SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes deadlines by which public bodies must respond to public records requests. Provides exceptions. [*Delays application of deadlines to local governments until July 1, 2013. Provides exceptions.*]

Limits amount of fees public bodies may charge for responding to public records requests. Provides exceptions.

Establishes jurisdiction of Attorney General to hear petitions for review of public records in custody of **certain statewide** elected officials by persons denied right to inspect records.

Requires Attorney General to develop training materials on public records.

Reorganizes exemptions from disclosure of public records.

Provides that modifications to public records law unrelated to reorganization of exemptions become operative July 1, 2012.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

11 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

PUBLIC RECORDS REQUEST PROCEDURES

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15 **SECTION 1.** ORS 192.410 is amended to read:

16 192.410. As used in ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

17 (1) **“Business day” means a day other than a federal or State of Oregon legal holiday or**
18 **a day other than a day on which the offices of a public body are otherwise closed.**

19 [(1)] (2) **“Custodian” means:**

20 (a) The person described in ORS 7.110 for purposes of court records; or

21 (b) A public body mandated, directly or indirectly, to create, maintain, care for or control a

1 public record. "Custodian" does not include a public body that has custody of a public record as
2 an agent of another public body that is the custodian unless the public record is not otherwise
3 available.

4 [(2)] (3) "Person" includes any natural person, corporation, partnership, firm, association or
5 member or committee of the Legislative Assembly.

6 [(3)] (4) "Public body" includes every state officer, agency, department, division, bureau, board
7 and commission; every county and city governing body, school district, special district, municipal
8 corporation, and any board, department, commission, council, or agency thereof; and any other
9 public agency of this state.

10 [(4)(a)] (5)(a) "Public record" includes any writing that contains information relating to the
11 conduct of the public's business, including but not limited to court records, mortgages, and deed
12 records, prepared, owned, used or retained by a public body regardless of physical form or charac-
13 teristics.

14 (b) "Public record" does not include:

15 (A) Any writing that does not relate to the conduct of the public's business and that is con-
16 tained on a privately owned computer.

17 (B) **An electronic record that was deleted in conformity with the applicable retention**
18 **period established by the State Archivist under ORS 192.105, regardless of whether the elec-**
19 **tronic record could be recovered by the public body. This subparagraph does not authorize**
20 **a public body to delete an electronic record after receiving a request to which the electronic**
21 **record is responsive.**

22 (C) **Electronic metadata.**

23 [(5)] (6) "State agency" means any state officer, department, board, commission or court created
24 by the Constitution or statutes of this state but does not include the Legislative Assembly or its
25 members, committees, officers or employees insofar as they are exempt under section 9, Article IV
26 of the Oregon Constitution.

27 [(6)] (7) "Writing" means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photographing and every means of
28 recording, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combination thereof, and all pa-
29 pers, maps, files, facsimiles or electronic recordings.

30 **SECTION 2.** ORS 192.420, as amended by section 34 of this 2011 Act, is amended to read:

31 192.420. (1) Every person has a right to inspect **or obtain a copy of** any public record of a
32 public body in this state, except as otherwise expressly provided by sections 11 to 21 of this 2011
33 Act.

34 (2)(a) If a person who is a party to a civil judicial proceeding to which a public body is a party,
35 or who has filed a notice under ORS 30.275 (5)(a), asks to inspect or to receive a copy of a public
36 record that the person knows relates to the proceeding or notice, the person must submit the re-
37 quest in writing to the custodian and, at the same time, to the attorney for the public body.

38 (b) For purposes of this subsection:

39 (A) The attorney for a state agency is the Attorney General in Salem.

40 (B) "Person" includes a representative or agent of the person.

41 (3) **Notwithstanding subsection (1) or (2) of this section or any other provision of ORS**
42 **192.410 to 192.505, a person does not have a right to inspect or obtain a copy of a public re-**
43 **cord of a public body if the person has an outstanding balance of unpaid fees charged under**
44 **ORS 192.410 to 192.505 that relate to a prior request to that public body for public records.**
45 **The public body need not undertake any action in response to the request other than to give**

1 **written notice to the requester of the unpaid balance along with a statement that indicates**
2 **that the public body need not undertake any action to fulfill the request until the unpaid**
3 **balance is paid.**

4 **SECTION 3.** ORS 192.440 is amended to read:

5 192.440. (1) The custodian of any public record that a person has a right to inspect shall give
6 the person, upon request:

7 (a) A copy of the public record if the public record is of a nature permitting copying; or

8 (b) A reasonable opportunity to inspect or copy the public record.

9 (2) If a person makes a written request to inspect a public record or to receive a copy of a
10 public record, the public body receiving the request shall respond as soon as practicable and [*with-*
11 *out unreasonable delay.*] **within 10 business days of receiving the request, by providing:**

12 (a) **A response that complies with subsection (8) of this section; or**

13 (b) **Notice that the public body is extending the deadline for providing a response under**
14 **paragraph (a) of this subsection, followed by a response that complies with subsection (8) of**
15 **this section within the additional time period stated in the notice. Notice under this para-**
16 **graph must specifically state the basis for the extension, which cannot exceed the following:**

17 (A) **If the request seeks records that must be physically retrieved from off-site archives,**
18 **the number of business days required to retrieve the records; and**

19 (B)(i) **If the public body estimates that the request will take less than five hours of staff**
20 **time to gather and review the records, a period not to exceed 5 business days;**

21 (ii) **If the public body estimates that the request will take at least five hours but not as**
22 **many as 10 hours of staff time to gather and review the records, a period not to exceed 15**
23 **business days;**

24 (iii) **If the public body estimates that the request will take at least 10 hours but not as**
25 **many as 20 hours of staff time to gather and review the records, a period not to exceed 25**
26 **business days; or**

27 (iv) **If the public body estimates that the request will take at least 20 hours of staff time**
28 **to gather and review the records, a period not to exceed 30 business days.**

29 (3)(a) **A public body described in paragraph (b) of this subsection may elect to double the**
30 **amount of time allowed under subsection (2)(b) of this section to respond to a request.**

31 (b) **This subsection applies to the following public bodies that are not state agencies:**

32 (A) **A school district, education service district or community college district with a total**
33 **enrollment for the year in which the request is made of 6,000 or fewer students; or**

34 (B) **Any other public body with the equivalent of 100 or fewer budgeted full-time equiv-**
35 **alent employees.**

36 (c) **A public body may not disaggregate its functions in order to meet the requirements**
37 **of paragraph (b) of this subsection.**

38 (d) **A public body making the election described in this subsection shall note the election**
39 **and the basis on which the public body qualifies for the election in the acknowledgement**
40 **required under subsection (7) of this section.**

