SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Updates connection date to federal Internal Revenue Code and other provisions of federal tax law. [*Maintains December 31, 2009, connection date for bonus depreciation and section 179 expensing for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2010, and before January 1, 2011.*] **For decedents dying after December 31, 2009, and before December 17, 2010, allows nine-month extension to file inheritance tax return in conformity with extension provided under federal law. Requires payment of inheritance tax as provided in existing state law without regard to extension provided in federal law.**

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

7 **SECTION 1.** ORS 238A.005, as amended by section 9, chapter 1, Oregon Laws 2010, and section
8 1, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended to read:

9 238A.005. For the purposes of this chapter:

10 (1) "Active member" means a member of the pension program or the individual account program
11 of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan who is actively employed in a qualifying position.

12 (2) "Actuarial equivalent" means a payment or series of payments having the same value as the
13 payment or series of payments replaced, computed on the basis of interest rate and mortality as-
14 sumptions adopted by the board.

15 (3) "Board" means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

16 (4) "Eligible employee" means a person who performs services for a participating public em-
17 ployer, including elected officials other than judges. "Eligible employee" does not include:

18 (a) Persons engaged as independent contractors;

19 (b) Aliens working under a training or educational visa;

20 (c) Persons, other than workers in the Industries for the Blind Program under ORS 346.190,
21 provided sheltered employment or make-work by a public employer;

22 (d) Persons categorized by a participating public employer as student employees;

23 (e) Any person who is an inmate of a state institution;

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (f) Employees of foreign trade offices of the Oregon Business Development Department who live
2 and perform services in foreign countries under the provisions of ORS 285A.075 (1)(g);

3 (g) An employee actively participating in an alternative retirement program established under
4 ORS 353.250 or an optional retirement plan established under ORS 341.551;

5 (h) Employees of the Oregon University System who are actively participating in an optional
6 retirement plan offered under ORS 243.800;

7 (i) Any employee who belongs to a class of employees that was not eligible on August 28, 2003,
8 for membership in the system under the provisions of ORS chapter 238 or other law;

9 (j) Any person who belongs to a class of employees who are not eligible to become members of
10 the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan under the provisions of ORS 238A.070 (2);

11 (k) Any person who is retired under ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245 or ORS chapter 238 and who
12 continues to receive retirement benefits while employed; and

13 (L) Judges.

14 (5) "Firefighter" means:

15 (a) A person employed by a local government, as defined in ORS 174.116, whose primary job
16 duties include the fighting of fires;

17 (b) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy state fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals;
18 and

19 (c) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a
20 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled
21 fires as described in ORS 477.064.

22 (6) "Fund" means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

23 (7)(a) "Hour of service" means:

24 (A) An hour for which an eligible employee is directly or indirectly paid or entitled to payment
25 by a participating public employer for performance of duties in a qualifying position; and

26 (B) An hour of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or authorized leave
27 during which an employee does not perform duties but for which the employee is directly or indi-
28 rectly paid or entitled to payment by a participating public employer for services in a qualifying
29 position, as long as the hour is within the number of hours regularly scheduled for the performance
30 of duties during the period of vacation, holiday, illness, incapacity, jury duty, military duty or au-
31 thorized leave.

32 (b) "Hour of service" does not include any hour for which payment is made or due under a plan
33 maintained solely for the purpose of complying with applicable workers' compensation laws or un-
34 employment compensation laws.

35 (8) "Inactive member" means a member of the pension program or the individual account pro-
36 gram of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan whose membership has not been terminated, who
37 is not a retired member and who is not employed in a qualifying position.

38 (9) "Individual account program" means the defined contribution individual account program of
39 the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

40 (10) "Member" means an eligible employee who has established membership in the pension pro-
41 gram or the individual account program of the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan and whose
42 membership has not been terminated under ORS 238A.110 or 238A.310.

43 (11) "Participating public employer" means a public employer as defined in ORS 238.005 that
44 provides retirement benefits for employees of the public employer under the system.

45 (12) "Pension program" means the defined benefit pension program of the Oregon Public Service

1 Retirement Plan established under ORS 238A.025.

2 (13) "Police officer" means a police officer as described in ORS 238.005.

3 (14) "Qualifying position" means one or more jobs with one or more participating public em-
4 ployers in which an eligible employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year,
5 excluding any service in a job for which benefits are not provided under the Oregon Public Service
6 Retirement Plan pursuant to ORS 238A.070 (2).

7 (15) "Retired member" means a pension program member who is receiving a pension as provided
8 in ORS 238A.180 to 238A.195.

9 (16)(a) "Salary" means the remuneration paid to an active member in return for services to the
10 participating public employer, including remuneration in the form of living quarters, board or other
11 items of value, to the extent the remuneration is includable in the employee's taxable income under
12 Oregon law. Salary includes the additional amounts specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection,
13 but does not include the amounts specified in paragraph (c) of this subsection, regardless of whether
14 those amounts are includable in taxable income.

15 (b) "Salary" includes the following amounts:

16 (A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan that are made
17 at the election of the employee.

18 (B) Contributions to a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity that are made at the election of the
19 employee.

20 (C) Any amount that is contributed to a cafeteria plan or qualified transportation fringe benefit
21 plan by the employer at the election of the employee and that is not includable in the taxable in-
22 come of the employee by reason of 26 U.S.C. 125 or 132(f)(4), as in effect on December 31, [2009]
23 **2010**.

