

Senate Bill 116

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Allows State Board of Higher Education to authorize university under board control to establish university police department.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

8 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

9 **SECTION 1. (1) The State Board of Higher Education may, at the request of a public**
10 **university under its control, authorize the university to establish a police department and**
11 **commission one or more of its employees as police officers.**

12 **(2) Police officers commissioned under this section:**

13 **(a) Have all powers and authorities given by statute to peace officers and police officers**
14 **of this state.**

15 **(b) Are not police officers for purposes of ORS 238.005, 243.005 or 243.736.**

16 **(c) Must complete training necessary for certification as police officers at an academy**
17 **operated or authorized by the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training.**

18 **(3) The board may adopt rules to carry out the provisions of this section. The rules may**
19 **describe the terms and conditions of employment for police officers commissioned under this**
20 **section and may include a prohibition on the possession and use of firearms in the course**
21 **of official duty.**

22 **SECTION 2. ORS 352.385 is amended to read:**

23 352.385. (1) The State Board of Higher Education may, at the request of [*any institution*] **a public**
24 **university** under its control, authorize [*that institution*] **the university** to commission one or more
25 of its employees as special campus security officers. [*However,*] The total number of special campus
26 security officers commissioned at the [*institutions*] **public universities** in the Oregon University
27 System [*shall*] **may** not exceed 50. Special campus security officers shall have stop and frisk au-
28 thority as set forth in ORS 131.605 to 131.625 and probable cause arrest authority and the accom-
29 panying immunities as set forth in ORS 133.310 and 133.315 when acting in the scope of their
30 employment as defined by the State Board of Higher Education. Special campus security officers

1 shall not be authorized to carry firearms as police officers and, except as provided in subsection (3)
2 of this section, shall not be considered police officers for purposes of ORS 181.610, 238.005, 243.005
3 or 243.736.

4 (2) The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training shall train special campus security
5 officers at the expense of the State Board of Higher Education.

6 (3) The State Board of Higher Education, acting by and through its special campus security of-
7 ficers, is a criminal justice agency for purposes of rules adopted pursuant to ORS 181.730 (3).

8 **SECTION 3.** ORS 352.360 is amended to read:

9 352.360. (1) The State Board of Higher Education may enact such regulations as the board deems
10 convenient or necessary to provide for the policing, control and regulation of traffic and parking
11 of vehicles on the property of any institution of higher education under the jurisdiction of the board.
12 The regulations may provide for the registration of vehicles, the designation of parking areas, and
13 the assessment and collection of reasonable fees and charges for parking, and shall be filed in ac-
14 cordance with the provisions of ORS chapter 183. The board may require that before a quarterly
15 or yearly parking privilege for any vehicle is granted to any full-time or part-time student to use
16 board property, the student must show that the vehicle is operated by a student holding a valid
17 driver's license, that the vehicle is currently registered and that the student driving the vehicle is
18 insured under a motor vehicle liability insurance policy that meets the requirements described under
19 ORS 806.080 or that the student or owner of the vehicle has provided the Department of Transpor-
20 tation with other satisfactory proof of compliance with the financial responsibility requirements of
21 this state.

22 (2) The regulations enacted pursuant to subsection (1) of this section shall be enforced admin-
23 istratively under procedures adopted by the board for each institution of higher education under the
24 jurisdiction of the board. Administrative and disciplinary sanctions may be imposed upon students,
25 faculty and staff for violation of the regulations, including but not limited to, a reasonable monetary
26 penalty which may be deducted from student deposits, and faculty or staff salaries or other funds
27 in the possession of the institution. The board shall provide opportunity for hearing for the deter-
28 mination of controversies in connection with imposition of fines or penalties. The board may pre-
29 scribe procedures for such hearings despite the provisions of ORS 183.413 to 183.470. Persons other
30 than students, faculty or staff may voluntarily submit to the hearing procedures prescribed by the
31 board, and shall be bound by the results of the hearing. The powers granted to the board by this
32 section are supplemental to the existing powers of the board with respect to the government of ac-
33 tivities of students, faculty and staff and the control and management of property under its juris-
34 diction.