41 (4) **If the public body is a school district, education service district or community college**
42 **district and fewer than half of the administrative staff are at work, as measured by full-time**
43 **equivalence, on the day that the public body receives the request, the public body may elect**
44 **to double the timeline otherwise applicable under subsection (2) of this section. The public**
45 **body shall note the election and the basis on which the public body qualifies for the election**

1 **in the acknowledgement required under subsection (7) of this section.**

2 (5) The public body may request additional information or clarification from the requester for
3 the purpose of expediting the public body's response to the request. **The timelines described in**
4 **subsections (2) to (4) of this section are suspended for any period in which the public body**
5 **is waiting for additional information or clarification from the requester.**

6 (6)(a) If a public body determines that the public body is unable to comply with the ap-
7 plicable timelines under subsections (2) to (4) of this section, the public body may seek au-
8 thorization for additional time to provide a response to the request. If the public body:

9 (A) Is a state agency, the state agency shall ask the Attorney General to authorize ad-
10 ditional time to provide a response. The Attorney General may not deny a request under this
11 subsection unless the Attorney General determines that the request is unreasonable. The
12 Attorney General shall notify the state agency and the requester in writing, within five
13 business days of receipt of the request from the state agency, of whether the request for
14 additional time is authorized. The timelines described in subsection (2) of this section are
15 suspended for any period in which the state agency is waiting for a response from the At-
16 torney General regarding a request for additional time under this subsection. The Attorney
17 General may not charge a state agency for services provided in determining whether to au-
18 thorize additional time to respond to a request.

19 (B) Is a public body other than a state agency, the public body shall ask the district at-
20 torney described in ORS 192.460 to authorize additional time to provide a response. The dis-
21 trict attorney may not deny a request under this subsection unless the district attorney
22 determines that the request is unreasonable. The district attorney shall notify the public
23 body and the requester in writing, within five business days of receipt of the request from
24 the public body, of whether the request for additional time is authorized. The timelines de-
25 scribed in subsections (2) to (4) of this section are suspended for any period in which the
26 public body is waiting for a response from the district attorney regarding a request for ad-
27 ditional time under this subsection. The district attorney may not charge a public body for
28 services provided in determining whether to authorize additional time to respond to a re-
29 quest.

30 (b)(A) Paragraph (a) of this subsection does not apply to judicial officers, as defined in
31 ORS 1.210, the Judicial Department, the Legislative Assembly or the members, committees
32 and statutory offices of the Legislative Assembly. A public body described in this paragraph
33 may determine for itself the amount of additional time needed to provide a response to the
34 request within a reasonable time.

35 (B) A person may challenge the determination of what constitutes a reasonable time for
36 a public body described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph by instituting proceedings for
37 declaratory relief in circuit court. If the determination that is being challenged is a deter-
38 mination by a judge in a circuit court, the Oregon Tax Court or the Court of Appeals, or by
39 a judge of the Supreme Court or the Chief Justice, the person may challenge the determi-
40 nation only by filing a petition for a writ of mandamus in the Supreme Court as prescribed
41 in ORS 34.105 to 34.240.

42 (7) The public body must provide a written acknowledgment of receipt of the request to
43 the requester within five business days of receipt of the request. The acknowledgment may
44 provide any other information required under subsections (2) to (4) or (8) of this section that
45 is available at the time the acknowledgment is made.

1 **(8) Following or contemporaneous with the written acknowledgment described in sub-**
 2 **section (7) of this section and within an adequate period of time to ensure compliance with**
 3 **the applicable timelines in subsections (2) to (4) of this section,** the response of the public body
 4 *[must acknowledge receipt of the request and]* must include one of the following:

5 (a) A statement that the public body does not possess, or is not the custodian of, the public re-
 6 cord.

7 (b) Copies of all requested public records for which the public body does not claim an exemption
 8 from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

9 (c) A statement that the public body is the custodian of at least some of the requested public
 10 records, an estimate of the time the public body requires before the public records may be inspected
 11 or copies of the records will be provided and an estimate of the fees that the requester must pay
 12 under subsection *[(4)]* **(10)** of this section as a condition of receiving the public records.

13 (d) A statement that the public body is the custodian of at least some of the requested public
 14 records and that an estimate of the time and fees for disclosure of the public records will be pro-
 15 vided by the public body within a reasonable time **and in compliance with the applicable**
 16 **timelines established under subsections (2) to (4) of this section.**

17 (e) A statement that the public body is uncertain whether the public body possesses the public
 18 record and that the public body will search for the record and make an appropriate response as soon
 19 as practicable **and in compliance with the applicable timelines established under subsections**
 20 **(2) to (4) of this section.**

21 (f) A statement that state or federal law prohibits the public body from acknowledging whether
 22 the record exists or that acknowledging whether the record exists would result in the loss of federal
 23 benefits or other sanction. A statement under this paragraph must include a citation to the state
 24 or federal law relied upon by the public body.

25 *[(3)]* **(9)** If the public record is maintained in a machine readable or electronic form, the custo-
 26 dian shall provide a copy of the public record in the form requested, if available. If the public record
 27 is not available in the form requested, the custodian shall make the public record available in the
 28 form in which the custodian maintains the public record.

29 *[(4)(a)]* **(10)(a) Subject to paragraphs (b) and (c) of this subsection,** the public body may es-
 30 tablish fees reasonably calculated to reimburse the public body for the public body's actual cost of
 31 making public records available, *[including costs for summarizing, compiling or tailoring the public*
 32 *records, either in organization or media, to meet the person's request.]* **including the actual cost of**
 33 **staff time necessarily incurred in responding to the request, the actual costs of paper, elec-**
 34 **tronic storage media or other materials requested by and provided to the requester.**

35 **(b)(A) For purposes of paragraph (a) of this subsection, the actual cost of staff time in-**
 36 **curring in response to a request may not exceed four times the minimum wage in effect under**
 37 **ORS 653.025 at the time the request is made.**

38 **(B) The limitations on fees in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph do not apply to:**

39 **(i) Work performed by a medical professional, information technology professional or city**
 40 **recorder, or by a licensed, certified or specialized staff person, other than an attorney, who**
 41 **is designated by the public body to fulfill the request, but only if the professional or special-**
 42 **ized expertise being used is necessary to fulfill the request or to determine the extent to**
 43 **which requested records are exempt from disclosure.**

44 **(ii) Any public body, if the sources of funds otherwise available to pay the difference be-**
 45 **tween the actual cost of responding to the request and the amount of fees permitted under**

1 **subparagraph (A) of this paragraph are dedicated by trust, the Oregon Constitution or fed-**
 2 **eral law to a purpose that does not permit use of the funds for responding to a public records**
 3 **request.**

4 [(b)] (c) The public body may include in a fee established under paragraph (a) of this subsection
 5 the cost of time spent by an attorney for the public body in reviewing the public records, redacting
 6 material from the public records or segregating the public records into exempt and nonexempt re-
 7 cords. The public body may not include in a fee established under paragraph (a) of this subsection
 8 the cost of time spent by an attorney for the public body in determining the application of the pro-
 9 visions of ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

10 [(c)] (d)(A) The public body may not establish a fee greater than \$25 under this section unless
 11 the public body first provides the [requestor] **requester** with a written notification of the estimated
 12 amount of the fee and the [requestor] **requester** confirms that the [requestor] **requester** wants the
 13 public body to proceed with making the public record available.

