members of a new committee within 30 days after the **date of the convening of each odd-**
41 **numbered year regular session** of the Legislative Assembly [*in regular session*].

42 (2) The term of a member of the committee shall expire upon the **date of the** convening of the
43 **odd-numbered year regular session of the** Legislative Assembly [*in regular session*] next following
44 the member's appointment. Vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled
45 by the appointing authority.

1 (3) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during
2 the sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof, and in the interim period between
3 sessions but the committee has no authority to affect the rules of either house.

4 (4) The Legislative Counsel Committee may appoint advisory committees or subcommittees. Ex-
5 cept as otherwise provided in this subsection, individuals other than members of the Legislative
6 Assembly may serve on such advisory committees or subcommittees. A member of such committee
7 or subcommittee who is not a member of the Legislative Assembly shall be compensated and reim-
8 bursed in the manner provided in ORS 292.495. An advisory committee or subcommittee appointed
9 to assist the Legislative Counsel Committee in review of state agency rules may consist only of two
10 or more members of the Legislative Assembly.

11 (5) The Legislative Counsel Committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present.
12 A quorum consists of a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a
13 majority of committee members from the Senate.

14 (6) Action by the committee requires the affirmative vote of a majority of committee members
15 from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

16 **SECTION 10.** ORS 173.215 is amended to read:

17 173.215. (1) The expiration of the terms of members of the Legislative Counsel Committee, as
18 provided by ORS 173.191, does not affect the employment of any individual filling a position previ-
19 ously approved by the committee.

20 (2) After the convening of the Legislative Assembly in **an odd-numbered year** regular session
21 and until the newly appointed Legislative Counsel Committee provides otherwise, the Legislative
22 Counsel may employ and fix the compensation of individuals the Legislative Counsel considers nec-
23 essary for the effective conduct of the work supervised or managed by the Legislative Counsel.

24 (3) Notwithstanding ORS 173.111 and 173.200, if a vacancy occurs in the position of Legislative
25 Counsel after the convening of the Legislative Assembly in **an odd-numbered year** regular session
26 and before the appointment of a Legislative Counsel Committee, the President of the Senate and the
27 Speaker of the House of Representatives may jointly select a Legislative Counsel who has the
28 qualifications set forth in ORS 173.200. The Legislative Counsel selected by the President and the
29 Speaker serves at their pleasure at a salary jointly fixed by the President and the Speaker that does
30 not exceed the salary last fixed by the committee. The President and Speaker may act in lieu of the
31 Legislative Counsel Committee under ORS 293.335 in designating the Legislative Counsel they select
32 to approve disbursements and in filing the statement of designation. After appointment of a Legis-
33 lative Counsel Committee, the Legislative Counsel selected under this subsection serves at the
34 pleasure of the committee and the committee may exercise power and authority over the Legislative
35 Counsel as if the Legislative Counsel had been selected by the committee.

36 **SECTION 11.** ORS 173.730 is amended to read:

37 173.730. (1) The Legislative Administration Committee shall consist of the Speaker of the House
38 of Representatives, the President of the Senate, members of the House appointed by the Speaker and
39 members of the Senate appointed by the President. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and
40 the President of the Senate may each designate an alternate from time to time from among the
41 members of the house over which that person presides to exercise the powers, except as
42 cochairperson, as a member of the committee. No more than three House members of the committee
43 shall be of the same political party. No more than three Senate members of the committee shall be
44 of the same political party.

45 (2) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during

1 sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof, and in the interim period between ses-
2 sions.

3 (3) The term of a member shall expire upon the **date of the** convening of the **odd-numbered**
4 **year regular session of the** Legislative Assembly [*in regular session*] next following the com-
5 mencement of the member's term. When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the committee in
6 the interim between **odd-numbered year regular** sessions, until such vacancy is filled, the mem-
7 bership of the committee shall be deemed not to include the vacant position for the purpose of de-
8 termining whether a quorum is present and a quorum is a majority of the remaining members.

9 (4) The presiding officers shall act as cochairpersons and may alternate at succeeding meetings
10 as presiding chairperson of the committee and vice chairperson thereof. The cochairpersons, jointly
11 or singly, may, in addition to other acts authorized, approve voucher claims.

12 (5) The committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present. A quorum consists of
13 a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee
14 members from the Senate.

15 (6) Action by the committee requires the affirmative vote of a majority of committee members
16 from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

17 **SECTION 12.** ORS 173.750 is amended to read:

18 173.750. The expiration of the terms of members of the Legislative Administration Committee

28 183.724. (1) As soon as is practicable after the end of each **odd-numbered year** regular legis-
29 lative session, the Legislative Counsel shall develop a list of state agencies with areas of responsi-
30 bility that are primarily within the subject-matter jurisdiction of interim committees of the
31 Legislative Assembly. The Legislative Counsel shall assign all state agencies to at least one interim

41 184.656. (1) The Governor shall submit to the Legislative Assembly a proposed biennial program
 42 budget for the Department of Transportation that specifies how existing revenues from all sources
 43 will be spent. The program budget shall include proposed expenditures for each program or item
 44 specifically listed in the budget bills for the department enacted during the preceding **odd-**
 45 **numbered year** regular session of the Legislative Assembly.

1 (2) The budget shall be accompanied by the Highway Construction Plan described in ORS
2 184.658.

3 **SECTION 17.** ORS 240.185 is amended to read:

4 240.185. (1) On and after January 1, 1984, the number of persons employed by the state shall not
5 exceed 1.5 percent of the state's population of the prior year.

6 (2) The population figure shall be that required by ORS 190.510 to 190.610.

7 (3) This section applies to all full-time equivalent budgeted positions.

8 (4) This section does not apply to the Governor, the Secretary of State, the State Treasurer, the
9 Supreme Court or the Legislative Assembly in the conduct of duties vested in any of them by the
10 Oregon Constitution. However, this exception applies only to the office of the Governor and not to
11 the executive branch of government.

14 (b) Post-secondary educational activities that are partially funded by student tuition and fees.

25 amounts available or that will become available during the current year from General Fund appro-
26 priations will not be sufficient to pay program bond principal and interest scheduled for payment
27 during the current year. A certificate issued under this paragraph shall specify the amount of the
28 anticipated current year deficit.

29 (4)(a) If a deficit in funds available to pay principal and interest in any general obligation bond
30 program is certified and confirmed under subsection (2) or certified under subsection (3) of this
31 section, the amount of the deficit, together with any deficit that is certified for any other general
32 obligation bond program shall upon certification constitute a state tax levy on property that shall
33 be apportioned among and charged to the several counties in that proportion which the total as-
34 sessed value of all the taxable property in each county bears to the total assessed value of all the
35 taxable property of the state as equalized.

36 (b) If any agency fails to make the certification under subsection (2) or (3) of this section with
37 respect to any general obligation bond fund program, the Oregon Department of Administrative
38 Services shall determine the amount of revenue and other funds that are available and the amount
39 of taxes, if any, that should be levied in addition to the revenues and funds, to pay bond principal
40 and interest under the program for the fiscal year in question. The additional amount so determined
41 shall thereupon constitute a state tax levy on property that shall be apportioned, certified, collected
42 and distributed as if determined and certified as a deficit by the agency. The Oregon Department
43 of Administrative Services shall charge the agency for cost recovery for time spent on that agency's
44 behalf.

45 (5) Immediately after the department has determined the amount of a state tax levy on property

1 in accordance with subsection (4) of this section, a certificate of levy, signed by the director of the
2 department, shall be filed in the office of the department. If no state levy is required for the fiscal

20 (E) The Housing and Community Services Department, as authorized by Article XI-I(2) of the

26 (b) Each agency authorized to issue general obligation bonds that are ordinarily to be repaid
27 from other than General Fund appropriations shall determine the amount of revenues or other funds
28 that are available and the amount of taxes, if any, that should be levied for the ensuing year in the
29 manner required under rules adopted by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services and
30 make the certification required under subsection (2) of this section.

31 (8)(a) State agencies that are authorized to issue general obligation bonds that are ordinarily to
32 be repaid from General Fund appropriations include but are not limited to:

33 (A) The State Board of Forestry and the State Forester, as authorized by Article XI-E of the
34 Oregon Constitution and ORS 530.210 to 530.280 (state reforestation).

35 (B) The State Board of Higher Education, as authorized by Article XI-G of the Oregon Consti-
36 tution and ORS 351.345 (higher education and community colleges).

37 (C) Other agencies as required by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services by rule
38 adopted using the criterion of this subsection.

39 (b) Each agency authorized to issue general obligation bonds ordinarily to be repaid from Gen-
40 eral Fund appropriations shall furnish any data required by the Oregon Department of Administra-
41 tive Services to determine the amount of revenues or other funds that are available and the amount
42 of taxes, if any, that should be levied for the ensuing year and the administrative division of the
43 Oregon Department of Administrative Services that has primary responsibility for accounting shall
44 make the determination for purposes of the making of the certification required under subsection (3)
45 of this section.

9 **SECTION 26.** ORS 469.421 is amended to read:

10 469.421. (1) Subject to the provisions of ORS 469.441, any person submitting a notice of intent,
11 a request for exemption under ORS 469.320, a request for an expedited review under ORS 469.370,
12 a request for an expedited review under ORS 469.373, a request for the State Department of Energy
13 to approve a pipeline under ORS 469.405 (3), an application for a site certificate or a request to
14 amend a site certificate shall pay all expenses incurred by the Energy Facility Siting Council, the
15 State Department of Energy and the Oregon Department of Administrative Services related to the
16 review and decision of the council. These expenses may include legal expenses, expenses incurred
17 in processing and evaluating the application, issuing a final order or site certificate, commissioning
18 an independent study by a contractor, state agency or local government under ORS 469.360, and
19 changes to the rules of the council that are specifically required and related to the particular site
20 certificate.

21 (2) Every person submitting a notice of intent to file for a site certificate, a request for ex-
22 emption or a request for expedited review shall submit the fee required under the fee schedule es-
23 tablished under ORS 469.441 to the State Department of Energy when the notice or request is
24 submitted to the council. To the extent possible, the full cost of the evaluation shall be paid from
25 the fee paid under this subsection. However, if costs of the evaluation exceed the fee, the person
26 submitting the notice or request shall pay any excess costs shown in an itemized statement prepared
27 by the council. In no event shall the council incur evaluation expenses in excess of 110 percent of
28 the fee initially paid unless the council provides prior notification to the applicant and a detailed
29 projected budget the council believes necessary to complete the project. If costs are less than the
30 fee paid, the excess shall be refunded to the person submitting the notice or request.

31 (3) Before submitting a site certificate application, the applicant shall request from the State
32 Department of Energy an estimate of the costs expected to be incurred in processing the application.
33 The department shall inform the applicant of that amount and require the applicant to make periodic
34 payments of the costs pursuant to a cost reimbursement agreement. The cost reimbursement agree-
35 ment shall provide for payment of 25 percent of the estimated costs when the applicant submits the
36 application. If costs of the evaluation exceed the estimate, the applicant shall pay any excess costs
37 shown in an itemized statement prepared by the council. In no event shall the council incur evalu-
38 ation expenses in excess of 110 percent of the fee initially estimated unless the council provided
39 prior notification to the applicant and a detailed projected budget the council believes is necessary
40 to complete the project. If costs are less than the fee paid, the council shall refund the excess to the
41 applicant.

42 (4) Any person who is delinquent in the payment of fees under subsections (1) to (3) of this
43 section shall be subject to the provisions of subsection (11) of this section.

44 (5) Subject to the provisions of ORS 469.441, each holder of a certificate shall pay an annual fee,
45 due every July 1 following issuance of a site certificate. For each fiscal year, upon approval of the

1 State Department of Energy's budget authorization by [a] **an odd-numbered year** regular session
2 of the Legislative Assembly or as revised by the Emergency Board **meeting in an interim period**
3 **or by the Legislative Assembly meeting in special session or in an even-numbered year reg-**

10 Administrative Services to ensure that the facility is being operated consistently with the terms and
11 conditions of the site certificate, any order issued by the State Department of Energy under ORS
12 469.405 (3) and any applicable health or safety standards, and the general costs to be incurred by
13 the council, the State Department of Energy and the Oregon Department of Administrative Services
14 to ensure that all certificated facilities are being operated consistently with the terms and condi-
15 tions of the site certificates, any orders issued by the State Department of Energy under ORS
16 469.405 (3) and any applicable health or safety standards that cannot be allocated to an individual,
17 licensed facility. Not more than 35 percent of the annual fee charged each facility shall be for the
18 recovery of these general costs. The fees for direct costs shall reflect the size and complexity of the
19 facility and its certificate conditions.

20 (6) Each holder of a site certificate executed after July 1 of any fiscal year shall pay a fee for
21 the remaining portion of the year. The amount of the fee shall be set at the cost of regulating the
22 facility during the remaining portion of the year determined in the same manner as the annual fee.

23 (7) When the actual costs of regulation incurred by the council, the State Department of Energy
24 and the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for the year, including that portion of the
25 general regulation costs that have been allocated to a particular facility, are less than the annual

36 (a) Upon approval of the budget authorization of the Energy Facility Siting Council, the Oregon

39 of Energy shall promptly enter an order establishing the amount of revenues required to be derived

42 ergy, including those enumerated in ORS 469.030 and others authorized by law, for the first fiscal
43 year of the forthcoming biennium. On or before June 1 of each even-numbered year, the Director
44 of the State Department of Energy shall enter an order establishing the amount of revenues required
45 to be derived from an assessment pursuant to this subsection in order to fund the activities of the

1 Energy Facility Siting Council, the Oregon Department of Administrative Services and the State
 2 Department of Energy, including those enumerated in ORS 469.030 and others authorized by law, for
 3 the second fiscal year of the biennium. The order shall take into account any revisions to the

11 (b) Each order issued by the director pursuant to paragraph (a) of this subsection shall allocate
 12 the aggregate assessment set forth therein to energy resource suppliers in accordance with para-

14 (c) The amount assessed to an energy resource supplier shall be based on the ratio which that
 15 supplier's annual gross operating revenue derived within this state in the preceding calendar year
 16 bears to the total gross operating revenue derived within this state during that year by all energy

7 (B) "Gross operating revenue" means gross receipts from sales or service made or provided
8 within this state during the regular course of the energy supplier's business, but does not include
9 either revenue derived from interutility sales within the state or revenue received by a petroleum
10 supplier from the sale of fuels that are subject to the requirements of section 3a, Article IX of the
11 Oregon Constitution, or ORS 319.020 or 319.530.

12 (C) "Petroleum supplier" has the meaning given that term in ORS 469.020.

22 (2) Upon a finding of probable cause, the Secretary of State shall report the finding [*to the*
23 *Legislative Assembly that will convene on the second Monday in January by delivery*] to the Secretary
24 of the Senate or Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives, as appropriate, at least five days prior
25 to the convening of the **odd-numbered year regular session of the Legislative Assembly.**

26 (3) The findings under this section are a public record available for public inspection.

27 (4) Action under this section is in addition to and not in lieu of action under ORS 260.345.

28 **SECTION 72.** ORS 177.120 is amended to read:

29 177.120. (1) The Secretary of State shall compile and issue [*biennially*] on or about February 15
30 of [*the same year as the regular sessions of the Legislative Assembly*] **each odd-numbered year**, an
31 official directory of all state officers, state institutions, boards and commissions and district and
32 county officers of the state, to be known as the Oregon Blue Book, and include therein the infor-
33 mation regarding their functions that the secretary considers most valuable to the people of the

23 chapter 244 may be occurring or may have occurred, the secretary shall notify the Oregon Govern-
24 ment Ethics Commission of the potential violation; and

26 be occurring or may have occurred, the secretary shall notify the appropriate law enforcement
27 agency of the potential fraud or other criminal activity.

22 ending upon adjournment of the regular [*biennial*] session of the Legislative Assembly, or during any

24 (4) A person or political committee affiliated with a political party, caucus of either house of the
25 Legislative Assembly, legislative official, statewide official or the Governor, Governor-elect or candi-
26 date for Governor shall file statements showing contributions received by the person or committee
27 on behalf of the Governor, Governor-elect or candidate for Governor, during the period beginning
28 January 1 [*immediately preceding a regular biennial session of the Legislative Assembly*] and ending
29 30 business days following adjournment of the regular [*biennial*] session of the Legislative Assembly,