35 (3) The regulations enacted pursuant to subsection (1) of this section may also be enforced by
36 the impoundment of vehicles, and a reasonable fee may be enacted for the cost of impoundment and
37 storage, if any, prior to the release of the vehicles to their owners.

38 (4) All fees and charges for parking privileges and violations are deposited in a designated ac-
39 count in the Oregon University System Fund established by ORS 351.506 for the purpose of defraying
40 the costs of constructing bicycle racks and bicycle lanes and of traffic control, enforcement of traffic
41 and parking regulations, and maintenance and operation of parking facilities and for the purpose
42 of acquiring and constructing additional parking facilities for vehicles at the various institutions,
43 departments or activities under the control of the board. Fees and charges may also be credited to
44 the account in the Oregon University System Fund designated by ORS 351.460. Parking fees shall
45 be established at levels no greater than those required to finance the construction, operation and

1 maintenance of parking facilities on the same campus of the state institution of higher education
 2 on which the parking is provided. Notwithstanding ORS 351.072, parking fees or changes in fees
 3 shall be adopted by rule of the state board subject to the procedure for rules adopted in ORS
 4 chapter 183.

5 (5) Every peace officer may enforce the regulations made by the board under subsection (1) of
 6 this section. *[The board, for the purpose of enforcing its rules and regulations governing traffic control,*
 7 *may appoint peace officers who have the same authority as other peace officers as defined in ORS*
 8 *133.005.]*

9 (6) The board and any municipal corporation or any department, agency or political subdivision
 10 of this state may enter into agreements or contracts with each other for the purpose of providing
 11 a uniform system of enforcement of the rules and regulations of the board enacted pursuant to
 12 subsection (1) of this section.

13 (7) In proceedings brought to enforce regulations enacted pursuant to subsection (1) of this
 14 section, it shall be sufficient to charge the defendant by an unsworn written notice in accordance
 15 with the provisions of ORS 221.333. In any case in which the defendant is not subject to and does
 16 not voluntarily submit to the hearing procedures prescribed under subsection (2) of this section,
 17 proceedings to enforce regulations enacted pursuant to subsection (1) of this section shall be
 18 brought in the name of the board in a circuit court, a justice court or a city court for offenses
 19 committed within the territorial jurisdiction of such court. Such courts shall have concurrent juris-
 20 diction over offenses committed within their respective jurisdictions. All fines, penalties and court
 21 costs recovered shall be paid to the clerk of the court involved and shall be disposed of as provided
 22 in ORS 153.630.

23 **SECTION 4.** ORS 40.275 is amended to read:

24 40.275. (1) As used in this section, "unit of government" means:

25 (a) The federal government or any state or political subdivision thereof; **or**

26 (b) **A university that has commissioned police officers under section 1 of this 2011 Act.**

27 (2) A unit of government has a privilege to refuse to disclose the identity of a person who has
 28 furnished information relating to or assisting in an investigation of a possible violation of law to a
 29 law enforcement officer or member of a legislative committee or its staff conducting an investi-
 30 gation.

31 (3) The privilege created by this section may be claimed by an appropriate representative of the
 32 unit of government if the information was furnished to an officer thereof.

33 (4) No privilege exists under this section:

34 (a) If the identity of the informer or the informer's interest in the subject matter of the com-
 35 munication has been disclosed to those who would have cause to resent the communication by a
 36 holder of the privilege or by the informer's own action, or if the informer appears as a witness for
 37 the unit of government.