14 **(B) If a public body that provides a method of making payment from a remote location**
 15 **provides an estimate of fees that is greater than \$25 and informs the requester that the**
 16 **public body requires prepayment of the estimated amount, the public body need not continue**
 17 **work on the request until the requester has paid the estimated fee. The applicable timelines**
 18 **under subsections (2) to (4) of this section are suspended from the date that the public body**
 19 **provides an estimate of the fee until the date the requester pays the estimated fee.**

20 [(d)] (e) Notwithstanding paragraphs (a) to [(c)] (d) of this subsection, when the public records
 21 are those filed with the Secretary of State under ORS chapter 79 or ORS 80.100 to 80.130, the fees
 22 for furnishing copies, summaries or compilations of the public records are those established by the
 23 Secretary of State by rule, under ORS chapter 79 or ORS 80.100 to 80.130.

24 [(5)] (11) The custodian of any public record may furnish copies without charge or at a sub-
 25 stantially reduced fee if the custodian determines that the waiver or reduction of fees is in the
 26 public interest because making the record available primarily benefits the general public.

27 [(6)] (12) A person who believes that there has been an unreasonable denial of a fee waiver or
 28 fee reduction may petition the Attorney General or the district attorney in the same manner as a
 29 person petitions when inspection of a public record is denied under ORS 192.410 to 192.505. The
 30 Attorney General, the district attorney and the court have the same authority in instances when a
 31 fee waiver or reduction is denied as it has when inspection of a public record is denied.

32 [(7)] (13) A public body shall make available to the public a written procedure for making public
 33 record requests that includes:

34 (a) The name of one or more persons to whom public record requests may be sent, with ad-
 35 dresses; and

36 (b) The amounts of and the manner of calculating fees that the public body charges for re-
 37 sponding to requests for public records.

38 [(8)] (14) This section does not apply to signatures of individuals submitted under ORS chapter
 39 247 for purposes of registering to vote as provided in ORS 247.973.

40 **(15) The failure of a public body to provide a response that complies with subsection (8)**
 41 **of this section within the applicable timelines prescribed under subsections (2) to (4) of this**
 42 **section is deemed a denial of the request and the requester may petition for review of the**
 43 **denial as provided in ORS 192.450, 192.460 or 192.480. The failure of a public body to provide**
 44 **a written acknowledgment of the receipt of a request pursuant to subsection (7) of this sec-**
 45 **tion is not deemed a denial of the request.**

1 **SECTION 4. Notwithstanding ORS 192.440 (2) to (4), (8), or (10), the public body and the**
 2 **requester of public records from the public body may agree in writing to modify the timelines**
 3 **or fees otherwise applicable to a request under ORS 192.440.**

4 **SECTION 5.** ORS 192.450 is amended to read:

5 192.450. (1) Subject to ORS 192.480 and subsection (4) of this section, any person denied the right
 6 to inspect or to receive a copy of any public record of a state agency may petition the Attorney
 7 General to review the public record to determine if it may be withheld from public inspection. Ex-
 8 cept as provided in subsection (5) of this section, the burden is on the agency to sustain its action.
 9 Except as provided in subsection (5) of this section, the Attorney General shall issue an order de-
 10 denying or granting the petition, or denying it in part and granting it in part, within seven **business**
 11 days from the day the Attorney General receives the petition.

12 (2) If the Attorney General grants the petition and orders the state agency to disclose the re-
 13 cord, or if the Attorney General grants the petition in part and orders the state agency to disclose
 14 a portion of the record, the state agency shall comply with the order in full within seven **business**
 15 days after issuance of the order, unless within the seven-day period it issues a notice of its intention
 16 to institute proceedings for injunctive or declaratory relief in the Circuit Court for Marion County
 17 or, as provided in subsection (6) of this section, in the circuit court of the county where the record
 18 is held. Copies of the notice shall be sent to the Attorney General and by certified mail to the
 19 petitioner at the address shown on the petition. The state agency shall institute the proceedings
 20 within seven **business** days after it issues its notice of intention to do so. If the Attorney General
 21 denies the petition in whole or in part, or if the state agency continues to withhold the record or
 22 a part of it notwithstanding an order to disclose by the Attorney General, the person seeking dis-
 23 closure may institute such proceedings.

24 (3) The Attorney General shall serve as counsel for the state agency in a suit filed under sub-
 25 section (2) of this section if the suit arises out of a determination by the Attorney General that the
 26 public record should not be disclosed, or that a part of the public record should not be disclosed if
 27 the state agency has fully complied with the order of the Attorney General requiring disclosure of
 28 another part or parts of the public record, and in no other case. In any case in which the Attorney
 29 General is prohibited from serving as counsel for the state agency, the agency may retain special
 30 counsel.

31 (4) A person denied the right to inspect or to receive a copy of any public record of a health
 32 professional regulatory board, as defined in ORS 676.160, that contains information concerning a
 33 licensee or applicant, and petitioning the Attorney General to review the public record shall, on or
 34 before the date of filing the petition with the Attorney General, send a copy of the petition by first
 35 class mail to the health professional regulatory board. Not more than [48 hours] **two business days**
 36 after the board receives a copy of the petition, the board shall send a copy of the petition by first
 37 class mail to the licensee or applicant who is the subject of any record for which disclosure is
 38 sought. When sending a copy of the petition to the licensee or applicant, the board shall include a
 39 notice informing the licensee or applicant that a written response by the licensee or applicant may
 40 be filed with the Attorney General not later than seven **business** days after the date that the notice
 41 was sent by the board. Immediately upon receipt of any written response from the licensee or ap-
 42 plicant, the Attorney General shall send a copy of the response to the petitioner by first class mail.

43 (5) The person seeking disclosure of a public record of a health professional regulatory board,
 44 as defined in ORS 676.160, that is confidential or exempt from disclosure under ORS 676.165 or
 45 676.175, shall have the burden of demonstrating to the Attorney General by clear and convincing

1 evidence that the public interest in disclosure outweighs other interests in nondisclosure, including
 2 but not limited to the public interest in nondisclosure. The Attorney General shall issue an order
 3 denying or granting the petition, or denying or granting it in part, not later than the 15th **business**
 4 day following the day that the Attorney General receives the petition. A copy of the Attorney
 5 General's order granting a petition or part of a petition shall be served by first class mail on the
 6 health professional regulatory board, the petitioner and the licensee or applicant who is the subject
 7 of any record ordered to be disclosed. The health professional regulatory board shall not disclose
 8 any record prior to the seventh **business** day following the service of the Attorney General's order
 9 on a licensee or applicant entitled to receive notice under this subsection.