24 (D) Any amount that is contributed to a cash or deferred arrangement by the employer at the
25 election of the employee and that is not included in the taxable income of the employee by reason
26 of 26 U.S.C. 402(e)(3), as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**.

27 (E) Retroactive payments described in section 7, chapter 1, Oregon Laws 2010.

28 (F) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by
29 the employer and deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS 238A.335
30 (1) and (2)(a).

31 (G) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is not paid
32 by the employer under ORS 238A.335.

33 (H) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS
34 652.190.

35 (c) "Salary" does not include the following amounts:

36 (A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer's business which is reimbursed by the
37 employer.

38 (B) Payments made on account of an employee's death.

39 (C) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave, vacation leave or other paid
40 leave.

41 (D) Any severance payment, accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period
42 or advance against future wages.

43 (E) Any retirement incentive, retirement bonus or retirement gratuitous payment.

44 (F) Payment for a leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have agreed that
45 no future services in a qualifying position will be performed.

1 (G) Payments for instructional services rendered to institutions of the Oregon University System
2 or the Oregon Health and Science University when those services are in excess of full-time em-
3 ployment subject to this chapter. A person employed under a contract for less than 12 months is
4 subject to this subparagraph only for the months covered by the contract.

5 (H) The amount of an employee contribution to the individual account program that is paid by
6 the employer and is not deducted from the compensation of the employee, as provided under ORS
7 238A.335 (1) and (2)(b).

8 (I) Any amount in excess of \$200,000 for a calendar year. If any period over which salary is
9 determined is less than 12 months, the \$200,000 limitation for that period shall be multiplied by a
10 fraction, the numerator of which is the number of months in the determination period and the de-
11 nominator of which is 12. The board shall adopt rules adjusting this dollar limit to incorporate
12 cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

13 (17) "System" means the Public Employees Retirement System.

14 **SECTION 2.** ORS 238A.125, as amended by section 2, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
15 to read:

16 238A.125. (1) Upon retiring at normal retirement age, a vested pension program member shall
17 be paid an annual pension for the life of the member as follows:

18 (a) For service as a police officer or firefighter, 1.8 percent of final average salary multiplied
19 by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as a police officer or firefighter.

20 (b) For service as other than a police officer or firefighter, 1.5 percent of final average salary
21 multiplied by the number of years of retirement credit attributable to service as other than a police
22 officer or firefighter.

23 (2) Notwithstanding any provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, the annual benefit payable to
24 a member under the pension program and under any other tax-qualified defined benefit plan main-
25 tained by the participating public employer may not exceed the applicable limitations set forth in
26 26 U.S.C. 415(b), as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**. The Public Employees Retirement Board
27 shall adopt rules for the administration of this limitation, including adjustments in the annual dollar
28 limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments authorized by the Internal Revenue Service.

29 (3) The board shall make no actuarial adjustment in a member's pension calculated under this
30 section by reason of the member's retirement after normal retirement age.

31 **SECTION 3.** ORS 238A.150, as amended by section 3, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
32 to read:

33 238A.150. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, an eligible em-
34 ployee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed ser-
35 vices, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with
36 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to accrue retirement credit, credit toward the
37 probationary period required by ORS 238A.100 and credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS
38 238A.115 under rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2)
39 of this section.

40 (2) The board shall adopt rules establishing benefits and service credit for any period of service
41 in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the purpose
42 of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all federal
43 law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed services, in-
44 cluding 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**. Benefits and service credit under
45 rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed benefits and service credit

1 required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed services.

2 **SECTION 4.** ORS 238A.170, as amended by section 4, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
3 to read:

4 238A.170. (1) An active member of the pension program who is 70-1/2 years of age or older must
5 retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which the member
6 terminates employment with all participating public employers. An inactive member of the pension
7 program must retire not later than April 1 of the calendar year following the calendar year in which
8 the member attains 70-1/2 years of age.

9 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, the entire interest of a
10 member of the pension program must be distributed over a time period commencing no later than
11 the required beginning date set forth in subsection (1) of this section, and must be distributed in a
12 manner that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regu-
13 lations implementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**. The Public Employees
14 Retirement Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

15 **SECTION 5.** ORS 238A.230, as amended by section 5, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
16 to read:

17 238A.230. (1) If a member of the pension program who is vested dies before the member's effec-
18 tive date of retirement, the Public Employees Retirement Board shall pay the death benefit provided
19 for in this section to the spouse of the member or to any other person who is constitutionally re-
20 quired to be treated in the same manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits.

21 (2)(a) The death benefit to be paid under this section shall be for the life of the spouse or other
22 person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same manner as a spouse, and shall be
23 the actuarial equivalent of 50 percent of the pension that would otherwise have been paid to the
24 deceased member.

25 (b) For the purpose of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the amount of the pension that would
26 otherwise have been paid to the deceased member shall be calculated:

27 (A) As of the date of death if the member dies after the earliest retirement date for the member
28 under ORS 238A.165; or

29 (B) As if the member became an inactive member on the date of death and thereafter retired
30 at the earliest retirement date if the member dies before the earliest retirement date for the member
31 under ORS 238A.165.

