SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Clarifies that state board or commission may meet through telephone or other electronic means. Provides that member who attends meeting through telephone or other electronic means is not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for expenses.

Modifies terms of office, compensation and reimbursement for expenses for members appointed to certain public bodies.

Adjusts amount of times certain boards must annually meet.

Repeals provisions relating to certain task forces and establishing Healthy Streams Partnership. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

2 Relating to the operation of public bodies with appointed members; creating new provisions;

7 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

8 **SECTION 1. (1) A state board or commission may meet through telephone or other**
9 **electronic means in accordance with ORS 192.610 to 192.690.**

10 **(2)(a) Notwithstanding ORS 171.072 or 292.495, a member of a state board or commission**
11 **who attends a meeting through telephone or other electronic means is not entitled to com-**
12 **penetration or reimbursement for expenses for attending the meeting.**

13 **(b) A state board or commission may compensate or reimburse a member, other than a**
14 **member who is a member of the Legislative Assembly, who attends a meeting through tele-**
15 **phone or other electronic means as provided in ORS 292.495 at the discretion of the board**
16 **or commission.**

17 **SECTION 2.** ORS 192.670 is amended to read:

18 192.670. (1) Any meeting, including an executive session, of a governing body of a public body
19 which is held through the use of telephone or other electronic communication shall be conducted in
20 accordance with ORS 192.610 to 192.690.

21 (2) When telephone or other electronic means of communication is used and the meeting is not
22 an executive session, the governing body of the public body shall make available to the public at
23 least one place where, **or at least one electronic means by which**, the public can listen to the
24 communication at the time it occurs [*by means of speakers or other devices*]. [*The*] **A** place provided

1 may be a place where no member of the governing body of the public body is present.

2 **SECTION 3.** ORS 442.830 is amended to read:

3 442.830. (1) There is established the Oregon Patient Safety Commission Board of Directors con-
4 sisting of 17 members, including the Public Health Officer and 16 directors who shall be appointed
5 by the Governor and who shall be confirmed by the Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS 171.562
6 and 171.565.

7 (2) Membership on the board shall reflect the diversity of facilities, providers, insurers, pur-
8 chasers and consumers that are involved in patient safety. Directors shall demonstrate interest,
9 knowledge or experience in the area of patient safety.

10 (3) The membership of the board shall be as follows:

11 (a) The Public Health Officer or the officer's designee;

12 (b) One faculty member, who is not involved in the direct delivery of health care, of the Oregon
13 University System or a private Oregon university;

14 (c) Two representatives of group purchasers of health care, one of whom shall be employed by
15 a state or other governmental entity and neither of whom may provide direct health care services
16 or have an immediate family member who is involved in the delivery of health care;

17 (d) Two representatives of health care consumers, neither of whom may provide direct health
18 care services or have an immediate family member who is involved in the delivery of health care;

19 (e) Two representatives of health insurers, including a representative of a domestic not-for-profit
20 health care service contractor, a representative of a domestic insurance company licensed to
21 transact health insurance or a representative of a health maintenance organization;

22 (f) One representative of a statewide or national labor organization;

23 (g) Two physicians licensed under ORS chapter 677 who are in active practice;

24 (h) Two hospital administrators or their designees;

25 (i) One pharmacist licensed under ORS chapter 689;

26 (j) One representative of an ambulatory surgical center or an outpatient renal dialysis facility;

27 (k) One nurse licensed under ORS chapter 678 who is in active clinical practice; and

28 (L) One nursing home administrator licensed under ORS chapter 678 or one nursing home di-
29 rector of nursing services.

30 (4) The term of office of each director appointed by the Governor is four years. Before the ex-
31 piration of the term of a director, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on
32 [October 1] **July 2** next following. A director is eligible for reappointment for an additional term. If
33 there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become effective im-
34 mediately for the unexpired term. The board shall nominate a slate of candidates whenever a va-
35 cancy occurs or is announced and shall forward the recommended candidates to the Governor for
36 consideration.