10 (6) If the Attorney General grants or denies the petition for a record of a health professional
 11 regulatory board, as defined in ORS 676.160, that contains information concerning a licensee or ap-
 12 plicant, the board, a person denied the right to inspect or receive a copy of the record or the
 13 licensee or applicant who is the subject of the record may institute proceedings for injunctive or
 14 declaratory relief in the circuit court for the county where the public record is held. The party
 15 seeking disclosure of the record shall have the burden of demonstrating by clear and convincing
 16 evidence that the public interest in disclosure outweighs other interests in nondisclosure, including
 17 but not limited to the public interest in nondisclosure.

18 (7) The Attorney General may comply with a request of a health professional regulatory board
 19 to be represented by independent counsel in any proceeding under subsection (6) of this section.

20 **SECTION 6.** ORS 192.465 is amended to read:

21 192.465. (1) The failure of the Attorney General or district attorney to issue an order under ORS
 22 192.450 or 192.460 denying, granting, or denying in part and granting in part a petition to require
 23 disclosure within seven **business** days from the day of receipt of the petition shall be treated as an
 24 order denying the petition for the purpose of determining whether a person may institute pro-
 25 ceedings for injunctive or declaratory relief under ORS 192.450 or 192.460.

26 (2) The failure of an elected official to deny, grant, or deny in part and grant in part a request
 27 to inspect or receive a copy of a public record within seven **business** days from the day of receipt
 28 of the request shall be treated as a denial of the request for the purpose of determining whether a
 29 person may institute proceedings for injunctive or declaratory relief under ORS 192.450 or 192.460.

30 **SECTION 7.** ORS 192.480 is amended to read:

31 192.480. (1) In any case in which a person is denied the right to inspect or to receive a copy
 32 of a public record in the custody of [*an elected official*] **a person described in subsection (2) of this**
 33 **section**, or in the custody of any other person but as to which [*an elected official*] **a person de-**
 34 **scribed in subsection (2) of this section** claims the right to withhold disclosure, no petition to
 35 require disclosure may be filed with the Attorney General or district attorney, or if a petition is
 36 filed it shall not be considered by the Attorney General or district attorney after a claim of right
 37 to withhold disclosure by an elected official. In such case a person denied the right to inspect or
 38 to receive a copy of a public record may institute proceedings for injunctive or declaratory relief
 39 in the appropriate circuit court, as specified in ORS 192.450 or 192.460, [*and the*] **except as other-**
 40 **wise provided under subsection (3) of this section.** The Attorney General or district attorney
 41 may upon request serve or decline to serve, in the discretion of the Attorney General or district
 42 attorney, as counsel in such suit for [*an elected official*] **a person described in subsection (2) of**

 44 Nothing in this section shall preclude [*an elected official*] **a person described in subsection (2) of**
 45 **this section** from requesting advice from the Attorney General or a district attorney as to whether

1 a public record should be disclosed.

2 **(2) This section applies to:**

3 **(a) Judicial officers, as defined in ORS 1.210;**

4 **(b) The Judicial Department;**

5 **(c) The Legislative Assembly, members of the Legislative Assembly, statutory commit-**
6 **tees and statutory offices of the Legislative Assembly;**

7 **(d) Persons holding the office of sheriff under Article VI of the Oregon Constitution; and**

8 **(e) Persons holding the office of prosecuting attorney under Article VII (Original) of the**
9 **Oregon Constitution.**

10 **(3) A person denied the right to inspect or receive a copy of a public record by a judge**
11 **in a circuit court or the Oregon Tax Court in a pending case, or by a judge in the Court of**
12 **Appeals or a judge of the Supreme Court or the Chief Justice, may challenge the determi-**
13 **nation by filing a petition for a writ of mandamus in the Supreme Court as prescribed in ORS**
14 **34.105 to 34.240.**

15 **SECTION 8.** ORS 192.490 is amended to read:

16 192.490. (1) In any suit filed under ORS 192.450, 192.460, 192.470 or 192.480, the court has juris-
17 diction to enjoin the public body from withholding records and to order the production of any re-
18 cords improperly withheld from the person seeking disclosure. The court shall determine the matter
19 de novo and the burden is on the public body to sustain its action. The court, on its own motion,
20 may view the documents in controversy in camera before reaching a decision. Any noncompliance
21 with the order of the court may be punished as contempt of court.

22 (2) Except as to causes the court considers of greater importance, proceedings arising under
23 ORS 192.450, 192.460, 192.470 or 192.480 take precedence on the docket over all other causes and
24 shall be assigned for hearing and trial at the earliest practicable date and expedited in every way.

26 the suit, the person shall be awarded costs and disbursements and reasonable attorney fees at trial
27 and on appeal. If the person prevails in part, the court may in its discretion award the person costs
28 and disbursements and reasonable attorney fees at trial and on appeal, or an appropriate portion
29 thereof. If the state agency failed to comply with the Attorney General's order in full and did not
30 issue a notice of intention to institute proceedings pursuant to ORS 192.450 (2) within seven **busi-**
31 **ness** days after issuance of the order, or did not institute the proceedings within seven **business**
32 days after issuance of the notice, the petitioner shall be awarded costs of suit at the trial level and
33 reasonable attorney fees regardless of which party instituted the suit and regardless of which party
34 prevailed therein.

35 **SECTION 9.** (1) **Except in cases where the law specifically creates a right of action based**
36 **on the disclosure of particular information or records, a public body or an official, volunteer,**
37 **employee or agent of a public body may not be held liable to any person as the result of a**
38 **disclosure made in a good faith attempt to comply with ORS 192.410 to 192.505.**

39 **(2) If a public body inadvertently discloses records that are privileged under ORS 40.225**
40 **to 40.295, the inadvertent disclosure does not constitute a waiver of the privilege if:**

41 **(a) A large volume of nonprivileged records are disclosed in response to the same request**
42 **for disclosure; and**

43 **(b) Either the public body reasonably did not expect privileged materials to be among the**
44 **materials disclosed or the public body searched for privileged materials in a manner that was**
45 **reasonable under the circumstances.**

1 (3) Subsection (2) of this section may not be construed to prevent a public body from
2 reviewing requested documents in a manner calculated to avoid the disclosure of privileged
3 materials.

4 **SECTION 10.** The Attorney General shall develop:

5 (1) Training materials designed to generally educate public employees with respect to the
6 requirements of ORS 192.410 to 192.505 and make those materials freely available on the At-
7 torney General's website; and

8 (2) Model public record request forms that a requester may use in making a request.