38 (b) If it appears from the evidence in the case or from other showing by a party that an informer
 39 may be able to give testimony necessary to a fair determination of the issue of guilt or innocence
 40 in a criminal case or of a material issue on the merits in a civil case to which the unit of govern-
 41 ment is a party, and the unit of government invokes the privilege, and the judge gives the unit of
 42 government an opportunity to show in camera facts relevant to determining whether the informer
 43 can, in fact, supply that testimony. The showing will ordinarily be in the form of affidavits, but the
 44 judge may direct that testimony be taken if the judge finds that the matter cannot be resolved sat-
 45 isfactorily upon affidavit. If the judge finds that there is a reasonable probability that the informer

1 can give the testimony, and the unit of government elects not to disclose identity of the informer,
 2 the judge on motion of the defendant in a criminal case shall dismiss the charges to which the tes-
 3 timony would relate, and the judge may do so on the judge's own motion. In civil cases, the judge
 4 may make any order that justice requires. Evidence submitted to the judge shall be sealed and pre-
 5 served to be made available to the appellate court in the event of an appeal, and the contents shall
 6 not otherwise be revealed without consent of the unit of government. All counsel and parties shall
 7 be permitted to be present at every stage of proceedings under this paragraph except a showing in
 8 camera, at which no counsel or party shall be permitted to be present.

9 (c) If information from an informer is relied upon to establish the legality of the means by which
 10 evidence was obtained and the judge is not satisfied that the information was received from an in-
 11 former reasonably believed to be reliable or credible. The judge may require the identity of the
 12 informer to be disclosed. The judge shall, on request of the unit of government, direct that the dis-
 13 closure be made in camera. All counsel and parties concerned with the issue of legality shall be
 14 permitted to be present at every stage of proceedings under this paragraph except a disclosure in
 15 camera, at which no counsel or party shall be permitted to be present. If disclosure of the identity
 16 of the informer is made in camera, the record thereof shall be sealed and preserved to be made
 17 available to the appellate court in the event of an appeal, and the contents shall not otherwise be
 18 revealed without consent of the unit of government.

19 **SECTION 5.** ORS 44.550 is amended to read:

20 44.550. As used in ORS 44.550 to 44.566:

21 (1) "Civil case" means any proceeding other than a criminal prosecution.

22 (2) "Law enforcement unit" means:

23 (a) The police department of a city [or];

24 (b) The sheriff's department or other police organization of a county; **or**

25 (c) **A university police department established under section 1 of this 2011 Act.**

26 (3) "Police officer" means an officer or member of a law enforcement unit who is employed
 27 full-time as a peace officer by the city or county and who is responsible for enforcing the criminal
 28 laws of this state.

29 (4) "Tribunal" means any person or body before which attendance of witnesses may be required
 30 by subpoena, including an arbitrator in arbitration proceedings.

31 **SECTION 6.** ORS 90.440 is amended to read:

32 90.440. (1) As used in this section:

33 (a) "Group recovery home" means a place that provides occupants with shared living facilities
 34 and that meets the description of a group home under 42 U.S.C. 300x-25.

35 (b) "Illegal drugs" includes controlled substances or prescription drugs:

36 (A) For which the tenant does not have a valid prescription; or

37 (B) That are used by the tenant in a manner contrary to the prescribed regimen.

38 (c) "Peace officer" means a sheriff, constable, marshal or deputy or a member of a state or city
 39 police force, **or a university police officer commissioned under section 1 of this 2011 Act.**

40 (2) Notwithstanding ORS 90.375 and 90.435, a group recovery home may terminate a tenancy and
 41 peaceably remove a tenant without complying with ORS 105.105 to 105.168 if the tenant has used
 42 or possessed alcohol or illegal drugs within the preceding seven days. For purposes of this sub-
 43 section, the following are sufficient proof that a tenant has used or possessed alcohol or illegal
 44 drugs:

45 (a) The tenant fails a test for alcohol or illegal drug use;

1 (b) The tenant refuses a request made in good faith by the group recovery home that the tenant
2 take a test for alcohol or illegal drug use; or

3 (c) Any person has personally observed the tenant using or possessing alcohol or illegal drugs.

4 (3) A group recovery home that undertakes the removal of a tenant under this section shall
5 personally deliver to the tenant a written notice that:

6 (a) Describes why the tenant is being removed;

7 (b) Describes the proof that the tenant has used or possessed alcohol or illegal drugs within the
8 seven days preceding delivery of the notice;

9 (c) Specifies the date and time by which the tenant must move out of the group recovery home;

10 (d) Explains that if the removal was wrongful or in bad faith the tenant may seek injunctive
11 relief to recover possession under ORS 105.121 and may bring an action to recover monetary dam-
12 ages; and

13 (e) Gives contact information for the local legal services office and for the Oregon State Bar's
14 Lawyer Referral Service, identifying those services as possible sources for free or reduced-cost legal
15 services.