37 (5) The board shall select one of its members as chairperson and another as vice chairperson for
38 the terms and with the duties and powers as the board considers necessary for performance of the
39 functions of those offices. The board shall adopt bylaws as necessary for the efficient and effective
40 operation of the commission.

41 (6) The Governor may remove any member of the board at any time at the pleasure of the
42 Governor, but not more than eight directors shall be removed within a period of four years, unless
43 it is for corrupt conduct in office. The board may remove a director as specified in the commission
44 bylaws.

45 (7) The board may appoint subcommittees and advisory groups as needed to assist the board,

1 including but not limited to one or more consumer advisory groups and technical advisory groups.
2 The technical advisory groups shall include physicians, nurses and other licensed or certified pro-
3 fessionals with specialty knowledge and experience as necessary to assist the board.

4 (8) No voting member of the board may be an employee of the commission.

5 **SECTION 4.** ORS 192.549 is amended to read:

6 192.549. (1) The Advisory Committee on Genetic Privacy and Research is established consisting
7 of 15 members. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall
8 each appoint one member and one alternate. The Director of the Oregon Health Authority shall
9 appoint one representative and one alternate from each of the following categories:

10 (a) Academic institutions involved in genetic research;

11 (b) Physicians licensed under ORS chapter 677;

12 (c) Voluntary organizations involved in the development of public policy on issues related to
13 genetic privacy;

14 (d) Hospitals;

15 (e) The Department of Consumer and Business Services;

16 (f) The Oregon Health Authority;

17 (g) Health care service contractors involved in genetic and health services research;

18 (h) The biosciences industry;

19 (i) The pharmaceutical industry;

20 (j) Health care consumers;

21 (k) Organizations advocating for privacy of medical information;

22 (L) Public members of institutional review boards; and

23 (m) Organizations or individuals promoting public education about genetic research and genetic
24 privacy and public involvement in policymaking related to genetic research and genetic privacy.

25 (2) Organizations and individuals representing the categories listed in subsection (1) of this
26 section may recommend nominees for membership on the advisory committee to the President, the
27 Speaker and the director.

28 (3) Members and alternate members of the advisory committee serve two-year terms and may
29 be reappointed.

30 (4) Members and alternate members of the advisory committee serve at the pleasure of the ap-
31 pointing entity.

32 **(5) Notwithstanding ORS 171.072, members and alternate members of the advisory com-
33 mittee who are members of the Legislative Assembly are not entitled to mileage expenses
34 or a per diem and serve as volunteers on the advisory committee. Other members and al-
35 ternate members of the advisory committee are not entitled to compensation or reimburse-
36 ment for expenses and serve as volunteers on the advisory committee.**

37 [(5)] (6) The Oregon Health Authority shall provide staff for the advisory committee.

38 [(6)] (7) The advisory committee shall report biennially to the Legislative Assembly in the
39 manner provided by ORS 192.245. The report shall include the activities and the results of any
40 studies conducted by the advisory committee. The advisory committee may make any recommen-
41 dations for legislative changes deemed necessary by the advisory committee.

42 [(7)] (8) The advisory committee shall study the use and disclosure of genetic information and
43 shall develop and refine a legal framework that defines the rights of individuals whose DNA samples
44 and genetic information are collected, stored, analyzed and disclosed.

45 [(8)] (9) The advisory committee shall create opportunities for public education on the scientific,

1 legal and ethical development within the fields of genetic privacy and research. The advisory com-
2 mittee shall also elicit public input on these matters. The advisory committee shall make reasonable
3 efforts to obtain public input that is representative of the diversity of opinion on this subject. The
4 advisory committee's recommendations to the Legislative Assembly shall take into consideration
5 public concerns and values related to these matters.