32 (3) The death benefit provided under this section is first effective on the first day of the month
33 following the date of death of the member. The surviving spouse or other person entitled to the
34 death benefit may elect to delay payment of the death benefit, but payment must commence no later
35 than December 31 of the calendar year in which the member would have reached 70-1/2 years of age.

36 (4) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.100 to 238A.245, distributions of death
37 benefits under the pension program must comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26
38 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations implementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2009]
39 **2010**. The board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

40 **SECTION 6.** ORS 238A.370, as amended by section 6, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
41 to read:

42 238A.370. Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the annual addition
43 to the employee and employer accounts of a member of the individual account program for a cal-
44 endar year, together with the annual additions to the accounts of the member under any other de-
45 fined contribution plan maintained by the participating public employer for a calendar year, may

1 not exceed the lesser of \$40,000, or 100 percent of the member's compensation for that calendar year.
2 For purposes of this section, "annual addition" has the meaning given that term in 26 U.S.C.
3 415(c)(2), as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**, and "compensation" has the meaning given the
4 term "participant's compensation" in 26 U.S.C. 415(c)(3), as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**.
5 The Public Employees Retirement Board shall adopt rules for the administration of this limitation,
6 including adjustments in the annual dollar limitation to reflect cost-of-living adjustments authorized
7 by the Internal Revenue Service.

8 **SECTION 7.** ORS 238A.400, as amended by section 7, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
9 to read:

10 238A.400. (1) Upon retirement on or after the earliest retirement date, as described in ORS
11 238A.165, a member of the individual account program shall receive in a lump sum the amounts in
12 the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account to the extent the member
13 is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320.

14 (2) In lieu of a lump sum payment under subsection (1) of this section, a member of the individ-
15 ual account program may elect to receive the amounts in the member's employee account and em-
16 ployer account, to the extent the member is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, in
17 substantially equal installments paid over a period of 5, 10, 15 or 20 years, or over a period that is
18 equal to the anticipated life span of the member as actuarially determined by the Public Employees
19 Retirement Board. Installments may be made on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis. In no event
20 may the period selected by the member exceed the time allowed by the minimum distribution re-
21 quirements described in subsection (5) of this section. The board shall by rule establish the manner
22 in which installments will be adjusted to reflect investment gains and losses on the unpaid balance
23 during the payout period elected by the member under this subsection. The board by rule may es-
24 tablish minimum monthly amounts payable under this subsection. The board may require that a
25 lump sum payment, or an installment schedule different than the schedules provided for in this
26 subsection, be used to pay the vested amounts in the member's accounts if those amounts are not
27 adequate to generate the minimum monthly amounts specified by the rule.

28 (3) A member of the individual account program electing to receive installments under sub-
29 section (2) of this section must designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries. In the event the member dies
30 before all amounts in the employee and vested employer accounts are paid, all remaining installment
31 payments shall be made to the beneficiary or beneficiaries designated by the member. A beneficiary
32 may elect to receive a lump sum distribution of the remaining amounts.

33 (4) A member who is entitled to receive retirement benefits under ORS chapter 238 may receive
34 vested amounts in the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account in the
35 manner provided by this section when the member retires for service under the provisions of ORS
36 chapter 238.

37 (5) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, the entire interest of a
38 member of the individual account program must be distributed over a time period commencing no
39 later than the latest retirement date set forth in ORS 238A.170, and must be distributed in a manner
40 that satisfies all other minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and regulations im-
41 plementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**. The board shall adopt rules im-
42 plementing those minimum distribution requirements.

43 **SECTION 8.** ORS 238A.410, as amended by section 8, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
44 to read:

45 238A.410. (1) If a member of the individual account program dies before retirement, the amounts

1 in the member's employee account, rollover account and employer account, to the extent the member
2 is vested in those accounts under ORS 238A.320, shall be paid in a lump sum to the beneficiary or
3 beneficiaries designated by the member for the purposes of this section.

4 (2) If a member of the individual account program is married at the time of death, or there exists
5 at the time of death any other person who is constitutionally required to be treated in the same
6 manner as a spouse for the purpose of retirement benefits, the spouse or other person shall be the
7 beneficiary for purposes of the death benefit payable under this section unless the spouse or other
8 person consents to the designation of a different beneficiary or beneficiaries before the designation
9 has been made and the consent has not been revoked by the spouse or other person as of the time
10 of the member's death. Consent and revocation of consent must be in writing, acknowledged by a
11 notary public, and submitted to the Public Employees Retirement Board in accordance with rules
12 adopted by the board. If the member's spouse is designated as the member's beneficiary and the
13 marriage of the member and spouse is subsequently dissolved, the former spouse shall be treated as
14 predeceasing the member for purposes of this section, unless the member expressly designates the
15 former spouse as beneficiary after the effective date of the dissolution or the former spouse is re-
16 quired to be designated as a beneficiary under the provisions of ORS 238.465.

17 (3) For purposes of this section and ORS 238A.400 (3), if a member fails to designate a benefi-
18 ciary, or if the person or persons designated do not survive the member, the death benefit provided
19 for in this section shall be paid to the following person or persons, in the following order of priority:

20 (a) The member's surviving spouse or other person who is constitutionally required to be treated
21 in the same manner as a spouse;

22 (b) The member's surviving children, in equal shares; or

23 (c) The member's estate.