10 **EXEMPTIONS FROM DISCLOSURE OF PUBLIC RECORDS**

12 **SECTION 11. Exemptions from disclosure of public records relating to criminal investi-**

14 disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505 unless the public interest requires disclosure in the
15 particular instance. The record of an arrest or the report of a crime shall be disclosed unless
16 and only for so long as there is a clear need to delay disclosure in the course of a specific
17 investigation, including the need to protect the complaining party or the victim. Nothing in
18 this subsection shall limit any right constitutionally guaranteed, or granted by statute, to
19 disclosure or discovery in criminal cases. For purposes of this subsection, the record of an
20 arrest or the report of a crime includes, but is not limited to:

21 (a) The arrested person's name, age, residence, employment, marital status and similar
22 biographical information;

23 (b) The offense with which the arrested person is charged;

24 (c) The conditions of release pursuant to ORS 135.230 to 135.290;

25 (d) The identity of and biographical information concerning both complaining party and
26 victim;

27 (e) The identity of the investigating and arresting agency and the length of the investi-
28 gation;

29 (f) The circumstances of arrest, including time, place, resistance, pursuit and weapons
30 used; and

31 (g) Such information as may be necessary to enlist public assistance in apprehending
32 fugitives from justice.

33 (2) Public records relating to criminal investigations and made confidential by a statute
34 listed in this subsection are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505, except to
35 the extent a statute listed in this subsection authorizes disclosure of the public record:

7 having actual or potential commercial value, and that gives its user an opportunity to obtain
8 a business advantage over competitors who do not know or use it.

9 (b) Information consisting of production records, sale or purchase records or catch re-
10 cords, or similar business records of a private concern or enterprise, required by law to be
11 submitted to or inspected by a governmental body to allow the body to determine fees or
12 assessments payable or to establish production quotas, and the amounts of such fees or as-
13 sessments payable or paid, to the extent that such information is in a form that would per-
14 mit identification of the individual concern or enterprise. This exemption does not include
15 records submitted by long term care facilities as defined in ORS 442.015 to the state for
16 purposes of reimbursement of expenses or determining fees for patient care. Nothing in this
17 paragraph shall limit the use that can be made of such information for regulatory purposes
18 or the admissibility of such information in any enforcement proceeding.

19 (c) Records, reports and other information received or compiled by the Director of the

25 (e) Sensitive business records or financial or commercial information of the State Acci-
26 dent Insurance Fund Corporation that is not customarily provided to business competitors.
27 This exemption does not:

28 (A) Apply to the formulas for determining dividends to be paid to employers insured by
29 the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation;

30 (B) Apply to contracts for advertising, public relations or lobbying services or to docu-
31 ments related to the formation of such contracts;

32 (C) Apply to group insurance contracts or to documents relating to the formation of such
33 contracts, except that employer account records shall remain exempt from disclosure as
34 provided in subsection (2)(g) of this section; or

35 (D) Provide the basis for opposing the discovery of documents in litigation pursuant to
36 the applicable rules of civil procedure.

37 (2) The following public records relating to business are exempt from disclosure under
38 ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

39 (a) Records, reports and other information received or compiled by the Director of the
40 Department of Consumer and Business Services in the administration of ORS chapters 723
41 and 725 not otherwise required by law to be made public, to the extent that the interests of
42 lending institutions, their officers, employees and customers in preserving the confidentiality
43 of such information outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

44 (b)(A) The following records, communications and information submitted to the Oregon
45 Business Development Commission, the Oregon Business Development Department, the

1 State Department of Agriculture, the Oregon Growth Account Board, the Port of Portland
2 or other ports, as defined in ORS 777.005, by applicants for investment funds, loans or ser-
3 vices including, but not limited to, those described in ORS 285A.224:

4 (i) Personal financial statements.

5 (ii) Financial statements of applicants.

6 (iii) Customer lists.

7 (iv) Information of an applicant pertaining to litigation to which the applicant is a party
8 if the complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the applicant shows
9 that such litigation is reasonably likely to occur, except that this exemption does not apply
10 to litigation that has been concluded and nothing in this sub-subparagraph shall limit any
11 right or opportunity granted by discovery or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or
12 potential litigation.

13 (v) Production, sales and cost data.

14 (vi) Marketing strategy information that relates to an applicant's plan to address specific
15 markets and the applicant's strategy regarding specific competitors.

16 (B) The following records, communications and information submitted to the State De-
17 partment of Energy by applicants for tax credits:

18 (i) Personal financial statements.

19 (ii) Financial statements of applicants.

20 (iii) Customer lists.

21 (iv) Information of an applicant pertaining to litigation to which the applicant is a party
22 if the complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the applicant shows
23 that the litigation is reasonably likely to occur, except that this exemption does not apply
24 to litigation that has been concluded, and nothing in this sub-subparagraph shall limit any
25 right or opportunity granted by discovery or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or
26 potential litigation.

27 (v) Production, sales and cost data.

28 (vi) Marketing strategy information that relates to an applicant's plan to address specific
29 markets and the applicant's strategy regarding specific competitors.

30 (c) Records, reports or returns submitted by private concerns or enterprises required by
31 law to be submitted to or inspected by a governmental body to allow the governmental body
32 to determine the amount of any transient lodging tax payable and the amounts of such tax
33 payable or paid, to the extent that such information is in a form that would permit identifi-
34 cation of the individual concern or enterprise. Nothing in this paragraph shall limit the use
35 that can be made of such information for regulatory purposes or the admissibility of such
36 information in any enforcement proceedings. The public body shall notify the taxpayer of the
37 delinquency immediately by certified mail. However, in the event that the payment or deliv-
38 ery of transient lodging taxes otherwise due to a public body is delinquent by over 60 days,
39 the public body shall disclose, upon the request of any person, the following information:

40 (A) The identity of the individual concern or enterprise that is delinquent over 60 days
41 in the payment or delivery of the taxes.

42 (B) The period for which the taxes are delinquent.

43 (C) The actual, or estimated, amount of the delinquency.

44 (d) Workers' compensation claim records of the Department of Consumer and Business
45 Services, except in accordance with rules adopted by the Director of the Department of

1 **Consumer and Business Services, in any of the following circumstances:**

2 (A) When necessary for insurers, self-insured employers and third party claim adminis-
3 trators to process workers' compensation claims.

4 (B) When necessary for the director, other governmental agencies of this state or the
5 United States to carry out their duties, functions or powers.

6 (C) When the disclosure is made in such a manner that the disclosed information cannot
7 be used to identify any worker who is the subject of a claim.

8 (D) When a worker or the worker's representative requests review of the worker's claim
9 record.

10 (e) The following records, communications and information obtained by the Housing and
11 Community Services Department in connection with the department's monitoring or admin-
12 istration of financial assistance or of housing or other developments:

13 (A) Personal and corporate financial statements and information, including tax returns.

14 (B) Credit reports.

15 (C) Project appraisals.

16 (D) Market studies and analyses.

17 (E) Articles of incorporation, partnership agreements and operating agreements.

18 (F) Commitment letters.

19 (G) Project pro forma statements.

20 (H) Project cost certifications and cost data.

21 (I) Audits.

22 (J) Project tenant correspondence.

23 (K) Personal information about a tenant.

24 (L) Housing assistance payments.

25 (f) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by
26 a public body engaged in the business of providing electricity or electricity services, if the
27 information is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 261.348, or if the informa-
28 tion is directly related to a bid, proposal or negotiations for the sale or purchase of elec-
29 tricity or electricity services, and disclosure of the information would cause a competitive
30 disadvantage for the public body or its retail electricity customers. This paragraph does not
31 apply to cost-of-service studies used in the development or review of generally applicable rate
32 schedules.

33 (g)(A) Employer account records of the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation.

34 (B) As used in this paragraph, "employer account records" means all records maintained
35 in any form that are specifically related to the account of any employer insured, previously
36 insured or under consideration to be insured by the State Accident Insurance Fund Corpo-
37 ration and any information obtained or developed by the corporation in connection with
38 providing, offering to provide or declining to provide insurance to a specific employer. "Em-
39 ployer account records" includes, but is not limited to, an employer's payroll records, pre-
40 mium payment history, payroll classifications, employee names and identification
41 information, experience modification factors, loss experience and dividend payment history.

42 (C) The exemption provided by this paragraph may not serve as the basis for opposition
43 to the discovery documents in litigation pursuant to applicable rules of civil procedure.

44 (3) Public records relating to business and made confidential by a statute listed in this
45 subsection are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505, except to the extent a

8 (2) ORS 192.844 (address confidentiality program records).

9 (3) ORS 18.048 (criminal restitution recipient records).

10 **SECTION 16. Exemptions from disclosure of public records relating to whistleblower in-**
11 **formation.** Public records relating to whistleblower information and made confidential by a
12 statute listed in this section are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505, except
13 to the extent a statute listed in this section authorizes disclosure of the public record:

14 (1) ORS 40.275 (identity of criminal investigation informants).

15 (2) ORS 124.075, 124.085 and 124.090 (identity of persons reporting elder abuse and elder
16 abuse records).

17 (3) ORS 177.170 and 177.180 (government waste, inefficiency or abuse records).

24 **SECTION 17. Exemptions from disclosure of public records relating to security and**
25 **emergency planning.** (1) The following public records relating to security and emergency
26 planning are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505 unless the public interest
27 requires disclosure in the particular instance:

28 (a) Computer programs developed or purchased by or for any public body for its own use.
29 As used in this paragraph, "computer program" means a series of instructions or statements
30 that permit the functioning of a computer system in a manner designed to provide storage,
31 retrieval and manipulation of data from such computer system, and any associated doc-
32 umentation and source material that explain how to operate the computer program. "Com-
33 puter program" does not include:

34 (A) The original data, including but not limited to numbers, text, voice, graphics and
35 images;

36 (B) Analyses, compilations and other manipulated forms of the original data produced by
37 use of the program; or

38 (C) The mathematical and statistical formulas that would be used if the manipulated
39 forms of the original data were to be produced manually.

40 (b) Specific operational plans in connection with an anticipated threat to individual or
41 public safety for deployment and use of personnel and equipment, prepared or used by a
42 public body, if public disclosure of the plans would endanger an individual's life or physical
43 safety or jeopardize a law enforcement activity.

44 (c) Records or information that, if disclosed, would allow a person to:

45 (A) Gain unauthorized access to buildings or other property;

1 (B) Identify those areas of structural or operational vulnerability that would permit un-
2 lawful disruption to, or interference with, services; or

3 (C) Disrupt, interfere with or gain unauthorized access to public funds or to information
4 processing, communication or telecommunication systems, including the information con-
5 tained in the systems, that are used or operated by a public body.

6 (d) Records or information that would reveal or otherwise identify security measures,
7 or weaknesses or potential weaknesses in security measures, taken or recommended to be
8 taken to protect:

9 (A) An individual;

10 (B) Buildings or other property;

11 (C) Information processing, communication or telecommunication systems, including the
12 information contained in the systems; or

13 (D) Those operations of the Oregon State Lottery, the security of which are subject to
14 study and evaluation under ORS 461.180 (6).

15 (2) The following public records relating to security and emergency planning are exempt
16 from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

17 (a) Records of the Energy Facility Siting Council concerning the review or approval of
18 security programs pursuant to ORS 469.530.

19 (b) A county elections security plan developed and filed under ORS 254.074.

20 (c) Information about review or approval of programs relating to the security of:

21 (A) Generation, storage or conveyance of:

22 (i) Electricity;

23 (ii) Gas in liquefied or gaseous form;

24 (iii) Hazardous substances as defined in ORS 453.005 (7)(a), (b) and (d);

25 (iv) Petroleum products;

26 (v) Sewage; or

27 (vi) Water.

28 (B) Telecommunication systems, including cellular, wireless or radio systems.

29 (C) Data transmissions by whatever means provided.

30 (3) Public records relating to security and emergency planning and made confidential by
31 a statute listed in this subsection are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505,
32 except to the extent a statute listed in this subsection authorizes disclosure of the public
33 record:

34 (a) ORS 1.180 (court security and emergency preparedness plans).

35 (b) ORS 176.765 (energy resource records).

36 (c) ORS 461.180 (Oregon State Lottery security records).

37 (d) ORS 824.082 (hazardous material transportation records).

38 **SECTION 18. Exemptions from disclosure of public records relating to public employee**
39 **privacy.** (1) The following public records relating to public employee privacy are exempt from
40 disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505, unless the public interest requires disclosure:

41 (a) The names and signatures of employees who sign authorization cards or petitions for
42 the purpose of requesting representation or decertification elections.

43 (b) Personnel discipline records where no disciplinary action is taken.

44 (c) The name, home address, professional address or location of a person that is engaged
45 in, or that provides goods or services for, medical research at Oregon Health and Science

1 University that is conducted using animals other than rodents. This subsection does not ap-
2 ply to Oregon Health and Science University press releases, websites or other publications
3 circulated to the general public.

4 (d) If requested by a public safety officer, as defined in ORS 181.610:

5 (A) The home address and home telephone number of the public safety officer contained
6 in the voter registration records for the public safety officer.

7 (B) The home address and home telephone number of the public safety officer contained
8 in records of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training.