16 (4) A written notice in substantially the following form meets the requirements of subsection (3)
17 of this section:

20 This notice is to inform you that you must move out of _____ (insert address of group
21 recovery home) by _____ (insert date and time that is not less than 24 hours after delivery
22 of notice).

23 The reason for this notice is _____ (specify use or possession of alcohol or illegal drugs,
24 as applicable, and dates of occurrence).

25 The proof of your use or possession is _____ (specify facts).

26 If you did not use or possess alcohol or illegal drugs within the seven days before delivery of
27 this notice, if this notice was given in bad faith or if your group recovery home has not substantially
28 complied with ORS 90.440, you may be able to get a court to order the group recovery home to let
29 you move back in. You may also be able to recover monetary damages.

30 You may be eligible for free legal services at your local legal services office _____ (in-
31 sert telephone number) or reduced fee legal services through the Oregon State Bar at 1-800-452-7636.

34 (5) Within the notice period, a group recovery home shall allow a tenant removed under this
35 section to follow any emergency departure plan that was prepared by the tenant and approved by
36 the group recovery home at the time the tenancy began. If the removed tenant does not have an
37 emergency departure plan, a representative of the group recovery home shall offer to take the re-
38 moved tenant to a public shelter, detoxification center or similar location if existing in the commu-
39 nity.

40 (6) The date and time for moving out specified in a notice under subsection (3) of this section
41 must be at least 24 hours after the date and time the notice is delivered to the tenant. If the tenant
42 remains on the group recovery home premises after the date and time for moving out specified in
43 the notice, the tenant is a person remaining unlawfully in a dwelling as described in ORS 164.255
44 and not a person described in ORS 105.115. Only a peace officer may forcibly remove a tenant who
45 remains on the group recovery home premises after the date and time specified for moving out.

1 (7) A group recovery home that removes a tenant under this section shall send a copy of the
 2 notice described in subsection (3) of this section to the Oregon Health Authority no later than 72
 3 hours after delivering the notice to the tenant.

4 (8) A tenant who is removed under subsection (2) of this section may obtain injunctive relief to
 5 recover possession and may recover an amount equal to the greater of actual damages or three
 6 times the tenant’s monthly rent if:

7 (a) The group recovery home removed the tenant in bad faith or without substantially complying
 8 with this section; or

9 (b) If removal is under subsection (2)(c) of this section, the removal was wrongful because the
 10 tenant did not use or possess alcohol or illegal drugs.

11 (9) Notwithstanding ORS 12.125, a tenant who seeks to obtain injunctive relief to recover pos-
 12 session under ORS 105.121 must commence the action to seek relief not more than 90 days after the
 13 date specified in the notice for the tenant to move out.

14 (10) In any court action regarding the removal of a tenant under this section, a group recovery
 15 home may present evidence that the tenant used or possessed alcohol or illegal drugs within seven
 16 days preceding the removal, whether or not the evidence was described in the notice required by
 17 subsection (3) of this section.

18 (11) This section does not prevent a group recovery home from terminating a tenancy as pro-
 19 vided by any other provision of this chapter and evicting a tenant as provided in ORS 105.105 to
 20 105.168.

21 **SECTION 7.** ORS 124.050 is amended to read:

22 124.050. As used in ORS 124.050 to 124.095:

23 (1) “Abuse” means one or more of the following:

24 (a) Any physical injury to an elderly person caused by other than accidental means, or which
 25 appears to be at variance with the explanation given of the injury.

26 (b) Neglect.

27 (c) Abandonment, including desertion or willful forsaking of an elderly person or the withdrawal
 28 or neglect of duties and obligations owed an elderly person by a caretaker or other person.

29 (d) Willful infliction of physical pain or injury upon an elderly person.