24 (4) The entire amount of a deceased member's vested accounts must be distributed by December
25 31 of the fifth calendar year after the year in which the member died. Notwithstanding any other
26 provision of this chapter, distributions of death benefits under the individual account program must
27 comply with the minimum distribution requirements of 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9) and the regulations im-
28 plementing that section, as in effect on December 31, [2009] 2010. The Public Employees Retirement
29 Board shall adopt rules implementing those minimum distribution requirements.

30 **SECTION 9.** ORS 238A.415, as amended by section 9, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is amended
31 to read:

32 238A.415. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 238A.300 to 238A.415, an eligible em-
33 ployee who leaves a qualifying position for the purpose of performing service in the uniformed ser-
34 vices, and who subsequently returns to employment with a participating public employer with
35 reemployment rights under federal law, is entitled to credit toward the probationary period required
36 by ORS 238A.300, credit toward the vesting requirements of ORS 238A.320 and contributions under
37 rules adopted by the Public Employees Retirement Board pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.

38 (2) The board shall adopt rules establishing contributions and service credit for any period of
39 service in the uniformed services by an employee described in subsection (1) of this section. For the
40 purpose of adopting rules under this subsection, the board shall consider and take into account all
41 federal law relating to benefits and service credit for any period of service in the uniformed ser-
42 vices, including 26 U.S.C. 414(u), as in effect on December 31, [2009] 2010. Contributions and service
43 credit under rules adopted by the board pursuant to this subsection may not exceed contributions
44 and service credit required under federal law for periods of service in the uniformed services.

45 **SECTION 10.** ORS 238A.430, as amended by section 10, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is

1 amended to read:

2 238A.430. (1) To the extent required by law, and except as otherwise provided by rules adopted
3 by the Public Employees Retirement Board under subsection (4) of this section, any portion of a
4 distribution of benefits described in subsection (2) of this section shall, at the election of and in lieu
5 of distribution to the distributee, be paid directly to an eligible retirement plan specified by the
6 distributee.

7 (2) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to a distribution of any benefit under
8 the pension program or the individual account program except:

9 (a) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least
10 annually for the life or life expectancy of the distributee, or for the joint lives or life expectancies
11 of the distributee and a designated beneficiary;

12 (b) A distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments made at least
13 annually for a specified period of 10 years or more; and

14 (c) A distribution to the extent that the distribution is required under 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(9).

15 (3) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section apply to any portion of a distribution of
16 benefits under the pension program or the individual account program even though the portion
17 consists of after-tax employee contributions that are not includable in gross income. Any portion of
18 a distribution that consists of after-tax employee contributions that are not includable in gross in-
19 come may be transferred only to an individual retirement account or annuity described in 26 U.S.C.
20 408(a) or (b), or to a qualified defined contribution or defined benefit plan described in 26 U.S.C.
21 401(a) or 403(b) that agrees to account separately for amounts transferred, including accounting
22 separately for the portion of the distribution that is includable in gross income and the portion of
23 the distribution that is not includable in gross income. The amount transferred shall be treated as
24 consisting first of the portion of the distribution that is includable in gross income, determined
25 without regard to 26 U.S.C. 402(c)(1).

26 (4) The board shall adopt rules implementing the direct rollover requirements of 26 U.S.C.
27 401(a)(31) and the regulations implementing that section, and may adopt administrative exceptions
28 to the direct rollover requirements to the extent permitted by 26 U.S.C. 401(a)(31) and the regu-
29 lations implementing that section.

30 (5) All references in this section to federal laws and regulations are to the laws and regulations
31 in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**.

32 (6) For purposes of this section:

33 (a) "Distributee" means a member, a member's surviving spouse or a member's alternate payee
34 under ORS 238.465.

35 (b) "Eligible retirement plan" means:

36 (A) An individual retirement account described in 26 U.S.C. 408(a);

37 (B) An individual retirement annuity described in 26 U.S.C. 408(b), other than an endowment
38 contract;

39 (C) A qualified trust under 26 U.S.C. 401(a), that is a defined contribution or defined benefit plan
40 and permits the acceptance of rollover contributions;

41 (D) An annuity plan described in 26 U.S.C. 403(a);

42 (E) An eligible deferred compensation plan described in 26 U.S.C. 457(b) that is maintained by
43 an eligible governmental employer described in 26 U.S.C. 457(e)(1)(A) and that agrees to account
44 separately for amounts transferred into such plan from the distributing plan; or

45 (F) An annuity contract described in 26 U.S.C. 403(b).

2 amended to read:

3 305.230. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 9.320:

5 who has been granted active enrollment to practice before the Internal Revenue Service and who
6 is qualified to prepare tax returns in this state or any person who is the authorized employee of a
7 taxpayer and is regularly employed by the taxpayer in tax matters may represent the taxpayer be-
8 fore a tax court magistrate or the Department of Revenue in any conference or proceeding with
9 respect to the administration of any tax.

10 (b) Any person who is licensed by the State Board of Tax Practitioners or who is exempt from
11 such licensing requirement as provided for and limited by ORS 673.610 may represent a taxpayer
12 before a tax court magistrate or the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to the
13 administration of any tax on or measured by net income.