6 **SECTION 5.** ORS 285A.091 is amended to read:

7 285A.091. (1) The Oregon Infrastructure Finance Authority Board is created as a policy-making
8 and advisory body within the Oregon Business Development Department. The board consists of nine
9 members as follows:

10 (a) One nonvoting member appointed from members of the Senate by the President of the Senate;

11 (b) One nonvoting member appointed from members of the House of Representatives by the
12 Speaker of the House of Representatives;

13 (c) One member appointed by the State Treasurer; and

14 (d) Six members appointed by the Governor.

15 (2) Persons appointed members of the board must be Oregon residents, well qualified by experi-
16 ence to make policy and recommendations in areas of concern to the Oregon Infrastructure Finance
17 Authority and to perform the duties of office. Members shall be appointed with consideration given
18 to knowledge and experience:

19 (a) In the field of state and municipal finance;

20 (b) Of the infrastructure and public works needs in Oregon cities;

21 (c) Of the infrastructure and public works needs in Oregon counties;

22 (d) Of issues related to ports that affect the state;

23 (e) Of issues related to special service district services furnished across the state; and

24 (f) Of infrastructure and public works necessary to further Oregon's long term economic growth.

25 (3) The office of the State Treasurer may recommend persons with expertise in the field of state
26 and municipal finance for membership on the board.

27 (4) The term of a member of the board appointed by the Governor, the State Treasurer or the
28 President of the Senate is four years. The term of a member appointed by the Speaker of the House
29 of Representatives is two years.

30 (5) In case of a vacancy on the board for any cause, the appointing authority shall appoint a
31 successor to serve for the unexpired term.

32 (6) A member of the board may be appointed to serve two consecutive terms. A member who
33 serves two consecutive terms is not eligible for reappointment within one year following the expi-
34 ration of the second term.

35 (7) The board shall select one of its members to chair the board for such term and with duties
36 and powers necessary to perform the functions of the office as the board determines.

37 (8) A majority of the voting members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of
38 business.

39 **(9) Notwithstanding ORS 171.072, members of the board who are members of the Legis-**
40 **lative Assembly are not entitled to mileage expenses or a per diem and serve as volunteers**
41 **on the board.**

42 **(10) Members of the board who are not members of the Legislative Assembly are entitled**
43 **to compensation and reimbursement for expenses as provided in ORS 292.495.**

44 **SECTION 6.** ORS 409.520 is amended to read:

45 409.520. (1) The Pain Management Commission shall consist of 19 members as follows:

1 (a) Seventeen members shall be appointed by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority. Prior
2 to making appointments, the director shall request and consider recommendations from individuals
3 and public and private agencies and organizations with experience or a demonstrated interest in
4 pain management issues, including but not limited to:

5 (A) Physicians licensed under ORS chapter 677 or organizations representing physicians;

6 (B) Nurses licensed under ORS chapter 678 or organizations representing nurses;

7 (C) Psychologists licensed under ORS 675.010 to 675.150 or organizations representing psychol-
8 ogists;

9 (D) Physician assistants licensed under ORS chapter 677 or organizations representing physician
10 assistants;

11 (E) Chiropractic physicians licensed under ORS chapter 684 or organizations representing
12 chiropractic physicians;

13 (F) Naturopaths licensed under ORS chapter 685 or organizations representing naturopaths;

14 (G) Clinical social workers licensed under ORS 675.530 or organizations representing clinical
15 social workers;

16 (H) Acupuncturists licensed under ORS 677.759;

17 (I) Pharmacists licensed under ORS chapter 689;

18 (J) Palliative care professionals or organizations representing palliative care professionals;

19 (K) Mental health professionals or organizations representing mental health professionals;

20 (L) Health care consumers or organizations representing health care consumers;

21 (M) Hospitals and health plans or organizations representing hospitals and health plans;

22 (N) Patients or advocacy groups representing patients;

23 (O) Dentists licensed under ORS chapter 679;

24 (P) Occupational therapists licensed under ORS 675.210 to 675.340;

25 (Q) Physical therapists licensed under ORS 688.010 to 688.201; and

26 (R) Members of the public.