9 (C) The name of the public safety officer contained in county real property assessment
10 or taxation records. This exemption:

11 (i) Applies only to the name of the public safety officer and any other owner of the
12 property in connection with a specific property identified by the officer in a request for ex-
13 emption from disclosure;

14 (ii) Applies only to records that may be made immediately available to the public upon
15 request in person, by telephone or using the Internet;

16 (iii) Applies until the public safety officer requests termination of the exemption;

17 (iv) Does not apply to disclosure of records among public bodies as defined in ORS 174.109
18 for governmental purposes; and

19 (v) May not result in liability for the county if the name of the public safety officer is
20 disclosed after a request for exemption from disclosure is made under this subsection.

21 (e) Unless the public records request is made by a financial institution, as defined in ORS
22 706.008, consumer finance company licensed under ORS chapter 725, mortgage banker or
23 mortgage broker licensed under ORS 86A.095 to 86A.198, 86A.990 and 86A.992 and ORS chap-
24 ter 59 or title company for business purposes, records described in subparagraph (A) of this
25 paragraph, if the exemption from disclosure of the records is sought by an individual de-
26 scribed in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph using the procedure described in subparagraph
27 (C) of this paragraph:

28 (A) The home address, home or cellular telephone number or personal electronic mail
29 address contained in the records of any public body that has received the request that is set
30 forth in:

31 (i) A warranty deed, deed of trust, mortgage, lien, deed of reconveyance, release, satis-
32 faction, substitution of trustee, easement, dog license, marriage license or military discharge
33 record that is in the possession of the county clerk; or

34 (ii) Any public record of a public body other than the county clerk.

35 (B) The individual claiming the exemption from disclosure must be a district attorney, a
36 deputy district attorney, the Attorney General or an assistant attorney general, the United
37 States Attorney for the District of Oregon, an assistant United States attorney for the Dis-
38 trict of Oregon, a city attorney who engages in the prosecution of criminal matters or a
39 deputy city attorney who engages in the prosecution of criminal matters.

40 (C) The individual claiming the exemption from disclosure must do so by filing the claim
41 in writing with the public body for which the exemption from disclosure is being claimed on
42 a form prescribed by the public body. Unless the claim is filed with the county clerk, the
43 claim form shall list the public records in the possession of the public body to which the
44 exemption applies. The exemption applies until the individual claiming the exemption re-
45 quests termination of the exemption or ceases to qualify for the exemption.

1 (f) Records of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training relating to in-
2 vestigations conducted under ORS 181.662 or 181.878 (6), until the department issues the re-
3 port described in ORS 181.662 or 181.878.

4 (2) The following public records relating to public employee privacy are exempt from
5 disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

6 (a) Public body employee or volunteer addresses, Social Security numbers, dates of birth
7 and telephone numbers contained in personnel records maintained by the public body that is
8 the employer or the recipient of volunteer services. This exemption:

9 (A) Does not apply to the addresses, dates of birth and telephone numbers of employees
10 or volunteers who are elected officials, except that a judge or district attorney subject to
11 election may seek to exempt the judge's or district attorney's address or telephone number,
12 or both, under the terms of ORS 192.445;

13 (B) Does not apply to employees or volunteers to the extent that the party seeking dis-
14 closure shows by clear and convincing evidence that the public interest requires disclosure
15 in a particular instance;

16 (C) Does not apply to a substitute teacher as defined in ORS 342.815 when requested by
17 a professional education association of which the substitute teacher may be a member; and

18 (D) Does not relieve a public employer of any duty under ORS 243.650 to 243.782.

19 (b) Employee and retiree address, telephone number and other nonfinancial membership
20 records and employee financial records maintained by the Public Employees Retirement
21 System pursuant to ORS chapters 238 and 238A.

22 (3) Public records relating to public employee privacy and made confidential by a statute
23 listed in this subsection are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505, except to
24 the extent a statute listed in this subsection authorizes disclosure of the public record:

25 (a) ORS 181.675 (public safety officer photographs and personal information records).

26 (b) ORS 181.854 (public safety employee photographs and personal information on re-
27 cords).

28 (c) ORS 181.860 (peer support counseling records).

29 (d) ORS 192.447 (public employee identification badge records).

30 (e) ORS 342.850 (teacher evaluation and personnel file records).

31 (f) ORS 339.388 (child abuse or sexual conduct records).

32 **SECTION 19. Exemptions from disclosure of public records relating to government op-**
33 **erations.** (1) The following public records relating to government operations are exempt from
34 disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505 unless the public interest requires disclosure in the
35 particular instance:

36 (a) Records of a public body pertaining to litigation to which the public body is a party
37 if the complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the public body shows
38 that such litigation is reasonably likely to occur. This exemption does not apply to litigation
39 that has been concluded, and nothing in this subsection shall limit any right or opportunity
40 granted by discovery or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or potential litigation.

41 (b) Test questions, scoring keys and other data used to administer a licensing examina-
42 tion, employment, academic or other examination or testing procedure before the examina-
43 tion is given and if the examination is to be used again. Records establishing procedures for
44 and instructing persons administering, grading or evaluating an examination or testing pro-
45 cedure are included in this exemption, to the extent that disclosure would create a risk that

1 the result might be affected.

2 (c) Information relating to the appraisal of real estate prior to its acquisition.

3 (d) Information concerning the location of archaeological sites or objects as those terms
4 are defined in ORS 358.905, except if the governing body of an Indian tribe requests the in-
5 formation and the need for the information is related to that Indian tribe's cultural or reli-
6 gious activities. This exemption does not include information relating to a site that is all or
7 part of an existing, commonly known and publicized tourist facility or attraction.

8 (e) Information developed pursuant to ORS 496.004, 496.172 and 498.026 or ORS 496.192 and
9 564.100, regarding the habitat, location or population of any threatened species or endangered
10 species.

11 (f) Writings prepared by or under the direction of faculty of public educational insti-
12 tutions, in connection with research, until publicly released, copyrighted or patented.

13 (g) Data and information provided by participants to mediation under ORS 36.256.

14 (h)(A) Audits or audit reports required of a telecommunications carrier. As used in this
15 subparagraph, "audit or audit report" means any external or internal audit or audit report
16 pertaining to a telecommunications carrier, as defined in ORS 133.721, or pertaining to a
17 corporation having an affiliated interest, as defined in ORS 759.390, with a telecommuni-
18 cations carrier that is intended to make the operations of the entity more efficient, accurate
19 or compliant with applicable rules, procedures or standards, that may include self-criticism
20 and that has been filed by the telecommunications carrier or affiliate under compulsion of
21 state law. "Audit or audit report" does not mean an audit of a cost study that would be
22 discoverable in a contested case proceeding and that is not subject to a protective order.

23 (B) Financial statements. As used in this subparagraph, "financial statement" means a
24 financial statement of a nonregulated corporation having an affiliated interest, as defined in
25 ORS 759.390, with a telecommunications carrier, as defined in ORS 133.721.

26 (2) The following public records relating to government operations are exempt from dis-
27 closure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

28 (a) Communications within a public body or between public bodies of an advisory nature
29 to the extent that they cover other than purely factual materials and are preliminary to any
30 final agency determination of policy or action. This exemption does not apply unless the
31 public body shows that in the particular instance the public interest in encouraging frank
32 communication between officials and employees of public bodies clearly outweighs the public
33 interest in disclosure.

34 (b) Information submitted to a public body in confidence and not otherwise required by
35 law to be submitted, where such information should reasonably be considered confidential,
36 the public body has obliged itself in good faith not to disclose the information, and when the
37 public interest would suffer by the disclosure.

38 (c) Information or records of the Department of Corrections, including the State Board
39 of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, to the extent that disclosure would interfere with the
40 rehabilitation of a person in custody of the department or substantially prejudice or prevent
41 the carrying out of the functions of the department, if the public interest in confidentiality
42 clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

43 (d)(A) Public records or information, the disclosure of which is prohibited or restricted
44 or otherwise made confidential or privileged under Oregon law.

45 (B) Subject to ORS 192.423, subparagraph (A) of this paragraph does not apply to factual

1 information compiled in a public record when:

2 (i) The basis for the claim of exemption is ORS 40.225;

3 (ii) The factual information is not prohibited from disclosure under any applicable state
4 or federal law, regulation or court order and is not otherwise exempt from disclosure under
5 ORS 192.410 to 192.505;

6 (iii) The factual information was compiled by or at the direction of an attorney as part
7 of an investigation on behalf of the public body in response to information of possible
8 wrongdoing by the public body;

9 (iv) The factual information was not compiled in preparation for litigation, arbitration
10 or an administrative proceeding that was reasonably likely to be initiated or that has been

11 **agents of the treasurer, council or board from each privately placed investment fund.**

12 **(v) The dollar amount, on a fiscal year-end basis, of the remaining value of assets in a**
13 **privately placed investment fund attributable to an investment by the State Treasurer, the**
14 **Oregon Investment Council, the Oregon Growth Account Board or the agents of the treas-**

38 **partment of Consumer and Business Services in confidence by a state, federal, foreign or**
39 **international regulatory or law enforcement agency or by the National Association of In-**
40 **surance Commissioners, its affiliates or subsidiaries under ORS 86A.095 to 86A.198, 86A.990,**
41 **86A.992, 697.005 to 697.095, 697.602 to 697.842, 705.137, 717.200 to 717.320, 717.900 or 717.905,**

40 (d) Notify the insurer of additional information the independent review organization requires and
41 when the information must be submitted.

42 (e) Decide the dispute relating to the adverse decision of the insurer under ORS 743.857 (1) and
43 issue the decision in writing.

44 (2) A decision by an independent review organization shall be based on expert medical judgment
45 after consideration of the enrollee's medical record, the recommendations of each of the enrollee's

1 providers, relevant medical, scientific and cost-effectiveness evidence and standards of medical
 2 practice in the United States. An independent review organization must make its decision in ac-
 3 cordance with the coverage described in the health benefit plan, except that the independent review
 4 organization may override the insurer's standards for medically necessary or experimental or
 5 investigational treatment if the independent review organization determines that the standards of
 6 the insurer are unreasonable or are inconsistent with sound medical practice.

7 (3) When review is expedited, the independent review organization shall issue a decision not
 8 later than the third day after the date on which the enrollee applies to the insurer for an expedited
 9 review.

10 (4) When a review is not expedited, the independent review organization shall issue a decision
 11 not later than the 30th day after the enrollee applies to the insurer for a review.

12 (5) An independent review organization shall file synopses of its decisions with the director ac-
 13 cording to the format and other requirements established by the director. The synopses shall exclude
 14 information that is confidential, that is otherwise exempt from disclosure under [ORS 192.501 and
 15 192.502] **sections 11 to 21 of this 2011 Act** or that may otherwise allow identification of an
 16 enrollee. The director shall make the synopses public.

18 777.795. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, the written records of an export
 19 trading corporation shall be public records available for inspection under ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

 21 **2011 Act**, the following public records of an export trading corporation are exempt from disclosure:

22 (a) Information consisting of financial, commercial, sales, production, cost or similar business

25 (b) Trade secrets, as defined in [ORS 192.501 (2)] **section 14 (1)(a) of this 2011 Act**.

26 **SECTION 88.** ORS 802.183 is amended to read:

27 802.183. (1) The Department of Transportation may establish fees reasonably calculated to re-
 28 imburse it for its actual cost in making personal information available to a person or government
 29 agency authorized under ORS 802.179 to obtain the information. Fees established under this sub-
 30 section are subject to the provisions of ORS 192.440 [(4) to (6)] **(10) to (12)**.

31 (2) The department may adopt rules specifying conditions that must be met by a person or gov-
 32 ernment agency requesting personal information under ORS 802.179. Such conditions may include
 33 but need not be limited to:

34 (a) Providing reasonable assurance of the identity of the requester;

35 (b) Providing reasonable assurance of the uses to which the personal information will be put, if
 36 applicable;

37 (c) Showing that the individual whose personal information is to be disclosed has given permis-
 38 sion for the disclosure, if permission is required; and

39 (d) Submitting a written request for the personal information in a form prescribed by the de-
 40 partment.

41 **SECTION 89.** ORS 802.187 is amended to read:

42 802.187. (1) Nothing in ORS 802.175 to 802.187 authorizes disclosure by the Department of
 43 Transportation of personal information that is barred from disclosure by the provisions of ORS
 44 192.445 or [192.502 (2)] **section 13 (1) of this 2011 Act**.

45 (2) Nothing in ORS 802.175 to 802.187 prohibits an individual from having access to personal

1 information about the individual that is contained in motor vehicle records.

3 **JUDICIAL ORDERS**

5 **SECTION 90. Notwithstanding any other provision of ORS 192.410 to 192.505, a public re-**
6 **cord may be protected from disclosure by court order. The process for requesting access to**
7 **a public record or for appealing the denial of access to a public record under ORS 192.410 to**
8 **192.505 does not apply to a public record that is protected from disclosure by court order.**

18 **SECTION 92. The unit and section captions used in this 2011 Act are provided only for**
19 **the convenience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or**
20 **express any legislative intent in the enactment of this 2011 Act.**

21 **SECTION 93. Sections 4 and 10 of this 2011 Act and the amendments to ORS 192.410,**
22 **192.420, 192.440, 192.450, 192.465, 192.480, 192.490 and 802.183 by sections 1 to 3, 5 to 8 and 88**
23 **of this 2011 Act become operative on July 1, 2012.**

27 **SECTION 94. This 2011 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
28 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2011 Act takes effect**
29 **on its passage.**