14 (c) Any shareholder of an S corporation, as defined in section 1361 of the Internal Revenue
15 Code, as amended and in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**, may represent the corporation in any
16 proceeding before a tax court magistrate or the department in the same manner as if the share-
17 holder were a partner and the S corporation were a partnership. The S corporation must designate
18 in writing a tax matters shareholder authorized to represent the S corporation.

19 (d) An individual who is licensed as a real estate broker or principal real estate broker under
20 ORS 696.022 or is a state certified appraiser or state licensed appraiser under ORS 674.310 or is a
21 registered appraiser under ORS 308.010 may represent a taxpayer before a tax court magistrate or
22 the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to the administration of any ad
23 valorem property tax.

24 (e) A general partner who has been designated by members of a partnership as their tax matters
25 partner under ORS 305.242 may represent those partners in any conference or proceeding with re-
26 spect to the administration of any tax on or measured by net income.

27 (f) Any person authorized under rules adopted by the department may represent a taxpayer be-
28 fore the department in any conference or proceeding with respect to any tax. Rules adopted under
29 this paragraph, to the extent feasible, shall be consistent with federal law that governs represen-

32 (g) Any person authorized under rules adopted by the tax court may represent a taxpayer in a
33 proceeding before a tax court magistrate.

36 to the satisfaction of the magistrate or department that the representative does in fact have au-

34 or property owner, whether stated as a minimum, fixed or variable amount. "Actual cost" includes,
35 but is not limited to, the costs of labor, materials, supplies, equipment rental, property acquisition,
36 permits, engineering, financing, reasonable program delinquencies, return on investment, required
37 fees, insurance, administration, accounting, depreciation, amortization, operation, maintenance, re-
38 pair or replacement and debt service, including debt service payments or payments into reserve ac-
39 counts for debt service and payment of amounts necessary to meet debt service coverage
40 requirements.

41 (2) "Assessment for local improvement" means any tax, fee, charge or assessment that does not
42 exceed the actual cost incurred by a unit of government for design, construction and financing of
43 a local improvement.

44 (3) "Bonded indebtedness" means any formally executed written agreement representing a
45 promise by a unit of government to pay to another a specified sum of money, at a specified date or

1 dates at least one year in the future.

2 (4) "Capital construction":

3 (a) For bonded indebtedness issued prior to December 5, 1996, and for the proceeds of any
4 bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that were spent or
5 contractually obligated to be spent prior to June 20, 1997, means the construction, modification,
6 replacement, repair, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or addition to a structure, that is ex-
7 pected to have a useful life of more than one year, and includes, but is not limited to:

8 (A) Acquisition of land, or a legal interest in land, in conjunction with the capital construction
9 of a structure.

10 (B) Acquisition, installation of machinery or equipment, furnishings or materials that will be-
11 come an integral part of a structure.

12 (C) Activities related to the capital construction, including planning, design, authorizing, issuing,
13 carrying or repaying interim or permanent financing, research, land use and environmental impact
14 studies, acquisition of permits or licenses or other services connected with the construction.

15 (D) Acquisition of existing structures, or legal interests in structures, in conjunction with the
16 capital construction.

36 bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that were spent or
37 contractually obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, has the meaning given that term in para-
38 graph (a) of this subsection, except that "capital improvements":

39 (A) Includes public safety and law enforcement vehicles with a projected useful life of five years

9 ments that was issued as a general obligation of the issuing governmental unit on or before No-
10 vember 6, 1990;

40 (A) That provides a special benefit only to specific properties or rectifies a problem caused by

4 (10) "Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated":

5 (a) Means activities, the type of which may be deducted as an expense under the provisions of
6 the federal Internal Revenue Code, as amended and in effect on December 31, [2009] 2010, that keep
7 the property in ordinarily efficient operating condition and that do not add materially to the value
8 of the property nor appreciably prolong the life of the property;

9 (b) Does not include maintenance and repair of property that is required by damage, destruction
10 or defect in design, or that was otherwise not reasonably expected at the time the property was
11 constructed or acquired, or the addition of material that is in the nature of the replacement of
12 property and that arrests the deterioration or appreciably prolongs the useful life of the property;
13 and

14 (c) Does not include street and highway construction, overlay and reconstruction.

15 (11) "Projected useful life" means the useful life, as reasonably estimated by the unit of gov-
16 ernment undertaking the capital construction or capital improvement project, beginning with the
17 date the property was acquired, constructed or reconstructed and based on the property's condition
18 at the time the property was acquired, constructed or reconstructed.

19 (12) "Routine obligations of ownership" means a standard of operation, maintenance, use or care
20 of property established by law, or if established by custom or common law, a standard that is rea-
21 sonable for the type of property affected.

22 (13) "Single assessment" means the complete assessment process, including preassessment, as-
23 sessment or reassessment, for any local improvement authorized by ORS 223.387 to 223.399, or a
24 local ordinance or resolution that provides the procedure to be followed in making local assessments

27 (14) "Special benefit only to specific properties" shall have the same meaning as "special and

6 (1) "Contract rent" means rental paid to the landlord for the right to occupy a homestead, in-
7 cluding the right to use the personal property located therein. "Contract rent" does not include
8 rental paid for the right to occupy a homestead that is exempt from taxation, unless payments in lieu
9 of taxes of 10 percent or more of the rental exclusive of fuel and utilities are made on behalf of the

18 made solely to secure those commodities or services for the homestead of the taxpayer. "Fuel and
19 utility payments" does not include telephone service.

