Senate Bill 994

Sponsored by Senator COURTNEY

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Resolves conflicts in certain education bills. Creates Task Force on Virtual School Governance. Sunsets task force on date of convening of 2012 legislative session. Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2011.

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(5) Each year the resident district shall be accountable for determining the student's progress

toward achieving the academic content standards. Progress toward the academic content standards shall be measured in a manner that clearly enables the student and parents to know whether the student is making progress toward meeting or exceeding the academic content standards. In addition, the district shall adopt a grading system based on the local school district board adopted course content of the district's curriculum. The grading system shall clearly enable the student and parents to know how well the student is achieving course requirements.

(6) If a student has not met or has exceeded all of the academic content standards, the school
district shall make additional services or alternative educational or public school options available
to the student.