27 (b) Two members shall be members of a legislative committee with jurisdiction over human
28 services issues, one appointed by the President of the Senate and one appointed by the Speaker of
29 the House of Representatives. Both members shall be nonvoting, ex officio members of the commis-
30 sion.

31 (2) The term of office of each member is four years, but a member serves at the pleasure of the
32 appointing authority. Before the expiration of the term of a member, the appointing authority shall
33 appoint a successor whose term begins on July 1 next following. A member is eligible for reap-
34 pointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appointment
35 to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

36 **(3) Members of the commission are not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for**
37 **expenses and serve as volunteers on the commission.**

38 **SECTION 7.** ORS 417.845 is amended to read:

39 417.845. (1) The Juvenile Crime Prevention Advisory Committee is created within the State
40 Commission on Children and Families.

41 (2) The committee shall have the following members:

42 (a) The Director of the Oregon Youth Authority or a designee of the director;

43 (b) The staff director of the State Commission on Children and Families or a designee of the staff
44 director;

45 (c) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority or one or more designees of the director, one

1 of whom has expertise in treatment and prevention of substance abuse;

2 (d) The executive director of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission or a designee of the
3 executive director;

4 (e) The Superintendent of Public Instruction or a designee of the superintendent;

5 (f) The Superintendent of State Police or a designee of the superintendent;

6 (g) The Director of the Department of Corrections or a designee of the director;

7 (h) One designee of the Governor;

8 (i) One member appointed by the President of the Senate, who shall be a member of the Senate
9 and who shall be a nonvoting, advisory member;

10 (j) One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall be a
11 member of the House of Representatives and who shall be a nonvoting, advisory member; and

12 (k) One designee of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court from the Judicial Department who
13 serves as a nonvoting member to provide information and support the partnership role of the courts
14 in an effective comprehensive statewide approach to high-risk youth and their families.

15 (3) In addition to the members listed in subsection (2) of this section, the Governor shall appoint
16 the following members who shall be representative of the geographic and cultural diversity of the
17 state:

18 (a) To represent local public and private entities:

19 (A) A county commissioner;

20 (B) A local juvenile director;

21 (C) A director of a local commission on children and families;

22 (D) Two law enforcement officials;

23 (E) A county mental health director;

24 (F) An alcohol and drug abuse professional;

25 (G) A school superintendent;

26 (H) A private youth service provider; and

27 (I) An elected city official;

28 (b) A researcher;

29 (c) A citizen member; and

30 (d) Other members as determined by the Governor.

31 (4) Each member of the committee appointed by the Governor under subsection (3) of this sec-
32 tion shall serve a term of four years. Members appointed by the Governor shall serve at the pleasure
33 of the Governor. A vacancy in the office of any member appointed by the Governor under subsection
34 (3) of this section shall be filled by the Governor by appointment for the unexpired term.

35 (5) The Governor shall select one of the members of the committee as chairperson and one of
36 its members as vice chairperson.

37 (6) The committee shall meet at times, places and intervals deemed advisable by a majority of
38 the members.

39 (7) The State Commission on Children and Families shall provide staff support to the committee.

40 **(8) Members of the committee who are members of the Legislative Assembly are entitled**
41 **to compensation and reimbursement of expenses as provided in ORS 171.072.**

42 **(9) Members of the committee who are not members of the Legislative Assembly are not**
43 **entitled to compensation, but may be reimbursed for actual and necessary travel and other**
44 **expenses incurred by them in the performance of their official duties in the manner and**
45 **amounts provided for in ORS 292.495. Claims for expenses shall be paid out of funds appro-**

1 **riated to the State Commission on Children and Families for purposes of the committee.**

2 **SECTION 8.** ORS 660.321 is amended to read:

3 660.321. (1) A State Workforce Investment Board shall be created under section 2821(b) and (c)
4 of the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 to assist in the development of the State Unified Workforce
5 Plan established under ORS 660.324 and to carry out the other functions described by the federal
6 Act.

7 (2) The membership of the board [*shall*] **must** be in accordance with the requirements of section
8 2821(b) of the federal Act.

9 (3) Representatives of business described in section 2821(b)(1)(C)(i) of the federal Act who are
10 appointed to the board [*shall*] **must** be confirmed by the Senate in the manner prescribed under ORS
11 171.562 and 171.565.

12 (4) The Governor shall select a chairperson in accordance with the requirements of section
13 2821(c) of the federal Act.

14 (5) A majority of the board [*shall*] **must** be representatives of business, as described in section
15 2821(b)(1)(C)(i) of the federal Act.

16 (6) Members of the Legislative Assembly appointed to the board are nonvoting members of the
17 board and may act in an advisory capacity only.

18 (7) To transact business at a meeting of the board, a quorum of voting members must participate.
19 A quorum [*shall consist*] **consists** of a majority of the voting members. At least 25 percent of the
20 members participating [*shall*] **must** be representatives of business, as described in section
21 2821(b)(1)(C)(i) of the federal Act.

22 **(8) Members of the board are not entitled to compensation, but may be reimbursed for**
23 **actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their**
24 **official duties in the manner and amount provided for in ORS 292.495.**

25 **SECTION 9.** Section 1, chapter 782, Oregon Laws 2009, is amended to read:

26 **Sec. 1.** (1) The Oregon Broadband Advisory Council is established within the Oregon Business
27 Development Department. The council shall consist of 14 members, of whom:

28 (a) The Governor shall appoint 12 members as follows:

29 (A) One member to represent the counties of this state.

30 (B) One member to represent the cities of this state.

31 (C) Three members to represent telecommunications service providers and Internet service pro-
32 viders in this state. At least one member must represent rural telecommunications consortia.

33 (D) One member to represent Oregon tribes.

34 (E) One member to represent education.

35 (F) One member to represent economic development.

36 (G) One member to represent public safety.

37 (H) One member to represent health.

38 (I) One member to represent government's electronic interface with the public.

39 (J) One member from the Public Utility Commission.

40 (b) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one nonvoting member who is a
41 member of the House of Representatives.

42 (c) The President of the Senate shall appoint one nonvoting member who is a member of the
43 Senate.

44 (2) The term of office of each voting member is four years, but a voting member serves at the
45 pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a voting member, the Governor shall

1 appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next following. A voting member is eligible
2 for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to
3 become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

4 (3) The nonvoting legislative members shall serve two-year terms and are eligible for reap-
5 pointment.

6 (4) Members of the council **who are not members of the Legislative Assembly** are not enti-
7 tled to compensation, but voting members may be paid expenses if funding is available from contri-
8 butions accepted under section 3 (2), **chapter 782, Oregon Laws 2009** [of this 2009 Act].

9 **(5) Members of the council who are members of the Legislative Assembly are entitled to**
10 **compensation and expense reimbursement as provided in ORS 171.072.**

11 [(5)] (6) The council shall select one of its voting members as chairperson and another voting
12 member as vice chairperson, for such terms and with duties and powers necessary for the perform-
13 ance of the functions of such offices as the council determines.

14 [(6)] (7) A majority of the voting members of the council constitutes a quorum for the trans-
15 action of business.

16 [(7)] (8) The council shall meet at least once every three months at a place, day and hour de-
17 termined by the council. The council may also meet at other times and places specified by the call
18 of the chairperson or of a majority of the members of the council.

19 [(8)] (9) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the voting members.
20 The council may recommend legislation, which must be prepared in time for pre-session filing at the
21 next regular session of the Legislative Assembly.

22 [(9)] (10) The Oregon Business Development Department shall provide staff or facilities to the
23 council.

24 [(10)] (11) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services, the Public Utility Commission
25 and the Department of Education may provide staff or facilities to the council.