20 (4) "Gross rent" means contract rent paid plus the fuel and utility payments made for the
21 homestead in addition to the contract rent, during the calendar year for which the claim is filed.

22 (5) "Homestead" means the taxable principal dwelling located in Oregon, either real or personal
23 property, rented by the taxpayer, and the taxable land area of the tax lot upon which it is built.

24 (6) "Household" means the taxpayer, the spouse of the taxpayer and all other persons residing
25 in the homestead during any part of the calendar year for which a claim is filed.

26 (7) "Household income" means the aggregate income of the taxpayer and the spouse of the tax-

- 6 (N) Payments received under the federal Social Security Act which are excluded from federal
7 gross income.
- 8 (O) Welfare payments, except as follows:
- 9 (i) Payments for medical care, drugs and medical supplies, if the payments are not made directly
10 to the welfare recipient;
- 11 (ii) In-home services authorized and approved by the Department of Human Services; and
- 12 (iii) Direct or indirect reimbursement of expenses paid or incurred for participation in work or
13 training programs.
- 14 (P) Nontaxable dividends.
- 15 (Q) Nontaxable interest not included in federal adjusted gross income.
- 16 (R) Rental allowance paid to a minister that is excluded from federal gross income.
- 17 (S) Income from sources without the United States that is excluded from federal gross income.
- 18 (b) Adjusted gross income shall be increased due to the disallowance of the following deductions:
- 19 (A) The amount of the net loss, in excess of \$1,000, from all dispositions of tangible or intangible
20 properties.

- 22 (C) The amount of the net loss, in excess of \$1,000, from all operations of a trade or business,
23 profession or other activity entered into for the production or collection of income.

42 (b) A qualified borrower who:

43 (A) Uses the loan proceeds to finance construction, development, acquisition or rehabilitation
44 of housing; and

45 (B) Provides a written certification executed by the Housing and Community Services Depart-

1 ment that the:

2 (i) Housing created by the loan is or will be occupied by households earning less than 80 percent
3 of the area median income; and

4 (ii) Full amount of savings from the reduced interest rate provided by the lending institution is
5 or will be passed on to the tenants in the form of reduced housing payments, regardless of other
6 subsidies provided to the housing project;

7 (c) Subject to subsection (14) of this section, a qualified borrower who:

8 (A) Uses the loan proceeds to finance construction, development, acquisition or rehabilitation
9 of housing consisting of a manufactured dwelling park; and

10 (B) Provides a written certification executed by the Housing and Community Services Depart-
11 ment that the housing will continue to be operated as a manufactured dwelling park during the pe-
12 riod for which the tax credit is allowed; or

13 (d) A qualified borrower who:

14 (A) Uses the loan proceeds to finance acquisition or rehabilitation of housing consisting of a
15 preservation project; and

16 (B) Provides a written certification executed by the Housing and Community Services Depart-
17 ment that the housing preserved by the loan:

18 (i) Is or will be occupied by households earning less than 80 percent of the area median income;
19 and

20 (ii) Is the subject of a rent assistance contract with the United States Department of Housing
21 and Urban Development or the United States Department of Agriculture that will be maintained by
22 the qualified borrower.

23 (6) A loan made to refinance a loan that meets the criteria stated in subsection (5) of this sec-
24 tion must be treated the same as a loan that meets the criteria stated in subsection (5) of this sec-
25 tion.

26 (7) For a qualified loan to be eligible for the tax credit allowable under this section, the Housing
27 and Community Services Department must execute a written certification for the qualified loan that:

28 (a) Specifies the period, not to exceed 20 years, as determined by the Housing and Community
29 Services Department, during which the tax credit is allowed for the qualified loan; and

30 (b) States that the qualified loan is within the limitation imposed by subsection (8) of this sec-
31 tion.

32 (8) The Housing and Community Services Department may certify qualified loans that are eligi-
33 ble under subsection (5) of this section if the total credits attributable to all qualified loans eligible
34 for credits under this section and then outstanding do not exceed \$17 million for any fiscal year. In
35 making loan certifications under subsection (7) of this section, the Housing and Community Services
36 Department shall attempt to distribute the tax credits statewide, but shall concentrate the tax
37 credits in those areas of the state that are determined by the State Housing Council to have the
38 greatest need for affordable housing.

39 (9) The tax credit provided for in this section may be taken whether or not:

40 (a) The financial institution is eligible to take a federal income tax credit under section 42 of
41 the Internal Revenue Code with respect to the project financed by the qualified loan; or

42 (b) The project receives financing from bonds, the interest on which is exempt from federal
43 taxation under section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code.

44 (10) For a qualified loan defined in subsection (1)(i)(B) of this section financed through the pur-
45 chase of bonds, the interest of which is exempt from federal taxation under section 103 of the

1 Internal Revenue Code, the amount of finance charge that would have been charged under sub-
2 section (2)(b) of this section is determined by reference to the finance charge that would have been
3 charged if the federally tax exempt bonds had been issued and the tax credit under this section did
4 not apply.

5 (11) A lending institution may sell a qualified loan for which a certification has been executed
6 to a qualified assignee whether or not the lending institution retains servicing of the qualified loan
7 so long as a designated lending institution maintains records, annually verified by a loan servicer,
8 that establish the amount of tax credit earned by the taxpayer throughout each year of eligibility.