30 (e) An act that constitutes a crime under ORS 163.375, 163.405, 163.411, 163.415, 163.425, 163.427,
 31 163.465 or 163.467.

32 (f) Verbal abuse.

33 (g) Financial exploitation.

34 (h) Sexual abuse.

35 (i) Involuntary seclusion of an elderly person for the convenience of a caregiver or to discipline
 36 the person.

37 (j) A wrongful use of a physical or chemical restraint of an elderly person, excluding an act of
 38 restraint prescribed by a licensed physician and any treatment activities that are consistent with
 39 an approved treatment plan or in connection with a court order.

40 (2) “Elderly person” means any person 65 years of age or older who is not subject to the pro-
 41 visions of ORS 441.640 to 441.665.

42 (3) “Facility” means:

43 (a) A long term care facility as that term is defined in ORS 442.015.

44 (b) A residential facility as that term is defined in ORS 443.400, including but not limited to an
 45 assisted living facility.

- 1 (c) An adult foster home as that term is defined in ORS 443.705.
- 2 (4) “Financial exploitation” means:
- 3 (a) Wrongfully taking the assets, funds or property belonging to or intended for the use of an
- 4 elderly person or a person with a disability.
- 5 (b) Alarming an elderly person or a person with a disability by conveying a threat to wrongfully
- 6 take or appropriate money or property of the person if the person would reasonably believe that the
- 7 threat conveyed would be carried out.
- 8 (c) Misappropriating, misusing or transferring without authorization any money from any ac-
- 9 count held jointly or singly by an elderly person or a person with a disability.
- 10 (d) Failing to use the income or assets of an elderly person or a person with a disability effec-
- 11 tively for the support and maintenance of the person.
- 12 (5) “Intimidation” means compelling or deterring conduct by threat.
- 13 (6) “Law enforcement agency” means:
- 14 (a) Any city or municipal police department.
- 15 (b) Any county sheriff’s office.
- 16 (c) The Oregon State Police.
- 17 (d) Any district attorney.
- 18 (e) **A university police department established under section 1 of this 2011 Act.**
- 19 (7) “Neglect” means:
- 20 (a) Failure to provide the care, supervision or services necessary to maintain the physical and
- 21 mental health of an elderly person that may result in physical harm or significant emotional harm
- 22 to the elderly person; or
- 23 (b) The failure of a caregiver to make a reasonable effort to protect an elderly person from
- 24 abuse.
- 25 (8) “Person with a disability” means a person described in:
- 26 (a) ORS 410.040 (7)(b); or
- 27 (b) ORS 410.715.
- 28 (9) “Public or private official” means:
- 29 (a) Physician, naturopathic physician, osteopathic physician, chiropractor, physician assistant
- 30 or podiatric physician and surgeon, including any intern or resident.
- 31 (b) Licensed practical nurse, registered nurse, nurse practitioner, nurse’s aide, home health aide
- 32 or employee of an in-home health service.
- 33 (c) Employee of the Department of Human Services or community developmental disabilities
- 34 program.
- 35 (d) Employee of the Oregon Health Authority, county health department or community mental
- 36 health program.
- 37 (e) Peace officer.
- 38 (f) Member of the clergy.
- 39 (g) Regulated social worker.
- 40 (h) Physical, speech or occupational therapist.
- 41 (i) Senior center employee.
- 42 (j) Information and referral or outreach worker.
- 43 (k) Licensed professional counselor or licensed marriage and family therapist.
- 44 (L) Any public official who comes in contact with elderly persons in the performance of the
- 45 official’s official duties.

1 (m) Firefighter or emergency medical technician.

2 (n) Psychologist.

3 (o) Provider of adult foster care or an employee of the provider.

4 (p) Audiologist.

5 (q) Speech-language pathologist.

6 (10) "Services" includes but is not limited to the provision of food, clothing, medicine, housing,
7 medical services, assistance with bathing or personal hygiene or any other service essential to the
8 well-being of an elderly person.