26 [(11)] (12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist the
27 council in the performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to
28 confidentiality, to furnish such information and advice as the members of the council consider nec-
29 essary to perform their duties.

30 **SECTION 10.** ORS 173.500 is amended to read:

31 173.500. (1) There is established within the legislative department the Oregon State Capitol
32 Foundation. The foundation shall be composed of not fewer than nine and not more than 25 voting
33 members, who shall each serve a term of four years. The President of the Senate shall appoint three
34 voting members from members of the Senate. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall
35 appoint three voting members from members of the House of Representatives. The Legislative Ad-
36 ministration Committee shall appoint the remaining voting members. A member is eligible for reap-
37 pointment. At all times there shall be appointed to the foundation an odd number of voting members.
38 The foundation may appoint honorary, nonvoting members to the foundation.

39 (2) The Oregon State Capitol Foundation shall:

40 (a) Advise the Legislative Administration Committee on the terms and conditions of contracts
41 or agreements entered into under ORS 276.002.

42 (b) Recommend to the committee renovations, repairs and additions to the State Capitol.

43 (c) Recommend to the committee exhibits and events for the State Capitol.

44 (d) Deposit gifts, grants, donations and moneys converted from gifts or donations of other than
45 money into separate trust accounts reserved for the purposes of the gifts, grants and donations.

1 (e) Develop, maintain and implement plans to:

2 (A) Enhance and embellish the State Capitol in keeping with the design and purpose of the
3 building and adjacent areas; and

4 (B) Preserve the history of activities of state government that have occurred in the State Capitol
5 and of persons who have participated in state government in the State Capitol.

6 (f) Adopt rules to guide the foundation and implement the foundation's responsibilities under this
7 subsection and the foundation's authority under subsections (3) to (5) of this section.

8 (g) Consult with any advisory committees the Legislative Administration Committee may desig-
9 nate before the foundation makes a recommendation required by this subsection.

10 (3) The Oregon State Capitol Foundation may:

11 (a) Solicit and accept gifts, grants and donations from public and private sources in the name
12 of the foundation.

13 (b) Under guidelines adopted by the Legislative Administration Committee, expend moneys from
14 the Oregon State Capitol Foundation Fund for the purposes set out in subsection (2) of this section,
15 including but not limited to the reasonable and necessary operating expenses of the foundation.

16 (c) Convert gifts or donations other than money into moneys.

17 (d) Become or create an organization under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

18 (4)(a) As used in this subsection, "community foundation" has the meaning given that term in
19 ORS 348.580.

20 (b) The Oregon State Capitol Foundation may enter into agreements with a person, including a
21 community foundation in Oregon, for the person to assume the management of the moneys in the
22 Oregon State Capitol Foundation Fund. The Oregon State Capitol Foundation may transfer to the
23 person any moneys in the fund.

24 (c) The Oregon State Capitol Foundation shall include in any agreement entered into under this
25 subsection a requirement that:

26 (A) The person conduct a periodic independent financial audit of the moneys transferred to the
27 person.

28 (B) The person prepare an annual financial report according to generally accepted accounting
29 principles.

30 (C) The person submit an annual financial report to the Oregon State Capitol Foundation, the
31 Legislative Administration Committee and the Oregon Investment Council.

32 (d) If a provision of an agreement entered into under this subsection would cause the person to
33 be out of compliance with a federal law, the Oregon State Capitol Foundation may waive the pro-
34 vision.

35 (5) The Oregon State Capitol Foundation may, through the Legislative Administrator, enter into
36 contracts or agreements to implement the foundation's responsibilities and authority. ORS 279.835
37 to 279.855 and ORS chapters 279A, 279B and 279C do not apply to a contract or agreement entered
38 into by the foundation.

39 (6) The Oregon State Capitol Foundation may take action under this section upon a majority
40 vote of a quorum of members. A majority of the voting members of the foundation constitutes a
41 quorum for the transaction of business.