9 (12) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a lending institution that is a community de-
10 velopment corporation organized under the Oregon Nonprofit Corporation Law may transfer all or
11 part of a tax credit allowed under this section to one or more other lending institutions that are
12 stockholders or members of the community development corporation or that otherwise participate
13 through the community development corporation in the making of one or more qualified loans for
14 which the tax credit under this section is allowed.

15 (13) The lending institution shall file an annual statement with the Housing and Community
16 Services Department, specifying that it has conformed with all requirements imposed by law to
17 qualify for a tax credit under this section.

18 (14) Notwithstanding subsection (1)(h) and (j) of this section, a qualified borrower on a loan to
19 finance the construction, development, acquisition or rehabilitation of a manufactured dwelling park
20 under subsection (5)(c) of this section must be a nonprofit corporation, manufactured dwelling park
21 nonprofit cooperative, state governmental entity, local unit of government as defined in ORS 466.706
22 or housing authority.

23 (15) The Housing and Community Services Department and the Department of Revenue may
24 adopt rules to carry out the provisions of this section.

25 **SECTION 26.** ORS 458.670, as amended by section 31, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is
26 amended to read:

27 458.670. As used in this section and ORS 458.675 to 458.700, unless the context requires other-
28 wise:

29 (1) "Account holder" means a resident of this state who:

30 (a) Is 12 years of age or older;

31 (b) Is a member of a lower income household; and

32 (c) Has established an individual development account with a fiduciary organization.

33 (2) "Fiduciary organization" means an organization selected under ORS 458.695 to administer
34 state moneys directed to individual development accounts and that is:

35 (a) A nonprofit, fund raising organization that is exempt from taxation under section 501(c)(3)
36 of the Internal Revenue Code as amended and in effect on December 31, [2009] **2010**; or

37 (b) A federally recognized Oregon Indian tribe that is located, to a significant degree, within the
38 boundaries of this state.

39 (3) "Financial institution" means:

40 (a) An organization regulated under ORS chapters 706 to 716 or 723; or

41 (b) In the case of individual development accounts established for the purpose described in ORS
42 458.685 (1)(c), a financial institution as defined in ORS 348.841.

43 (4) "Individual development account" means a contract between an account holder and a
44 fiduciary organization, for the deposit of funds into a financial institution by the account holder, and
45 the deposit of matching funds into the financial institution by the fiduciary organization, to allow

1 the account holder to accumulate assets for use toward achieving a specific purpose approved by
2 the fiduciary organization.

3 (5) "Lower income household" means a household having an income equal to or less than the
4 greater of the following:

5 (a) 80 percent of the median household income for the area as determined by the Housing and
6 Community Services Department. In making the determination, the department shall give consider-
7 ation to any data on area household income published by the United States Department of Housing
8 and Urban Development.

9 (b) 200 percent of the poverty guidelines as determined by the Housing and Community Services
10 Department. In making the determination, the department shall give consideration to poverty
11 guidelines published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services and may con-
12 sider other income data periodically published by other federal or Oregon agencies.

13 (6) "Resident of this state" has the meaning given that term in ORS 316.027.

14 **SECTION 27.** ORS 657.010, as amended by section 32, chapter 82, Oregon Laws 2010, is
15 amended to read:

16 657.010. As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

17 (1) "Base year" means the first four of the last five completed calendar quarters preceding the
18 benefit year.

19 (2) "Benefits" means the money allowances payable to unemployed persons under this chapter.

20 (3) "Benefit year" means a period of 52 consecutive weeks commencing with the first week with
21 respect to which an individual files an initial valid claim for benefits, and thereafter the 52 consec-
22 utive weeks period beginning with the first week with respect to which the individual next files an
23 initial valid claim after the termination of the individual's last preceding benefit year except that
24 the benefit year shall be 53 weeks if the filing of an initial valid claim would result in overlapping
25 any quarter of the base year of a previously filed initial valid claim.

26 (4) "Calendar quarter" means the period of three consecutive calendar months ending on March
27 31, June 30, September 30 or December 31, or the approximate equivalent thereof, as the Director
28 of the Employment Department may, by regulation, prescribe.

29 (5) "Contribution" or "contributions" means the taxes, as defined in subsection (13) of this sec-
30 tion, that are the money payments required by this chapter, or voluntary payments permitted, to be
31 made to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund.

32 (6) "Educational institution," including an institution of higher education as defined in sub-
33 section (9) of this section, means an institution:

34 (a) In which participants, trainees or students are offered an organized course of study or
35 training designed to transfer to them knowledge, skills, information, doctrines, attitudes or abilities
36 from, by or under the guidance of an instructor or teacher;

37 (b) That is accredited, registered, approved, licensed or issued a permit to operate as a school
38 by the Department of Education or other government agency, or that offers courses for credit that
39 are transferable to an approved, registered or accredited school;

40 (c) In which the course or courses of study or training that it offers may be academic, technical,
41 trade or preparation for gainful employment in a recognized occupation; and

42 (d) In which the course or courses of study or training are offered on a regular and continuing
43 basis.

44 (7) "Employment office" means a free public employment office or branch thereof, operated by
45 this state or maintained as a part of a state-controlled system of public employment offices.

1 (8) "Hospital" means an organization that has been licensed, certified or approved by the Oregon
2 Health Authority as a hospital.