9 (11)(a) "Sexual abuse" means:

10 (A) Sexual contact with an elderly person who does not consent or is considered incapable of
11 consenting to a sexual act under ORS 163.315;

12 (B) Sexual harassment, sexual exploitation or inappropriate exposure to sexually explicit mate-
13 rial or language;

14 (C) Any sexual contact between an employee of a facility or paid caregiver and an elderly per-
15 son served by the facility or caregiver;

16 (D) Any sexual contact between an elderly person and a relative of the elderly person other
17 than a spouse; or

18 (E) Any sexual contact that is achieved through force, trickery, threat or coercion.

19 (b) "Sexual abuse" does not mean consensual sexual contact between an elderly person and a
20 paid caregiver who is the spouse of the elderly person.

21 (12) "Sexual contact" has the meaning given that term in ORS 163.305.

22 (13) "Verbal abuse" means to threaten significant physical or emotional harm to an elderly
23 person or a person with a disability through the use of:

24 (a) Derogatory or inappropriate names, insults, verbal assaults, profanity or ridicule; or

25 (b) Harassment, coercion, threats, intimidation, humiliation, mental cruelty or inappropriate
26 sexual comments.

27 **SECTION 8.** ORS 131.605 is amended to read:

28 131.605. As used in ORS 131.605 to 131.625, unless the context requires otherwise:

29 (1) "Crime" has the meaning provided for that term in ORS 161.515.

30 (2) "Dangerous weapon," "deadly weapon" and "person" have the *[meaning provided for]*
31 **meanings given** those terms in ORS 161.015.

32 (3) "Frisk" is an external patting of a person's outer clothing.

33 (4) "Is about to commit" means unusual conduct that leads a peace officer reasonably to con-
34 clude in light of the officer's training and experience that criminal activity may be afoot.

35 **(5) "Peace officer" has the meaning given that term in ORS 133.005.**

36 *[(5)]* **(6)** "Reasonably suspects" means that a peace officer holds a belief that is reasonable under
37 the totality of the circumstances existing at the time and place the peace officer acts as authorized
38 in ORS 131.605 to 131.625.

39 *[(6)]* **(7)** A "stop" is a temporary restraint of a person's liberty by a peace officer lawfully pres-
40 ent in any place.

41 **SECTION 9.** ORS 133.005 is amended to read:

42 133.005. As used in ORS 133.005 to 133.381 and 133.410 to 133.450, unless the context requires
43 otherwise:

44 (1) "Arrest" means to place a person under actual or constructive restraint or to take a person
45 into custody for the purpose of charging that person with an offense. A "stop" as authorized under

1 ORS 131.605 to 131.625 is not an arrest.

2 (2) “Federal officer” means a special agent or law enforcement officer employed by a federal
3 agency who is empowered to effect an arrest with or without a warrant for violations of the United
4 States Code and who is authorized to carry firearms in the performance of duty.

5 (3) “Peace officer” means:

6 (a) A member of the Oregon State Police [*or*];

7 (b) A sheriff, constable, marshal[,] **or** municipal police officer, **or a university police officer**
8 **commissioned under section 1 of this 2011 Act;**

9 (c) **An** investigator of a district attorney’s office if the investigator is or has been certified as
10 a peace officer in this or any other state[.]; or

11 (d) An investigator of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice of the State
12 of Oregon.

13 **SECTION 10. ORS 133.033 is added to and made a part of ORS 133.005 to 133.381.**

14 **SECTION 11.** ORS 133.033 is amended to read:

15 133.033. (1) Except as otherwise expressly prohibited by law, any peace officer [*of this state, as*
16 *defined in ORS 133.005,*] is authorized to perform community caretaking functions.

17 (2) As used in this section, “community caretaking functions” means any lawful acts that are
18 inherent in the duty of the peace officer to serve and protect the public. “Community caretaking
19 functions” includes, but is not limited to:

20 (a) The right to enter or remain upon the premises of another if it reasonably appears to be
21 necessary to:

22 (A) Prevent serious harm to any person or property;

23 (B) Render aid to injured or ill persons; or

24 (C) Locate missing persons.

25 (b) The right to stop or redirect traffic or aid motorists or other persons when such action
26 reasonably appears to be necessary to:
