A-Engrossed Senate Bill 723

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON HEALTH CARE, HUMAN SERVICES AND RURAL HEALTH POLICY

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Changes name of Respiratory Therapist Licensing Board to Respiratory Therapist and Polysomnographic Technologist Licensing Board. Expands board membership to include two individuals who practice polysomnography and authorizes qualified medical director for polysomnography to serve on board.

Directs board to license polysomnographic technologists beginning January 1, 2012.

Prohibits practice of polysomnography by person other than licensed polysomnographic technologist. Makes prohibition operative January 1, 2013.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.