3 (9) "Institution of higher education" means an educational institution that:

4 (a) Admits as regular students only individuals having a certificate of graduation from a high
5 school, or the recognized equivalent of such a certificate;

6 (b) Is legally authorized in this state to provide a program of education beyond high school;

7 (c) Provides an educational program for which it awards a bachelor's or higher degree, or pro-
8 vides a program that is acceptable for full credit toward such a degree, a program of post-graduate
9 or post-doctoral studies, or a program of training to prepare students for gainful employment in a
10 recognized occupation; and

11 (d) Is a public or other nonprofit institution.

12 (10) "Internal Revenue Code" means the federal Internal Revenue Code, as amended and in ef-
13 fect on December 31, [2009] **2010**.

14 (11) "Nonprofit employing unit" means an organization, or group of organizations, described in
15 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code that is exempt from income tax under section 501(a)
16 of the Internal Revenue Code.

17 (12) "State" includes, in addition to the states of the United States of America, the District of
18 Columbia and Puerto Rico. However, for all purposes of this chapter the Virgin Islands shall be
19 considered a state on and after the day on which the United States Secretary of Labor first approves
20 the Virgin Islands' law under section 3304(a) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act as amended by
21 Public Law 94-566.

22 (13) "Taxes" means the money payments to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund re-
23 quired, or voluntary payments permitted, by this chapter.

24 (14) "Valid claim" means any claim for benefits made in accordance with ORS 657.260 if the
25 individual meets the wages-paid-for-employment requirements of ORS 657.150.

26 (15) "Week" means any period of seven consecutive calendar days ending at midnight, as the
27 director may, by regulation, prescribe. The director may by regulation prescribe that a "week" shall
28 be "in," "within," or "during" the calendar quarter that includes the greater part of such week.

29 **SECTION 28. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) and (3) of this section, the**
30 **amendments to statutes by sections 1 to 27 of this 2011 Act apply to transactions or activities**
31 **occurring on or after January 1, 2011, in tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2011.**

32 **(2) The effective and applicable dates, and the exceptions, special rules and coordination**
33 **with the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, relative to those dates, contained in the Fed-**
34 **eral Aviation Administration Air Transportation Modernization and Safety Improvement Act**
35 **(P.L. 111-226), the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (P.L. 111-148), the Preservation**
36 **of Access to Care for Medicare Beneficiaries and Pension Relief Act of 2010 (P.L. 111-192),**
37 **the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 (P.L. 111-152), the Homebuyer As-**
38 **sistance and Improvement Act of 2010 (P.L. 111-198) and other federal law amending the**
39 **Internal Revenue Code apply for Oregon personal income and corporate excise and income**
40 **tax purposes, to the extent they can be made applicable, in the same manner as they are**
41 **applied under the Internal Revenue Code and related federal law.**

42 **(3)(a) If a deficiency is assessed against any taxpayer for a tax year beginning before**
43 **January 1, 2011, and the deficiency or any portion thereof is attributable to any retroactive**
44 **treatment under the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450,**
45 **310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 311.689, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010 and 317.097 by sections 11 to**

1 25 of this 2011 Act, then any interest or penalty assessed under ORS chapter 305, 314, 315,
2 316, 317 or 318 with respect to the deficiency or portion thereof shall be canceled.

3 (b) If a refund is due any taxpayer for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2011, and
4 the refund or any portion thereof is due the taxpayer on account of any retroactive treat-
5 ment under the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690, 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450,
6 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 311.689, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010 and 317.097 by sections 11 to
7 25 of this 2011 Act, then notwithstanding ORS 305.270 or 314.415 or other law, the refund or
8 portion thereof shall be paid without interest.

9 (c) Any changes required because of the amendments to ORS 305.230, 305.494, 305.690,
10 307.130, 307.147, 308A.450, 310.140, 310.630, 310.800, 311.689, 314.011, 315.004, 316.012, 317.010 and
11 317.097 by sections 11 to 25 of this 2011 Act for a tax year beginning before January 1, 2011,
12 shall be made by filing an amended return within the time prescribed by law.

13 (d) If a taxpayer fails to file an amended return under paragraph (c) of this subsection,
14 the Department of Revenue shall make any changes under paragraph (c) of this subsection
15 on the return to which the changes relate within the period specified for issuing a notice of
16 deficiency or claiming a refund as otherwise provided by law with respect to that return, or
17 within one year after a return for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2011, and be-
18 fore January 1, 2012, is filed, whichever period expires later.

19 **SECTION 29.** Section 30 of this 2011 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 118.005 to
20 118.840.

21 **SECTION 30.** For decedents dying after December 31, 2009, and before December 17, 2010:

22 (1) If the filing of a federal estate tax return is required, a return is not due under ORS
23 118.005 to 118.840 until the date provided in section 301(d)(1) of Public Law 111-312 for filing
24 of the federal estate tax return.

25 (2) Notwithstanding ORS 118.100 (1) and 118.220, taxes imposed by ORS 118.005 to 118.840
26 are due and payable within nine months after the decedent's death.

27 (3) Penalties and interest under ORS 118.260 shall be determined without regard to the
28 extension of time to file under subsection (1) of this section.

29 **SECTION 31.** This 2011 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2011
30 session of the Seventy-sixth Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.
